Dear Rrine Minister,

When we resigned from the Conservative Party advertising account last year, I mentioned that Charles and I would very much like to mark our long relationship with some significant academic honour which would be established in your name.

Since then, we have been pursuing the matter. We regarded only three institutions as being of sufficient stature for such a project - Oxford University, LSE and Cambridge University. Oxford we would not consider because of their past approach to such matters, and Sir John Sparrow at LSE, although highly supportive of the venture, concluded that the internal approval procedures at LSE were such that he could not guarantee confidentiality while discussions were underway.

As a result, we have been pursuing discussions with Cambridge University. In order to come to you with a reasonably specific proposal rather than just a general idea, we have taken the liberty of discussing with the University the idea of creating the "Margaret Thatcher Chair of International Relations", a prestigious professorship within the University which would be held on an annual basis by an eminent person of worldwide reputation.

This proposal has been discussed with Dr Henry Chadwick, (Master of Peterhouse), Sir Harry Hinsley (Master of St John's), Richard Langhorne (Fellow of St John's and mainspring of the International Relations faculty), and James Wright (Secretary of Faculties). The Vice Chancellor has been told of the nature of the discussions.

The Prime Minister would welcome advice on the suggestion that Saatchi and Saatchi should inaugurate an international enterprise scholarship at the London School of Economics which would be awarded annually in her name.

I can see no objection on the grounds of propriety to the suggestion, though I think that it might be prudent if someone was to ensure that the conditions for the establishment of this scholarship reflected what was normal in these circumstances in the academic world. Professor Griffiths, Head of the Prime Minister's Policy Unit, would be well placed to provide such advice.

Subject to your views, I suggest that the Prime Minister should express her acceptance to Saatchi and Saatchi that a scholarship should be awarded in her name. I should be grateful for your views.
