

STERLING OPENED TODAY AT DOLLARS 1.5825 AND CLOSED AT DOLLARS 1.5788: OPENED AT DM 3.7267 AND CLOSED AT DM 3.7244: AND BOTH OPENED AND CLOSED AT 81.4. INTERVENTION WAS +6. THE BANK REPORT THAT TRADING WAS QUIET IN A THIN MARKET FOR MOST OF THE DAY. THE DOLLAR STRENGTHENED AGAINST MOST CURRENCIES WHEN THE U.S. DISCOUNT RATE WAS NOT REDUCED AS HAD BEEN EXPECTED.

THE THREE MONTH INTER-BANK RATE CLOSED AT 11 11/16, A FALL FROM THE MORNING WHEN IT WAS 11 7/8. GILTS FELL 3/4 (SHORTS) AND 1/2 (LONGS).

RFA FORT GRANGE (1520-1545)

Captain Barry RUTTERFORD RFA. The ship took part in Operation CORPORATE. She is a modern stores ship carrying food for the garrison and ships, naval stores and ammunition. She also carries 4 Seaking helicopters of 826 Naval Air Squadron (Lt Cdr David RAINES RN). FORT GRANGE was due to leave for the UK with the rest of the group at the end of February but the ship's company have just been informed that the ship will stay until the end of April.

The brief visit today will include the presentation of a Queens commendation for brave conduct to Engineer Officer Ian BOVEY RFA for his bravery when serving in RFA SIR GALAHAD.

MV STENA INSPECTOR (1555-1620)

Master - Captain John TURNBULL. This diving support ship was taken up from trade during CORPORATE and now serves as a Fleet Repair Ship. There is a large naval party on board, commanded by a naval engineer officer (Captain Stan MASON RN). The mix of RN/MN works very well, and the ship is likely to remain on station for most of 1983.

HMS CHARYBDIS (1620-1645)

Commander Niels WESTBERG RN. A newly converted Leander Class frigate equipped with Sea Wolf missiles. She arrived at the end of November with the rest of the group.

She is at present undergoing routine maintenance alongside STENA INSPECTOR and resumes patrol on 13 Jan.

MAIN STORIES IN MOST PAPERS ARE REPORTS ON THE THREE CENT DROP IN STERLING WHICH FORCED UP BANKING RATES BY ONE PER CENT TO 11 (ELEVEN) PER CENT. STERLING HAS NOW LOST 12 (TWELVE) PER CENT OF ITS VALUE SINCE MID-NOVEMBER. THE US LEADING BANKS CUT THEIR PRIME LENDING RATES BY D.5 (ZERODECIMALFIVE) PER CENT TO 11 (ELEVEN) PER CENT. THE F. TIMES SPLASH REPORTS THAT THE RISE HALTED THE POUND'S SLIDE. THE TIMES SAYS ON THE FRONT PAGE THAT MRS THATCHER CONTINUED HER PROGRESS AROUND THE FALKLAND ISLANDS BATHED IN THE WARM GLOW OF LOCAL HEROINE-WORSHIP AND PLEDGED THAT BRITAIN WOULD CONTINUE TO DEFEND THE COLONY FOR A LONG TIME TO COME. SHE SAID SHE HAD NO DOUBT THAT THE BRITISH PEOPLE WOULD BE PREPARED TO BEAR THE LONG-TERM HEAVY COST OF SUPPORTING THE ISLANDS AND MAINTAINING A GARRISON. THE REPORT ADDS THAT SHE DEFIANTLY DISMISSED ACCUSATIONS OF PROVOCATION FROM HER ADVERSARIES IN ARGENTINE AND OF PARTY POLITICAL EXPLOITATION FROM HER OPPONENTS AT HOME. SHE CONFIRMED THAT BRITAIN INTENDED TO REBURY 200 (TWOHUNDRED) ARGENTINIAN WAR DEAD ON THE ISLANDS IN SUITABLE AND FITTING CEMETERIES. THERE ARE ALSO DETAILS OF THE COSTS INVOLVED IN BUILDING A NEW RUNWAY. THE ITEM ADDS THAT MRS THATCHER'S VISIT TO THE ISLANDS WILL HAVE RUN UP A POUNDS STERLING 150,000 ONEHUNDREDANDFIFTYTHOUSAN) BILL FOR TRAVEL ALONE. THE F. TIMES QUOTES MRS THATCHER IN THEIR FRONT PAGE NEWS SUMMARY SAYING THAT THE ISLANDS ARE VERY BRITISH AND ARE BECOMING MORE SO. ITS MAIN REPORT IS ON PAGE FOUR UNDER THE HEADING: ''CHORUS OF CRITICISM GREETS THATCHER'S FALKLANDS VISIT' SAYING THAT ARGENTINE'S CONTINUED STRONG CRITICISM WAS ECHOED BY OTHER LATIN AMERICAN COUNTRIES. THE REPORT SAYS RENEWED EXPRESSION OF SYMPATHY AND SUPPORT HAVE COME FROM VENEZUELA AND PERU. BRAZIL AND MEXICO HAVE FAILED TO COMMENT. ALTHOUGH BOTH FAVOUR AGRENTINA'S CLAIMS, THEY ADOPTED A MODERATE STANCE DURING THE FIGHTING. SPAIN'S SOCIALIST PARTY AS ALSO

DENOUNCED THE VISIT AS ARROGANT AND RIDICULOUS SAYS THE REPORT. THE REPORT, FROM BUENOS AIRES, ADDS, HOWEVER, THAT BOTH GOVERNMENT AND OPPOSITION LEADERS IN THE ARGENTINE HAVE BEEN CAREFUL TO EMPHASISE THAT THE DISPUTE WITH THE UK SHOULD BE RESOLVED BY NEGOTIATIONS. ADDITIONAL MATERIAL WILL FOLLOW AS SOON AS OTHER FIRST EDITIONS ARE AVAILABLE.

SECRET FOFT 007/11 ZZ PORT STANLEY GRS 400 FM FCO 111943Z JAN 83 TO FLASH PORT STANLEY TELEGRAM NUMBER 18 OF 11 JANUARY FOLLOWING RECEIVED FROM CABINET OFFICE FOLLOWING IS A MESSAGE TO THE PRIME MINISTER FROM THE CHANCELLOR OF THE EXCHEQUER. THE EXCHANGE RATE AND INTEREST RATES 1. THE EXCHANGE RATE, DOLLAR AND EFFECTIVE, AGAIN FELL SHARPLY TODAY. THIS WAS ACCOMPANIED BY A RISE IN INTER-BANK INTERES RATES TO NEARLY 11 PER CENT THIS MORNING AND OVER 11 PER CENT THIS AFTERNOON. 2. I HELD A MEETING WITH THE BANK OF ENGLAND THIS MORNING AND MADE IT CLEAR THAT MY STRONG PREFERENCE NTEREST RATES DOWN. THE BANK'S PROPOSAL WAS THAT ITS BILL DEALING RATE SHOULD GO UP AT 1215- BUT THE CONCLUSION WAS THAT THEY SHOULD BE MAINTAINED AT 10 PER CENT. BARCLAYS, WHO HAD ALREADY INDICATED THAT THEY WISHED TO RAISE THEIR BASE RATE FROM THE EXISTING LEVEL OF 10 PER CENT, WERE ASKED TO DEFER A DECISION FOR THE TIME BEING. 3. IN THE EVENT THE EXCHANGE RATE WEAKENED FURTHER AND INTER-BANK RATES ROSE ABOVE 11 PER CENT. BY 1430 THE EFFECTIVE RATE WAS BO.3 AND THE DOLLAR RATE 1.5635 . A. BARCLAYS THEN MADE IT CLEAR THAT IN THESE CIRCUMSTANCES A REQUEST TO THEM TO DELAY AN ANNOUNCEMENT OF AN INCREASE IN BASE RATES BEYOND THIS AFTERNOON WOULD MAKE IT VERY LIKELY THAT THE INCREASE ON 12 JANUARY WOULD BE SUBSTANTIALLY LARGER THAN THE ONE POINT RISE THEY WISHED TO MAKE TODAY. THE BANK'S LADVICE, WHICH I RELUCTANTLY ACCEPTED AT 1500, WAS THEREFORE NOT TO REQUEST A FURTHER DELAY AND THEREBY RUN THE RISK OF AN EVEN BIGGER MOVEMENT IN BASE RATES TOMORROW. BARCLAYS ANNOUNCED A ONE POINT RISE AT 1630 - THE OTHER +nlat West-CLEARERS WILL NO DOUBT FOLLOW SUIT, STERLING ROSE SHARPLY: BY 1730 TO AN EFFECTIVE RATE OF 81.3 AND A DOLLAR RATE OF 1.5820. 5. THE BRIEFING LINE MAKES IT PLAIN THAT THE INCREASE IN BASE RATES, WHICH WILL BE FOUL OWED BY AN INCREASE IN THE BANK OF ENGLAND'S DEALING RATES FOR BILLS TOMORROW, WAS NOT ENGINEERED BY THE AUTHORITIES, IT GOES ON TO SAY THAT IT WAS NEITHER DESIRABLE NNOR FEASIBLE FOR THE AUTHORITIES TO RESIST THE MARKET DEVELOPMENTS WHICH PRODUCED THE RISE IN BASE RATES. THERE WAS NO EXCHANGE RATE TARGET, BUT THE EXCHANGE RATE HAD ALWAYS BEEN A FACTOR TO TAKEN INTO ACCOUNT IN ASSESSING MONETARY CONDITIONS AND DETERMINING THE AUTHORITIES' ATTITUDES TO INTEREST RATES. THE RECENT FALL IN THE EXCHANGE RATE REFLECTS MARKET UNCERTAINTIES ABOUT MONETARY CONDITIONS, DESPITE THE REASSURING POSITION ON THE POBR AND THE MONETARY AGGREGATES. THE RISE IN INTEREST RATES WOULD REASSURE MARKETS THAT THE MONETARY CONDITIONS



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we sent out a Task Force. It landed here after coming 8000 miles at San Carlos, yomped across from San Carlos to Stanley and defeated the Argentines in 10½ weeks. (cheers). To do all that in 10½ weeks was an incredible achievement. I know that for those of you who were here throughout that period it seemed like a lifetime, and I should like to hand over now to one of you who was here through all that time, a senior member of the Falkland Islands Government, your Financial Secretary who has a few words to say for all of you Islanders. Harold Rowlands.

The Hon OBE
/Harold Rowlands/ Financial Secretary
Prime Minister, Ladies and Gentlemen.

It is the greatest moment of my life here today. I am very pleased to be able to thank Mrs Thatcher in person for the liberation of the Falkland Islands. Not only the liberation but also the rehabilitation and now the development of the Islands. We look forward to the development of these Islands, that the battle was not wasted, that the men whose lives were lost will be remembered. We will make sure that it was worthwhile. I am sure that the majority of people will be looking forward to a great future, and to start it off in 1983, I think it's fantastic that we start our 150th celebrations in advance (cheers).

Prime Minister, I have now the pleasure and the honour to present the freedom of the Falkland Islands. (cheers). I would like to mention that it was not planned. The Councillors did not know of Mrs Thatcher's arrival here. Spontaneously, yesterday all Councillors unanimously agreed on your behalf, the people of the Falkland Islands. The people that are in this hall tonight, the people that are on duty, that are sick, unable to attend the meeting tonight, also the people in the Camp stations, the settlements, the outside houses, I do this on behalf of them with great pleasure. I should like to read you what is in it, and we must congratulate our Attorney General on having guided us on this matter, and also to our printer who did

a marvellous bit of printing at the last moment. It says: "Freedom of the Falkland Islands. Whereas we the people of the Falkland Islands have recently suffered armed invasion of our beloved Islands, and whereas but for the support and aid given to us by the people of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland we would still be under foreign domination today. Now we the undersigned Representatives of the people of the Falkland Islands, in acknowledgement of our humble and sincere gratitude and appreciation of the courageous steadfast and unyielding leadership of Margaret Hilda Thatcher, Prime Minister of the United Kingdom throughout the campaign for our freedom, hereby confer the said Margaret Hilda Thatcher the honorary freedom of Stanley and all townships and settlements throughout the Falkland Islands." (cheers)

Prime Minister

Mr Rowlands, that's the most marvellous honour you could have conferred upon me, and I am deeply happy to accept it. Each of us has our own memories of the period through which we've lived. Somehow history is something that happens to other people, and then all of a sudden we found ourselves making history here in these Islands. I will never forget, and nor will the Governor – forgive me if I still use the old name (cheers) – the night that information came through that there was a fleet that looked as if it was heading for the invasion of Port Stanley. We had to contact the Governor, we contacted the President of the United States hoping that he would be able to stop it. It was not to be. For two days we carried a few of us that knowledge that maybe the Falklands were going to be invaded, and help was a very very long way away. You know what happened, and I am very happy to report as you know that the whole British people were outraged that such an invasion should

have occurred, and promptly set about remedying the situation of throwing the invader off the Islands, and as I said in the House of Commons, restoring British sovereignty and British administration to a people of British stock who were British, were loyal British, and wished to remain British in a British Island. (cheers). And so with the total support of the British people the Task Force sailed. It must have been an agonising time for you, it was for us as the Campaign was shaped and planned, and we faced the worry of more and more Argentine soldiers being put upon these Islands, a worry which you saw in practical terms at this end. Then we were able in a magnificent campaign to retake South Georgia, and that of itself was a very famously fought battle. And we learned the difficulties of the weather in this part of the world, because I will tell you what happened when those forces arrived in South Georgia. They arrived to a force 11 gale. You can imagine the worries that that gave us. You have I understand experienced many force 11 gales. In spite of that they took South Georgia, and I understand that that was a tremendous boost to morale on these Islands. It was then you realised we really were coming to regain the Falklands for British sovereignty and British administration.

We wondered how precisely it would come about, and there was so much planning going on, and we didn't know the precise shape of the campaign. We knew we had the finest professional forces devoted and dedicated to the cause of freedom and justice the world over. (cheers). In them we put our faith and our trust. Then one dark winter's night a silent armada put ashore British forces on what was then a hostile enemy coast, but full of loyal devoted British citizens, that was in San Carlos. I remember I was in my own constituency that day, I knew the night it was going to happen. I was worried stiff as you may imagine, but I had a full day's engagements in my own constituency of Finchley near London, and I knew if I didn't go and carry out the lot someone would know /something

I'm not quite sure to this moment what I said except that somehow I had a speech to make; and I said please would they understand that my mind wasn't wholly on the party politics of Britain, it was really 8000 miles away which was a long way geographically but at that moment it was only a heartbeat away. And at the end of that day in my constituency I was able to say that the Union Jack was once again flying on the Falkland Islands. (cheers). To a reception like this as they too rose and cheered like that.

There were many difficult worrying days to follow, and many difficult battles to fight, and it is one thing that troubles us all that at times of national danger it is always the young people who have to bear the brunt of the fighting and make great sacrifices, and I have today been paying our tribute to those who gave their lives in battle that we might live in freedom. (applause). But it was a tremendous inspiration to the youth, British youth everywhere; to know that when the call came their generation was not found wanting but on the contrary added lustre to the battles which Britons have fought the world over. (applause). And we owe it to them to build our lives remembering the sacrifices that they made for us. And therefore I am confident that you in this famous city of Port Stanley, and many others in the famous townships throughout these Islands will strive again and again to build a better life for your families for the future, the better because of the sacrifices that have been made for us because we are a people that cannot live without breathing the air of freedom and justice. (cheers).

You will understand that perhaps the most emotional night of my life was when the news came in that the Argentine troops were retreating from Tumbledown Mountain past Mt William into Port Stanley. We weren't quite sure, and I waited until 1000 in the evening London time - rather differently your time - to go down to the House of Commons, to stand at the Despatch Box and say the reports are that the white flags are flying over Port Stanley. (cheers).

Today again the Union Jack flies over Port Stanley, and may it ever fly there (cheers). So we in the Falkland Islands and in Great Britain re-dedicate our lives to the cause of freedom and justice of peoples here and everywhere. We have given an example to the world, and hope to many of those who do not enjoy these great qualities. May we also act as a beacon of hope to them that so long as we defend that which is ours now, they too one day may enjoy these great things. (cheers).



Married (Wife: Jan, qualified teacher). Two daughters. Branch Engineer, Cable & Wireless Limited. Previous service with Falkland Islands Government (Wireless Station) and BAS. Elected to Legislative Council as representative for West Stanley, 1981. Formerly Chairman of the (local) Falkland Islands Committee. Went to New York with Mr A T Blake to address the Decolonisation Committee, U N, August 1982. Mr and Mrs Cheek were in the United Kingdom during the Argentine occupation. He was on a course with Cable and Wireless Limited but spent much of his time putting the Falklands case in the news media in the UK and the USA. He returned to New York with Mr A T Blake to address the Fourth Committee in November 1982. The Hon A T (Tony) Blake Age 42. Born in Britain. Married (wife: Lynn), two children. Mr Ingham The following is an account of the two telephone conversations which took place on Sunday 9 January 1983 between yourself and: 1) Mr A Protheroe of the BBC at 1840 (approx) local time Port Stanley, 2140 GMT and UK time; and Mr David Nicholas of ITN at 1900 (approx) local time Port Stanley, 2200 GMT and UK time, during both of which I was present. Mr Protheroe began the conversation to which you responded vehemently on the basis that you had provided them with a signal service, by detaining the BBC crew on the Falkland Islands at very considerable risk to the Prime Minister and her party in order that the media and public would be able to have an account of the Prime Minister's arrival and visit to the Islands. You could easily, and justifiably, have let the BBC crew return to the UK but you did not. On that basis you felt deeply hurt that the BBC had adopted this childish attitude by not making the film and soundtrack of the Prime Minister's arrival etc freely available to other networks. He obviously tried to oppose this argument because you kept stressing the all important security aspect, but he was obviously totally disregarding your line of reasoning. You asked him what alternative course you could have taken to which he replied that you could have spoken to him privately about the matter. Again you repeated the security aspect and, therefore, could not have done as he suggested. 2 Furthermore, you felt that if the British public were to become aware of the way in which the BBC had dealt with this matter, they (the British public) would not believe it possible. You also stated that you had not informed the Prime Minister of this incredible situation but were certain of the reaction you would get from her. 3 You also stated that you felt you deserved some gratitude, which as yet had not been forthcoming, for the considerable risk which you had taken in detaining the BBC and, as a result of the BBC's attitude, had regrettably been forced into making the threat of not allowing the film/soundtrack to leave the Islands. However, you were willing to release the material that evening only on his (Protheroe's) personal assurance that the material would be made freely available to the other networks as soon as it arrived in the UK. Mr Protheroe finally consented to do so which you confirmed twice before confirming the release of the material on that basis. 5 You then commented that you and he must have a meeting after you returned to the UK to discuss these problems as it was obviously not possible to continue in this fashion every time the PM makes a visit which is of a highly sensitive/secret nature. He agreed.

Born at Hill Cove and educated in Britain. Engaged in sheep farming from 1928 until his retirement in 1972. Manager of Roy Cove 1933-72. A pioneer of grasslands improvement. Chairman, Hydatids Eradication Committee since its formation in 1970. Elected member of the Legislative Council for West Falklands 1956-60 and 1964-71, and for Stanley 1971-76. Executive Council. Resigned from Executive Council 1976. Married (wife: Betty) with four sons. Awarded the CBE in the Birthday Honours List 1979. Both Mr and Mrs Miller remained in Stanley during the Argentine occupation.

J T (Jim) Clement JP

Executive Secretary Sheepowners' Association 1979. Engaged for many years in sheep farming. Retired as Manager, Fitzroy (FICo) 1971. Secretary, Green Patch Steering Committee. Married (wife: Dorothy (Bunny)). Three children. Mr and Mrs Clement were on leave in the UK during the Argentine occupation.

Rt Rev Monsignor D Spraggon OBE

Prefect Apostolic of Falkland Islands and Dependencies, St Mary's Church. Nine years in the Colony. Served as Chaplain in the Army and in the mission field in Nigeria. Born in Britain. Remained in Stanley during the Argentine occupation and received his OBE in the South Atlantic Honours List.

The Prime Minister speaking to the Executive/Legislative Councils in Government House this morning referred to three great experiences which she would always remember.

The first was on March 31st last year when she received intelligence that there was an invasion force on its way to Port Stanley. That, she said, was the worst week in her life.

"My second most moving experience was on June 14th when we received news - and I went to the House of Commons at 10 o'clock at night to make a statement - that white flags were flying over Port Stanley. That I will never forget."

"To come here is the third one" the Prime Minister said.

"This is more than a visit it is a profoundly moving experience because we have all been through things we hope will never be repeated. But I think having come through them, as we have, we can take a little bit of pride in being of British stock."

The Prime Minister's purpose was to hear from the Executive and elected officers how they see the future, and especially the Islands' development. They stressed the importance of making early progress on internal air services, farm purchase and educational development.

The Prime Minister received many warm and moving tributes from the representatives, both for her leadership and for the support of the Task Force and the British people.

In the course of her remarks she paid tribute to the Civil Commissioner, saying that the Islanders had been very fortunate in their Governor at the time of the invasion.

The Islanders, she said, went through a dramatic experience "and we at home went through an agonising experience".

"You know what we fought for - freedom and justice, which are two sides of the same coin. We had total faith in your wish to stand by everything we believe in and we also have total faith in the courage, bravery and skill of our Armed Forces. These things together brought us all a famous victory. In the end everyone knew you were British and wanted to remain British and throughout you remained totally loyal.

- 2. D/SSS system is the alternative. Ask swithboard to get 'Gateway'. This will come through on X170. If operator at MOD asks Logie is on no. 16. But by now MOD should be putting us through automatically.

PLAIN SPEECH

1. The GPO line takes a minimum of 10 minutes for call to get through, as the switchboard have to book the call. At times, on Sunday it was taking up to 1 hour so be warned if you choose this method. The advantages are that both parties can hear each other relatively easily whereas on secure speech the line is often distorted with much electronic interference. Therefore if nothing sensitive needs to be sent the GPO line may be the better choice.

However even this has its limitations. The link is not available between 2000 and 1100 hours GMT.

MESSAGES

MESSAGES

If lengthy messages need to be sent, then obviously the telephone links are <u>not</u> the best way. Experience proved that the best way was in telegram form via the MOD/FCO. Many Press Office telegrams were sent via MOD.

TLEGRAMS

- 1. Tels via the FCO are restricted to 0800 1700 hours London time.
- 2. Tels via MOD can be sent 24 hours and was the method adopted. To do this all telegrams must be sent via the Cabinet Office Communications people usual procedure of meeting someone at the connecting door.

Using this method, all tels have been sent 'Immediate' and have reached Logie within $l_2^{\frac{1}{2}} - 2$ hours. It is useful to warn Logie that a telegram is coming through so that he can be on hand.

Returning to question of secure speech, there is one other option not tested. There is a secure link to the MOD (HQ) in Port Stanley which is seperate to Logie's base. To use this link up which is both secure and also a better line, it is necessary to first call Logie on the open line or D/SSS so that he can call us back on this special link up. It will take him some 15 mins to get to this phone, provided there are no problems. (Press Office have made frequent use of this line in contacting Bernard but have done so by going across to MOD initial contact at MOD is Commander Peter Voute 218 6081. From our point of view, there is little point in contemplating going across to MOD.)

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CONTINGENCY PLAN FOR VISIT OF A VIP TO THE FALKAND ISLANDS

1.a.

GENERAL

1. There is a possibility that a very senior Minister may visit the Falkland Islands at some time during the next 2 month period. The Civil and Military Commissioners have decided therefore that a contingercy visit programme should be prepared which could be implemented at short notice.

AIM

2. The aim of this instruction is to detail an outline programme for a visit by a senior Minister. Additional instructions as necessary will of course be issued by this Headquarters once specific details are available.

ASSUMPTIONS

- 3. For planning purposes it is assumed that:
 - a. The VIP party will consist of the following personnel:
 - (1) VIP accompanied by wife/husband.
 - (2) Four personal staff one of whom will remain at Government House throughout the visit and will not accompany the VIP's on their tour of the Islands.
 - (3) A Service Chief.
 - b. The party would be accommodated at Government House throughout less the Service Chief who would stay at Britannia House.
 - c. The UK press will not be given any advance notice of a visit and therefore will arrive in the Falkland Islands at least 24 hours after the arrival of the VIP. However, members of the Press who are in the Falklands at the time of the VIP's arrival will be informed accordingly and will be afforded the normal facilities.

SECURITY

4. It is imperative that details of this contingency programme are kept on a strict need to know basis at all times. In the event of a visit taking place details of the programme are to be promulgated only to those personnel and units involved at the latest possible time commensurate with making sure that adequate preparations have been made. References to the programme should be by use of the Serial Number of each event detailed at Annex A.

DRESS / COMPLIMENTS

- 5. Throughout the visit the strictest attention is to be paid to dress and the paying of compliments. It would be appropriate also for 'Three Cheers' to be given when the VIP leaves respective locations.

 OUTLINE PROGRAMME
- 6. An outline programme for a 4 day period is at Annex A. It is probable

that any visit would continue for at least a further day but the detailed programme for that day would very much reflect the VIPs personal wishes and may include either a battlefield tour or a visit to some of the conservation areas. MOVEMENT The road and air transport programmes are at Annexes B and C respectively and the coordination of these is to be carried out from the HQ BFFI Ops Room. In addition there is to be an OIC with each party provided as follows: OIC Vehs. Officer nominated by G3 Army HQ BFFI. Officer nominated by G3 Air HQ BFFI. b. OIC Hels. SOCIAL FUNCTIONS Four social functions will be hosted by the Services during the visit. The broad details and responsibilities are set out at Annex D. PR 9. G5 are to assume responsibility for Press coverage of the visit and coordinate the accommodation, movement, transport and briefing as necessary. In the event of the UK Press arriving 24 hours after the VIP, G5 is to ensure that this initial period is covered by making maximum use of Service PR facilities and also those Press who are in the Falkland Islands at the time. One CHINOOK helicopter is allocated for air movement. Further details are at Annex E. PROTECTION 10. Personal Protection. Personal protection is to be provided for the VIP throughout the visit under arrangements of OC FIPU who will be briefed separately. 11. Area Protection. CO 1RHamps is to provide one inf pl from the coy based at Fox Bay for area protection duties. The deployment and operating procedures for this pl within Stanley are to be as detailed and coordinated by OC FIPU. A section of 10 men including an officer and 2 x PLOWPIPE Dets is to deploy with the VIP on visits outside Stanley sharing the helicopter facilities provided for the Press. The pl is to be fully equipped with rations and "with weapon" ammo scales and is to operate tactically while away from its base at the 1 RHamps Echelon. 12. Vehicle Escort. OC FIPU is to provide a vehicle escort for all visits carried out in the Stanley area. COMMUNICATIONS In general the normal communications systems will be used. In addition Comd JFSS is to provide and coordinate communications for: Personal escort for VIP. a. Inf protection pl. b. Military Commissioner - operator to be provided. Tpt party. Hels. Comd JFSS is also to ensure that CBF is able to communicate with the HQ BFFI Ops Room at all times. 2 of 3 SECRET

COMMAND AND CONTROL

- 15. Command and control of the visit will be exercised from the HQ BFFI Ops Room under the direction of COS. Any queries concerning the programme are to be directed to the Ops Room.
- 16. The dates for the visit will be passed to all addressees by secure means.
- 17. Ops Room briefings and manning levels will be as directed by COS.



VISIT TO THE FALKLANDS

This note sets out the line to be taken on inquiries about the Prime Minister's projected visit to the Falklands.

The objective of the exercise is to get the Prime Minister to the Falklands before the news of the visit breaks. Similarly, it will be necessary to leave open the question of precisely when she is to leave to fly home.

No information must be given of the Prime Minister's flight or visit until her arrival has been confirmed in No 10.

1. In response to questions before the Prime Minister leaves the UK press officers should say:

What's the Prime Minister's programme?

- The Prime Minister is down to spend the weekend at Chequers. She has a number of engagements next week; and (only to the Lobby) is due to see the Lobby next Thursday.
- Is she going to the Falklands? The Prime Minister does of course intend to visit the Falklands some time, but we cannot help you when.

Will you tell us when the Prime Minister is going?

- Probably not, given the security considerations.

Will the Prime Minister be taking a media party with her?

- Almost certainly not, given the security considerations, the transport difficulties and the accommodation problems.
- 2. Miss Christopherson will arrange with the Duty Clerk to be informed of when confirmation of arrival has been received. She will then inform MoD and FCO News Departments.

When did the Prime Minister fly to the Falklands?

- She left the UK on Friday night (10 pm from Brize Norton) in a VC10 for

2.

Ascension. She then transferred to a Hercules transport. The total flying time was, with a one hour break in Ascension.

Who is travelling with her?

- Mr Thatcher; Chief of the Naval Staff, Admiral Fieldhouse; 2 private secretaries (Mr Butler and Mr Coles); Chief Press Secretary (Mr Ingham); and a duty clerk (Alan Logie).

Why no detectives?

- The Prime Minister will be in the care of the military throughout. She was also anxious to keep her party to the absolute minimum. She is not, for example, taking any secretary.

How long has the visit been in the planning machine?

- A long time. Months on a contingency basis.

Why no media party?

- A BBC team is in the Falklands. The BBC is being asked to make its output generally available. Three other journalists, who will work on a pool basis, are on their way there - one from PA; one representating the Lobby; and an ITN reporter who will share BBC facilities. Problems of security, transport and accommodation place the severest limit on the facilities which can be accorded the media. We wish it were otherwise.

Why those three? - Was any effort made to get a larger party?

- The choice is entirely ours. Some hard decisions have to be made when numbers are limited. Yes, we examined the possibility but eventually decided for a number of reasons that only a very limited facility could be provided. To

repeat, we wish it had been possible to take more.

Is there any possibility of getting there?

- No. There is no point in trying. If we had intended you or others to go you would be on your way there. You will I fear simply have to grin and bear it.

Why has the Prime Minister gone (since she doesn't seem to be all that concerned about being seen there)?

- She has not gone for the benefit of the media. She has gone to see the Falklands for herself; to meet Islanders in their own communities; and of course to support the Islanders and the British Forces protecting them.

what will she see?

How long will she be there and - The visit will last for only a few days. We do not intend to be more precise about how long. In the course of the visit she will tour the Islands from her base with the Civil Commissioner in Port Stanley. You can assume she will visit most of the historic places.

Will she lay wreaths?

- Of course.

Is she taking any promises, initiatives, projects?

- No. The purpose is to meet the people. A lot of the decisions about the development of the Islands have already been taken.

is going quite deliberately before the publication of the Franks Report.

Presumably the Prime Minister - No. Publication of the Franks Report has got absolutely nothing to do with the timing of the visit. The timing is entirely due to the fact that this is a Recess, and it is at the height of the Falklands' summer when, theoretically at least, the weather should be better. You should not read anything into the visit in relation to Franks. My advice about Franks - to

repeat what we have consistently said about it - is to wait until it is published and not join the frenzy of speculation.

- The proposed itinerary is attached. But it must be emphasised that it is not final. It should only be used illustratively and the precise period of the visit should not be disclosed.
- Other questions which might arise are:
- How will TV pictures get back? Via Ascension from which it may be possible to satellite TV film. Still pictures will be satellited as now from the Falklands.
- arrangements have been laid on?
- So no special communications The BBC may be arranging for TV film to be satellited from Ascencion, having been flown from the Falklands by normal service. The media communications will be via satellite from a ship in Port Stanley.

Isn't the Prime Minister at risk all the time she is there and couldn't the Argentinians bottle her up there indefinitely?

- You can assume that the Prime Minister took the decision to make the visit in the light of advice about all the circumstances surrounding life in the islands.

Did any members of the Prime Minister's Cabinet know she was going?

- Very few indeed.

Was The Queen informed?

- Of course.

What is the cost of the visit? - Not known at this stage. The Prime Minister flew to Ascension by an aircraft which had other passengers on it. She had a specially prepared Hercules from Ascension to the Falklands.

What was special about the Hercules?

- The aircraft contained a porter cabin providing the Prime Minister with private sleeping and working head-quarters.

Ascension Island is a dependency of the colony of St Helena. It has no indigenous population but is used by Cable and Wireless PLC, the BBC and the Composite Signals Organisation (GCHQ) as well as the United States Air Force (USAF), the National Aeronautic and Space Administration (NASA) and the South African Cable Company (SACC) all of whom provide employment for people from St Helena.

Because of the strategic position of Ascension Island and the presence on it of Wideawake Airfield, which was built and is managed by the Americans under a lease agreement, Ascension played a vital part in the Falkland Islands campaign. The role of the United States Base and the people of the island in that campaign has already been recognised.

In view of this it would be very much appreciated if the Prime Minister would, despite the late hour and short stop over at Ascension, be kind enough to meet representatives of all sections of the community on her return through Ascension from the Falkland Islands. The meeting could take place at a small reception at CBFASI's Headquarters at Wideawake Airfield which is close to the air terminal. This will have to be in a Portakabin. A suggested guest list of people who were or will be involved with the Falkland Islands operations is attached. On route to this reception she could meet some of the servicemen if she so wishes.

Also attached are short notes on Ascension Island.

ASCENSION ISLAND

The island of Ascension lies in the South Atlantic close to the equator at 7 56's and 14 22'w. It is an island of purely volcanic origin and is only 34sq miles in area. Its nearest neighbour is the island of St. Helena some 700 miles to the southeast. The nearest land fall in Africa is at a distance of 900 miles.

Ascension is a young island in geological terms and the most recent volcanic eruptions may have taken place as little as 5-700 years ago. The oldest part of the island is Green Mountain 2,817 feet. The island is devoid of vegetation except for the upper slope of Green Mountain. Land on the peak has been farmed since the mid 19th century and to-day supplies the small population with vegetables and meat mainly lamb and pork. The Wideawake or Sooty Tern visit the island every tenth month in large numbers to breed. Green Turtles also use the sandy beaches of the island to lay their eggs between December and May each year.

Ascension is said to have been first discovered by Juan de Nova on Ascension Day 1501. It was uninhabited until 1815 when following the arrival of Napoleon in St. Helena it was decided to establish a small British naval garrison on Ascension. The island remained under the supervision of the Admiralty until 1922 when it was made a dependency of St.Helena by Royal Letters Patent.

In that year the Eastern Telegram Company (to become Cable and Wireless Ltd in 1934) who had established a submarine cable link between Ascension and St. Helena in 1899 to facilitate growing need for communications between England and South Africa, were granted permission to continue to operate from the island and to assume certain executive and administrative functions on behalf of the Governor of St. Helena.

In 1942 the British Government leased an area in the southwest corner of the island to the United States to enable them to build Wideawake Airfield for strategic purposes. The U.S. Military Withdrew in 1945 but returned in 1956 under a new agreement providing additional sites for the extension of the U.S. Long Range Proving ground for guided missiles. A further agreement was signed in 1965 to allow the United States to develop tracking facilities on the island in support of the National Aeronautics and Space Administrations Apollo Space programme.

By 1965 other users had arrived on Ascension with the result that an Administrator was appointed by the Government of St. Helena to look after its interests on the island. Agreement was reached between the years then Cable & Wireless, the B.B.C. and the Composite Signals Organisation and, later in 1967, the South Atlantic Cable Company, to provide and share the cost of certain services to the community. The property Services Agency, a department of the British Department of the Environment was brought in to carry out Public Works including the provision of power and water. P.S.A. withdrew in 1978 and the years assumed their responsibilities. The years and the y.S. Base have traditionally looked to St. Helena for the provision of labour with the result that the population of the island at the end of 1981 consisted of y.S.A. (143), Saint Helenians (617), British (194) and Others (17). Figures include women/children.

Ascension A.A.F. operates Wideawake Airfield. Normal Air Traffic averages 25 aircraft arrivals per month. The management and operation of the Base is a rrently under contract to pan American Airways with Radio Corp. of America (R.C.A.) their sub-contractor for operating all radios and radars (Instrumentation). The Base also feeds and houses the N.A.S.A. contractors personnel.

The current Base was constructed in 1956 adjacent to the WW II Air field which was built in 1942.

CABLE &. WIRELESS P.L.C.

The Eastern Telegraph Company first came to Ascension in 1899. The E.T.C. became Imperial and International Communications Ltd. (1929), subsequent to the introduction of radio communication and in 1934 the Company adopted its present title of Cable &. Wireless.

The Company built its first satellite Earth Station in Ascension in 1966 to support the N.A.S.A. Apollo programme and together with a second Earth Station introduced in October 1980 still provides the major route for international telecommunications to and from the island.

Cable &. Wireless, from its office in Georgetown provides international telephone, telegram and telex services.

Cable &. Wireless also operates and manages the common services for the British Organisations in Ascension :-

> Building and road maintenance, sewage. Medical and dental, Port facilities. school, Georgetown and Two Boats shops (sub-contracted), Farm and slaughterhouse, Public Health, and Certain recreational facilities.







THE INTERNATIONAL EDITOR OF THE NEWSPAPER, ROMARIO SCHETTINO, FOLLOWING HIS COI VISIT TO LONDON (20-27 NOVEMBER) CALLED ON HM AMBASSADOR ON 1 DECEMBER AND MENTIONED THAT HE HAD HEARD IN LONDON THAT "'A BRITISH MINISTER" WOULD BE VISITING THE FALKLANDS IN JANUARY FOR THE 150 YEARS' CELEBRATIONS AND THAT CONSIDERATION WAS BEING GIVEN TO A STOP-OVER IN BRAZIL. THE AMBASSADOR SAID HE KNEW NOTHING OF A PROPOSED VISIT BY A MINISTER TO THE FALKLANDS EARLY NEXT YEAR. IF ONE DID TAKE PLACE, THE POSSIBILITY OF THE MINISTER IN QUESTION VISITING BRAZIL EN ROUTE COULD BE ENTIRELY RULED OUT.

ANY PRIME MINISTERIAL VISIT TO FALKLANDS

You should have the following considerations in mind in planning any visit by the Prime Minister to the Falklands:

- 1. It will be virtually impossible to prevent publicity before the Prime Minister's arrival given the preparations that will have to be made in the Falklands.
- 2. It may be possible to get the Prime Minister en route from London without publicity, but we cannot count on this. It would be easier to accomplish this if she travelled during a Recess or a weekend but it would only be a matter of time before the news got out, almost certainly before she arrived.
- 3. Notwithstanding the enormous demand for places I would defend travelling without a media party on grounds of security, but it would be vital to have an MoD TV crew and stills photographer there with facilities for rapid transmission of film back to the UK; and to ensure that we had a sound, reliable writer in the Falklands to cover the entire visit from touchdown to departure. If this situation arose I would like to advise on the choice.
- 4. The above is the minimalist approach. It will probably satisfy no-one, including the Prime Minister.
- 5. An alternative approach would be for MoD to offer a facility visit to a group covering TV, radio, agencies, populars, qualities, regional and foreign newspapers which miraculously coincided with a Prime Ministerial visit; again I would like to advise on the choice and would wish to take responsibility for that choice when the inevitable complaints started to flow in. This ploy would of course run the risk of stimulating speculation that the Prime Minister was to visit; that would be lessened if there were an earlier dummy run by a reserve party.

- 6. Another alternative would be to grasp the nettle for me to select the media "pool" or "rota" party we wish to travel with us; to call the editors in individually, swear them to secrecy, and take them into our confidence to the extent that I reveal a Prime Ministerial visit is on (but not when) and that we propose to take X with us at short notice; X should not be told yet but should be kept close to the ranch. (I should preface all this by saying that circumstances dictate our chosen method of proceeding and there is no room for alteration).
- 7. For obvious reasons I would prefer the approach in Paragraph 6 if security allows.

To assist you in considering the alternatives I would advocate taking the following party of 10 for reasons which I explain below:

- BBC/ITN TV Glyn Mathias (ITN) with 2 crew preferably those who travelled with us to Far East; we know each other and get on. And I can deal with David Nicholas, Editor, ITN, who was by far the most helpful media man throughout the Falklands
- BBC/IRN/BBC Gordon Martin, BBC External Services, who has been on several Prime Ministerial tours; a serious, first-class extremely hard working and sympathetic journalist; he would do for all radio, assuming that numbers are severely constrained.
- Popular Jack Warden, Political Editor, Daily Express, Newspapers chairman of the Lobby and a very senior Lobby correspondent.
- Qualities Jim Wightman, Daily Telegraph political editor, another senior Lobby correspondent who is arguably the soundest and most objective reporter to the Lobby.

Apart from Cleaver, the PA photographer, none of the journalists I recommend went with the Task Force. I see no particular reason in view of the behaviour of many of them to give those with the Task Force much consideration. Nor are my suggestions Defence experts. They are predominantly political journalists. I believe that the Prime Minister's visit should be covered principally by political correspondents. I have chosen the most reliable and experienced - and a group which would get on together. Newspapers may object that they want to send feature writers; so far as I am concerned we would be in a seller's market. It is take it or leave it.

Three further points:

- the list clearly indicates a minimum media party of 10 and that leaves out of account a Welsh (Welsh Guards) representative;
- I need to be brought into the firm planning at the earliest opportunity;
- we must thoroughly investigate the transmission back of pictures, given that any visit is likely to be a short one.

Finally, you may care to see the attached minutes which underline the need for my taking control of the planning. I do not want MoD involved, except to the extent that it is necessary for them to issue our orders.

FALKLAND ISLANDS PRESS ARRANGEMENTS

I attended a meeting at MoD on Friday, 19 November, chaired by Brigadier Ramsbotham (DPR Army) to discuss future arrangements for press visiting the Falklands and in particular any facilities that MoD should be considering for any visit by the Prime Minister. Also present were Alan George (MoD) and Peter Marshall (FOO).

At present MoD/FCO aim to send 8 journalists per week. This includes British and foreign correspondents. However press interest is rapidly falling off and Brigadier Ramsbotham has proposed that from 1 January the number should be reduced to four per week. I attach a paper prepared by MoD which shows the allocations up to the end of this year. You will note that after 19 December the only press on the Islands will be BBC TV News. Seats have still to be allocated from 1 January 1983. MoD have promised to send me a list of outstanding bids. There are no resident UK correspondents on the Islands and no stringers.

Brigadier Ramsbotham asked what the position was in respect of a visit by the Prime Minister. He told me that he had sent a personal signal to the Commander British Forces alerting him to an extremely busy first quarter next year. He said it would be very difficult, if not impossible, to achieve reasonable press coverage without adequate warning of a visit by the Prime Minister. Special communications arrangements for press copy, photographs and radio reports would be necessary; arrangements would have to be made to transport press from Stanley to any communications ship, and helicopter transport would also be necessary to get them around the Islands. MoD envisaged that the Prime Minister would probably carry a press party on her aircraft.

I told Brigadier Ramsbotham that in answer to any inquiries about a visit by the Prime Minister we took the line that no decisions had been made. I made it absolutely clear that MoD should make no arrangements involving the press which might suggest that a visit by the Prime Minister was imminent or likely. Nor should they encourage certain newspapers/broadcasters to think it would be in their interests to be in the Falklands at a certain time - this would be too obvious. I said that there was always a possibility the Prime Minister might visit with absolutely no advance notice or publicity in which case we would have to make do with whatever press/facilities happened to be on the Islands at that time. Nevertheless I said that in January and February MoD/FCO should, if possible, maintain eight journalists per week on the Islands and try to ensure a representative mix of British reporters.

Depending on the circumstances of any visit by the Prime Minister, we should not overlook the possibility of using MoD photographers and an MoD TV team. Apparently BBC and ITN are quite accustomed to using MoD material, particularly in the context of NATO. By using MoD staff, this would not necessarily involve alerting media organisations in advance but would ensure availability of pictures.

I attach my minute to you of 18 November together with details of the 18 bids we have received to accompany the Prime Minister. Also attached is a letter from Neville Taylor and a copy of a signal from Brigadier Ramsbotham to the Commander British Forces in respect of the BBC TV Songs of Praise programme from the Falklands to be screened on 2 January.

TV PICTURES FROM THE FALKLAND ISLANDS

- 1. You may wish to know that I have been approached by Mr Mike Neuston of ITN and Mr Ken Oxley of BBC and asked to attend an informal exploratory meeting on Monday 8 November to look again at any assistance we may be able to give in sending TV back to UK from the FI. I have accepted on the condition that the meeting should be without prejudice and of a technical nature. You may recall that I was closely involved with the same 2 gentlemen when the subject was last raised! I will attempt to see you before the meeting, however in view of the short notice, I thought I had better let you have something in writing.
- 2. The object of BBC and ITN is to provide joint coverage of the Prime Minister's visit to the FI in Feb 85, and they want to start the detailed planning of this important event now. In view of the political nature and PR value that can be extracted from the visit, I have assumed that you would wish me to be as cooperative as possible.
- 3. It would seem that the following factors have changed since we last addressed the problem.
 - e. The SKYNET IIB footprint now covers the FI and should still do so in Feb83.
 - b. With the sessation of hostilities, it may be easier for CINCFLEET to find a SCOT fitted ship to assist.
 - c. The runway at Port Stanley could be used for flying in equipment, thus considerably shortening the logistic tail.
 - d. The US attitude to the use of DSCS has hardened.
- The technical problems have not changed. We can still only offer a poor monochrome picture without sound from a SCOT ship over SKYNET IIB, although the ship could now access the satellite from Port Stanley. BBC and ITN have said that although black and white may have been acceptable during the war, they require colour for this venture. The military TSC 502 land terminal in the FI will not transmit TV via SKYNET IIB because its power rating is some 10dB EIRP less than SCOT. You may remember that the SCOT experiment showed a power margin of only 4dB; and thus you can see we are a long way short on power. We did demonstrate that the TSC 502 could transmit colour TV, if we had enough power in the satellite. . The only available satellite with adequate power is the spot beam of AO DSCSII. but we would have to ask the US to re-configure the satellite at the expense of their own operational requirements. Since the conflict the US has become extremely awkward about our operational use of DSCS, and has refused to re-negotiate the MOU which expires next month. Any approach to mess around with satellite for TV would need extreme caution and a political judgement I am unqualified to make. The only sensible answer still seems to be a commercial land terminal and we may be able to help with logistics.
 - 5. I will explain the problems to the BBC and ITN at our meeting, but my main intention is to avoid being accused of any lack of will.

TV PICTURES FROM THE FALKLAND ISLANDS

Reference: RC3 loose minute D/DNOR/30/1/8 of 5 Nov 82

- 1. You will recall from the Reference that I attended a meeting yesterday with the BBC and ITN to investigate how we could send TV to the UK from the FI to cover the Prime Minister's visit in Feb 83. The purpose of this minute is to report the outcome of the meeting.
- 2. The meeting was very informal and conducted in a most friendly and pleasant atmosphere. I put the MOD position as outlined in the Reference, and apart from one aspect, had no need to stray from my brief. The BBC and ITN had discovered from an undisclosed source that MOD was planning to procure a NATO 7 metre earth station, and they asked whether this could be used to transmit TV via SKYNET IIB. I stated that it would probably be technically suitable, but since we did not anticipate delivery before Apr 83, it would not meet the timescale. Furthermore we were procuring the terminal to meet an important operational requirement in the UK and would be unwilling to release it for TV.
- 3. The BBC/ITN position is that they wish to cover this important event and the SCOT/SKYNET IIB mute monochrome solution is not suitable they want colour. They are very limited for cash and cannot afford to lease a commercial terminal. Their own satellite terminals are designed to operate over the Orbital Test Satellite (OTS) system in the 11/14 GHz band, but the OTS footprint does not cover the South Atlantic. The INTELSAT satellites they use operate in the 4/6 GHz band, and although this system has the required coverage, the BBC/ITN do not own any terminals in this band, relying on fixed commercial links for their broadcasts. They stated that the INTELSAT V satellite which does have an 11/14 GHz capability is not yet operational. This fact is not strictly true, the satellite is operational but there does not appear to be a suitable (Standard C) earth station in the UK.
- 4. The BBC/ITN are following up 3 actions and will no doubt come back to me in due course.
 - a. The Secretary of State's recent visit was covered by flying material to a fixed commercial satellite terminal and accepting a delay of about 12 hours. This delay could be reduced by using facilities at Montevideo or Punta Arenas with a microwave link to Santiago, and we estimate that the minimum delay could come down to about 2 hours. The BBC/ITN are assessing the problem and in particular seeking advice on whether the very much cheaper delay option is acceptable against the very expensive real time solution.
 - b. BBC/ITN are going to approach industry to see if they can arrange a deal such that they borrow a 4/6GHz terminal in exchange for some free publicity. They may then ask MOD to transport it to the FI.

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- c. We discussed a speculative solution which required a SCOT fitted ship alongside transmitting into a big dish on the jetty and then back to UK via SKYNET IIB. The practical problem here is that the TX/RX waveguide from SCOT to the dish must not exceed 12m, and even this length will give some attenuation. Thus it is really only an idea but the BBC/ITN will see if they can acquire a dish.
- 5. I enclose a copy of my bread and butter letter to ITN and I have taken the opportunity to amplify a couple of points in this brief. I will report any further developments.

I thought our meeting was very useful and I hope it helps to contribute to a satisfactory outcome to your venture. Now that I am back in the office and have had time to think there are a couple of points that come to mind and I am copying this letter to Ken Oxley at the BBC to keep him in the picture. Firstly you may recall that we discussed a possible solution using a large dish on the jetty working through a SCOT fitted ship alongside and operating over the SKYNET satellite. There is one practical problem I forgot to mention. There is a limit on the length of TX/RX waveguide between the terminal and the dish, and this must not exceed 12m, and even this length will give some attenuation. If you should find a suitable dish we would need to re-calculate our sums with RSRE, assuming we can overcome the physical problem. Secondly you said that your own terminals operate in the 11/14 GHz band using the OTS system and that the INTELSAT capability in this band is not yet operational. Our information from COMSAT General is that the INTELSAT V satellites launched in 1981 do have a 11/14 GHz system and that a Standard C earth station was commissioned at West Virginia in the same year. However there does not appear to be a Standard C station in UK. Would it be possible to use one of your own terminals in the FI and double hop through the US? It might even be worth asking COMSAT General for their advice on the whole problem. Thank you again for all your generous hospitality. Your Visit to the Falklands

I have held up the attached papers until the weekend, because I think you need time to consider them carefully.

Sir Robert Armstrong's minute (Flag A) covers a JIC assessment on the risk of possible Argentine action to disrupt your visit or worse.

The Defence Secretary's letter at Flag B recognises that you should go but not at the time of the 150th anniversary celebrations. He recommends a surprise visit on the lines of those you have made to Northern Ireland.

Anything may happen between now and February but I think we have to face the fact that there is a real risk of Argentina trying to disrupt any visit you make in connection with the anniversary celebrations.

I do not think you can make a surprise visit quite on the lines of those you have made to Northern Ireland. A trip to the Falklands is a different proposition. But there is everything to be said for minimising advance knowledge of the visit, so that the Argentines have little opportunity to prepare. Other dates which you could consider are the Easter Recess (1-10 April) - but you should bear in mind that you will also be travelling in the Whitsun Recess for the Economic Summit; and 8-12 or 13 January (but you will be speaking to the Conservative Trade Unionists on 15 January).

I think it will be worth discussing this with your colleagues. We could perhaps invite the Defence Secretary, Foreign Secretary, Home Secretary and Sir Robert Armstrong. We need to take some kind of decision fairly soon because Rex Hunt will need to know whether the dates of the anniversary celebrations should be extended.

Agree that we should arrange such a meeting?

POSSIBLE VISIT TO THE FALKLAND ISLANDS BY THE PRIME MINISTER

Thank you for your letter of 26th October commenting on one from John Holmes of 22nd October, which I have seen on my return from the Defence Secretary's visit to the Falkland Islands and Ascension Island.

The Defence Secretary considers that the Prime Minister should visit the Falkland Islands. He believes that the Prime Minister would find a visit valuable and enjoyable and it would of course be warmly welcomed by the Islanders themselves. He does however believe that there would be considerable drawbacks in a visit which was known in advance, as would inevitably be the case if the Prime Minister attends the 150th Anniversary celebrations. Although we have yet to see the JIC assessment commissioned in your letter of 26th October, the Defence Secretary considers that we could not rule out some form of Argentinian response to a visit linked to the Anniversary celebrations. The problems of protecting an aircraft with the Prime Minister on board on the long journey from Ascension Island to the Falkland Islands should not be underestimated; and the garrison itself could be put under strain in preparing to deal with possible Argentinian incursions linked to the visit. The Defence Secretary's strong preference would therefore be for the Prime Minister to pay a "surprise" visit to the Islands on the lines of those which she has made to Northern Ireland, the timing of which could be kept to a very small circle. The Argentinians would then have no opportunity to plan some form of military action in advance.

As to transport to the Islands there have been some changes in our planning since we provided you with earlier advice. The highest priority is now being given to constructing accommodation for our Servicemen and to building aircraft dispersal areas and it is now unlikely that the runway at Port Stanley will be lengthened

to 7,100 ft before March or April next year. The present 6,100 ft runway is suitable for use by Nimrod aircraft only when military requirements dictate that the risks involved must be accepted. But the Prime Minister and her party (provided it was kept reasonably small) could certainly fly from Ascension Island to the Falkland Islands in a Hercules with some form of VIP fit. The flight is very slow and the aircraft is inevitably much noisier and less comfortable than a passenger plane. But the discomfort involved has been over-dramatised in the press.

You referred to the reinforcement exercise. The CDS has now concluded, and the Defence Secretary has agreed, that a full reinforcement exercise should not be held before the next Falklands summer begins in November 1983 and this is not therefore a complication.

Finally, John Holmes referred to the question of the Prime Minister making brief stop-overs in Dakar and Freetown on her way to and from the Falklands. You may like to know that the Defence Secretary himself called in at Dakar and thanked personally the Senegalese Defence Minister for the assistance that had been given to us. Mr Nott considers that this is sufficient in the case of Senegal and, given that the journey to and from the Falklands is inevitably somewhat wearing and time-consuming, he suggests that the Prime Minister should travel direct to and from Ascension Island.

Possible Visit to the Falkland Islands by the Prime Minister

You will have seen John Holmes' letter of 22 October about the possibility of the Prime Minister visiting the Falkland Islands for the 150th anniversary celebrations.

I think that the Prime Minister will wish to make a decision about this visit in the next week or two. But it would be helpful if further advice could be provided.

In particular, I am sure that Mrs. Thatcher would welcome the views of your Secretary of State in the light of his own visit to the Islands. Does Mr Nott consider that a visit by the Prime Minister in February is desirable? Furthermore, does he wish to offer views on the question of transport, which is to some extent dealt with in John Holmes' letter?

At an earlier stage, reference was made to the Ministry of Defence mounting a reinforcement exercise at the time of the anniversary celebrations. Is this still planned, what would it involve and does it have any implications for a possible visit by the Prime Minister?

Finally, we should give thought to the question of possible Argentine attitudes to a visit by the Prime Minister. It would be helpful if Richard Hatfield, to whom I am copying this letter, could arrange for a JIC assessment of any threat which might arise from that quarter during a visit by the Prime Minister.

It would be most helpful if advice on these various points could reach me by 5 November so that the Prime Minister can consider the matter over the weekend of 6/7 November.

Possible Visit to the Falkland Islands by the Prime Minister

In your letter of 11 October you asked whether we could obtain discreetly from the Civil Commissioner an indication of whether the dates for the 150th Anniversary celebrations on the Falkland Islands could be extended to allow for a possible visit by the Prime Minister.

You will now have seen Port Stanley telegram 395 (copy enclosed) in which the Civil Commissioner reports that there should be no problem about moving dates: planning is clearly not very far advanced. It may be unnecessary to delay the whole of the celebrations, but clearly if this would make the difference between attendance and non-attendance by the Prime Minister, Sir R Hunt is prepared to do this. Whatever is decided, however, the Civil Commissioner will presumably have to tell the organising committee why he is proposing a change of dates. When the Prime Minister has taken a final decision we shall have to give careful consideration to the timing of an announcement: it would be better, if possible, to avoid any coincidence with the UN Falklands debate (now likely to be the first week of November).

On the question of possible transport, you may be interested in Mr Onslow's views in the light of his recent trip. He is not convinced that it is necessary for the Prime Minister and her party to be flown from Ascension to Port Stanley by Nimrod and believes that this option should be looked at again. In particular he believes that if the Hercules is still the standard means of air transport to the Falkland Islands at the time of the celebrations, it could be psychologically important for the Prime Minister to travel by this means as well.

Having himself just returned from the Falklands by Hercules, Mr Onslow does not think the difficulties and discomforts of travelling by this means should be over dramatised. On the face of it, and subject to MOD views, there would seem to be no insuperable obstacle to putting a 'VIP fit' into an ordinary Hercules, which would give the Prime Minister the privacy that she would need, and which could be combined with the installation of sufficient standard airline seats to enable her party to travel with her in reasonable comfort. The one possible drawback would be the noise level, but this could perhaps be minimised by making use of the more modern, and quieter version of the aircraft. Whatever aircraft is used, there remains the inevitable risk of political embarrassment if it is obliged to divert to an airport on mainland South America: that is not in our view a sufficient argument to rule out a visit, but security aspects will obviously need to be very carefully considered. Mr Nott will no doubt have views on all this when he has returned from his own visit to the Falklands.

Attendance by other Ministers at the celebrations will depend upon whether the Prime Minister is able to be present herself. If she is not able to go, Mr Pym would be ready to represent the Government. Mr Marten has in any case been invited separately to visit the Islands. If the Prime Minister goes, he would be happy to accompany her if she wishes. Otherwise, he would propose to pay a separate visit to the Islands either in January or independently for the celebrations.

On a separate point, we know that the Islanders wish to invite Prince Andrew to return for the celebrations. Mr Pym sees no reason to discourage this, although the celebrations will in some ways inevitably be a highly political occasion.

Finally, you may wish to be aware that, if the Prime Minister decides to accept the invitation to the Falklands, we may wish to recommend that - if time permits - she should make very brief stop-overs in Dakar and Freetown on her way to and from the Falklands. Both Senegal and Sierra Leone provided invaluable assistance in support of the Task Force. We would expect that both would warmly welcome such stop-overs, despite reservations about our Falklands policy elsewhere in the non-aligned movement.

Possible Visit to the Falkland Islands by the Prime Minister

As you know, the Prime Minister has not taken a firm decision as to whether she should visit the Falkland Islands at the time of the Anniversary celebrations next February. Mrs. Thatcher is aware of the logistic problems (see Nick Evans' letter of 1 October) and will wish to receive further advice on these in due course. Meanwhile, you should know that the Prime Minister intends to carry out an engagement at the Institute of Directors on Wednesday, 23 February. If she goes to the Falklands, she will need to leave London after this event. In that connection, the Prime Minister has enquired whether there is any possibility of the celebrations in the Falklands being extended to, say, 27 or 28 February.

Unless you see objection, could you please make a discreet enquiry of the Civil Commissioner. Rex Hunt could be told that the Prime Minister is unlikely to be able to take a firm decision on the visit until a good deal later in the year but that, if she attends the celebrations, she is more likely to do so at the end than at the beginning. She has, in any case, an engagement in London on 23 February. In carrying out a further examination of the possibility of a visit, it would be helpful to know whether the celebrations could be extended to 27 or 28 February.

As you know, the press and the BBC have told everybody that the Prime Minister will be visiting the Falkland Islands in February. This is not necessarily the case. The Prime Minister would like the following line to be used but only in answer to questions (we do not want the press to announce a reversal of plans): "The Prime Minister very much wants to visit the Falklands on the occasion of the 150th Anniversary but a final decision cannot be taken until the logistics have been worked out and until we are sure that the plans fit in with those which the Islanders have worked out for the celebrations."

For your own information, I think it could well be late in the year before a final decision can be taken.

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PRIME MINISTER YOUR VISIT TO THE FALKLAND ISLANDS As you know, the Institute of Directors are hoping that you will address them on 23 February (and Walter Goldsmith has written a strong letter urging that you keep this date). The celebrations in the Falkland Islands of the 150th Anniversary are from 20 - 26 February on present plans. Providing all the difficulties (see below) can be solved, you could just about give your speech to the Institute, take off immediately afterwards, fly to Ascension by VC10 (11 hours), rest for a few hours and then proceed by Nimrod to Port Stanley (9 hours). You would then be able to attend the end of the celebrations on 25 and 26 February. In theory you could alternatively attend the beginning of the celebrations and return for your speech on 23 February. But in practice things could well go wrong. Bad weather or bad luck could well mean that you missed your date with the Institute on 23 February. Would you like us to tell Walter Goldsmith in answer to his letter that you will keep your engagement with him? Can we also tell Rex Hunt that you are more likely to come at the end of than at the beginning of the celebrations? The difficulties that still have to be resolved are as follows:-(a) When the extension to the runway has been completed (in the next couple of weeks or so) Nimrod trials will begin. The MOD say that we shall not know until mid-December whether the trials have been successful and Nimrod can land safely, though they are fairly optimistic. If the trials fail, we shall be able to use Hercules though this would be slow (12 hours from Ascension to Port Stanley) and uncomfortable. (b) The Nimrod would need inflight re-fuelling. Certain risks are involved in this operation though the probability of anything going wrong is very low. The operation could, however, be uncomfortable for passengers since the Nimrod has to dive during re-fuelling. /(c)

- (c) At present 1 in 4 Hercules flights is unable to land and has to return to Ascension. Nimrod is expected to do better than this and February should be better than October. But we shall have to wait to see.
 - (d) We shall have to consider whether the Argentine Government, or more probably an unauthorised Argentine officer, is likely to attempt any action against the Falkland Islands while you are there. We cannot make that assessment now.

I am sure that all these problems can be surmounted. But I think there is good reason for not making public now a firm decision to go to the Falkland Islands. (With your agreement I have told Rex Hunt and Bernard Ingham that a final decision cannot be taken until the logistics have been worked out).

VISIT OF THE PRIME MINISTER TO THE FALKLANDS

It has been agreed that we should advise on transport arrangements and security implications of the Prime Minister's proposed visit for the Falkland Islands 150 Anniversary celebrations. I gather that John Holmes will be writing to you about other aspects of the visit.

The Prime Minister and party would be flown from the UK to Ascension Island in an RAF VC10 under the normal VIP arrangements. From Ascension Island to Port Stanley the RAF would plan to use a Nimrod long-range maritime patrol aircraft. This leg is too far for a VC10 which cannot be refuelled in flight. The Nimrod has not yet been used on this journey but with the extension of the temporary runway at Port Stanley the flight should be possible by next February.

The Nimrod will be substantially quicker and more comfortable than the Hercules, which is the only alternative, but it has no VIP fit. Space will be limited by refuelling lines etc; and it should be assumed that at the maximum 15 passengers could be carried. It would not be possible to use a civilian aircraft. The airfield at Port Stanley even when extended will not take a long haul aircraft and aircraft with shorter range would need in-flight refuelling or an assured diversion airfield en route, neither of which is possible.

The Prime Minister will be fully aware of the difficulties of travel to the Falklands but there are one or two points which I should draw to your attention. First, should future experience show there are difficulties with operating Nimrods on this route, a Hercules would have to be used instead. In this event the flight will be slow (12 hours each way as opposed to 9 for the Nimrod), uncomfortable and exhausting for the party. Second, whichever aircraft

is used, inflight refuelling, which always carries a certain risk and is uncomfortable for those on board, would be necessary. Finally, diversion airfields in the event of an emergency or failure to land at Port Stanley would have to be on the South American mainland.

Whichever aircraft is used, security for the flights should present no major problems. On board the aircraft an Air Transport Security Squad of 1 Officer and 2 RAF Policemen would accompany the flight. Air defence cover in the Falklands area will be provided by RAF fighter aircraft; and should the threat warrant it, cover could also be provided in the area of Ascension Island.

For completeness we have considered the possibility of sea travel. Assuming we cannot use a South American port a RN ship or Royal Fleet Auxiliary could be used from Ascension Island to the Falklands. However, the journey would take 7/10 days each way, and I assume that this would not be acceptable.

Falkland Islands Anniversary

We spoke this morning about the celebrations being held in the Falkland Islands to mark the 150th anniversary of continuous British occupation, the actual date of which is 3 January.

I understand that MOD are writing separately today with details of the logistics for a Nimrod flight for the Prime Minister plus a total party of ten others.

The celebrations are due to be held between 20-26 February. There has not been time to consult Port Stanley today but in our view it is not possible at this stage to change the dates further. I do not know what else is in the Prime Minister's diary but I know that you wished to know whether she could be in London on 23 February. Subject to the logistic details being supplied by the MOD, and to Port Stanley's views, it might be possible for the Prime Minister to travel to the Falklands during 19 February, spend the first two days of the celebrations with them, and return on 22 February (although this would of course be a very tight and no doubt exhausting timetable). Alternatively the Prime Minister might be able to leave on 24 February and be present for the last two days of the celebrations, subject to the reservations above.

I am sorry that this is not a very conclusive steer. We can of course seek views urgently from Port Stanley in the light of the logistic details supplied by the MOD and the Prime Minister's wishes.

As you know, Cranley Onslow is visiting the Islands next week. I hope that any final decision/announcement can be delayed until he has had a chance to assess the situation at first hand.

You may already have seen a copy of telegram number 209 from Port Stanley (copy attached) about plans for the 150th Anniversary celebrations. You will see that the dates have slipped and that the Islanders have reverted to the possibility of a Royal visit. They are also proposing to invite the Prime Minister, Mr Pym and others.

The Ministry of Defence are looking at possible transport arrangements and the security implications. When this work is complete we shall be able to make firm proposals although, as we noted in our letter of 10 August, logistical and security problems are likely to rule out a visit by a member of the Royal Family.

1. THE CO-ORDINATING COMMITTEE DECIDED TO GO AHEAD WITH THE CELEBRATIONS BUT TO POSTPONE THE DATES FROM THE FIRST WEEK IN JANUARY TO THE LAST WEEK IN FEBRUARY, IE 20 TO 26 FEBRUARY. THIS DECISION WAS TAKEN TO GIVE MORE TIME FOR THE STANLEY RACECOURSE TO RECUPERATE AND TO EASE ACCOMMODATION AND COMMUNICATIONS PROBLEMS.

THE COMMITTEE EXPRESSED THE HOPE THAT PRINCE ANDREW, THE FRIME MINISTER AND YOU OR ONE OF YOUR MINISTERS WOULD BE ABLE TO GRACE THE CELEBRATIONS WITH YOUR PRESENCE. THEY WOULD ALSO LIKE TO INVITE SIR JOHN FIELDHOUSE, ADMIRAL WOODWARD, GENERAL MOGRE, PETER KING, (FROM CALLING THE FALKLANDS) AND HAPOLD

BRILEY, (BBC LATIN AMERICAN CORRESPONDENT).



The Prime Minister is, I believe, aware that Mr Onslow is planning a visit to the Falkland Islands in the autumn. We have put this proposal to the Civil Commissioner, seeking his views on a week's visit from 31 October.

I understand that the Prime Minister has indicated that should would like to visit the Island possibly next January when the Islanders will be celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the establishment of permanent British settlement.

The Islanders would certainly welcome a visit by the Prime Minister at that time, particularly as logistical and security problems will probably rule out a visit by a member of the Royal Family.

But we shall have to make detailed investigation of a number of points, especially on transport and security, before making a recommendation on the point. I should be grateful for confirmation that the Prime Minister would like us to set this in hand.
