Thank you for your letter of 30 August which I have received from your Ambassador in London. I am grateful to you for keeping us informed of the progress of your negotiations with your commercial bank creditors. I have followed closely the progress of the economic reform programme you have courageously pursued since taking office.

I welcome your determination, despite the difficult and tragic events of earlier this year, to persevere with these policies. Britain fully endorses the strengthened debt strategy which allows the use of a portion of IMF and World Bank lending to facilitate commercial bank debt reduction. I am glad that Venezuela is one of the first countries to benefit from this new approach. The agreement reached with the IMF and IBRD is a measure of the economic reforms you are undertaking.

Our policy has always been not to intervene in negotiations between governments and their commercial creditors. I am sure that Venezuela's creditors will take into account the constructive way in which your Government is dealing with the debt situation when considering your request. But any agreement must be a commercially-based and voluntary one.

Dear Prime Minister.

From the beginning of my government in February 1989, a programme of strict economic measures has been applied, at correcting the imbalance affecting our development possibilities with the functioning of a more opened and flexible economy.

This programme has started to bear fruit and it is fully supported by the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank. As proof of its support the International Monetary Bank approved for Venezuela \$4,600 million with extended facilities; and the World Bank has granted loans for structural adjustment and commercial policy for 400 million dollars.

In order to consolidate this process of adjustment and the early recovery of the economy a prompt negociation of the foreign debt, on acceptable terms, is essential.

It is for this reason that I address myself to you. To share with you my concern, since for all practical purposes our negotiations with the banks are in a state of stagnation. As you are probably aware, Venezuela has always met its obligations, even when the state of the external accounts made this inadvisable. For the last five years, Venezuela has devoted more than 50% of its oil revenues to honouring the external debt. This responsible attitude vis a vis the international financial community has depleted our reserves situation can not be corrected without and this wholehearted support of the internacional banking community which would enable us to conclude a global negotiation including the present debt situation and its definitive restructuring within the framework of the Brady Inicitiave,

for debt reduction during 1989 and thus the consolidation of the economic adjustment programme.

The banks have acknowledged a major residual deficit of \$1,500 million in the Venezuelan Balance of Payments for 1989. This residual deficit can not be met by Venezuela. The banks must take into consideration the efforts that Venezuela has always made and help us to emerge successfully in these negotiations.

Prime Minister, even though, it does not directly concern your government, I would be very grateful for your good offices, with regard to a more understanding attitude on the part of the banks towards our proposal.

Our negotiating team, formed by the President of the Central Bank, the Minister of State-Head of the Central Office for Coordination and Planning and the President's Commissioner for Renegotiating the External Debt will propose a solution aimed at breaking the deadlock, details of which will be provided to the financial authorities of your country.

I thank you, in advance for your support and the support of the financial authorities of your country, in achieving a prompt solution to the problem of Venezuela's external debt.

Election of New Venezuelan President

In the Venezuelan Presidential elections of 4 December, the Centre-left candidate, Carlos Andres Perez - previously President of Venezuela from 1974 to 1979 - defeated his Christian Democrat rival, Eduardo Fernandez.

In 1983 the Prime Minister sent a message of congratulations to the then President-elect, now President, Jaime Lusinchi. Venezuela is a stable democracy, an important export market and a force for stability in the region.

The Foreign Secretary suggests that the Prime Minister might consider sending a message to the President-elect on the following lines:

"Please accept my warmest congratulations on your victory in the recent presidential elections. I wish you and your future government every success. I am confident that the present good relations enjoyed by our two countries will be maintained and strengthened in the years to come."

We have had an approach suggesting that the Prime Minister should see a Mr. Eduardo Fernandez, a Conservative candidate in the Venezuela Presidential elections. He is likely to be in London on 18-20 February and 23-27 February. While in Europe, he is apparently seeing Chancellor Kohl.

I am not convinced that it is a good thing for the Prime Minister to start seeing Presidential election candidates in Venezuela, even if of conservative persuasion; and anyway her other commitments make it difficult. I should be grateful if you could let me know in the course of Monday whether there are strong reasons in favour of the Prime Minister seeing him, of which I should take account.

Lord Shackleton phoned earlier today and, in your absense, spoke to me.

He had been approached by Mr. Eduardo Fernandez, a Conservative candidate for the Venezuelan presidency who wishes to call on the Prime Minister during his European visit. Mr. Fernandez has apparently already made an appointment with Chancellor Kohl. The suggested dates were either 18-20 February or 23-27 February.

Lord Shackleton had apparently asked Mr. Fernandez why he was not seeking to arrange a meeting through the usual channels. The response was that Mr. Fernandez saw things as an approach from one Conservative politician to another. Before coming to us, Lord Shackleton had nonetheless approached the Foreign Office. Giles Fitzherbert, our Ambassador in Venezuela, was said to be in favour of the Prime Minister seeing Mr. Fernandez. Lord Shackleton had also spoken to John Everard in the FCO whose views were not clear.

Lord Shackleton had also taken soundings about the liklihood of Mr. Fernandez winning the election. There are apparently some who think he has a good chance but the majority view was that he would fail.

I told Lord Shackleton that I would pass all this on to you and you would seek the Prime Minister's views on whether she wished to see Mr. Fernandez. I told him that for diary reasons 18-20 February looked most unlikely, and Lord Shackleton will pass that message back, without, at the same time, encouraging Mr. Fernandez to believe he would be seen during the 23-27 February period. I said we would try to get back to Lord Shackleton next Monday - his phone numbers are 0590 23373 (home) and 930 1752 (office).


I have seen your letter of 22 February to Robert Armstrong.

PROPOSED VISIT OF PRESIDENT LUSINCHI OF VENEZUELA

- 1. The Royal Visits Committee agreed at its meeting on 11 January that if President Betancur of Colombia was for any reason unable to take up the invitation to visit the UK as a Guest of Government from 13-17 May that slot should be offered to President Lusinchi of Venezuela. We have now heard that President Betancur has postponed his European visit until the autumn and that he will not therefore be able to visit the UK in May.
- 2. As agreed by the Royal Visits Committee we now propose to offer those dates to President Lusinchi. We have asked the Ambassador in Caracas for his personal assessment of the suitability of the dates proposed and he believes that President Lusinchi would welcome the invitation. Assuming, therefore, that you, Philip Moore and Robin Butler, to whom I am copying this letter, have no objections we will ask the Ambassador as a matter of urgency, in view of the shortage of time, to put the proposal to the Venezuelan Government.



3. The postponement of President Betancur's European tour may mean that we will eventually be faced with a proposal that he should visit the UK in the Autumn. The programme of Guest of Government visits this year is getting fairly full with firm proposals from Presidents Mubarak and Nyerere, and the possibility of visits by Presidents Lusinchi and Chun (although the latter is still an uncertain starter). There is also, though in a rather different category, King Fahd. It may not therefore be possible or practical for us to offer President Betancur a full Guest of Government visit and since he is the one who has postponed his plans, it may be better to put him into 1986. We can, however, discuss this if and when we are faced with a proposal from the Colombians.

PRIME MINISTER'S MESSAGE

2. I HANDED CUSINCHI THE PRIME MINISTER'S MESSAGE (YOUR TELNO 191). THIS WAS VERY WELL RECEIVED. LUSINCHI SPOKE WARMLY OF MRS THATCHER AND SAID HE WOULD REPLY FORMALLY THROUGH THE VENEZUELAN EMBASSY IN LONDON.

FOREIGN POLICY

TO THE CARIBBEAN, GRENADA HAD BEEN A LESSON. THE SMALL ISLAND
STATES WERE VULNERABLE TO SUBVERSION. HE HOPED THAT BRITAIN
WOULD KEEP AN EYE ON THE AREA AND THE UNITED STATES TAKE A GREATER
INTEREST. ON GUYANA, HE SAID THAT AD WOULD ENJOY BETTER RELATIONS

RELATIONS WITH BRITAIN

6. LUSINCHI SAID THAT BRITAIN HAD LONG-STANDING LINKS WITH LATIN AMERICA AND VENEZUELA. HE LOOKED FORWARD TO DIALOGUE WITH BRITAIN, PARTICULARLY ON DEBT, OIL AND GUYANA. HE SPOKE WARMLY OF THE HELP HE HAD HAD DURING THE ELECTION CAMPAIGN FROM TEALE, THE BRITISH ADVERTISING DIRECTOR RESIDENT HERE. I THANKED LUSINCHI FOR HAVING SENT NICOMEDES ZULOAGA TO REPRESENT HIM AT THE INAUGURATION OF MIRANDA HOUSE LAST WEEK AND PRESENTED HIM WITH A SPODE BICENTENARY COMMEMORATIVE PLATE WHICH PLEASED HIM.

COMMENT

7. LUSINCHI SEEMED MORE RELAXED AND IN BETTER CONDITION THAN ON PREVIOUS OCCASIONS. HE HAS OVERCOME MANY OBSTACLES, INCLUDING ILLEGITIMACY, AND OFFICE MAY YET ADD TO HIS STATURE. OUR RELATIONS SEEM OFF TO A REASONABLE START. HOWEVER, HE WILL PROBABLY EXPECT US TO PRODUCE MORE THAN WE ARE WILLING OR ABLE TO DELIVER OVER THE DISPUTE WITH GUYANA.

The change of government offers us the opportunity to develop a better relationship. HM Ambassador in Caracas considers that Lusinchi would respond well to a message from HMG, which would give us a good foundation on which to build in the months to come.

We therefore recommend that the Prime Minister should send a brief message of congratulations. I enclose a telegram to Caracas embodying a draft message.

Possible Visit of Venezuelan President-Elect

The Prime Minister may wish to know that the Venezuelan President-elect may be coming to London to attend the inauguration of a new Venezuelan Cultural Centre on 17 December.

Arrangements are in the hands of the Venezuelan Embassy and their plans are still rather tentative. We shall probably not know for certain whether the Presidentelect will be coming until after the elections on 4 December. If he does come, we recommend that the Prime Minister receive him for a brief (15 minute) courtesy call on Friday, 16 December, if this can be fitted in. Sir Geoffrey would also plan to see the President-elect on that day.

We shall let you know as soon as we know the outcome of the Venezuelan Presidential elections. Both leading candidates have expressed interest in coming to London to attend the ceremony.
