Den John Bishop Muzorewa In Michael Alexander's letter of 1 December he said that the Prime Minister had asked whether it would not be possible at least to do something to help with the cost of Bishop Muzorewa's children's education and that she would be grateful if this could be looked at again. Lord Carrington, who shares the Prime Minister's obvious feeling of personal sympathy for the Muzorewa family, has again given this very careful thought. But he remains doubtful whether it would be right to make any further payments to Bishop Muzorewa even for this purpose. As I mentioned in my letter of 25 November the Bishop has already received from us a 'final payment' of US\$100,000 to buy a house and to look after his family after the elections in Zimbabwe. There is the risk that if we now start to subsidize the cost of keeping his sons at university in this country and the United States we may be taking on something of an open-ended commitment. Even if we made an ad hoc payment and told the Bishop that no more money would be forthcoming, on past form he could well come

back to us as soon as he ran short of funds.

Lord Carrington therefore thinks that it would be better to steer clear of supporting the educational costs of the Bishop's children and that we should stick to the decision to avoid making further payments to him.

Bishop Muzorewa

I enclose a letter addressed to the Prime Minister which Bishop Muzorewa recently passed to the High Commissioner in Salisbury. As you will see the Bishop is asking for \$75,000 (presumably Zimbabwe dollars and therefore the equivalent of £55,000) to improve the arrangements for his personal security and to cover the cost of keeping his two sons at university in London and the United States.

As the Prime Minister knows, considerable payments were made to Bishop Muzorewa between July 1979 and February 1980 as part of the process of securing a Rhodesia settlement. These payments were intended to strengthen the political position of the Bishop. In March 1980 Lord Carrington agreed that a personal payment should be made to Bishop Muzorewa of US\$100,000 to enable him to buy a house and look after his family while he re-established himself after his defeat in the elections. A further request for funds from the Bishop in May 1980 was refused.

Lord Carrington considers that there is no justification now for making further payments to Bishop Muzorewa. Subject to the Prime Minister's views, he proposes that the Acting High Commissioner in Salisbury should be instructed to pass this message orally to the Bishop: it would be a mistake in his view to commit any response to paper.

First of all, I wish to greet you heartily and to wish you excellent health, long life and reign.

Secondly, my family and I are exceedingly grateful for the 60% of the total cost of the house in which we are living with which I believe you had something to do.

Today, as a matter of emergency, I write out of desparation and concern. My personal safety is threatened - seriously. This may already be apparent to you judging from some of the press statements which are often made here.

I feel the urgent need to implement some vital security precautionary measures in the form of:

(a) having a security DURAWALL erected and extended along the perimeter of the four-acre plot of my residence.

(b) having security lights installed.

(c) continued maintenance for the four loyal and well trained close security quards and a chauffeur that I already have but will soon lose unless their \$250 per month salaries are guaranteed for at least the next twelve months. (The state's security men have since been withdrawn.)

In order to effect these measures and keep these essential guards, I require \$35,000 and \$15,000 respectively.


