Prince Aya was born in Tokyo on 30 November 1965, the second son of His Majesty Emperor Akihito.

In October 1988 Prince Aya began a post-graduate course in Marine Biology at St John's College Oxford, after spending two months staying with Mr and Mrs Leonard Ingrams to improve his English. His studies have been interrupted by the illness and subsequent death of his grandfather, the late Emperor Showa (Hirohito). At Japanese request Special Branch provide 24 hour protection for Prince Aya.

Prince Aya was educated at Gakushuin School in Tokyo and graduated from the Department of Politics of the Faculty of Law Gekushuin University in March 1988. He also received extensive private tuition in biology and has written a research paper on the taxonomy of Thai Catfish to be submitted to the Japanese Journal of Icthyology.

He is President of the Yamashina Institute of Ornithology and of the World Wildlife Fund Japan (his inauguration ceremony was attended by HRH The Duke of Edinburgh, President of the World Wildlife Fund International). Prince Aya has visited New Zealand, Thailand, Malaysia and Singapore. He has also visited the UK previously, when, in 1985, he came to see his older brother, now HIH Crown Prince Naruhito, who studied at Merton College Oxford from 1983 to 1985.

Prince Aya's favourite sports are tennis and table tennis. He is also reputed to be fond of fast cars and rock music.

Lunch at Chequers on 18 February

The Prime Minister is giving lunch tomorrow to Prince Hiro of Japan. You might find the following background useful.

Prince Hiro, who will be 24 on 23 February, is the eldest son of the Japanese Crown Prince and thus second in line to the Imperial throne. He went to Australia for a short period of schooling in 1974 but otherwise his education has been in Japan. He arrived in the UK in June 1983 for preparatory language tuition before starting his M.Litt studies in October at Merton College, Oxford. His subject at Oxford is mediaeval history with special emphasis on water transport. As far as we are aware, his studies have been progressing satisfactorily apart from some initial problems (now overcome) with his English.

Prince Hiro has made one official visit, to Brazil in 1982, when he also visited New York and Mexico. His main interests are sport and music. He is a keen tennis player (reputedly unbeaten since his arrival in Britain) and also went skiing in Liechtenstein this January. He will no doubt have been following the Winter Olympics closely. He plays the viola, cello and piano and is expected to take part in a concert at St John's, Smith Square, in May with a touring Japanese orchestra. The Prince is a personable, although slightly shy, young man, who is quite ready to relax in conversation after some initial hesitation.

The Prince's parents are to visit the UK from 4-7 March on their return from an official visit to Zaire and Senegal, and will travel to Oxford to see the Prince. They will be calling on Colonel Hall who will be a lunch guest on 18 February, and in whose house Prince Hiro stayed for three months while studying English last summer. They are lunching with HM The Queen on 6 March, but the visit is otherwise private. The Prime Minister might enquire after the health of the Prince's grandfather (the Emperor). When

Sir Hugh Cortazzi had his farewell audience on 25 January the Emperor seemed to be well for a man of 82, although he shows some signs of age. Sir Hugh Cortazzi was able to congratulate their Majesties on their 60th wedding anniversary which fell on 26 January.

Prince Hiro (and the Imperial Family in general) has no direct involvement and probably not a great deal of interest in international political and economic questions. The Prime Minister may nevertheless like to be reminded of the main strands of UK-Japan relations. The relationship is inevitably affected by the existence of a trading deficit of £2,600m in our bilateral visible trade. (Japanese exports to the UK were £3,374m in 1983 and UK exports to Japan £797m.) Nonetheless Japanese investment in the UK, noticeably the Nissan deal, and voluntary restraint arrangements in sensitive areas of Japanese exports, do help the trading relationship. There are currently talks taking place in Tokyo between the EC and the Japanese Government on trading matters during which the EC will be encouraging the Japanese, in their next package of measures to promote imports, not to concentrate entirely on measures aimed to meet US concerns.

Apart from the Crown Prince and Princess's private visit there are a number of high level visits planned for the first six months of 1984. Captain Mark Phillips visits Japan privately at the beginning of March. Mr Tebbit and Sir G Howe are planning trips to Tokyo during the Easter recess. Mr Nakasone and other Japanese Ministers will be coming to London for the Economic Summit.

On the political and cultural level relations between the two countries remain good in spite of the Japanese Government's refusal last December to accept a visit by HMS Invincible. This episode, which was in large part the result of pressures during the Japanese election campaign, is not expected to have any long term effects. The Japanese Government have said that they look forward to ships' visits from the UK in the future.



Prince Hiro of Japan

Thank you for your letter of 11 January.

It is confirmed that Prince Hiro will be able to accept an invitation from the Prime Minister to lunch at Chequers on Saturday 18 February.

Of those mentioned in Roger Bone's letter of 9 January, we think that on reflection it would not be appropriate to invite the Earl and Countess of Haddington; the Earl is aged 89, and as his home is in Scotland he might well be reluctant to travel. From the Japanese side we recommend that the Japanese Ambassador and his wife should be invited and the Japanese would also hope that the Prince's Chamberlain, Dr Fuji, could be included. Thank you for your letter of 5 January about the Prime Minister's desire to offer a meal to Prince Hiro of Japan (not in fact the Crown Prince as his grandfather the Emperor is still alive).

The dates proposed for the unofficial visit to the UK by the Prince's father and mother, the Crown Prince and Princess, are 4 - 7 March.

You asked about the Kents' and the Ogilvies' connections with Japan. The Duke and Duchess of Kent visited the country last in 1979 and before that in 1973. The Ogilvies have not been there since 1965. However Princess Alexandra invited Prince Hiro for a drink when he arrived here in June, and opened the Great Japan Exhibition in 1981 with his greataunt, Princess Chichibu. We believe that on balance Princess Alexandra probably has the stronger connection with Japan, but not decisively so.

The two acquaintances to whom Sir Antony Acland referred are Colonel Tom Hall, Chairman of International Language Centres Ltd and a Gentleman at Arms in the Royal Household, and his wife. Prince Hiro stayed with the Halls for three months during the summer when he was receiving private tuition in English arranged by Colonel Hall. The Prime Minister might also like to be aware that Lord and Lady Mansfield have received Prince Hiro at their home in Scone Palace, where they had earlier entertained the Crown Prince and Princess; and that the Earl of Haddington and Lord Saye and Sele have had Prince Hiro to stay for a few days at their homes near Edinburgh and Banbury respectively.
