

Three series are covered by strict arrangements to guard against disclosure, as laid down in a letter from Tim Lankester on 22 June 1979. Pre-release data from these series are only seen by a named list of Ministers and officials. However, the security classification is not stipulated and we have discovered that there is no uniformity of approach, either between the departments involved, or even within this department. At present the unemployment figures are classified secret and the RPI and earnings index are confidential. We can see no justification for the difference in approach and, having considered advice from our security officer, propose to classify all three series as personal and confidential. We would like the Prime Minister's agreement to adding Director of Statistics in the Department of Employment and his key officials to this list. Each month the Department of Employment press notice manufacturing earnings and employment includes information on productivity and unit wage costs which are compiled by CSO. Naturally, the most up-to-date information on production is used in the calculation of these measures. Since these figures are published in a Department of Employment press notice, DE ministers need to be briefed on them. In those months of the year when the Index of Production figures are published in advance of this briefing there is no problem. However in some months the press notices are published on the same day or within a day or so of each other, and then advance notice of the productivity and unit costs figures would be helpful to DE, together with the underlying production figures. I would be grateful if you could approve the arrangement whereby in certain months we send figures incorporating unpublished IoP data to the Director of Statistics in DE for use in ministerial briefing. The confidentiality of the data in advance of publication would be stressed. You may wish to refer to the authority for the present arrangements - a minute from Tim Lankester to Tony Battishill on 22 June 1979 - and a copy is attached. 



told the figures in advance of their publication.

Given the high market sensitivity of these figures we have taken further steps in the Treasury to restrict the list of people with advance knowledge of them; I understand that the Bank have taken similar action. So far as our own desk press officers are concerned the figures will not be circulated to them until 2 pm on the day of publication (ie half an hour before publication). If on reflection you still feel that your own officers must be told the numbers in advance, I hope that you will at least be able to follow a similar timetable.

The next figures, of course, are published next Tuesday.

INDEX OF PRODUCTION - MONTHLY STATISTICS

You wrote to say that your Secretary of State would like the other Ministers in your Department to receive advance copies of the Index of Industrial Production each month. I have arranged for this but Sir John Boreham has asked me to make sure that all your Ministers are reminded that the arrangements set out in the No.10 minute dated 22 June 1979 were deliberately strict so as to guard against leaks before publication. The Government must be forever on guard, he says, not to give any grounds for suspicion either that it is unable to protect sensitive material or that the substance and timing of statistics could be influenced for short term political gains.

ADVANCE CIRCULATION OF KEY ECONOMIC STATISTICS

- 1 In 1978, following a number of apparent leaks, stricter arrangements were made for the circulation in advance of publication of certain key economic statistics. These included figures of unemployment, earnings, the retail prices index and the CSO forecast of the index. The arrangements were confirmed on behalf of the Prime Minister by her office in June 1979.
- 2 I am writing to remind all recipients of the importance of maintaining the strict security of these figures.
- 3 There have recently been some press references, giving figures which were close to the outcome in advance of publication. These may reflect no more than capable and intelligent speculation by specialists, but are a warning of the continuing danger of there being further leaks.
- 4 I must stress that the figures are provided to you in advance on a personal basis and that only Secretaries of State and their Permanent Secretaries can authorise the provision of advance figures to others in their Departments (whether Ministers or officials). Such provision must be confined strictly to those who need to know for operational purposes.

Bad weather and high seas yesterday prevented anti-pollution teams from tackling a mile-long oil slick which threatens some of the most unspoilt beaches in Greece

The threat followed the sinking on Saturday afternoon of a Greek oil tanker, the Irene Serenade. It sank after explosions in its stern had set it ablaze, and began spilling its cargo of 102,000 tons of crude oil into the sea less than two miles off the port of Pylos-in the South-western Peloponnese.

The tanker sank shortly afterwards leaving the oil slick which a Greek Merchant Marine Ministry official described yesterday as a black river in the sea of black of a sea of the s

Anti-pollution teams, including one from the Netherlands, arrived at the scene but have been able only to place a floating barrier in an attempt to contain the slick.

"We have all the materials and equipment we need to hand in Pylos, including an airforce helicopter," a merchant marine spokesman said.
"All we need now is for the weather to calm down."

The tanker is an ecological time bomb which can deposit its cargo up onto the nearby beaches at any time, just as the tourist season is beginning. It had on board more than enough oil to pollute the entire Gulf of Navarino, one of the most beautiful regions in Greece. A plan to site an in-dustrial complex in the area was dropped after a mational outcry a few years ago."



The sets of figures involved are overseas trade, money supply, unemployment, retail prices index, earnings and industrial production index. Last year there were a number of suspected leaks of certain of these statistics in advance of publication. Because of the risks not only of political embarrassment but also of speculation on the foreign and domestic exchanges we tightened up the handling of these statistics and restricted their circulation in the usually short period between them becoming available and the day of publication. At present Permanent Secretaries of originating Departments (or the Governor in the case of the money supply) are required to satisfy themselves that those contributing to the preparation of the figures, or with access to them are kept to an irreducible minimum. Pre-publication copies are sent only to the following Ministers and their Permanent Secretaries:-Prime Minister, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Secretaries Trade figures of State for Trade and for Industry.
