PRIME MINISTER'S DINNER WITH ARAB AMBASSADORS

- 1. THE GUARDIAN OF 7 JULY REPORTED THAT THE ARAB AMBASSADORS IN LONDON CANCELLED A DINNER WITH THE PRIME MINISTER AFTER SHE MADE IT CLEAR THAT THE PRESENCE OF THE PLO LONDON REPRESENTATIVE WOULD BE POLITICALLY EMBARRASSING.
- 2. THE STORY IS SUBSTANTIALLY ACCURATE AND REFLECTS PRESS BRIEFING BY NO 10 IN RESPONSE TO ENQURIES. THE INVITATION TO THE PRIME MINISTER WAS MADE BY THE ARAB AMBASSADORS IN LONDON EARLY THIS YEAR AND WAS ACCEPTED. HOWEVER THE GUEST LIST SENT SUBSEQUENTLY TO NO 10 CONTAINED THE NAME OF THE LONDON PLO REPRESENTATIVE, NABIL RAMLAWI, (WHO HAS SINCE BEEN MADE 'DEAN' OF THE ARAB DIPLOMATIC CORPS IN LONDON: WE DO NOT RECOGNIZE SUCH A POSITION). IT WAS MADE CLEAR TO THE ARAB AMBASSADORS THAT THE PRIME MINISTER COULD NOT ATTEND A DINNER WITH RAMLAWI PRESENT IN VIEW OF THE GOVERNMENT'S PRACTICE THAT MINISTERS DO NOT MEET REPRESENTATIVES OF THE PLO (MY TELNO GUIDANCE 89, PARAGRAPH 12). THE AMBASSAODRS FOR THEIR PART DID NOT FEEL ABLE TO WITHDRAW RAMLAWI'S INVITATION AND CANCELLED THE DINNER. THERE WAS NO ACRIMONY.
- 3. IF YOU ARE ASKED ABOUT THIS, YOU SHOULD DRAW ON THE ABOVE AS APPROPRIATE, STRESSING THAT THE DINNER WAS CANCELLED BY MUTUAL AGREEMENT AND THERE WAS NO QUESTION OF ILL WILL OR ILL FEELINGS ON EITHER SIDE.

Arab Ambassador's Dinner

As I have mentioned to you on the telephone, the Prime Minister has seen your letter to me of 15 June on this subject and has decided that she will not be able to attend the dinner if Mr. Ramlawi is there. She does not believe that her attendance together with Mr. Ramlawi would be consistent with her firm public position that British Ministers are not meeting the PLO.

I should record one or two points in this letter:-

- a) It has always been the Prime Minister's understanding that in agreeing to attend the dinner with the Arab Ambassadors, in return for the lunch which she gave for a number of Ambassadors at Chequers last autumn, she was agreeing to dine with a group of accredited representatives.
- b) The arrangements for this meal e.g. the place and time of the dinner were negotiated by the diary secretary here before she saw a list of those who were going to attend.
- c) The list of those attending was not seen by the Prime Minister, or indeed by me, until very recently. There is no question of anyone here having changed their mind about the occasion.
- d) I do not think that it would be enough for Mr. Ramlawi to develop a "diplomatic illness" on the day of the dinner. What matters from the Prime Minister's point of view is that his name should not be on the list of those attending. There would however, in my opinion, be less difficulty from the Prime Minister's point of view if Mr. Ramlawi's name were not to appear on the guest list e.g. because he was away, and the Arab Ambassadors were to explain subsequently that he would have been invited if he had been available.

You asked whether the recent decision by Arab Ambassadors to regard Mr Ramlawi, the PLO representative, as their Dean could cause embarrassment at the dinner which the Arab Ambassadors are giving for the Prime Minister on 2 July, and said that if possible things should be so arranged that Mr Ramlawi would not be there.

Mr Ramlawi has discussed press comment on his appointment as 'Dean' with officials at the FCO. He volunteered that it was not the intention to cause any embarrassment to mblum of I had seen HMG, and he would not do so. Referring to the dinner for the Prime Minister, he said that it was not intended that he should act as Dean, make a speech, or take the lead in any way on that occasion, though he would if possible like to shake hands with the Prime Minister. He said, however, that it would be embarrassing both for his own people and for the other Ambassadors if he were left out of the party.

> Officials subsequently discussed this problem privately with the Jordanian Ambassador. He confirmed that Mr Ramlawi would not have any role as 'Dean' at the dinner. We said that there was a political difficulty about Mr Ramlawi's presence. We argued that the purpose of such an occasion could only be to improve relations and mutual understanding, not to score points or cause embarrassment. The Ambassador agreed and said that he and his colleagues regarded the proposed dinner as a great opportunity. It would, however, be very difficult to exclude Mr Ramlawi,

No representatives of the press would be invited and it was intended that the dinner should be entirely private. On present plans the numbers would be small, and guests would be limited to those who fully understood the intricacies of the problem. If, on the other hand, it would be easier for the Prime Minister to attend a larger party, this could be arranged.

Lord Carrington considers that it is unlikely that the Ambassadors will agree to remove Mr Ramlawi's name from the list. This would be an extremely embarrassing step for them, particularly as his name has been firmly on the list from the beginning. It is a fact that they accept Mr Ramlawi as their equal, because the PLO is a full member of the Arab League. It would be politically difficult, probably impossible, for the Arabs to unite on a step of this sort.

Equally, Lord Carrington recognises the awkwardness for the Prime Minister of the presence of a PLO representative. He believes, however, that it would be regretable if the dinner were to fall through after her acceptance had been so warmly welcomed. The timing, coinciding with the start of the UK Presidency, is an additional factor in our wishing this event to be a success.

The best solution, if the Prime Minister agrees, might be to encourage the Arabs to enlarge the guest list (which is at present limited to a few Conservative Members of Parliament sympathetic to the Arabs, apart from the Ambassadors themselves and the Arab League representative). The advantage of another dozen guests would be that it would no longer be possible to argue that Mr Ramlawi's presence implied recognition of any special status for him. Lord Carrington believes that it would be possible to get an assurance from the Arab Ambassadors that Mr Ramlawi would do nothing to embarrass the Prime Minister, and that this assurance would be honoured. In the event of publicity we would say that there was nothing new in the attendance of Ministers, including the Prime Mimister, at social functions at which a PLO representative was also present.
