NUCLEAR SAFETY - CHANCELLOR SCHMIDT'S LETTER OF 28 MAY

Your letter of 30 May. What follows has been approved by my Secretary of State.

Chancellor Schmidt's initiative follows, of course, from Harrisburgh, and his Government's difficulties in pursuing the development of nuclear power because of public opposition and the resistance of some local and Lander authorities. He is also concerned about the fact that French and East German nuclear stations are situated near the FRG border and he needs to be assured that their standards are acceptable to the FRG. (No doubt they are equally concerned about the FRG's own standards).

His message to the Prime Minister should be read in conjunction with the spelling out of what he has in mind, given in the letter from his Minister Hauff to the Director General of the IAEA (see telegram number 92 of June from Vienna attached). From this it is clear that apart from dressing up an international gesture, Chancellor Schmidt is primarily proposing a stepping up of activities in which the IAEA is already involved.

FEDERAL CHANCELLOR'S LETTER TO PRIME MINISTER: REACTOR SAFETY

1. ROUGET (FEDERAL FOREIGN MINISTRY) INFORMED COUNSELLOR (SCIENTIFIC) THAT THIS INITIATIVE WAS IN ACCORD WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S STRONG BELIEF THAT GOVERNMENTS HAD IN GENERAL FAILED TO KEEP THE PUBLIC PROPERLY INFORMED ON NUCLEAR ENERGY MATTERS, THAT GOVERNMENTS MUST BE SEEN TO BE ACTING DECISIVELY ON A MATTER OF SERIOUS PUBLIC CONCERN, AND THAT THE RESULTS OF SUCH AN INVESTIGATION SHOULD BE PUBLISHED WIDELY. THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT WERE NOT CONVINCED THAT ACTION BEING CONSIDERED BY THE IAEA DIRECTOR GENERAL TO SET UP A COMMITTEE OF INDEPENDENT EXPERTS WOULD MEET THE CASE AND AUTHORIGED HAUFF, MINISTER FOR RESEARCH AND TECHNOLOGY, TO PUT PROPOSALS IN A LETTER DATED 17 MAY TO EKLUND (COPY AND TRANSLATION FOLLOW BY BAG) WITH A VIEW TO HAVING THE SUGGESTIONS CIRCULATED AMONG TAEA MEMBERS AND PERHAPS RAISED AT THE JUNE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS. 2. ROUGET SUGGESTED THAT A FIXED TIME LIMIT EXERCISE, PERHAPS ON THE INFCE MODEL, MIGHT BE APPROPRIATE WITH A NUMBER OF WORKING GROUPS OF EXPERTS AND A TECHNICAL COORDINATING COMMITTEE. HE ACCEPTED THAT THE FRENCH INITIAL REACTION MIGHT BE LUKEWARM BUT HOPED THEY WOULD (AS WITH INFOE) BECOME ACTIVE COLLABORATORS. ME STRESSED THE NEED TO ALLOW FOR DIFFERENT NATIONAL APPROACHES TO QUESTIONS OF REACTOR SAFETY AND THE FREEDOM OF EACH STATE TO MAKE ITS DECISIONS IN THIS AREA. ALTHOUGH THE UNITED STATES HAD MADE IT CLEAR THEY WOULD PREFER INTERNATIONAL DISCUSSIONS (PERHAPS FOR 6 MONTHS) UNTIL SUCH TIME AS DISCUSSION WOULD NO LONGER BE DOMINATED BY THREE MILE ISLAND, ROUGET POINTED OUT THAT IT WOULD TAKE SEVERAL MONTHS BEFORE A FRAMEWORK FOR INTERNATIONAL DISCUSSION COULD BE SET UP.

3. ROUGET EXPLAINED THAT THE CHANCELLOR'S CALL FOR AN INTERNATIONAL INVESTIGATION STEMMED FROM HIS VISIT TO BRAZIL IN THE IMMEDIATE AFTERMATH OF THREE MILE ISLAND. THE ORIGINAL FRG/BRAZIL IDEA HAD BEEN TO REFER THE MATTER TO INFCE BUT IT WAS SOON REALISED THAT IT WAS NOT APPROPRIATE TO INFCE'S TERMS OF REFERENCE AND INFCE WAS IN ANY CASE ALREADY APPROACHING ITS FINAL STAGES.

TOKYO SUMMIT: GERMAN INITIATIVE ON NUCLEAR SAFETY

- 1. DAHLHOFF, CHARGE D'AFTAIRES OF THE FRG MISSION TO THE TAEA, HAS GIVEN ME COPIES OF A LETTER AND MEMORANDUM SENT BY THE FEDERAL MINISTER FOR RESEARCH AND TECHNOLOGY TO THE DIRECTOR GENERAL OF THE TAEA. TEXTS ARE IN MY TWO IFT'S.
- 2. DAHLHOFF EXPLAINED THAT THE LETTER AND MEMORANDUM RESULTED FROM A CABINET DECISION ON 14 MAY THAT AN INITIATIVE MUST BE TAKEN IN THE INTERNATIONAL FIELD CONCERNING THE SAFETY ASPECTS OF NUCLEAR POWER. HE SAID THAT THE FEDERAL CHANCELLOR HAD ADDRESSED LETTERS TO HEADS OF GOVERNMENT OF THREE GROUPS OF STATES. THE FIRST WAS TO PARTICIPANTS IN THE TOKYO SUMMIT. THE SECOND WAS TO MEMBERS OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY NOT ATTENDING THE SUMMIT. THE THIRD WAS TO MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE IAEA WO WERE NOT IN EITHER OF THE TWO PRECEDING CATEGORIES.
- 3. DANLHOFF SAID THAT THE DELIVERY OF THE LETTER TO THE DIRECTOR GENERAL HAD COINCIDED WITH A MEETING OF SAFETY EXPERTS CONVENED ON THE DIRECTOR GENERALS HUITIATIVE. GAUSDEN WAS THE UK PARTICIPANT IN THAT MEETING. THE DIRECTOR GENERAL HAD ASKED THE MISSION OF THE FRG WHETHER HE SHOULD MAKE PARTICIPANTS IN THE EXPERT MEETING AWARE OF THE GERMAN INITIAVE. HE HAD BEEN TOLD THAT THE FRG WOULD PREFER THAT HE SHOULD NOT MENTION IT UNTIL THE GROUND HAD BEEN PREPARED IN CAPITALS.

- 4, DAHLHOFF SAID THAT HE/HAD HAD NO REPEAT NO 'OFFICIAL''.
  REACTION FROM THE IAEA BUT THE DIRECTOR GENERAL'S PRELIMINARY
  REACTION HAD BEEN FAVOURABLE. SINCE THE DIRECTOR GENERAL HAS,
  IN THE AFTERMATH OF THE THREE MILE ISLAND INCIDENT, BEEN DETERT
  MINED TO DEMONSTRATE THAT HE IS SEEKING FOR WAYS IN WHICH THE
  IAEA CAN ASSIST IN THE FIELD OF NUCLEAR SAFETY, AND SINCE THE
  LETTER FROM THE FEDERAL MINISTER FOR RESEARCH AND TECHNOLOGY
  IS ESSENTIALLY SUPPORTIVE OF ANY INITIATIVE HE MAY TAKE, IT
  COULD BE EXPECTED THAT THE OFFICIAL AGENCY REACTION WOULD ALSO
  BE POSITIVE.
- 5. I WAS CONTACTED TODAY BY MY CANADIAN COLLEAGUE WHO SOUGHT OUR VIEW ON THE GERMAN PROPOSAL. HE INDICATED THAT THE ATTITUDE OF HIS OWN GOVERNMENT WAS SOMEWHAT RESERVED. HE SAID, HOWEVER, THAT HE WAS NOT ABLE TO EXPAND ON THIS OR TO GIVE HIS REASONS.
- 6. A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE JAPANESE MISSION CALLED ON THE DIRECTOR OF THE LEGAL DIVISION OF THE IAEA EARLIER THIS WEEK. HE WISHED TO ADDRESS THE QUESTIONOF THE AGENCY'S ROLE IN MUCLEAR SAFETY, BUT MADE NO REPEAT NO REFERENCE TO THE GERMAN INITIAVE. HE SAID, HOWEVER, THAT IF NO OTHER COUNTRY SOUGHT TO MAKE REFERENCE TO THE SUBJECT IN THE FINAL COMMUNIQUE OF THE TOKYO SUMIT, JAPAN PROBABLY WOULD. HE REFERRED TO THE POSSIBILITY OF AN I INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION ON NUCLEAR SAFETY, BUT IT IS NOT CLEAR TO WHAT EXTENT HE WAS SPEAKING ON INSRUCTIONS OR WAS EXPRESSING A PERSONAL VIEW.
- 7. AS SEEN FROM HERE, IT IS LIKELY THAT THE AGENCY WOULD WELCOME INITIATIVES AIMED AT BUILDING ON ITS PRESENT WORK IN THE FIELD OF NUCLEAR SAFETY. DAHLHOFF SPOKE TO ME IN TERMS OF CONSTRUCTING A '' THIRD PILLAR'' OF IAEA ACTIVITIES, VIZ SAFEGUARDS, TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND NUCLEAR SAFETY. THE ATTITUDE OF THE DEVELOPING COUNTRIES WITHIN THE IAEA IS, HOWEVER, UNCERTAIN. THEY WOULD CERTAINLY BE RESISTANT TO ANY EXERCISE WHICH THEY COULD INTERPRET AS LIMITING THEIR FREEDOM TO DEVELOP NUCLEAR POWER. THEY WOULD ALSO BE LIKELY TO RESIST PROPOSALS WHICH SUBSTANTIALLY INCREASED

THEIR CONTRIBUTION TO THE IAEA BUDGET. THE QUESTION OF THE AGENCY'S ACTIVITIES IN THE FIELD OF NUCLEAR SAFETY IS ON THE AGENDA OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS TO BE HELD FROM 26 JUNE. DEVELOPING COUNTRY ATTITUDES WILL BECOME CLEARER ON THAT OCCASION.
