

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO AUSTRALIA

The telegrams from Canberra rain in faster even than I can write letters about them. Since my letter of earlier this morning, I have received telegram numbers 494, 495 and 501.

Telegram 494 in fact deals quite neatly with my point about the timing of the meeting with the Leader of the Opposition and I think we should now settle for this. The Prime Minister will be able to complete work on her National Press Club speech early in the morning before she sets off for her meetings with Mr. Hawke and Mr. Howard.

I will consult the Special Branch on the point about protected cars in telegram number 495.

As regards telegram number 501, I think the proposal for a visit to HMAS Watson is an imaginative one and would be welcome to the Prime Minister although I would prefer not to pursue the further visits to Darling Harbour and the Power House Museum. I agree that the High Commissioner should not give a reception in Melbourne and that a visit to the Institute of Medical Research should be substituted.

I should like if possible to have a complete revised programme to show to the Prime Minister this weekend so that she can start planning clothes and so on.

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO AUSTRALIA

On return from Hanover I have seen two further telegrams about the Prime Minister's programme in Australia on which you may find it helpful to have comments:

- Canberra telegram 474 deals with the lunch which the Prime Minister is to host in Sydney. The suggestions made as to how the lunch should be organised and the list of invitees both look admirable;
- Canberra telegram 490 deals with the Prime Minister's meetings in Canberra itself. I wonder if it is right for the Prime Minister to see the leader of the opposition before her meeting with the Australian Prime Minister. It is certainly a sequence which we try to avoid in the case of similar visits in this country. I am also worried by the early start: if it is a day when the Prime Minister also has the hairdresser it will mean beginning the day very early after a heavy programme the day before. I do not have any ready solution for this but wonder whether we cannot look at the timings again to see if there is some way in which the meeting with Mr. Howard could be put in after the meeting with Mr. Hawke. For instance, if the meeting with Mr. Hawke ended at 1045, the Prime Minister could then see Mr. Howard from 1045-1130 before going straight on to the Press Club (if the speech is not finished by then it never will be!).



This timetable has the Prime Minister meeting the Leader of the Opposition before she sees Mr Hawke. The Foreign Secretary saw Mr Howard first during his own visit to Australia; the press tried to make something of this, and Mr Hawke also mentioned the point even though there was a very good reason for it (the Foreign Secretary went to Sydney before Canberra, and Mr Howard was staying in Sydney at the time). The Foreign Secretary does not think that this should rule out the timetable now proposed for the Prime Minister, but he thinks that it should first be firmly established that the Australians themselves are content. The press may still try a little mischief, but that should be tolerable if there is no sensitivity on the part of the hosts. I should be grateful for your views both on the timing of Mr Howard's call and Mr Coles' suggestion that it should take place over coffee rather than a working breakfast. 

Thank you for your letter of 17 June dealing with the Prime Minister's stopovers in Malaysia and Bangkok on her way back from Australia.

Stopover in Malaysia

I agree that it would probably be wise to wait until after the Ministerial meeting on the Malaysian defence package on 27 June before taking a final decision whether to propose a stopover in Malaysia. But I am sure the Prime Minister would not in any event wish to stay overnight in Kuala Lumpur. Her preference would be to stay just long enough for a meeting with Dr. Mahathir before flying on to Bangkok that evening. However, she would be prepared to arrive in Bangkok rather later than planned, and to have the Thai Government Dinner the following night.

Stopover in Bangkok

I have consulted the Prime Minister about the two refugee camps. She is prepared to visit Site B, the more distant of the two, provided there have been no engagements the night before. I would prefer to leave the decision whether to make the visit by helicopter all the way, or to do it by a mix of aeroplane, helicopter and road, to our reconnaissance team. We would then have the Thai Dinner that evening (7 August), with departure for London at 0800 on 8 August.

The Foreign Office think this an excellent idea provided we have settled the problem over the Malaysian defence package (we must). The question remains whether to make it just a brief two hour technical stop in the hope that you could meet Mr. Mahathir at or near the airport; or whether to have dinner with him which would in practice mean staying overnight and going on to Bangkok early the next morning. would then carry out your full programme in Bangkok the next day concluding with dinner there in the evening, returning to London one day later than originally planned (getting back on the evening of Monday 8 August). The advantage of this is that it would give you more time with Dr. Mahathir, mirror arrangements made for Singapore and make it look less like a rushed technical stop. Against that, it means yet another night in yet another hotel with quite an early start the next morning. Stop-Over in Malaysia In the general context of our relations with Malaysia, a Prime Ministerial visit, however brief, could be very valuable. The political climate was greatly improved by the Prime Minister's visit in 1985, by Dr Mahathir's return visit last year, and, most recently, by the Secretary of State's visit. The Malaysians place special store by personal contacts at the top: perhaps the best example is Mrs Thatcher's call on Dr Mahathir at his hotel last summer. A visit would also hlep to reassure Dr Mahathir about our overall relationship after the recent Newsnight programme. Lastly, it is not to be excluded that the Malaysians could take umbrage, at a time when we have several important irons in the fire, if the Prime Minister visited Singapore and Thailand but not Malaysia. The general political case is therefore strong. However, we are far from being out of the wood over the defence package and it is not easy to foresee what the position will be in August. That will depend on what we are able to say between now and then on the questions of ATP and flight frequencies and on progress over the draft MOU. We clearly cannot wait until the last minute before proposing that the Prime Minister should stop over in Malaysia. But the Foreign Secretary thinks that it would be prudent to delay doing so at lest until after the Ministerial meeting on the defence package, now planned for the week beginning 27 June. We have also considered the programme implications. If the Prime Minister stayed in Kuala Lumpur for just two hours, we could simply substitute the technical stop-over for that currently planned for Singapore. She could still arrive in Bangkok by 1820, and have talks followed by dinner at 1900, as planned. However, the visit to Malaysia /would CONFIDENTIAL



would go down better if the Prime Minister were able to stay on for dinner. A better plan might be for the Prime Minister to do that and depart for Bangkok early the following morning. Departure from Kuala Lumpur at 0900 local time on 7 August should permit arrival in Bangkok at 1000 local time, thus involving a minimum of change to the planned programme in Thailand. The official dinner in Bangkok would then be re-scheduled for 7 August, with departure for London at 0800 local time on 8 August, allowing arrival in the UK at 1915 local time the same day.

Finally the two points raised in your letter of 3 June. On Singapore (the idea of a single photogenic engagement), we await a reply from the post. On the programme in Thailand, the Embassy advise that the helicopter journey time to Site 2 is about 50 minutes, compared with 90 minutes to Site B. The helicopter would be a military twin-engined, eleven-seater Bell 214ST with a VIP qualified crew. An alternative route to Site B would be by aeroplane to Surin, followed by a short helicopter flight and finishing the journey by road. Total journey time would be about the same as by helicopter all the way (ie about 4 hours there and back), but this method might be more comfortable and less tiring.

The Ambassador is strongly of the view that a visit to Site B would be preferable. It would be a demonstration of support for Sihanouk in his efforts to seek a solution in Cambodia and would be welcomed as such by the Thai Government. It would attract considerable media attention. There would be no time or opportunity for substantive exchanges at Site B but these can be pursued with Sihanouk in London later in the year. A meeting with Sihanouk elsewhere in Thailand, assuming it could be arranged, would not have the same impact. Nor would a visit to Site 2, though it would highlight our humanitarian concern for the plight of the Cambodian refugees (the KPNLF is divided and incapable of political initiative at present). There is little doubt that the Thais would prefer a visit to Site B.

We agree with the Ambassador that, if at all possible, we should go for a visit to Site B rather than Site 2.

The Embassy are consulting the Thais about speeches at the official dinner. We await a response.

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO AUSTRALIA

In the light of the difficulties which have emerged over the Malaysian Defence Package, the Prime Minister thinks that she ought to make a brief stop-over in Malaysia on her way back from Australia, to meet Dr. Mahathir and reassure him of our political commitment to the defence package. I should be grateful for early advice on:

- the political case for such a visit. By committing the Prime Minister now to visit Kuala Lumpur in early August, we assume that a satisfactory solution can be worked out on the question of ATP for civil contracts in Malaysia. The Prime Minister's view, as I have recorded it separately, is that a solution must be found.
- the programme consequences. As I recall, we were anyway planning a technical stop in Singapore en route from Brisbane to Bangkok. Can that as easily be made in Kuala Lumpur? Would Dr. Mahathir be content with a two hour stopover, given that the Prime Minister will be spending rather longer in Singapore on the way out? What would be the implications for the programme in Thailand if we have to stay longer in Kuala Lumpur? It looks to me as though it would be virtually impossible to reach Bangkok in time for dinner, in the event of a stopover in Kuala Lumpur, in which case we might have to spend the night of Sunday, 7 August in Bangkok leaving for London on the Monday morning.

I am copying this letter to Brian Hawtin (Ministry of Defence).





Prime Minister's visit to Oman

We spoke earlier this week about the need to refuel the aircraft carrying the Prime Minister's party to Australia before it arrives at Salalah in Oman where the Prime Minister will be meeting the Sultan. The RAF insist that they cannot fly to Salalah without a refuelling stop. This will add two and a half hours to the journey time to Salalah.

The RAF say that refuelling is only possible in either Bahrain or Luxor. Apparently Cyprus is not close enough to the route to make a refuelling stop there feasible. Refuelling in Bahrain would take only one hour (the RAF have a representative there) as against one and a half hours (and a slightly longer flying time) if the stop was made in Luxor.

If the stop is made in Bahrain the Ruler of Bahrain will almost certainly insist on greeting the Prime Minister. However the meeting could be kept short and restricted to an exchange of courtesies. There need be no delay, but the Amir would be delighted by the briefest of meetings with the Prime Minister.

Even if it proved possible to bring forward departure to the evening of 29 July, which would give a longer stop-over in Oman, this would mean two long overnight flights to reach Singapore. This is clearly not to be recommended.

I should be grateful therefore if you would let me know if departure from London could be advanced from 0800 to 0700 with arrival in Salalah at 2050 (local time). Flying time to Bahrain would be 7 hours 20 minutes (ETA 1620 local) and 2 hours 30 minutes to Salalah. This gives a rather later arrival in Salalah but should be nonetheless acceptable to the Sultan.

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO AUSTRALIA


I wrote to you on 6 June about the programme for the Prime Minister's visit to Australia. The Prime Minister has subsequently had a word with Lord McAlpine and has the following additional suggestions:

- in Perth, she would like to do a walkabout in the City centre. She would also like to meet half a dozen or so of Western Australia's leading businessmen (some suggested names to follow) over a tea or a drink. This has a much higher priority in the Prime Minister's eyes than a cruise on the Swan River;
- it might be possible to fit in her proposed rural visit somewhere between Perth and Canberra on Tuesday 2 August. I understand that there are a number of possible sites, for instance in the area North of Adelaide, and that there are Royal Australian Air Force bases on the route where the VC 10 could land. This would of course necessitate a much earlier start from Perth on the morning of 2 August. But the Prime Minister would like to see a proposal.

I should be grateful if these additional points could be passed on to John Coles.

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO AUSTRALIA: PROGRAMME

Thank you for your letter of 3 June covering Mr. Coles' telegrams from Canberra about the programme for the Prime Minister's visit to Australia.

On the general balance of the programme, the Prime Minister has said that she attaches importance to seeing something of rural Australia. As examples she has suggested a visit to a farm, to the flying doctor service, an opportunity to see how children in remote areas are taught by TV and perhaps do a phone-in programme for people in remote parts. I realise this would mean sacrificing some other part of the programme. This should preferably be one of the lunches or receptions. I can only say that the Prime Minister is very keen on this idea and will not lightly be argued out of it.

To take the points in Canberra telegram no 378 in order:

Hotels

In general the Prime Minister is content to follow the Australian Government's wishes. But she wants to accept Lord McAlpine's invitation to stay in his house in Perth. In Sydney she would wish to stay at the Intercontinental Hotel rather than the Regent. These points are not negotiable.

Speeches

The Prime Minister will of course make short impromptu speeches at the various functions. It would be helpful to have some particularly apposite points for her to make on each occasion. We shall need full draft speeches for the National Press Club, the Australian Government dinner and the opening of British Day at EXPO.

Perth

The Prime Minister is content to open the new Rolls Royce factory. Is a cruise on the Swan River really a good idea at that time of year? It might be better to go for a meeting with local businessmen or a visit to a winery or

some other local landmark.

Canberra

There is no objection to planting another tree. The Prime Minister would be content for the High Commissioner to give a reception provided that it does not conflict with her wish to add a rural visit to the programme. She is content to attend a dinner with the Governor-General rather than host a return dinner for Mr. Hawke.

Sydney

As noted above, the Prime Minister would prefer the Intercontinental Hotel.

Brisbane

The Prime Minister would be willing to receive the special photograph album about the Young Endeavour Project. I think the programme is too crowded to allow a separate meeting with Lincolnshire sixth-formers, but they could be included in a reception.

TV & Radio Interviews

These points should be settled during the reconnaissance.

Opposition

The Prime Minister agrees that she should not attend any separate function with the Opposition but should receive a call from Mr. Howard in Canberra. But she would not wish to restrict it just to Mr. Howard: he might be offered the option of bringing some of his senior colleagues with him.

Mr. Thatcher's programme

I am consulting Mr. Thatcher and will reply separately.

As you will see, it has a large number of rather formal events: a lunch, a reception and a dinner virtually every day. In the main these are not our idea: they are proposed by the various State Governments and are a mark of your popularity. There are a fair number of commercial visits to help our exports, several interviews and one major speech. I am afraid there is relatively little which is pleasurable or imaginative. I have asked Carol and Alistair McAlpine for some ideas, but nothing has come yet. Although there is only one major speech, there will be quite a number of smaller ones at lunches and dinners. But John Coles advises that these need be only 2/3 minutes each and generally impromptu, except for the Australian Government dinner and the opening of British Day at Expo 88. The first and main question is whether you are prepared to subject yourself to this ordeal? It is not a frivolous question: it is a very full programme at the end of a parliamentary session and meeting so many people at receptions and meals is very tiring. The only alleviating factor is that there are no particularly difficult talks or negotiations. In addition there are a number of specific questions: - are you content to open the new Rolls-Royce turbine blade factory in Perth? John Coles strongly recommends this. You would probably do it in conjunction with the Australian Defence Minister (Labour). would you be willing to plant another tree in the High Commissioner's garden? The last one is doing well. CONFIDENTIAL

- agree that John should give a reception in your honour at Canberra?
- there are some problems over accommodation. John wants for you to stay in a hotel in Perth, but you are keen on Alistair's house. Agree that I should insist on the house, provided there is security clearance? And in Sydney, the Australian Government want to put you up in the Regent Hotel, while Alistair wants you to stay in the Intercontinental (which is his). Again, agree that I should courteously but firmly insist on the Intercontinental?
- lastly there is the question of a meeting with the Opposition. The proposal is that you should receive a call from Mr Howard in Canberra but not attend any more public functions (Mr Howard was earlier talking of hosting an Opposition lunch for you). I think it is probably better to stick to protocol on this. If you attend a lunch, you will have to speak and it will probably leak and be used to cause embarrassment.

 Agree to a call by Mr Howard but nothing more?

Prime Minister's visit to Australia 1 - 6 August: Programme

You will have seen Canberra telegram nos 378, 379 and 380 containing the revised draft programmes for the Prime Minister and Mr Thatcher together with a commentary by the High Commissioner.

We endorse the recommendations made by Mr Coles in his telegram no 378 and would be grateful to know your decisions on the questions raised.

You will wish to note that in the revised programme the only planned contact with the leader of the Opposition is a call by Mr Howard in Canberra on 3 August. In your letter of 25 April to Robert Culshaw you thought this would suffice, despite Mr Howard's earlier suggestion of hosting a public luncheon in Sydney. The fact that Mr Howard will now be calling on both the Prime Minister and the Secretary of State during his visit to Britain from 20-27 July would appear to reinforce your view.

One other point concerns a possible visit to New Parliament House on the morning of 3 August. If the Prime Minister's meeting with Mr Hawke on 2 August takes place in New Parliament House (as foreseen in para 1 of Canberra telegram no 372, copied to you) we see little need for the Prime Minister to return on 3 August for what would be no more than an architectural tour of the building. Mr Hawke might in any case offer to show the Prime Minister the main features of the building. If on the other hand the meeting with Mr Hawke is elsewhere then a visit to the New Parliament would be expected by the Australians and would present a good photo opportunity.

Thank you for your letter of 2 June about the stopovers in Singapore and Bangkok, on the Prime Minister's journey to and from Australia.

Singapore

I wonder whether we ought not to have a single, photogenic engagement at about 4 p.m. in the afternoon (to allow time for a rest on arrival). I have no particular suggestion but the Post might be asked for a recommendation.

Thailand

I agree that we should go ahead with plans for the visit despite the general election. I am less happy with the prospect of 1½ hours in a helicopter. It is an exceptionally long journey. What sort of helicopter would it be? Can some of the journey be undertaken by aircraft? How much closer is Site 2 closer than Site B (in journey time)? Would there not be some other way of 'noticing' Prince Siharouk (the Prime Minister is of course to see him in September)? I think we need to go into all this in more detail before reaching a decision.

The other proposals look fine. The Prime Minister will presumably need to make a speech at the dinner and you will want to commission a draft.

Prime Minister's visit to Australia

As promised in Tony Galsworthy's letter of 13 May, we have taken action with our posts. I enclose draft programmes for the Prime Minister's stopovers in Singapore and Bangkok which are subject to the following comments.

Singapore

Officials in Singapore foresee no difficulties with what is proposed and think it probable that Lee Kuan Yew will wish to host a dinner. Formal confirmation will follow when we have it.

Thailand

It is unlikely to be possible to finalise the programme until shortly before the visit. The general election due on 24 July could result in another coalition Government which may take some weeks to form. Agreement on a new Cabinet may take longer. However, the present expectation is that General Prem will return as Prime Minister. He has already personally welcomed the proposed visit and Thai politicians and officials are firm that it should go ahead. Our Ambassador's assessment is that the new Prime Minister should be known by the time of the visit, even if he has not been formally appointed, and that there are no other likely candidates for the office whom it would not be suitable for the Prime Minister to meet.

The Thais say that General Prem (assuming he is indeed the new Prime Minister) would almost certainly wish to offer a dinner for the Prime Minister and Mr Thatcher on the evening of 6 August. This might be preceded by a short call (say 30 minutes) for official talks.

In these circumstances a call on the morning of 7 August would not be necessary, which opens the way to an early start for the border. This in turn would permit an audience with the King of Thailand, which the Thais are likely to favour, in the afternoon (the only time audiences are granted). It would also leave time for a press conference.

There are two options for a visit to the border: Site 2, administered by the Khmer People's National Liberation Front (KPNLF), or Site B, run by elements loyal to Prince Sihanouk. (The KPNLF and the Sihanoukists are the non-Communist factions of the tri-partite Coalition Government of Democratic Kampuchea, which opposes the Vietnamese occupation of Cambodia). Site B seems to us the more suitable.

Sihanouk is likely to be in Thailand at the time and to wish to receive the Prime Minister personally at Site B, should she decide to go there. This could be an effective way of demonstrating our support for the Prince, whose involvement is a sine qua non for a settlement of the Cambodia question. Site 2 is admittedly more photogenic, with its much larger population (200,000 compared with 40,000 at Site B). However, the likely presence of Sihanouk at Site B and our wish to support him politically lead us to advise Site B over Site 2.

Site B is further from Bangkok than Site 2. But a 7.30 start from the Residence means ample time $(l\frac{1}{2} \text{ hours})$ to tour the camp and meet Sihanouk. We have no precise timing for the audience with the King. However we will ensure sufficient time to freshen up and change clothing between the return to Bangkok and the audience. The programme will also ensure adequate facilities for the press to keep up with what will be a fairly tight schedule.

Although neither programme is yet firm, it would be useful to have your views and suggestions on what is now emerging. We can then go back to post and finalise the details.



I have had a couple of discussions with Colin Marshall of British Airways. The upshot is that the only aircraft they could make available at that time is Concorde and there are considerable disadvantages to using it. It would need to make more stops than a subsonic aircraft, the accommodation is quite limited and the full charter cost would be £700,000. Added to that it is of course a rather temperamental aircraft. I have not pursued the idea of the British Aerospace Airbus A300 or the loan of a Virgin Atlantic aircraft. So we are really left with the RAF VC10 and shall have to resign ourselves to travelling in greater discomfort, with the only consolation that there will be a fair number of stops. We shall have to try to arrange matters so that we have space for at least 12/15 press. In the light of Canberra telegram number 331 we shall also have to allow two seats on internal journeys for the High Commissioner and his wife, although we clearly cannot take his information officer or any Australian officials. Could you please let me see a revised layout, or perhaps alternative layouts, which would meet our requirements as well as possible. - 1. I MET SENIOR OFFICIALS FROM THE AUSTRALIAN PRIME MINISTER'S DEPARTMENT ON 5 MAY TO DISCUSS THE VISIT. PRIOR TO THIS WE HAD REVISED DRAFT PROGRAMME A TO TAKE ACCOUNT OF YOUR COMMENTS IN FIRST T U R AND THE LIKELY ARRIVAL AND DEPARTURE TIMES GIVEN IN SECOND T U R.
- 2. I GAVE A COPY OF THE REVISED DRAFT PROGRAMME TO THE OFFICIALS, EXPLAINING THAT THERE WAS NO FIRM COMMITMENT BY THE PRIME MINISTER TO VISIT IN EARLY AUGUST AND THAT THE DRAFT REPRESENTED ONLY OUR INITIAL IDEAS. THE OFFICIALS SAID THAT THEY WOULD HAVE TO OBTAIN VIEWS FROM THE STATE GOVERNMENTS CONCERNED ABOUT OUR IDEAS AND THAT THE STATES MIGHT HAVE THEIR OWN IDEAS ABOUT HOSPITALITY AND OTHER EVENTS. - B. WOULD THE RAF VC 10 BE USED FOR THE PRIME MINISTER'S INTERNAL FLIGHTS IN AUSTRALIA?. THE AUSTRALIANS WOULD HAVE NO OBJECTION AND WOULD PAY HANDLING, REFEULLING AND CATERING COSTS.
- C. WOULD THE PRIME MINISTER PROPOSE TO BRING GIFTS ?.

 I RECOMMEND THAT SHE DOES SO, FOR THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL, PRIME MINISTER HAWKE AND STATE PREMIERS. EXPENSIVE GIFTS ARE NOT REPEAT NOT THE AUSTRALIAN HABIT, SO MRS THATCHER COULD BRING COMPARATIVELY MODEST ONES.

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO AUSTRALIA

Thank you for your letter of 3 May with the revised itinerary for the Prime Minister's visit to Australia. I take your point about plunging into a working visit to Singapore after a long flight. But the only engagement which the Prime Minister wants in Singapore is a talk, perhaps over dinner, with Lee Kuan Yew. I suggest therefore that we allow several hours for recuperation in Singapore, with no meeting planned before 1700/1800. With this proviso, I am content with the revised timings, and agree that you should now consult the posts concerned.

The question of the aircraft remains difficult. The main constraint is the size of the press party. This will depend in part on how much we charge: but on the basis of our experience, it is likely comfortably to exceed the eight provided for in the RAF seating plan.

At the same time I am sceptical of the British Airways' quotation for a charter. Does it have to be a Tristar? Are there not other and smaller aircraft - 757/767 or Airbus which might be available and cheaper? Are British Airways at the Lord King/Sir Colin Marshall level really going to slap an opportunity cost on us?

I think all this needs a bit more work before we reach a decision, in particular the following questions:

- what would we have to charge the press for seats for this trip on an RAF VC10?
- will the RAF be sending a back-up aircraft which could be used for the press?
- would it be possible to fly some of the RAF and security support personnel out to Australia and back from Thailand by commercial means, leaving more space for the press on the VC10 for the longer stages of the trip? We could be more cramped on the shorter stages within Australia and from Australia to

Thailand.

- are there cheaper alternatives to chartering a Tristar from British Airways?
- do they seriously intend to charge us an opportunity cost? (I would be ready to pursue this with Lord King or Sir Colin Marshall when we have the answers to the other points.)

I should be grateful if this could be looked at further.

Prime Minister's visit to Australia

In your letter of 25 April you asked for some minor modifications to be made to the outward and return journeys. The revised itineraries (using a VC10) are enclosed. Please note that a 2230 hrs departure from Muscat (or Salalah) would mean an arrival in Singapore at 1115 hrs rather than 1015 hrs. This would mean arriving in Singapore for a working visit after 16 hours flying with a break in Oman of only a little over 4 hours on the way.

As you suggested, we have prolonged the stay in Bangkok on the return leg to allow for a less rushed visit to the Thai-Cambodia border. A 1900 hrs departure from Bangkok on Sunday 7 August should get the Prime Minister back to London the following day at 0615 hrs, which should avoid the Monday morning rush hour.

If you are content with these itineraries, we will now ask Posts to consult the Government concerned.

You ask in the last paragraph of your letter of 25 April for a quotation from British Airways for the charter of a larger aircraft for the Prime Minister's visit to Australia. Conference Section have been in touch with the charter division of British Airways. The cost of the operation, ie actual flying and reconfiguration of a Tristar for the whole trip would be £525,000 (this would include fitting tables and beds for the Prime Minister's compartment). There would be no facilities for secure communications or plugs for electric typewriters on this aircraft.

The figure of £525,000 does not, however, cover "lost opportunity cost", ie any necessary cancelling of scheduled services which results in revenue loss including using resources of aircraft and crews. There is, in fact, no Tristar free over the period 30 July to 8 August. If, therefore, British Airways were asked to make one available, the cost quoted would be increased by the lost opportunity cost which would be in the region of £2 million (details of how this cost is arrived at can, of course, be provided, but includes forecast of expected bookings, existing bookings etc).



I should be grateful to know whether you wish us to pursue further the question of charter from British Airways.

From the Private Secretary PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO AUSTRALIA I have seen copies of Canberra telegrams 280, 281 and 282 dealing with the Prime Minister's visit to Australia. You may find it helpful to have some comments: the Prime Minister is keen to visit Perth, and we should keep it in the programme. This means working on the basis of Programme A; under the revised proposals which I put to you in my letter of 25 April, the Prime Minister could arrive in Perth by 1400 on 1 August. That would leave ample time for engagements in Perth that day. I think the Prime Minister might prefer the engagements in question to receiving a succession of Ministers in Canberra (as envisaged in Programme B); an alternative - which I favour less but need not be discarded completely - would be to stop-over in Perth on the return journey. It would substitute for the technical stop-over in Singapore while en route Brisbane-Bangkok; Mr. Thatcher will on present plans accompany the Prime Minister. I am not expecting any other member of the Prime Minister's family to do so; Programme A is a broadly acceptable basis for planning. My main concern about it is the preponderance of lunches, dinners and receptions, and the relative lack of 'hard' newsworthy events except at EXPO 88. Perhaps this is inevitable for this sort of visit to Australia. But would it be heretical to suggest dropping the lunches on 3 and/or 4 August and either the dinner or the reception on 3 August? And perhaps add one or two events such as walkabouts or visits which would attract some media coverage? as regards the Opposition, I agree that we need to tread carefully. Under Programme A there is in fact no provision for calls by Opposition leaders in Canberra, only CONFIDENTIAL

a meeting in Sydney. I would have thought that enough. But Mr. Coles should be aware that Mr. Howard wrote to the Prime Minister in February saying that he hoped she would make time available for an appropriate Liberal Party-sponsored function, and mentioned hosting a public luncheon in Sydney. The Prime Minister replied only that she would bear the suggestion in mind.

- subject to these points, I would be content for Mr. Coles to discuss a programme on these lines with the Australian authorities without commitment.

- 1. MY TWO IFT'S CONTAINS ALTERNATIVE OUTLINE PROGRAMMES FOR THE PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT. THEY HAVE NOT BEEN DISCUSSED AT ALL WITH THE AUSTRALIANS WHO OF COURSE MAY HAVE QUITE OTHER IDEAS. PROGRAMME A IS BASED ON ARRIVAL AT PERTH ON MONDAY, 1 AUGUST, PROGRAMME B ON ARRIVAL ON SUNDAY, 31 JULY.
- 2. PROGRAMME A IS VERY TIGHT. IT INVOLVES A FLIGHT EVERY DAY, INCLUDING ON THE SECOND DAY THE FOUR HOUR FLIGHT FROM PERTH TO CANBERRA. PROGRAMME B IS SOMEWHAT LESS TIGHT, ALLOWS THE PRIME MINISTER A LITTLE MORE TIME IN PERTH AND A GOOD DEAL MORE IN CANBERRA, BUT IT STILL INVOLVES A LOT OF TIME IN THE AIR.
- 3. I ORIGINALLY FAVOURED A STOP IN PERTH TO GIVE MRS THATCHER SOME TIME TO REST AFTER THE FLIGHT FROM LONDON BEFORE HER PROGRAMME IN CANBERRA. BUT IF (CULSHAW'S LETTER OF 23 MARCH TO POWELL) A STOP-OVER IS ENVISAGED ELSEWHERE EN ROUTE, THE CASE FOR GOING TO PERTH IS MUCH LESS STRONG. I WOULD RECOMMEND CUTTING IT OUT AND COMING STRAIGHT TO CANBERRA.
- 4. ON SPEECHES, I RECOMMEND THAT THE MAJOR ONE IS GIVEN AT THE NATIONAL PRESS CLUB IN CANBERRA. AT EXPO (BRISBANE) I DOUBT IF THE ENVIRONMENT WILL LEND ITSELF TO A SUBSTANTIAL SPEECH. THE OPENING CEREMONY WILL BE ON A PLATFORM IN THE OPEN AIR AND THERE WILL BE A GOOD DEAL OF NOISE FROM CROWDS, TRAFFIC ETC. I THEREFORE SUGGEST A SHORTISH (5 MINUTE) SPEECH THERE BUT A SUBSTANTIAL PRESS CONFERENCE LATER IN THE DAY.
- 5. I HAVE OF COURSE NOT DISCUSSED ANY PROGRAMME DETAILS YET WITH THE AUSTRALIANS THOUGH THEIR PRIME MINISTER'S DEPARTMENT WISH TO BEGIN DISCUSSIONS WITH ME SOON. AT THAT POINT THE QUESTION WILL ARISE OF WHAT MEETINGS THE PRIME MINISTER SHOULD HAVE WITH THE OPPOSITION. GIVEN LABOR'S RECENT ELECTORAL REVERSES (MY TELNO 276) THAT IS LIKELY TO BE A SENSITIVE POINT. I SEE NO DIFFICULTY ABOUT SUGGESTING THAT JOHN HOWARD (LIBERAL PARTY) AND IAN SINCLAIR (NATIONAL PARTY) SHOULD CALL ON MRS THATCHER

IN CANBERRA BUT HOWARD IS LIKELY TO PRESS FOR MORE THAN THAT.

I HAVE THERFORE PROVIDED IN THE PROGRAMME FOR A FURTHER PRIVATE
MEETING IN SYDNEY WHERE I ENVISAGE THAT HOWARD MIGHT WANT TO HAVE
HIS SHADOW CABINET COLLEAGUES PRESENT AND PERHAPS INVITE OTHERS.

- A. IN THE LIGHT OF PARAGRAPHS 2 AND 3 ABOVE WILL THE PRIME MINISTER STILL START HER PROGRAMME IN PERTH ?.
- B. IF SO, ON MONDAY OR SUNDAY ?.
- C. WILL MR THATCHER OR ANY OTHER MEMBER OF THE FAMILY ACCOMPANY
 THE PRIME MINISTER ?.
- D. IS PROGRAMME A OR B BROADLY ACCEPTABLE TO NO 10 AS A BASIS FOR PLANNING ?.
- E. SHOULD ANY EVENTS BE DELETED OR ADDED ?.
- F. MAY I BE AUTHORISED TO TRY TO INCLUDE THE ENGAGEMENTS WITH THE OPPOSITION SUGGESTED IN PARA 5 ABOVE AND TO RESIST ANY PROPOSALS FOR HIGHER PROFILE, MORE PUBLIC MEETINGS WITH THE OPPOSITION, WHICH COULD TURN THE VISIT PRETTY SOUR ?.
- 8. I PROPOSE TO STICK TO THE LINE IN ANY DISCUSSIONS HERE THAT ALL PROGRAMME PLANNING IS ON A CONTINGENCY BASIS, THAT A FIRM DECISION ON THE VISIT WILL NOT BE TAKEN FOR SOME TIME AND THAT FOR SECURITY AND OTHER REASONS WE WISH TO KEEP THE DATES CONFIDENTIAL.

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO AUSTRALIA

Thank you for your letter of 22 April with an itinerary for the Prime Minister's visit to Australia. This is in general very much on the right lines, with some minor modifications. Thus:

- the Prime Minister would want only talks with the Sultan in Muscat (or Salalah) not a more extensive visit. Her preference would therefore be to leave London at say 0800 on Saturday 30 July for talks with the Sultan that evening;
- she would like to leave Muscat (or Salalah) earlier on 31 July, say 0730, to get to Singapore by 1900;
- indeed an alternative would be not to overnight in Muscat (or Salalah) at all but to rejoin the aircraft after dinner, leaving for Singapore at 2330. This would presumably get us to Singapore at about 1015 on 31 July, which would allow an afternoon or early evening meeting. On the whole that would be the Prime Minister's preference;
- we could then make an earlier departure from Singapore on 1 August - say 0900 - getting us to Perth by 1400;
- the Prime Minister would indeed like to visit a refugee camp on the Thai-Cambodia border and we must leave ample time for this. I am inclined to think, therefore, that we should give the Prime Minister slightly longer in Thailand and bargain on getting back to London at breakfast time on Monday 8 August.

I should be grateful if the experts could have one final go at this, without the overnight stop at Muscat (or Salalah), after which we can begin to put forward proposals to the governments concerned.

There remains the question of the type of aircraft (your letter of 13 April). I do not think that accommodation for eight press men will meet demand. Could Conference Section please obtain a quotation from British Airways for the charter of a larger aircraft for the whole journey so that we can consider that option? Could it be fitted with tables and beds for the Prime Minister's compartment?

Prime Minister's visit to Australia

Your letter of 14 April asked for revised draft itineraries to allow working stops in the Gulf, Singapore and Thailand.

The Gulf

The enclosed itineraries (in which all times are local) include overnight stops in the Gulf and Singapore on the outward journey. For the reasons outlined in my letter of 23 March, Oman remains the preferred stop-over in the Gulf. The itinerary envisages an arrival at Muscat (or Salalah) just after 2000, if departure from London is at 0900.

Given the fairly late arrival time in Muscat/Salalah it is likely that there will be time on the evening of 30 July only for a dinner hosted by the Sultan. Guests would no doubt include senior Omani members of the Royal Family and Ministers. Time could be set aside before dinner for discussion of regional issues (including the risks of more active Soviet involvement in the region). Bilateral exchanges would focus on our future military arrangements with Oman and the future of the British Eastern Relay Station (BERS) at Masirah. The Prime Minister would also no doubt wish to take the opportunity to thank the Omanis for the help given to the Royal Navy.

If the Sultan is in Salalah, which seems probable, the best option for the morning of 31 July might be a small working breakfast with two or three Omani Ministers including Yousuf bin Alawi (Foreign Affairs) and Qais Zawawi (Economic and Financial Affairs). An alternative to this might be a drive along the spectacular coast road. If the meeting takes place in Muscat, alternatives to the working breakfast might be a visit to one of several major projects completed recently by British firms (the Stadium, Royal Hospital or University), or a helicopter visit to RN vessels in a nearby port.

Singapore

In order to have an evening meal or meeting with Lee on Sunday 31 July, it would be necessary to arrive in Singapore no later than 1900. This would involve leaving Oman at 0715 and assumes there are no delays en route to Singapore. It might be better to plan instead on either a working breakfast with Lee on 1 August or on a meeting from 0900 - 1030. An 1115 departure from Singapore would mean an arrival in Perth at 1615, allowing some rest before any evening function.

Thailand

If the Prime Minister began the return journey from Australia from Brisbane at 0900 on Saturday 6 August, she would reach Bangkok a little before 1800. The RAF advise us that it would not be possible for the VC10 to do this leg non-stop. A technical stop in Singapore would be necessary.

The extent of the programme in Thailand would depend on how late the Prime Minister is willing to reach London on the evening of Sunday 7 August. A departure from Bangkok at noon that day would mean an arrival at Heathrow at 2315.

In addition to talks with Prime Minister Prem, the Prime Minister might wish to pay a short visit to a refugee camp on the Thai-Cambodian border. This would be an effective way of underlining our support for Thailand and ASEAN over Cambodia as well as the assistance we provide, both bilaterally and through the UN, to the Cambodian refugees in the border camps. There would be press interest in such a visit. A short visit to the camp at Site 2, which the Foreign Secretary visited last year, should be possible on the morning of 7 August. It would involve a flight of about 12 hours by helicopter in each direction. Assuming departure for Site 2 at 0730, and one hour at the camp, the Prime Minister could be back at Bangkok airport at 1130 in time for departure at noon. If the Prime Minister is attracted by this proposal, the talks with Prime Minister Prem would have to take place on the evening of Saturday 6 August, possibly over a working dinner. Jams wa

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO AUSTRALIA

The Prime Minister and the Foreign Secretary had some further discussion this evening about places which the Prime Minister might visit on her way to and from Australia (your letter of 31 March to me refers). It was agreed not to pursue the idea of a visit to Fiji and not to include either India or Pakistan in the itinerary. The Prime Minister agreed to consider a visit to Thailand either on the way to Australia or on the way back.

It would be helpful if you could now let me have a revised draft itinerary which would allow working stops in the Gulf, Singapore and Thailand. The Prime Minister's preference, if it can be done, is to stop in the Gulf and Singapore on the way out, and Thailand on the way back, preferably flying direct from Brisbane to Bangkok non-stop. She would envisage a fairly brief visit to Thailand of perhaps half a day and an overnight stop if possible. She would return direct from there to the UK with only a refuelling stop en route.

Programme in Australia We have asked John Coles in Canberra to take into account the Prime Minister's wish to include Perth in the itinerary. We have also asked him for a firm recommendation on where the Prime Minister's one major speech in Australia should be made. We will write again with more detailed proposals once John Coles has had a chance to send us his views. Possible Stopovers Taking into account the Prime Minister's preferences, we // have drawn up the two enclosed draft itineraries: the first includes stopovers in Islamabad (18 hrs on the ground including rest time in the night) and in Singapore (41/2 hrs) on the outward leg, and in New Delhi (5 hrs) and Muscat (9 hrs, including rest time in the night) on the way back; - the second includes overnight stops in Muscat and Singapore on the way out and a day in Fiji on the return journey (but see below on the merits of this idea). Middle East Present indications are that the Sultan may not visit London this summer which would make a stopover in Oman by the Prime Minister more desirable. Depending on where the Sultan is residing, this could be either at Muscat or Salalah, both of which can handle a VC10. (The timings for Salalah would be only marginally different from those on the enclosed draft itinerary.) Sub-Continent We agree that it would be right for the Prime Minister to stop in India as well as Pakistan if she is to visit the sub-continent at all. There are powerful arguments for stopovers in both, but also some drawbacks to consider. Much will depend for Pakistan on what happens in the Geneva talks: and for India on how the fraught relationship develops, CONFIDENTIAL



especially over the Extradtion Treaty. It is still too early to make a recommendation either way. For the time being, it seems best to retain the option of stopovers in both Pakistan and India. Any stopover made in India, however, should be in New Delhi rather than Madras, because Rajiv Gandhi would expect to receive the Prime Minister in New Delhi.

South East Asia

The draft itineraries allow for a call at Singapore with enough time for a meal and talks with Lee. The Foreign Secretary strongly supports this idea.

The arguments for a short visit to Thailand are less compelling, but not negligible.

Fiji

The Foreign Secretary advises against a visit to Fiji by the Prime Minister in August. It would be a further encouragement to Ratu Mara in his search for a solution to Fiji's problems. But it would give us a higher profile in the difficult task of designing an acceptable constitution than we would wish. And a westabout return would preclude other stopovers which have a much higher priority for British interests. In any case, the international airport in Fiji is at Nadi, on the other side of the main island from Suva; a VC10 cannot land at Suva airport; it would therefore be necessary to take a smaller aircraft for the further journey from Nadi to Suva.

Mode of Travel

We have consulted the RAF about the reconfiguration of a VC10 to accommodate the press party in more comfort and the availability of an RAF Tristar. We shall write again as soon as we have their views.

A visit to Perth could be fitted in, but this would probably have to be at the expense of Melbourne, which is of greater importance to British interests. If the Prime Minister nonetheless decided to go to Perth it would be best to do so either at the start of the visit, or else on Saturday, 6 August on the way home. Either way it would be difficult to make a visit to Broome (Lord McAlpine's suggestion): Broome is three hours flight from Perth and can only be reached by a smaller aircraft than a VC10.

Possible Stopovers

The Foreign Secretary recommends planning for one or two stopovers in each direction. There are strong candidates in the Gulf and in South East Asia. There is also a good case for including stops in the Indian sub-continent but it is difficult to offer firm advice at this stage.

South Arabia/The Gulf

Oman is our preferred stop-over in the Gulf, provided the Sultan does not himself come to London privately this summer (he is not expected to decide whether to come for another month or so). The Prime Minister has not visited Oman since 1981. Relations are exceptionally close and a visit could be timely in putting the seal on new UK/Oman defence arrangements. A stopover on the way back in the United Arab Emirates would be our second choice. Shaikh Zaid's State Visit to London will not take place until the summer of 1989 at the earliest. The UAE has been helpful with facilities for RN's Armilla and Cimnel forces and we have important commercial interests.

We do not favour a stopover in Saudi Arabia: we shall have received Crown Prince Abduallah in London only six weeks before the Prime Minister's visit to Australia, and the King came on a State Visit here in March 1987.

South East Asia

A stopover in Bangkok would allow the Prime Minister to discuss Cambodia, to give support to Biwater in their bid for a large irrigation project, and to make up for the omission of Thailand from her 1985 itinerary. We do not think General Prem would resent a brief stopover. The Foreign Secretary would, however, give priority to a visit to Singapore if it is not possible to include both. Lee Kuan Yew has got wind of the Prime Minister's visit to Australia and our High Commissioner has been asked to pass a message that he would be happy to see Mrs Thatcher on her outward or return journey, either for an official visit or a stopover.

Indian Sub-Continent

Pakistan is likely to be facing a very difficult situation over Afghanistan by the summer: a stopover in Islamabad would be appreciated by the Pakistanis as a demonstration of our solidarity and support. We should also consider India but it is difficult to know whether our relations with India will have recovered sufficiently from the Panorama programme setback to make a visit in August wise. We do not wish to propose a visit to Islamabad until we are clearer about the desirability of including India. A third candidate could be Colombo, but that depends on whether or not President Jayewardene pays a guest of government visit here in the summer.

Possible Itinerary:

Outward Journey

The following paragraphs outline possible itineraries, including stopovers in the sub-continent.

Assuming departure from London in the morning of Saturday, 30 July, the necessary technical stop in the Gulf would come in the late evening, too late for any meetings.

Islamabad could be reached in the early hours of Sunday, 31 July, with the remainder of the night available for rest there, followed by discussions on the Sunday morning (no great difficulty in a Muslim country).

CONFIDENTIAL Depending on the length of stay at Islamabad - a long stopover would obviously permit a better programme - there would be the possibility of a stopover at Bangkok on the Sunday evening. From Singapore it would be possible to fly to either New Delhi or Colombo, with the possibility of talks with Rajiv Gandhi or Jayewardene on the evening of Saturday 6 August. After leaving New Delhi or Colombo, the Prime Minister could arrive in Muscat (or Salalah) or in Abu Dhabi in the early hours of Sunday 7 August and have most of the night available for rest, before paying calls in the morning before departure for London. It would also be possible to fly direct from Singapore to Muscat or Abu Dhabi. I enclose possible itineraries for the outward and return journeys showing how the stopovers might be fitted In due course the Foreign Secretary would welcome a chance of discussing all these options with the Prime Minister, to give more specific advice about which has the higher priority in the promotion of British interests. PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO AUSTRALIA

I should be grateful for some advice on various aspects of the Prime Minister's visit to Australia, for which we have tentatively blocked out 30 July-7 August.

Aircraft Types

It would be helpful to know whether use of a Tristar rather than the VC10 would:

- (a) cut the journey time significantly;
- (b) reduce the number of stops en route to Australia:
- (c) be much more expensive.

(I might add in parenthesis that I have had some discussion with Sir Colin Marshall of British Airways about the possibility of chartering Concorde. It would cost about £500,000.)

Programme in Australia

It might be useful to get some advice from Sir John Leahy before his final departure - if it has not already happened - on a programme in Australia. In addition to Expo in Brisbane, the Prime Minister will presumably have to visit Canberra and Sydney, and would guite like to visit Perth.

Possible Stop-overs

A decision on possible stop-overs will depend in part on how many we actually need to make: and of course technical stops do not necessarily have to become visits. But possibility which we are considering are:

- Islamabad, to see President Zia;
- Bangkok, because the Prime Minister was unable to include it in her South East Asia tour in 1985. But would one day be enough or regarded as insultingly short?

- Singapore, for a talk with Lee Kuan Yew;
- Madras, to see Mr. Alexander (the former High Commissioner) and balance a visit to Pakistan; and
- Saudi Arabia and/or a Gulf State.

These are very tentative ideas. But it would be helpful to know:

- whether you see objections to any of them;
- or have alternatives to suggest; and
- could draw up an overall itinerary with rough times, so that we could see what a visit encompassing 3/4 days in Australia and these stops might look like.
