PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO MALAYSIA

- 1. I was invited last week to call on Dr Munir Majid, the Editor-in-Chief of the Fleet Publishing Group, to be presented with the original of a cartoon which appeared in The New Straits Times shortly after Mrs Thatcher's return to London after her Far East tour in April. Dr Munir asked me if I would transmit this to No.10 with his compliments.
- 2. The cartoon, which has been framed, is being sent under separate cover. I hope it arrives in one piece.
- 3. I am sure that you and the Prime Minister will enjoy it. The cartoonist, known as Lat, is something of a national institution here and has published numerous books of cartoons in addition to his regular slot in The New Straits Times. IMPORT OF SNAKE SKIN GIFTS

I refer to our recent telephone conversations about the snake skin gifts given to members of the Prime Minister's party by the Indonesian Government following the recent tour of S E Asia. The goods had been seized by customs at Heathrow as permits necessary for the import of species controlled under EC Regulations 3626/82 and 3418/84, the Endangered Species (Import and Export) Act 1976 and the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981, had not been granted.

I now enclose five application forms for import permits. Only those boxes marked with an X need to be completed. The Department's Chief Wildlife Inspector has examined the items and will fill in the details about species.

Once the forms have been returned, they will be formally referred to the NCC, the Department's scientific advisors, who will advise for or against issuing import permits. It is very likely that the permits will be granted as the goods were unsolicited gifts. Please would you return the forms to me so that I can ensure the applications are dealt with urgently.

Thank you for your letter of 17 April. I was disturbed to hear that one of the BRAHMS secure speech equipments taken on the Far East trip appeared to have been tampered with.

I have discussed this with the Duty Clerks who accompanied us. They assure me that the BRAHMS was never left unguarded: it was always held in our Private Office (apart from when it was on the aeroplane or was on its way to or from the aeroplane) and the office was continuously manned by a Duty Clerk, Garden Room Girl or during the night by a Royal Military Policeman.

Second, the key-tape material was always kept in a separate briefcase, apart from when it was actually being used to "fill" the machine each morning.

Third, the only recollection that the Duty Clerks have which might throw some light on when the incident happened was that one BRAHMS case was difficult to shut when the Duty Clerks were packing up the office to leave Sri Lanka on the morning of Saturday 13 April. However, I repeat that the equipment was under the guard of an RMP during the previous night.

Dear Prine Minister.

First, may I thank you for receiving me in Singapore, for the warmth of your hospitality and for the talks we had together. As I said in my remarks at the banquet, I would have been glad to come to South East Asia purely for the pleasure of a talk with you, even if that had been the only reason for visiting the region.

May I also tell you that I had what I hope was a helpful conversation with the Sultan of Brunei on the lines we discussed. In emphasising the value of the monarchical system, I said that the British Royal Family had gained and retained their place in the affections of the people by constantly going out among them and showing their support for the people's interests. I also stressed that it was important to explain the reasons why things were done using as an illustration the efforts I made to convey through the press party accompanying me that even on my absences I was working for the interests of the British people.

All this was well received by the Sultan who said that he was planning to visit the villages of Brunei as his father had done on his own accession. I stressed the need to have a systematic plan for covering the ground.

I told him of my impression that there were people outside his country who were planning to foment trouble for him and I

- 2 recommended him to look to you for advice on developments in the region and on other matters. In my remarks to the press on leaving I laid particular emphasis on my visit to the hospital which the Sultan's government had provided for the people. My general impression was that the Sultan was sympathetic with the points I made and is genuinely concerned to be a responsible and successful ruler though whether he really has it in him remains to be seen. He is willing to look for guidance but does not yet know whom he can rely on. I recommended him to attend the meeting of the Commonwealth Heads of Government and he said that he hoped to do so. Once again my thanks for our talks. I look forward very much to seeing you again in October if there is not an opportunity Warn pussonal regards Vous sincerely before then. - 1. I HAVE DISCUSSED ARRANGEMENTS TODAY IN GREATER DETAIL WITH CHIEF OF ROYAL PROTOCOL.
- 2. CEREMONIES AT THE AIRPORT ARE CONFIRMED AS IN MY TUR AND THERE IS LIKELY TO BE A FULL TURN-OUT OF SAUDI MINISTERS PRESENT. THE PRIME MINISTER AND THE CROWN PRINCE WILL BE LED TO A DAIS FOR THE NATIONAL ANTHEM, BUT WILL NOT (NOT) INSPECT THE GUARD OF HONOUR.
- 3. AFTER COFFEE AT THE ROYAL PAVILION, THE PARTY WILL DRIVE TO THE KHUZAMA PALACE (ABOUT 10 MINS FROM THE AIRPORT) IN THE ORDER GIVEN IN MY TUR. ON ARRIVAL AT THE PALACE, THE WHOLE PARTY WILL BE GREETED BY THE KING, A MEETING OF ABOUT HALF AN HOUR WILL FOLLOW, ATTENDED ON THE SAUDI SIDE BY PRINCE ABDULLAH, PRINCE SULTAN (MINISTER OF DEFENCE), PRINCE SAUD (MINISTER OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS) AND POSSIBLY THE MINISTERS OF PETROLEUM AND FINANCE. COSTS OF PM'S VISIT TO SOUTH EAST ASIA

As you know, I asked MPO to look into the costs and let us have something for tonight's box. In the time available they have not been able to come up with any firm figures, but hope to hone up their estimates on Monday morning in time for a possible statement.

So far they have provided the following estimates:

RAF transport £160,000 (less £23,000 for press party contributions)
Total transport therefore £137,000

Other items are small by comparison. They include:

Reception (Jakarta?): UK contribution £6,000 Gifts £2,500

(though items taken from stock in No. 10 have yet to be included)

Advance visits and courier: £1,800 approx Locally provided transport and accommodation: as yet unspecified.

These costs do not, of course, include any amounts to allow for accommodation provided in Embassies, High Commissions, etc. MPO think it will be about a month before accurate figures can be provided, though I have told them we will need to have reasonable estimates by Monday lunch time.

All in all, it looks as if £150,000 could sensibly be used as a provisional estimate at this stage. MPO would be happy with quoting it on that basis.

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO MALAYSIA

- 1. Forgive me for troubling you with a few details left over in the wash-up after your visit.
- 2. When you left I was expecting to receive a sum of money to be handed on as tips to the staff at the hotel. In the event this did not reach me, I presume because one of the No.10 team handled it direct with the hotel.
- 3. It was good of you to send signed photographs to many members of my staff. There was however one omission: Ian Danson. He did as much work as anyone, probably more, and in order to avoid hurt feelings, Richard Fell, the Head of Chancery, has given Ian his signed photograph pretending that this came direct from you. If it is not too much trouble would it be possible for you to let Richard Fell have another photograph for his own use?
- 4. Still on the subject of photographs, we have contacted by the General Manager of the Malayan Railway Administration, Datuk Ahmad Badri, who met the Prime Minister at the railway station and who presented her with the model train. Apparently the MRA is opening a railway museum here in Malaysia in June and Datuk Badri has asked if it would be possible for him to receive for display at the museum a signed photograph of the Prime Minister with, if possible, a short greeting on it in Mrs Thatcher's hand. He has also asked if the Prime Minister would sign the MRA driving licence which he presented to her at the railway station and if you could send a photocopy of that signed driving licence, also for display at the museum. I apologise for troubling you with these details but, as you know, we are hoping to get a number of important orders in the railway sector. The lady at the Hilton Hotel who was directly in charge of the organisation during your stay has also asked if there is any possibility of her receiving a small photograph of the Prime Minister. She was, I believe, extremely helpful and co-operative. If you felt it appropriate we could pass the photograph on to her.



5. May I say how very much we in the High Commission enjoyed the visit. The word is not too strong. As you know, there was a good deal of work and pressure during the month or two before the visit took place but, on this occasion everyone found, once you were here the visit was not only immensely helpful to our efforts in Malaysia but was also a great deal of fun. This was dur in very large measure to the tremendously good cooperation between your Private Office staff and the people in the High Commission. We are all most grateful for this.

6. I am now about to go on leave and will be back in London for the British-Malaysian junket in June. I am angling for an invitation to Lord Richardson's banquet and, if I am allowed through the august portals, will perhaps catch sight of you then. I hope so.
