## EXTRACT FROM A LETTER TO SIR LAURENS VAN DER POST FROM CHIEF BUTHELEZI 2

It is on behalf of the millions of Black South Africans who believe with me in decency that I ask you, Sir, for a personal favour. I would be most grateful if you could convey to Mrs. Margaret Thatcher our very deep appreciation for the tough stand she took in Canada at the recent Commonwealth meeting. We saw in her that steely commitment and that tough-minded morality which we so badly need in this country. Of her I believe it could truly be said that she is astute enough to talk to the devil himself if necessary, but moral enough never to deal with him. She has shown the West the international climate.

Please convey to her, Sir Laurens, our view that Britain remains one of the world's greatest diplomatic powers and probably the world's most honest broker. It shames us as Black South Africans to hear that she is being called a racist because of her stand on principle for the sake of the poorest of the poor in this country. She took her stand knowing that it would involve her in ongoing tough consequences in her own dealings with Commonwealth countries. She knew also that it would complicate her dealings with Non-aligned countries but she did not flinch in the face of these problems. We appreciate that very much.

I have brought with me a copy of a memorandum I addressed to all Commonwealth and Non-aligned Foreign Ministers last month. I appreciate very much the fact that Sir Geoffrey Howe wrote to me thanking me for my in-put. I would like you, Sir, to have a copy would wish to make and I sincerely hope that after reading it, you would find merit enough in it to discuss it with others. Somehow the West must become more tangibly involved in that which can work in this country. Somehow it must do more to bolster the forces of democracy. Naive decency has in the past so often played into the Persons Group came here with decent objectives and however flawed miscalculations of how difficult the South African situation really is, we must build on that attempt.

The CEPG mission was deficient to the extent that it did not realise that negotiation will itself have to be turned into a process in which the West participates. Negotiation is not something in our circumstances which takes place once people get around the conference table. Negotiations must make conference tables possible. Final national conferences must be about that

Thank you for your letter of 17 October recording the outcome of the Prime Minister's unscheduled meeting with President Gayoom.

Assistance with the improvement of fire-fighting services at the airport has already been requested and agreed. However the requests for help with airport security and construction of an extra fish cannery are new. The ODA has asked the High Commission in Colombo to obtain further details of what is required. Once these have been received, the requests will be investigated as quickly as possible in consultation with the Maldives authorities.

MUGABE TRAVELLED TO VANCOUVER WITH MORE REALISTIC EXPECTATIONS THAN TO NASSAU AND MARLBOROUGH HOUSE (MY TELNO 451) AND THESE EXPECTATIONS WERE FULFILLED. FROM HIS POINT OF VIEW, IT WAS A SUCCESSFUL MEETING.
