

The Prime Minister will wish to know that we have agreed that HRH The Duke of Kent should visit Northern Ireland on Friday, 25 September on a secret unannounced visit to army units serving in the Province of which he is Colonel or Colonel in Chief.

The outline programme is as follows:

10.45	Arrive RAF Aldergrove in Andover of the Queen's Flight. Met by Commander Land Forces.
11.00 - 12.30	Visit 3rd battalion, the Royal Regiment of Fusiliers at Holywood Barracks, Belfast.
12.30 - 15.15	Visit 1st battalion, the Scots Guards at Girdwood Camp, Belfast.
15.45 - 17.20	Visit 1st battalion, the Devon and Dorset Regiment in South Armagh.
17.45	Depart RAF Aldergrove.

His Royal Highness will travel within Northern Ireland by RAF helicopter and not by a Queen's Flight aircraft.

At present the security forces see no reason why the visit should not go ahead but, as usual, the visit may be cancelled at any time if the security situation should worsen significantly or if prior news of the visit were to leak.

VISIT OF HRH THE DUKE AND DUCHESS OF KENT

I mentioned that the visit by the Duke and Duchess was generally regarded as a great success here and that I would be letting you have a more considered appraisal.

I attach a note prepared for me by Ewart Bell, Head of the Northern Ireland Civil Service. The important point is that this Royal visit not only gave a lot of pleasure to a significant number of people who came into contact with the visitors, but over and above that gave the Province as a whole something to talk about other than terrorism and politics. It was/kind of highly publicised event in which most people might have no more than a modest interest but which added colour and humanity out of the ordinary.

As you will see from the list annexed to the note, there is a real hope that another Royal visit might be possible before too long and in any case during 1981. I am sure that - subject always to the trend of events - it would help the people of Northern Ireland if we were able to include the Province in as near normal a way as possible in Royal itineraries. Any encouragement you can give to this will be greatly valued.

Security will, you may be confident, remain the prime consideration but it is encouraging that the security authorities were justified in their confidence that they could cope with a Royal visit spread over two days, and with no element of surprise, better than with the surprise "in-and-out". I don't suppose Their Royal Highnesses were aware, incidentally, how novel and beneficial it was to see

streets lined with policemen in ceremonial kit and wearing white gloves: these things should not be underestimated.

I was able yesterday to discuss the subject with the Chief Constable. He would welcome another Royal Visit as a symbolic extension of the normality he is gradually extending on the streets of Northern Ireland and would particularly endorse a visit in connection with the completion of St. Anne's Cathedral in Belfast. And he advises that in Northern Ireland the presence of a Primers or a Duchess will greatly add to the impact of the visit. An you may be aware, we have already consulted Nicholas Lawson about the GOU's invitation to Princess Anne to visit the Royal Signals Unit next Summer. We hope the programme will involve both military and civil events, including St. Anne'.

THEIR ROYAL HIGHNESSES THE DUKE AND DUCHESS OF KENT'S VISIT TO NORTHERN IRELAND - 24/25 JUNE 1980

The visit of Their Royal Highnesses The Duke and Duchess of Kent to Northern Ireland on 24 and 25 June was very successful and gave a great deal of pleasure to many people as well as providing a welcome boost to the community as a whole and the opportunity for good publicity for Northern Ireland.

- 2. Press coverage was extensive and good with live BBC TV coverage of the final event of the 2-day visit a garden party for 1,500 to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the formation of the Ulster Defence Regiment. The remainder of the programme (at times undertaken separately by the Duke and Duchess) included commerce and industry, recognition of the 'caring services', visits to Army Units and the presentation of Gallantry Awards to members of the Royal Ulster Constabulary.
- 3. The main events, with guests drawn from all walks of life and regardless of class and creed, were as follows:-
- a. <u>Cloghan Point Fuel Terminal</u> 70 guests including 23 members of NIES staff plus approximately 500 schoolchildren.
- b. Joss Cardwell Rehabilitation Centre 37 guests including staff plus approximately 30 patients.
- c. Coffee Reception at Hillsborough Castle approximately 80 guests from Youth, Welfare,
 Nursing, Ambulance, Fire, Prison and other
 services.
 - d. IDR Garden Party at Hillsborough Castle approximately 1,500 people from all parts of
 the Province attended.

In addition, visits to Short Bros Ltd and Hughes Tool Co Ltd, for presentation of the Queen's Awards, provided the opportunity for both workforces to meet HRH The Duke of Kent, while the visits to Army Units and the presentation of Gallantry Awards to members of the RUC were much appreciated by the security forces.

- this wide rariety of interests to be included in a programme which Their Royal Hiphnesses themselves evidently found interesting and enjoyable and, although it involved I' concrete movements of the Royal Visitors, it went smoothly and presented no serious problem for the RUC as regards their security. Discordant notes were heard, inevitably, but appeared to be limited to a reference by a Republican Club Councillor to "Royal Junketing" going on in the midst of an economic crisis and to alterations from the Carrickfergus Borough Council that they had been snubbed because all the members of the Council had not been invited to the Clochen Point seremony and a visit to Carrickfergus Castle had not been included in the itinerary.
- Royal presence at forthcoming events in Northern Ireland and these and other possible events are listed in Annex A. Around these major events balanced programmes, similar to that arranged for Their Royal Highnesses, The Duke and Duchess of Kent could be organised. Because of security aspects of a Royal Visit, a Garden Party at Hillsborough Castle gives the best opportunity for the largest number of people (up to 3,000) from a wide cross section of the population to have a part in the visit.

VISIT TO NI BY THE DUKE AND DUCHESS OF KENT - 24 AND 25 JUNE

In my letter to you of 31 March, I told you about the proposed visit to Northern Ireland by the Duke and Duchess of Kent. Michael Alexander replied on 2 April recording the Prime Minister's agreement to our plans.

I am now writing to let you know that, since the Duke and Duchess's programme is unusually wide-ranging, and there is a risk of public and press speculation about the visit arising through the number of outside organisations involved, my Secretary of State believes that a formal announcement should be made as soon as can be arranged. He is satisfied that an announcement at this stage will not materially increase the security risk involved in the visit.

I attach for your information, a copy of the draft press statement we intend to issue.

ROYAL VISIT TO NORTHERN IRELAND

It has been learnt today from St James's Palace that Their Royal Highnesses The Duke and Duchess of Kent will make a two-day visit to Northern Ireland on 24-25 June.

The main purpose of their visit will be to attend a Garden Party to be held as part of the celebration connected with the 10th anniversary of the Ulster Defence Regiment. While in the Province the Duke and the Duchess will also carry out a number of other engagements.

VISIT TO NORTHERN IRELAND BY DUKE AND DUCHESS OF KENT

You will wish to inform the Prime Minister that preliminary planning is under way for a visit by the Duke and Duchess of Kent to Northern Ireland on 24 and 25 June 1980.

The main purpose of the visit would be for the Duke and Duchess to attend a Garden Party, to be held by the Ulster Defence Regiment in the grounds of Hillsborough Castle, to mark the tenth anniversary of its formation. The Secretary of State for Defence and the Army Board have supported the concept of this event.

The Garden Party would take place in the afternoon of the 25 June and would provide the Duke and Duchess with an opportunity to meet and talk informally with members of the UDR and their families.

On arrival on 24 June (at about 10.30 am) the Duke would visit his Regiment (2nd Battalion Royal Regiment of Fusiliers) at Holywood while the Duchess visited the Joss Cardwell Rehabilation Centre or Girl Guide Headquarters - both venues are convenient to Holywood.

The Duke and Duchess would then travel to HQNI Lisburn where the Duke would visit the 1st Scots Guards plus representatives of 2nd Scots Guards while the Duchess met representatives of the Army Catering Corps and the Womens Royal Army Corps. Following lunch at HQNI the Royal Party would pay a visit to Cloughan Point Oil Terminal beside the Kilroot Power Station on the County Antrim side of Belfast Lough for an opening ceremony, followed by a sherry reception and a private dinner party at Hillsborough Castle.

On Wednesday morning (10.00 am - 11.00 am) members of voluntary and other organisations such as Samaritans and the Fire Service will be invited to a coffee reception at Hillsborough Castle after which the Royal Party will travel to Garnerville on the outskirts of Belfast to visit the RUC. They will return to Hillsborough Castle for lunch and will attend the UDR garden party in the afternoon.

Travel within Northern Ireland would be by helicopter of the Queen's Flight except for one short car journey by the Duchess. If the Prime Minister agrees that the visit should take place it would be accepted, as in the case of all Royal Visits in the last three years, that it might be necessary for security reasons to cancel the visit at any time up to the last minute. We shall keep the visit confidential until as short a time in advance as is feasible. A review of the security situation would be made before any announcement.

My Secretary of State believes that this proposed two day visit is desirable. It should not present any great security or administrative difficulties. He would be grateful for the Prime Minister's approval to his proceeding with plans for the visit in consultation with St James's Palace on the basis of detailed arrangements to be made under his responsibility.

I am copying this to John Chilcot, who will want to know that Metropolitan Police Officers would need to accompany the Duke and Duchess.
