ROYAL VISIT The Prime Minister will wish to know that it is proposed that Her Royal Highness Princess Alexandra will visit Northern Ireland on Tuesday 2 June, circumstances permitting. The main object of the visit is for HRH to attend the consecration of St Anne's Cathedral in Belfast on Tuesday evening, an event which will also be attended by the Archbishop of Canterbury and which will be covered

by television.

HRH will arrive in the early afternoon, visit a factory in Bangor, and open new District Council Offices and a new Recreation Centre in Banbridge before dining at Hillsborough Castle prior to the Consecration Ceremony. She will then return to Great Britain.

Security considerations are, of course, paramount in view of the present tense situation in the Province. On Thursday 28 May we shall review the security situation in the light of advice from the GOC and Chief Constable, and on 29 May my Secretary of State will advise the Royal Household whether the visit should take place. If that advice is favourable, the security situation will be kept under constant review and if the Palace agree, an announcement will be made late on Sunday (in time for Monday's newspapers) that HRH will be coming to attend the Consecration Service and to fulfil other engagements. The Press announcement will give no other details of the programme.

Knowledge of the proposed visit has been kept to the minimum number of people necessary to make the essential administrative arrangements. *

VISIT TO NORTHERN IRELAND BY PRINCESS ALEXANDRA

The Prime Minister would wish to be aware that preliminary planning is under way for a visit by Princess Alexandra to Northern Ireland on 29-June.

The purpose of the visit would be for Princess Alexandra to present the Queen's Badge (a new Red Cross award) to the Duchess of Abercorn, the President of the Northern Ireland Branch of the Red Cross; and to unveil the Royal Ulster Constabulary Book of Rememberance at the RUC Headquarters at Knock. The Red Cross presentation would take place at Hillsborough Castle in the morning and would provide the Princess with an opportunity to meet and talk informally with members of the Red Cross and representatives of the Service units and other charitable Cross and representatives of the Service units and other charitable organisations with which she has connections. In the afternoon there would be a short ceremony followed by an informal garden party at which Princess Alexandra would be able to meet members of the RUC and their families.*

The proposed visit would be limited to Hillsborough Castle and Knock. All travel within Northern Ireland would be by helicopter of the Queen's Flight except for the visit to Knock for which road travel would be necessary to and from the nearest helicopter landing site at Stormont Castle.

If the Prime Minister agrees that the visit should take place it would be accepted, as in the case of all Royal Visits in the last two years, that it might be necessary, for security reasons, to cancel the visit at any time up to the last minute.

We need to keep the visit confidential until as short a time in advance as is feasible. We would aim to announce it two weeks in advance since it would be difficult to plan in secret without a risk of leakage after that. A review of the security situation would be made before any announcement was made.

My Secretary of State believes that this proposed short visit is desirable. It should present no great security or administrative

difficulties. He would be grateful for the Prime Minister's approval to his proceeding with plans for the visit in consultation with St James's Palace on the basis of detailed arrangements to be made under his responsibility.
