SOUIET UNION

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GORBACHEV ADDRESS TO PARTY FIRST SECRETARIES.

SUMMARY

1. IN DEFENSIVE SPEECH, GORBACHEV ARGUES TIME IS RIGHT FOR
TRANSITION TO REGULATED MARKET ECONOMY. ATTEMPTS TO JUSTIFY
FORTHCOMING LEGISLATION IN TERMS OF ECONOMIC LIBERATION AND
MOTIVATION OF THE INDIVIDUAL. DEFINES NEW PARTY ROLE IN EDUCATING
POPULATION WHICH CURRENTLY LACKS MARKET PSYCHOLOGY. THE PARTY
APPARATUS STILL UNEASY ABOUT MARKET IDEAS. ECONOMIC DEBATE LIKELY TO
BE A CENTRAL THEME OF FORTHCOMING CPSU CONGRESS.

DETAIL

- 2. ON 11 JUNE THERE WAS A MEETING OF REPUBLIC AND REGIONAL PARTY LEADERS IN MOSCOW. THE TEXT OF GORBACHEV'S SPEECH, BUT NONE OF THE OTHER CONTRIBUTIONS, WAS PUBLISHED IN PRAVDA ON 13 JUNE. NEARLY ALL HIS REMARKS WERE DIRECTED TO ECONOMIC REFORM.
- 3. THE SOVIET LEADER BEGAN BY ADMITTING THAT PREPARATIONS FOR THE MARKET ECONOMY WOULD BE DIFFICULT AND COMPLICATED. ON 13 JUNE THE GOVERNMENT AND PARLIAMENTARY ECONOMIC REFORM COMMISSION WOULD MAKE THEIR FINAL PRESENTATION TO THE SUPREME SOVIET FOLLOWING THE DISCUSSION STAGE OF RYZHKOV'S REFORM PACKAGE (WE WILL BE REPORTING THIS SEPARATELY).

ECONOMIC ARGUMENT

- 4. GORBACHEV RAISED THE ISSUE OF WHETHER PRIVATISING STATE PROPOERTY CONTRADICTED SOCIALISM. HE EMPHASISED THAT ECONOMIC FREEDOM OF THE INDIVIDUAL MUST ACCOMPANY HIS POLITICAL EMANCIPATION AND CLAIMED THAT LENIN HAD COME TO REALISE THIS, EVEN IF ONLY IN HIS LATER YEARS. A RETURN TO THE COMMAND-ADMINISTRATIVE SYSTEM WAS OUT OF THE QUESTION AS THE LATTER WAS OUT-DATED AND HAD IMPEDED SCIENTIFIC-TECHNOLOGICAL PROGRESS. THE SOVIET ECONOMY LAGGED SO FAR BEHIND ITS US COUNTERPART NOT ON ACCOUNT OF A LACK OF RESOURCES, BUT RATHER DUE TO THE ABSENCE OF INDIVIDUAL ECONOMIC MOTIVATION.
- 5. THE SOCIAL CHANGE INVOLVED IN THE TRANSITION TO A REGULATED MARKET WAS COMPARABLE WITH THAT WHICH OCCURRED AFTER OCTOBER 1917.

PAGE 1 RESTRICTED THE REFORMS WOULD HAVE ADVERSE EFFECTS ON THE POPULATION BUT PRICE INCREASES SHOULD LEAD TO MORE, NOT LESS, GOODS ON THE SHELVES. A 7-8 MONTH PREPARATORY PERIOD FOR LEGISLATION WOULD NOW ENSUE, AN IMPORTANT ASPECT OF WHICH WOULD BE TO DECIDE EFFECTIVE MEASURES OF SOCIAL PROTECTION. THOSE WHO ARGUED THE GOVERNMENT SHOULD HAVE INTRODUCED MARKET-ORIENTATED REFORMS EARLIER WERE WRONG AS ENTERPRISES HAD NEEDED TIME TO READJUST TO NEW CONDITIONS.

IDEOLOGY AND FUTURE ROLE OF THE PARTY

- 6. GORBACHEV ARGUED THAT THE ACTIVE COOPERATION OF PARTY AND STATE ORGANS WAS REQUIRED IF ECONOMIC REFORMS WERE TO ACHIEVE THEIR MAXIMUM POTENTIAL. THE PSYCHOLOGICAL CHANGE REQUIRED WAS EVEN MORE COMPLEX THAN THE ECONOMIC ONE. THE SOVIET PEOPLE 'ABSOLUTELY' LACKED A MARKET PSYCHOLOGY AT PRESENT AND THE CPSU WOULD HAVE TO TASK ITSELF WITH EXPLAINING THE PURPOSE OF FORTHCOMING LEGISLATION AND EDUCATING THE POPULATION GENERALLY.
- 7. GORBACHEV SAID THAT THE REFORM PLAN WOULD CAUSE 'TEMPORARY DISCOMFORT'. BUT BEFORE CRYING 'GUARD' THE ISSUES SHOULD BE STUDIED CAREFULLY. THIS SHOULD BE DONE BY EVERYONE TOGETHER: IF THERE WAS NOT AGREEMENT, PARTICULARLY AMONG THOSE IN RESPONSIBLE POSITIONS THEN THE REFORM PROCESS WOULD BE CHOKED OFF. THERE WAS NO NEED TO FEAR THAT THE MARKET WOULD MAKE THE ECONOMY UNMANAGEABLE. BUT IT HAD TO BE CLEAR THAT THE PRUPOSE OF REFORM WAS TO IMPROVE LIVING STANDARDS NOT TO KEEP CERTAIN PEOPLE IN POWER.

COMMENT

8. GORBACHEV'S ATTEMPT TO PLACE THE PROPOSED ECONOMIC REFORMS WITHIN A LENINIST IDEOLOGICAL FRAMEWORK WAS UNCONVINCING. THE CPSU, AS THE VERY EMBODIMENT OF THE COMMAND-ADMINISTRATIVE SYSTEM, APPEARS AN UNLIKELY AND UNQUALIFIED ADVOCATE OF A REGULATED MARKET ECONOMY. BUT IT IS CLEAR FROM THIS SPEECH THAT THERE IS STILL A LOT OF OPPOSITION WITHIN THE PARTY EVEN TO THE CURRENT CAUTIOUS MARKET REFORM PROGRAMME OF THE GOVERNMENT. GORBACHEV IS EVIDENTLY EXPECTING THE DEBATE OVER ECONOMIC CHANGE TO PLAY A CRUCIAL ROLE IN THE OUTCOME OF THE FORTHCOMING PARTY CONGRESS.

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SOVIET UNION: 9 MAY ANNIVERSARY: SPEECHES BY GORBACHEV AND YAZOV

SUMMARY

1. GORBACHEV SETS THE RECORD STRAIGHT ON STALIN AND THE WAR AND STRESSES AGAIN THE NEED FOR MILITARY REFORM. A GOOD SPEECH - BUT ONE WHICH WILL NOT HAVE HELPED MEND FENCES WITH THE MILITARY.

DETAIL

2. GORBACHEV ADDRESSED THE PRE-ANNIVERSARY MEETING ON THE EVENING OF 8 MAY WITH A SPEECH ENTITLED ''LESSONS OF WAR AND VICTORY''. DEFENCE MINISTER YAZOV MADE HIS MUCH BRIEFER COMMENTS AT THE PARADE ON RED SQUARE ON 9 MAY. THE MILITARY PARADE ITSELF WAS METICULOUSLY PRESENTED AND WENT OFF WITHOUT INCIDENT.

GORBACHEV'S SPEECH

- 3. GORBACHEV BEGAN BY NOTING THAT THE 9 MAY ANNIVERSARY WAS AN OCCASION FOR NATIONAL PRIDE AND FOR NATIONAL MOURNING. HE NOTED THE WAR HAD COST ALMOST 27 MILLION SOVIET LIVES. HE PAID TRIBUTE TO THE HEROISM OF SOVIET TROOPS AND THE SOVIET PEOPLE AND ALSO EXPRESSED GRATITUDE FOR THE EFFORTS OF THE ALLIES SINGLING OUT FIRST THE UK AND THE USA.
- 4. THE REST OF GORBACHEV'S SPEECH DEALT WITH THE LESSONS TO BE LEARNED FROM EVENTS LEADING UP TO THE WAR AND THE WAR ITSELF: IN HIS FINAL PASSAGES HE DEALT WITH THE ISSUE OF MILITARY REFORM.

LESSONS FROM THE WAR

5. GORBACHEV REFERRED TO THE DAMAGE DONE BY THE PURGES OF 1937-38 TO THE USSR'S INTERNATIONAL REPUTATION. THE QUESTION WAS OFTEN ASKED, HE SAID, WHETHER THE WAR COULD HAVE BEEN AVOIDED. THINGS WOULD HAVE BEEN DIFFERENT WITHOUT THE WEST'S POLICY OF APPEASEMENT: BUT THERE WAS PROBABLY LITTLE THAT COULD HAVE BEEN DONE TO PREVENT THE WAR. THE USSR CONGRESS OF DEPUTIES HAD RECENTLY GIVEN THEIR ASSESSMENT OF THE RIBBENTROP/MOLOTOV PACT: HE DID NOT WANT TO ADD TO THIS - EXCEPT

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TO SAY THAT THE ENORMOUS POLITICAL AND MORAL COSTS OF DELAYING THE WAR IN THIS WAY HAD BEEN GIVEN EVEN MORE FORCE BY SUBSEQUENT SERIOUS STRATEGIC MISTAKES BY THE SOVIET UNION. HE REFERRED TO STALIN'S DECIMATION OF THE OFFICER CORPS. MORE THAN 40,000 HAD BEEN KILLED OR IMPRISONED. HE ALSO REFERRED AT SOME LENGTH TO STALIN'S REFUSAL TO BELIEVE ALL THE EVIDENCE THAT A GERMAN ATTACK WAS IMMINENT AND TO THE DISASTROUS RESULTS OF THIS IN THE OPENING PHASES OF THE WAR.

- 6. TURNING TO THE REASONS FOR THE EVENTUAL SOVIET VICTORY, GORBACHEV REJECTED THE PARALLELS WITH NAPOLEON: I.E. THAT THE GERMAN ARMY WAS DEFEATED BY THE SIZE OF THE COUNTRY, THE WEATHER ETC. HE ALSO REJECTED THE IDEA THAT VICTORY WAS WON NOT BY COURAGE OR INTELLIGENCE BUT PURELY BECAUSE OF THE SOVIET UNION'S WILLINGNESS TO SACRIFICE ENORMOUS NUMBERS OF LIVES. HE EMPHASISED IN PARTICULAR THE UNITY OF THE MULTI-NATIONAL USSR THROUGHOUT THE WAR SOMETHING OVER WHICH HITLER BADLY MISCLACULATED. HE ALSO PAID TRIBUTE TO THE ENORMOUS ROLE PLAYED BY THE CPSU.
- 7. GORBACHEV RAISES ANOTHER FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTION WHY DID THE INHABITANTS OF THE COUNTRY THAT WON THE WAR NOW LIVE WORSE THAT THOSE THEY HAD DEFEATED. THE ANSWER: HAVING WON THE WAR, THE SOVIET PEOPLE WERE ONCE AGAIN SUBJECTED TO AUTHORITARIANISM. THOSE WHO RETURNED FROM THE WAR DID NOT WANT ANY LONGER TO BE COGS IN A POLITICAL MACHINE. BUT THEY DID NOT GET THEIR HONOUR AND FREEDOM UNTIL 1956. HE ALSO NOTES THAT DURING THE COLD WAR THE VAST WEALTH CREATED BY THE SOVIET PEOPLE WAS LARGELY INVESTED IN INCREASING THE COUNTRY'S MILITARY STRENGTH ONE OF THE FACTORS WHICH HAD LED THE ECONOMY TO ITS PRESENT CRISIS.

MILITARY REFORM

- 8. GORBACHEV SAID THAT THE PROBLEMS OF THE MILITARY WERE NOW BEING DISCUSSED HEATEDLY EVERYWHERE. THE ISSUES WERE INTER-LINKED WITH THE NEW APPROACHES IN FOREIGN POLICY, THE COMPLEX PROBLEMS OF THE DEMOCRATIC PROCESS AS WELL AS CURRENT ECONOMIC DIFFICULTIES. IT WAS NATURAL THAT THE ARMED FORCES SHOULD REFLECT THE WIDER PLUSES AND MINUSES OF MODERN SOVIET LIFE. THE ARMY COULD NOT BE PLACED ABOVE CRITICISM. PERESTROIKA MEANT THAT THE ARMY'S ROLE IN SOCIETY HAD TO BE LOOKED AT AGAIN. BUT DISCUSSIONS OF THEIR PROBEMS HAD TO BE COMPETENT, CONSTRUCTIVE AND COHESIVE.
- 9. THE AIM OF MILITARY REFORM WAS TO ACHIEVE THE MOST EFFICIENT STRUCTURE AT THE MINIMAL COST. LIFE IN THE MILITARY HAD TO BE DEMOCRATISED THE ROLE OF POLITICAL SECTIONS HAD TO BE RETHOUGHT.

PAGE 2 RESTRICTED 10. THE ISSUE OF MILITARY REFORM AFFECTED EVERYBODY - THERE HAD TO BE A CAREFULLY WORKED OUT STATE-WIDE PROGRAMME FOR WIDE RANGING CUTS IN PERSONNEL, EQUIPMENT, BUDGET REDUCTIONS AND CONVERSION OF THE MILITARY SECTOR. AT THE SAME TIME, THE LIVING CONDITIONS OF THE MILITARY AND OTHER FAMILIES HAD TO BE IMPROVED. THE HONOUR AND DIGNITY OF THE MILITARY HAD TO BE PROTECTED. THERE SHOULD BE NO ATTEMPT TO INFRINGE THEIR SOCIAL OR POLITICAL RIGHTS. ON THIS DAY OF VICTORY, GORBACHEV SAID HE WANTED TO SAY TO THE MILITARY HOW MUCH THEIR WORK AND THEIR READINESS TO DEFEND THE COUNTRY WAS VALUED.

SPEECH BY DEFENCE MINISTER YAZOV

- 11. THE WAR, SAID YAZOV, HAD CONVINCINGLY DEMONSTRATED THE STRENGTH OF THE SOVIET SYSTEM, AND THE UNBREAKABLE FRIENDSHIP OF ITS PEOPLES. THE SOVIET PEOPLE HAD DEFEATED FASCISM NOT ONLY ON THE FIELD OF BATTLE BUT ALSO ECONOMICALLY. IN THE STRUGGLE FOR METAL, COAL, BREAD AND ENERGY, THE ENORMOUS POTENTIAL OF THE SOCIALIST SYSTEM HAD BEEN DEMONSTRATED. THE ROLE OF THE PARTY AND ITS APPARATUS HAD BEEN CRUCIAL. VICTORY IN THE WAR HAD OPENED BEFORE MANKIND NEW AVENUES TO SOCIAL PROGRESS AND PEACE.
- 12. NEW POLITICAL THINKING AND THE PROCESS OF CHANGE IN THE SOVIET UNION HAD PRODUCED POSITIVE CHANGES IN THE INTERNATIONAL ARENA. THERE WAS NOW DIALOGUE INSTEAD OF CONFRONTATION. BUT THESE ACHIEVEMENTS WERE NOT YET IRREVERSIBLE: MILITARY DANGER STILL EXISTED.
- 13. THE SOVIET MILITARY WELCOMED AND SUPPORTED THE NEW PARTY PLATFORM AND THE DECISIONS OF THE LAST PEOPLE'S CONGRESS AND OF THE PRESIDENT AIMED AT STRENGTHENING THE UNITY OF THE USSR.

COMMENT

- 14. GORBACHEV'S SPEECH WAS DESIGNED TO SET THE RECORD STRAIGHT ABOUT THE LESSONS OF THE WAR AND THE EVENTS LEADING UP TO IT. HE SET OUT, IN MORE DETAIL THAN HE HAD DONE BEFORE, THE IMPACT OF STALIN HIS PURGES OF THE ARMY AND HIS REFUSAL TO ACCEPT THE IMMINENCE OF A GERMAN ATTACK. HIS ACCOUNT WAS DESIGNED TO MAKE THAT POINT THAT THE SOVIET UNION'S PROBLEMS CAN ONLY BE RESOLVED BY DEMOCRACY NOT BY A RETURN TO AUTHORITARIANISM.
 - 15. THIS WAS A CAREFULLY PREPARED, SOPHISTICATED AND RELATIVELY OBJECTIVE ANALYSIS. BUT THERE MUST HAVE BEEN A REAL QUESTION ABOUT WHETHER THIS WAS THE TIME AND PLACE FOR SUCH A SPEECH. BY AN ACADEMIC AUDIENCE, IT WOULD HAVE BEEN WELL RECEIVED. THE ACTUAL AUDIENCE MAINLY WAR VETERANS AND THE MILITARY AND POLITICAL

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ESTABLISHMENT - GAVE IT A NOTICEABLY COOL RECEPTION. GIVEN THE APPARENT TENSIONS IN GORBACHEV'S RELATIONS WITH THE MILITARY, HE MIGHT HAVE BEEN BETTER ADVISED TO RESTRICT HIMSELF - AS YAZOV DID - TO THE SORT OF PLATITUDES RUSSIANS ARE USED TO HEARING ON THESE OCCASIONS.

- 16. HIS COMMENTS ON THE IMPORTANT ISSUE OF MILITARY REFORM WERE REASONABLY BALANCED. THEY FOLLOWED THE SAME LINE AS OTHER RECENT COMMENTS EG IN SVERDLOVSK. HE INSISTED ON THE NEED FOR REFORM: THERE WAS NO SIGN OF BACKTRACKING ON MANPOWER OR BUDGET CUTS. THE ARMY HAD TO BE DEMOCRATISED AND COULD NOT REMAIN ABOVE CRITICISM. BUT HE ALSO STRESSED HIS COMMITMENT TO PRESERVING MILITARY HONOUR AND DIGNITY AND WARNED AGAINST LETTING PUBLIC CRITICISM OF THE ARMED FORCES GO TOO FAR.
- 17. YAZOV'S COMMENTS INCLUDED A SHORT AND RATHER GRUDGING ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF THE NEED FOR REFORM. HIS ASSURANCE THAT GORBACHEVS POLICY OF PRESERVING THE UNITY OF THE UNION HAD MILITARY SUPPORT WAS PRESUMABLY DIRECTED, IN PARTICULAR, AT LITHUANIA.

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Foreign and Commonwealth Office London SW1A 2AH RESTRICTED ear Charles Gorbachev's Speech at the Council of Europe, 6 July You have seen the text of speech given by Gorbachev at the Council of Europe on 6 July; I enclose a further copy. The speech concentrates on areas which Gorbachev considers ripe for cooperation across Eastern and Western Europe, under the general umbrella theme of the "Common European Home". It is broadly positive and forthcoming in tone, although it gives the impression of being something of a rag-bag of disparate ideas. Gorbachev invokes the now familiar themes of the interdependence of nations, and respect for the right of each people to choose their social system, adding that any attempt to limit the sovereignty of states whether friends, allies or anyone else is inadmissible - a very clear intended reference to the Brezhnev Doctrine. He suggests that the main obstacle to greater European unification is not the existence of two social systems, but the belief that 'what is meant by overcoming the division of Europe is actually "overcoming socialism"'. Both social systems can co-exist and cooperate in a more united Europe. While there are some welcome passages in this, the section as a whole contains a "hands-off" message based on the negative premise that socialism in the East is a "historical fact". Press interest has so far concentrated on Gorbachev's remarks on SNF, although in fact there is little substantially new in these, and Gorbachev's appeal is more emotional than rational. The offer of unilateral reductions in short- range nuclear weapons once the Alliance has signalled its readiness to join in negotiations on "tactical nuclear weapons" is disingenuous since in Russian parlance the phrase includes all theatre nuclear systems. The Alliance is not of course willing to engage in negotiations which go beyond short-range missiles. More interesting is the suggestion that the Soviet Union, US, UK, and France, together with countries upon whose soil nuclear weapons are based, should discuss in depth questions such as the concept of minimum deterrence and the point at which the ability to retaliate with nuclear weapons becomes an ability to use them for attack. This is one of a number of recent hints which the Russians have given that, while not

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abandoning their traditional rejection of the concept of nuclear deterrence, they may be willing to accept that nuclear weapons have a role to play in European security. Talks such as Gorbachev proposes would contain pitfalls - the issue of deterrence is one for the Alliance as a whole, not for individual nations - and the Russians would no doubt use such contacts to disparage the deterrent value of short-range nuclear weapons. These issues may well be raised by the Russians at next year's CSBM seminar on military doctrine.

Economic and Other Cooperation

Gorbachev spoke of the possibility of Soviet accession to certain Council of Europe conventions open to signature by non-member states. He also made a pitch for greater East/West economic cooperation, speaking strongly about COCOM. He listed a series of possible joint East/West projects, including a trans-European high-speed railway, and programmes on solar energy and nuclear safety. He spoke positively of cooperation and the EC and EFTA.

Gorbachev suggested that a new Helsinki conference was becoming increasingly urgent. It is not clear what he hopes to gain by this, unless a further platform for the Soviet Union to show its reform process in a good light. There is already a full programme of meetings leading up to the 1992 Helsinki Review Conference: and many commitments made by the East at earlier meetings have yet to be fulfilled. The speech did, however, contain a useful commitment to the establishment of a "State of Law" in the Soviet Union and Europe.

Comment

Little of this is really new. Gorbachev has used the forum of the Council of Europe and the theme of the Common European Home to bring together a number of fairly disparate Soviet proposals into a more general picture of cooperation across East and West Europe. He has stuck to Soviet support for two different social systems in Europe, although with the implication that the division into two blocs will become less threatening and less important. Apart from the section on SNF there is little here that calls for a substantive response.

Visit to Paris

There were no surprises from the earlier part of Gorbachev's visit to France. The 21 bilateral agreements signed during the visit cover well trodden ground, for instance cultural centres and management training (a programme on the same sort of scale as the FRG's). The French apparently resisted Soviet pressure for a joint statement on the lines of the one issued in Bonn, and there is no major political declaration.

/President Mitterrand



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President Mitterrand took a firm line over the need for practical steps to overcome the East/West division. Gorbachev for his part spoke in forth- coming terms of the freedom of the East Europeans to go their own way: "It is up to Hungary and Poland to decide their own affairs". He also, however, made clear that he envisaged the future of the East European nations as being in "a socialist system and a socialist democracy" - the same ambiguity which marked the Strasbourg speech.

According to press reports, Gorbachev spent much of his time with Mitterrand explaining the present position of the reform process in the Soviet Union. The Prime Minister may like to ask Mitterrand for his impressions when she meets him in Paris next week.

Mr. President, Mr. President

Ladies and gentlemen,

I thank you for the invitation to make an address here-in one of the epicenters of European politics and of the
European idea.

This meeting could, perhaps, be viewed both as evidence of the fact that the pan-European process is a reality and of the fact that it continues to evolve.

Now that the 20th century is entering a concluding phase and both the post-war period and the cold war are becoming a thing of the past, the Europeans have a truly unique chance-

to play a role in building a new world, one that would be worthy of their past, of their economic and spiritual potential.

I.

Now more than ever before, the world community is experiencing profound changes. Many of its components are currently at the turning point of destinies.

The material foundation of life is changing drastically as are its spiritual parameters. There are new, and increasingly more powerful factors of progress emerging.

But alongside these factors and in their wake, there continue to persist and even escalate the threats emanating from this very progress.

There is an inevitable need to do everything within the power of modern intellect so that Man would be able to continue the role assigned to him on this Earth, perhaps in the Universe at large,

so that he would be able to adapt himself to the stressinducing newness of modern existence and win the fight for the survival of the present and succeeding generations.

This applies to all mankind. But it applies three times as much to Europe--both in the sense of its historic responsibility and in the sense of the urgency and immediacy of problems and tasks at hand, and in the sense of opportunities.

It is also the specific feature of the situation in Europe that it can cope with all this, live up to the expectations of its peoples and do its international duty at the new stage of world history,

only by recognizing its wholeness and by making the right conclusions.

The years 1920s saw the theory of "a declining Europe" gain wide currency. But that theme seems to be in vogue with some people even today. As far as we are concerned, we do not share the pessimism regarding the future of Europe.

Europe experienced, before everyone else, the consequences of the internationalization first and foremost of economic and subsequently of the whole public life.

The interdependence of countries, as a higher stage of the process of internationalization, made itself felt here before it did in other parts of the world.

Europe experienced more than once the attempts at unification by force. But it also experienced lofty dreams of a voluntary democratic community of European peoples.

Victor Hugo said that the day would come when you, France, you, Russia, you, Italy, you, England, you, Germany--all of you, all the nations of the continent will, without losing your distinguishing features and your splendid distinctiveness, merge inseparably into some high society and form a European brotherhood... The day would come when the only battle-field will be markets open for trade and minds open to ideas.

Nowadays it is no longer enough to merely ascertain the commonality of destiny and interdependence of European states.

The idea of European unification should be collectively thought over once again in the process of the co-creation of all nations--large, medium and small.

Is it realistic to raise the question in these terms?

I know that many people in the West perceive the main difficulty in the existence of two social systems.

Yet the difficulty lies elsewhere—it lies in the rather wide—spread belief (or even in the political objective) that what is meant by overcoming the division of Europe is actually "overcoming socialism".

But this is a course for confrontation, if not something worse. There will be no European unity along these lines.

The fact that the states of Europe belong to different social systems is a reality. The recognition of this historical fact and respect for the sovereign right of each people to choose their social system at their own descretion are the most important prerequisite for a normal European process.

The social and political order in some particular countries did change in the past, and it can change in the future as well. But this is exclusively a matter for the peoples themselves and of their choice.

Any interference in internal affairs, any attempts to limit the sovereignty of states-both friends and allies or anybody else-are inadmissible.

Differences between states cannot be eliminated. In fact, they are even salutary, as we said on more occasions than one.

Provided, of course, that the competition between different types of society is aimed at creating better material and spiritual conditions of life for people.

Thanks to perestroika, the Solviet Union will be in a position to take full part in such an honest, equal and constructive competition. For all our present shortcomings and lagging behind, we know full well the strong points of our social system which follow from its essential characteristics.

And, we are confident that we shall be able to make use of them both to the benefit of our ourselves and of Europe.

It is time to consign to oblivion the cold war postulates when Europe was viewed as an arena of confrontation divided into "spheres of influence" and someone else's "forward-based defenses", as an object of military confrontation--namely a theatre of war.

In today's interdependent world the geopolitical notions, brought forth by a different epoch, turn out to be just as helpless in real politics as the laws of classical mechanics in the quantum theory.

In the meantime, it is precisely on the basis of the outmoded stereotypes that the Soviet Union continues to be suspected of hegemonistic designs and of the intention to decouple the United States from Europe.

There are even some people who are not unwilling to put
the USSR outside of Europe from the Atlantic to the Urals by
confining it to the space "from Brest to Brest". To them, the
Soviet Union is ostansibly too big for joint living: the others
will not feel very comfortable next to it, or so they say.

The realities of today and the prospects for the foreseable future are obvious: the Soviet Union and the United States are a natural part of the European international and political structure.

Their involvement in its evolution is not only justified, but also historically conditioned. No other approach is acceptable. In fact, it will even be counterproductive.

For centuries Europe has been making an indispensable contribution to world politics, economy, culture and to the development of the entire civilization.

Its world historic role is recognized and respected everywhere.

Let us not forget, however, that the metastases of colonial slavery spread around the world from Europe. It was here that fascism came into being. It was here that the most destructive wars started.

At the same time Europe, which can take a legitimate pride in its accomplishments, is far from having settled its debts to mankind. It is something that still has to be done.

And it should be done by seeking to transform international relations in the spirit of humanism, equality and justice and by setting an example of democracy and social achievements in its own countries.

The Helsinki process has already commenced this important work of world-wide significance.

Vienna and Stockholm brought it to fundamentally new frontiers. The documents adopted there are today's optimal expression of the political culture and moral traditions of European peoples.

Now it is up to all of us, all the participants in the European process, to make the best possible use of the ground work laid down through our common efforts. Our idea of a Common European Home serves the same purpose too.

II.

It was born out of our realization of new realities, of our realization of the fact that the linear continuation of the path, along which inter-European relations have developed until the last quarter of the 20th century, is no longer consonant with these realities.

The idea is linked with our domestic, economic and political perestroika which called for new relations above all in that part of the world to which we, the Soviet Union, belong, and with which we have been tied most closely over the centuries.

We also realized that the colossal burden of armaments and the atmosphere of confrontation did not just obstruct Europe's normal development,

but at the same time prevented our country--economically, politically and psychologically--from being integrated into the European process and had a deforming impact on our own development.

These were the motives which impelled us to decide to pursue much more vigorously our European policy which, incidentally, has always been important to us in and of itself.

In our recent meetings with European leaders questions were raised about the architecture of our "common home", on how it should be built and even on how it should be "furnished".

Our discussions of this subject with President Francois Mitterand in Moscow and in Paris were fruitful and fairly significant in scope.

Yet even today, I do not claim to carry a finished blue-print of that home in my pocket. I just wish to tell you what
I believe to be most important.

In actual fact, what we have in mind is a restructuring of the international order existing in Europe that would put the European common values in the forefront and make it possible to replace the traditional balance of forces with a balance of interests.

What are the questions that deserve specific mention in this context?

First and foremost, these are security issues.

As part of the new thinking, we began with a critical reassessment of our perceptions of the military confrontation in Europe, of the dimensions of the external threat and of the factor of force in strengthening security.

This did not come easy, sometimes it was downright painful. But as a result, decisions were made that have made it possible to break the vicious circle of "action-reaction" in East-West relations.

No doubt, joint Soviet-US efforts in the area of nuclear disarmament played a major starting role in the process.

The INF Treaty got something more than just approval from the Europeans. Many contributed to its conclusion.

The Vienna talks opened a fundamentally new stage in the arms reduction process.

23 states, rather than just two powers are participating in it.

All the 35 participants in the CSCE process continue to
work out military confidence-building measures. Although the
two negotiating processes are going on in different rooms, they
are closely interrelated.

There are no "bystanders", nor can there be any, in peace-building in Europe; all are equal partners here and everyone, including neutral and non-aligned countries, bears his share of responsibility to his people and Europe.

The philosophy of the concept of a "Common European Home" rules out the probability of an armed clash and the very possibility of the use or threat of force, above all military force, by an alliance against another alliance, inside alliances or wherever it may be.

It suggests a doctrine of restraint to replace the doctrine of deterrence. This it is not just a play on notions, but a logic of European development imposed by life itself.

Our objectives at the Vienna talks are well-known. We believe--and the US President has also spoken in favour of it--that substantial reductions within two or three years in the level of armaments in Europe can well be achieved, naturally, given the elimination of all asymmetries and imbalances.

I emphasize, all asymmetries and imbalances. No double standards are admissible there.

We are convinced that it is high time talks on tactical nuclear systems were initiated among all interested countries.

The ultimate objective is to completely eliminate those weapons.

Chly Europeans who have no intention of waging war against one another are threatened by those weapons. What are they for then and who needs them?

Are nuclear arsenals to be eliminated or retained at all costs? Does the strategy of nuclear deterrence enhance or undermine stability?

On all these questions the positions of NATO and WTO appear to be diametrically opposed.

We, however, are not dramatizing our differences. We are looking for solutions and invite our partners to join us in this quest.

After all, we see the elimination of nuclear weapons as a stage-by-stage process. Europeans can travel part of the distance separating us from complete destruction of nuclear weapons together, without backing away from their positions—with the USSR remaining faithful to its non-nuclear ideals and the West-to the concept of "minimum deterrence".

However, there is merit in figuring out what lies behind the concept of "minimum" deterrence and where the limit is beyond which nuclear retaliation capability is transformed into an attack capability. Here much remains unclear, and ambiguity breeds mistrust.

Why shouldn't experts from the USSR, the United States,
Great Britain and France, as well as from states who have
nuclear weapons on their territories, hold an in-depth
discussion of those questions?

If they arrive at some common views, the problem would become simpler at the political level, too.

If it becomes clear that NATO countries are ready to join us in negotiations on tactical nuclear weapons, we could, naturally after consulting our allies, carry out without delay further unilateral reductions in our tactical nuclear missiles in Europe.

The Soviet Union and other Warsaw Treaty countries, notwithstanding the Vienna talks, are already unilaterally reducing their armed forces and armaments in Europe.

Their posture and operational structure are changing in line with the defensive doctrine of reasonable sufficiency.

That doctrine-both in terms of quantities of armaments and troops and in terms of their deployment, training and all military activities makes it physically impossible to launch an attack or to conduct large-scale oriensive operations.

In any case, as was declared at the USSR Supreme Soviet, we intend, if the situation permits, to cut sharply--by 1.5 to 2 times-the share of our defence expenditure in national income already by 1995.

We have seriously addressed conversion of the military industry. All CSCE participating countries will come to face this problem one way or another. We are ready to exchange views and share experience.

We think that the opportunities offered by the United Nations can also be used and, say, a joint working group can be set up within the Economic Commission for Europe to look into conversion problems.

- we are in favour of a radical reduction in conventional arms and armed forces down to a level of reasonable defense sufficiency that would rule out the use of military force against other countries for the purposes of attack;
- we are in favour of complete withdrawal of all foreign troops from the territories of other countries;
- we are absolutely opposed to the development of any space weapons;
- we are in favour of dismantling military blocs and launching immediately a political dialogue between them to that end, we are in favour of creating an atmosphere of trust that would rule out any surprises;
- we are in favour of a deep, consistent and effective verification of all treaties and agreements that may be concluded with respect to disarmament issues.

I am convinced that it is high time the Europeans brought their policies and their conduct in line with a new common sense--not to prepare for war, not to intimidate one another, not to compete in improving weapons, all the more so-in attempts to "offset" the initiated reductions, but rather to learn to make peace together and to jointly lay a solid basis for it.

III.

If security is the foundation of a Common European Home, then all-round cooperation is its bearing frame.

What is symbolic about the new situation in Europe and throughout the world in recent years, is an intensive interctate dialogue, both bilateral and multilateral. The network of agreements, treaties and other accords has become considerably more extensive. Official consultations on various issues have become a rule.

For the first time contacts have been established between NATO and WTO, between EC and CMEA, not to mention many political and public organizations in both parts of Europe.

We are pleased with the decision of the Parliamentary
Assembly of the Council of Europe to grant the Soviet Union the
status of a "specially invited" state. We are prepared to
cooperate. But we think that we can go further than that.

We could accede to some of the international conventions of the Council of Europe that are open to other states—on the environment, culture, education, television broadcasting. We are prepared to cooperate with the specialized agencies of the Council of Europe.

The Parliamentary Assembly, the Council of Europe and the European Parliament are situated in Strasbourg. Should our ties be expanded in the future and be put on a regular basis, we would open here, with the French government's consent, of course, a Consulate General.

Interparliamentary ties have major significance for making the European process more dynamic. An important step has already been made: late last year a first meeting of the parliamentary leaders of 35 countries was held in Warsaw.

We have duly appreciated the visit to the USSR of the delegation of the Parlimantary Assembly of the Council of Europe headed by its President, Mr. Bjork.

The delegation could, I hope, "feel" directly the potent and energetic pulse of the Soviet perestroika.

We regard as particularly important the recently initiated contacts with the European Parliament.

Inter alia, we took note of its resolutions on militarypolitical issues which are seen by the Parliament as the core of the West European consensus in the area of security.

In this connection I cannot but mention the plans for "the Western European defense". Of course, any state or any group of states have the right to take care of their security in the forms they consider most appropriate.

It is important, though, that these forms are not in contradiction with the prevailing positive trends, i.e. the trend toward a military detente.

That they do not lead to the reappearance of confrontational tendencies in European politics and hence to a renewed arms race.

The need to convene within the next 18-24 months a second Helsinki-type meeting is coming to the fore with ever increasing urgency. It is time for the present generation of the leaders of the European countries, USA and Canada to discuss, in addition to the most immediate issues, how they contemplate future stages of progress toward a European community of the XXI century.

The economic content of the Common European Home. We regard as realistic -- though not a close one -- the prospect of emergence of a vast economic space from the Atlantic to the Urals where Eastern and Western parts would be strongly interlocked.

In this sense, the Soviet Union's transition to a more open economy is essential; and not only for ourselves, i.e. for higher economic effectiveness and for meeting consumer demands.

Such a transition will increase East-West economic interdependence and, thus, will tell favorably on the entire spectrum of European relations.

Similarities in the functioning of economic mechanisms, strengthening of ties and economic interest, mutual adaptation, training of experts—these are all long-term factors of cooperation, a guarantee of stability of the European and the international process as a whole.

My contacts with prominent representatives of the business communities of Great Britain, the Federal Republic of Germany, France, Italy and the United States during my trips

abroad and on numerous occasions in Moscow, testify to an increased interest in doing business with us in the conditions of perestroika.

Many of them do not overdramatize our difficulties, take into account the specificity of the moment, when the reform is more successful in destroying obsolete mechanisms then in engaging new ones.

I have also noted the resolve of experienced businessmen with a broad political outlook to take justified risks, demonstrate audacity and act with long-term prospects in mind.

And incidentally, not only in the interests of business but also in the interests of progress and peace and in universal human interests.

We also feel the swareness that focus on the immediate commercial profit may miss the chance for broad-scale and much more beneficial long-term economic cooperation with us as an integral part of the European process.

I think that the distinguished audience will agree that in our age segregating economic ties from scientific and technological ties is something less than normal. Yet, East-West relations have of late been bled white by COCOM.

If one could justify such practices at the peak of the cold war, today many restrictions seem utterly ridiculous.

Of course, we, too, are often excessively closed. However, we have begun to straighten this out. We have started to take down our "domestic COCOM"---the wall separating military and civilian production--in particular, in connection with conversion.

So maybe experts and representatives of the respective governments could get together and break all those cold war log-jams.

To bring secrecy down to reasonable limits which are indeed required for security, and to give the green light to the normal two-way flow of scientific knowledge and technical art?

The following projects, for example, are equally urgent both for the East and West of Europe:

a trans-European high-speed railway;

a common European programme on new solar-energy technologies and equipment;

processing and storing nuclear waste and enhancing the safety of nuclear power stations;

additional fiber optics channels for transmitting information; an all-European satellite TV system.

Of great interest is the proposed high definition television. The research is under way in several countries and this system has a promising future for use within a "European home".

Naturally, one would prefer the most advanced and inexpensive system.

In 1985 in Paris President Mitterand and I put forward the idea of developing an international thermonuclear experimental reactor. It is an inexhaustible source of environmentally clean energy.

Under the IAEA aegis this project—the result of pooling scientific capabilities of the Soviet Union, West European countries, the United States, Japan, and other countries—is moving to the stage of practical research.

Scientists believe that such a reactor could be built by the end of the century. It is a great achievement of academic thought and technological art, which will serve the future of Europe and the entire world.

The model of economic rapprochement between Eastern and Western Europe will to a large extent be determined by the relations between Western regional organizations—the EC, EFTA, and CMEA. Each of them has its own dynamics of development and its own problems.

We do not doubt that integration processes in Western

Europe are acquiring a new quality. We are far from underestimating
the emergence in the next few years of a single European market.

The Council for Mutual Economic Assistance is also working towards establishing a integrated market though we are lagging far behind in this respect.

The rate of internal change in the CMEA will to a considerable degree determine what will have a priority development in the near future—ties between the CMEA and EC as groups or ties between inidividual socialist countries and the EC.

It is quite possible that now and then one or the other form will come to the forefront. What is important is that both forms fit in the logic of establishing a common European economic dimension.

As for the Soviet Union, coming up is a trade and economic agreement between our country and the EC. We attach substantial significance to this act from the standpoint of all-European interests too.

We are, naturally, far from seeing our ties with the EC as opposed to ties with other associations or states. The EFTA countries are our good and old partners.

It might be reasonable to talk also about developing ties between the CMEA and EFTA and use this channel of multilateral cooperation, too, in the construction of new Europe.

The common European home will have to be environmentally clean as well. Life has taught us bitter lessons. Major ecological problems have long ago transcended national confines. Setting up a regional ocological security system is therefore an urgent task.

It is quite possible that it is in this direction which is indeed a priority direction that the all-European process will advance most rapidly.

Elaborating a long-term continental ecological programme could be a first step.

We have proposed setting up a UN centre for emergency ecological assistance.

Such a centre or agency with a warning and monitoring system is urgently needed in Europe.

We might also give thought to establishing an all-European inctitute for ecological research and assessment.

And ultimately--on the creation of an organ with binding authority.

The Vienna meeting decided that an environmental forum of the 35 would be held this autumn in Sofia, Bulgaria. It could also discuss the problems in practical terms.

Humanity is suffering increasingly grave losses as a result of natural and technological disasters. Scores and even hundred of thousands of lives are lost each year. Huge sums are spent to control the consequences. Scientists are alarmed because largest cities are increasingly vulnerable in the face of natural disasters.

We are aware of the major projects designed to cope with this growing global threat.

The USSR Academy of Sciences has established an International Institute for the Theory of Earthquake Prediction, and it invites scientists from around the world to take part in developing a scientific basis for the problems of security and safety of larger cities, forecasting of draughts and possible climatic catastrophes.

The Soviet Union is ready to provide for these purposes satellites, oceanic vessels and new technology. It would be probably useful to involve also military services of various countries, above all medical and engineering units in the international rescue and restoration efforts.

The <u>humanitarian content</u> of the pan-European process is one of the crucial aspects.

A world where military arsenals would be reduced but where human rights would be violated, would not be a safe place.

We have made this conclusion for ourselves once and for all.

The decisions made by the Vienna meeting represent a real breakthrough in this respect. It laid down a programme of joint actions by European countries, made up of all kinds of activities. Understanding was reached on many issues which until very recently had been stumbling blocks in East-West relations.

We are convinced that the all-European process should rest on a solid legal ground. We are thinking of an all-European home as a community rooted in law. And for our part we have begun to move in that direction.

The Resolution adopted by the Congress of People's Deputies of the USSR says inter alia:

"Guided by international rules and principles, including those in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the Helsinki accords and agreements, and bringing its domestic legislation in line with the above, the USSR will seek to contribute to the establishment of a world community of states rooted in law".

Europe could set an example in that respect. Naturally, its <u>international legal integrity</u> includes national and social specific features of states. Each European country, the United States and Canada have their own laws and traditions in the humanitarian sphere, even though there exist some universally recognized rules and principles.

It would, perhaps, be useful to make a comparison of the existing legislations on human rights by setting up to that end an ad hoc working group or a kind of European institute for comparative humanitarian law.

In view of the different social systems

we are not likely to achieve a complete identity of views. However, the Vienna meeting and the recent London and Paris conferences have demonstrated that common views and common approaches do exist and can be multiplied.

This makes it possible to speak of the possibility of creating a European <u>legal</u> space.

At the Paris Humanitarian Forum, the Soviet Union and France cosponsored an initiative to that effect. They were joined by the Federal Republic of Germany, Austria, Hungary, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

What we need is to expand greatly cultural cooperation, increase interaction in the field of humanitarian sciences and to attain a higher level of information exchanges.

In a word, the Europeans must step up the process of getting to know each other better.

A special role here could be played by television which brings in contact scores and hundreds of millions, rather than hundreds or thousands, of men and women.

There are also certain dangers inherent in that. They should be seen. Performing stages, screens, exhibition halls, and publishing houses are flooded with commercial pseudo-culture alien to Europe. National languages are treated with disdain. All this calls for our common attention and joint work in the spirit of respect for the true national values of each and every one.

That may involve sharing of experience in the preservation of cultural heritage, actions to familiarize European peoples with the original present-day culture of each other and collective promotion of language studies.

This may also involve cooperation in the preservation of historical and cultural monuments, joint production of cine-, TV-, and videofilms which promote national cultural achievements and the best examples of artistic creation of the past and of today.

THERE WOULD BE A FURTHER OPPORTUNITY FOR DISCUSSION AT THE NEXT PLENUM ON THE EVE OF THE CONGRESS OF PEOPLES DEPUTIES WHEN THERE WOULD ALSO BE DISCUSSION OF ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE CONGRESS AND THE FORMATION OF OTHER STATE BODIES.
- 4. GORBACHEV AGREED WITH THOSE AT THE PLENUM WHO HAD ATTRIBUTED MANY OF THE PROBLEMS OF PERESTROIKA TO THE FAILINGS OF CENTRAL BODIES. BUT PEOPLE WERE ALSO UNHAPPY WITH REGIONAL AND LOCAL AUTHORITIES, WITH THEIR WORK IN THE SPHERE OF TRADE, SERVICES, TRANSPORT: WITH ECONOMIC AND ECOLOGICAL MIS-MANAGEMENT AND VIOLATIONS OF THE RULE OF LAW. THEY SAW THE FACT THAT PEOPLE HAD NOW BEGUN TO PARTICIPATE IN THE POLITICAL PROCESS AS TAKING PERESTROIKA TOO FAR. ON THE CONTRARY. THIS WAS A SUCCESS FOR RESTRUCTURING. GORBACHEV STRESSED THAT THIS WAS ALSO THE VIEW OF THE POLITBURO.

THE ECONOMY

- 6. GORBACHEV NOTED SOME POSITIVE SIGNS. FIGURES SUGGESTED THAT THE TREND TOWARDS A SLOWING DOWN OF GROWTH RATES HAD BEEN CHECKED. PEOPLE'S PSYCHOLOGY WAS CHANGING. RESTRUCTURING WAS TAKING PLACE AT THE LEVEL OF THE ENTERPRISES.
- 7. NEVERTHELESS, PEOPLE WERE JUSTIFIABLY DISSATISFIED WITH WHAT HAD BEEN DONE SO FAR. PEOPLE WERE RESPONDING BADLY TO SHORTAGES AND QUEUES. THEY FELT HUMILIATED. BUT THERE COULD BE NO YIELDING TO PRESSURE TO STEP BACK FROM THE AGREED COURSE OF REFORM.
- 8. WHAT HAD GONE WRONG? CENTRAL ECONOMIC BODIES AND THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE MEMBERS WHO HEADED THEM HAD BEEN VEY SLOW IN UNDERSTANDING THE IMPLICATIONS OF HTE COUNTRY'S FINANCIAL PROBLEMS. MANY DECISIONS HAD BEEN TAKEN WITHOUT DUE ACCOUNT OF THE REAL STATE OF FINANCIAL AND ECONOMIC RESOURCES. THERE HAD BEEN A FAILURE TO DEVELOP PROPER LEVERS FOR REGULATING INCOMES: THERE WAS NO WELL-THOUGHT-OUT TAXATION POLICY. AS A RESULT WAGES WERE OUTSTRIPPING PRODUCTIVITY. THIS WAS UNDERMINING THE PROCESS OF REFORM. THESE ISSUES NEEDED TO BE EXPLAINED TO WORKING PEOPLE. IT HAD BEEN AGREED THAT THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE WOULD DRAFT A LETTER TO THE PEOPLE ON THIS. IF THE NEW AGRARIAN POLICY WAS CONSISTENTLY IMPLEMENTED AND PEOPLE WEE GIVEN THE RIGHT TO MANAGE THEIR LAND, THERE COULD BE A BREAKTHROUGH IN FOOD SUPPLIES BEFORE TOO LONG. BUT IN MANY AREAS LOCAL PARTY AND GOVERNMENT MANAGEMENT WAS DOING LITTLE TO PROMOTE THIS.
- 9. GORBACHEV WENT ON TO ENUMERATE IN FAIRLY STANDARD TERMS THE MEASURES UNDERTAKEN TO INCREASE THE OUTPUT OF CONSUMER GOODS, AND AGAIN STRESSED THAT MUCH OF THE RESPONSIBILITY LAY WITH BODIES AT THE REPUBLIC AND LOCAL LEVEL. IT WAS TIME ONCE AND FOR ALL TO ABIDE BY PAST DECISIONS. EACH REPUBLIC AND REGION SHOULD ANSWER BEFORE ITS POPULATION FOR THE LIVING STANDARDS IT OFFERED THEM. BUT THE LEADERS OF CERTIAN REPUBLICS STILL PREFERRED CONSTANTLY TO ASK MOSCOW FOR MORE RESOUCES. THERE WAS ALSO THE SEROIUS PROBLEM OF ECONOMIC MIS-MANAGEMENT, OF GROSS MIS-CALCULATIONS IN INVESTMENT POLICY AT THE CENTRE AND LOCALLY. FUNDS TIED UP IN UNCOMPLETED CONSTRUCTION

PAGE 2 UNCLASSIFIED PROJECTS HAD INCREASED BY 3D BILLION ROUBLES OVER THE PAST THREE YEARS. IN 1988 THERE HAD BEEN A 41% INCREASE IN NEW CONSTRUCITON PROJECTS. GORBACHEV WENT ON TO CRITICISE A NUMBER OF MINISTERS IN VERY SHARP TERMS FOR INEFFICIENCY AND IRRESPONSIBLE BEHAVIOUS. THERE WAS ALSO CORRUPTION. PEOPLE WERE DEMANDING STRICT PUNISHMENT FOR THOSE GUILTY OF MIS-MANAGEMENT. THE POLITBURO HAD AGREED THAT CASES OF MIS-MANAGEMENT AT BOTH CENTRAL AND REGIONAL LEVEL SHOULD BE CONSIDERED IN PUBLIC SO THAT PEOPLE WOULD KNOW ABOUT THE MEASURES BEING TAKEN.

THE ROLE OF THE PARTY

10. GORBACHEV SAID THAT HE DID NOT AGREE WITH SOME OF THE EXTREME JUDGEMENTS WHICH SUGGESTED THAT THE PARTY WAS LOSING ITS POSITION IN THE COUNTRY, OR THAT IT WAS TURNING INTO A DISCUSSION CLUB. SOME WERE HINTING AT WEAKNESS AND INDECISION IN THE CENTRE. BUT THIS WAS A SIGN THAT PARTY OFFICIALS WERE LOSING CONFIDENCE. THIS WOULD NOT DO. THE MAIN POINT IN RECENT DEVELOPMENTS WAS THE RAPID GROWTH IN PEOPLE'S SELF-AWARENESS. THE INITIAL STAGES OF PERESTROIKA HAD BEEN IMPLEMENTED FROM ABOVE. NOW THERE WAS ALSO A POWERFUL MOVEMENT FROM BELOW. NUMEROUS PUBLIC GROUPS WERE BEING FORMED. THE PARTY HAD TO LEARN TO WORK IN THESE NEW CONDITIONS. THE ELECTIONS HAD SHOWN THAT SOME WERE NOT READY FOR THIS. THERE WAS A GROWING PARADOX. THE PARTY HAD INITIATED DEMOCRATISATION. BUT WHEN SOME SAW THE RESULTS OF THIS THEY TRIED TO HOLD THE PROCESS BACK. SOME EVEN PANICKED AND SAW A THREAT TO SOCIALISM. INSTEAD, THE TASK OF THE PARTY WAS TO LEAD THIS PROCESS. ONLY IN THIS WAY WOULD THE PARTY INCREASE ITS SUPPORT AMONG THE WORKING PEOPLE. IF THE PARTY LOST THE INITIATIVE, IRREPARABLE DAMAGE WOULD BE DONE TO THE CAUSE OF PERESTROIKA. THE PARTY MUST LEARN TO BE MORE IN TOUCH WITH THE PEOPLE INORDER TO EARN THEIR CONFIDENCE.

11. THIS WAS ALSO THE LESSON TO BE DRAWN FROM THE DRAMATIC EVENTS OF 9 APRIL IN TBILISI. THE POLITBURO HAD GIVEN INSTRUCTIONS FOR EVERYTHING THAT HAD HAPPENED THERE TO BE CAREFULLY ANALYSED. BUT IT WAS ALREADY CLEAR THAT EVERYTHING MUST BE DONE USING POLITICAL METHODS AND THE FORCE OF LAW TO PREVENT A REPETITION.

PERESTROIKA REQUIRED A MECHANISM FOR THE DEFENCE OF DEMOCRACY.

POPULAR ACTIVITY COULD NOT BE ALLOWED TO DEVELOP INTO SOMETHING WHICH INFRINGED THE RIGHTS AND FREEDOMS OF OTHERS. THE RECENTLY PUBLISHED DECREE OF THE SUPREME SOVIET (IE THAT INTRODUCING NEW LEGISLATION FOR ARTICLES 70 AND 190 OF THE CRIMINAL CODE WAS INTENDED TO DO THIS. ON THE WHOLE IT HAD BEEN RECEIVED WITH UNDERSTANDING. BUT, GORBACHEV SAID, HE AGREED WITH SOME COMRADES WHO SAID THAT THE PRESS HAD DEVELOPED A HABIT OF AUTOMATICALLY CRITICISING EVERY NEW DOCUMENT AS SOON AS IT WAS PUBLISHED WITHOUT PROPER ANALYSIS. URGENT ACTION WAS ALSO NEEDED TO TACKLE THE GROWING CRIME RATE WHICH IN SOME REGIONS

PAGE 3 UNCLASSIFIED HAD BECOME ALARMING.

13. IN HIS CONCLUDING PASSAGES GORBACHEV EMPHASISED THAT EACH MEMBER OF THE GOVERNING BODIES OF THE PARTY AND THE GOVERNMENT HAD TO BEAR THEIR OWN SHARE OF PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY FOR THEIR OWN WORK. PARTY CADRES HAD TO CHANGE THEIR STYLE OF WORK. PERSONNEL CHANGES SHOLD BE MADE WHERE THEY WERE NECESSARY. THE USSR WAS A COMPLEX MULTI-NATIONAL COUNTRY. THE PARTY WAS STILL THE NATURAL POLITICAL LEADER AND THE ONLY POLITICAL ORGANISATION CAPABLE OF ENSURING SOCIAL STABILITY AND RESTRICTING DANGEROUS MANIFESTATIONS OF NATIONALISM AND CHAUVINISM.

The Implications of the Leadership Changes in Moscow

The Prime Minister may find it useful to have a brief assessment of the recent leadership changes in Moscow.

The forceful and dominant way in which Gorbachev bounced the changes he wanted through the Central Committee Plenum and Supreme Soviet stamped his authority firmly on the leadership. But it was clearly not all plain sailing.

There was no obvious reason for moving so quickly. It may be that Gorbachev detected growing opposition to his proposals for reforming the Party mechanism, and decided to nip this in the bud.

Certainly Gorbachev has strengthened his hand in the Politburo. Four of the new total of twelve are committed reformers (Gorbachev, Shevardnadze, Yakovlev and Medvedev). The old guard are down to three (Ligachev, Chebrikov and Shcherbitsky). Of the rest, two are more committed to economic than political reform. The remaining three tend to support the "conservative" line.

Gorbachev's two main opponents, Ligachev and Chebrikov, remain in the Politburo. Ligachev has been handed the poisoned chalice of agriculture. It remains to be seen whether he will retain the number two role or whether that role itself may change with the creation of the six commissions in the Secretariat instead (we assume) of the previous 30 or so departments. The fact that the existing Secretary for Agriculture, Nikonov, has not yet been assigned a new role may mean that Gorbachev originally wanted Ligachev out altogether but compromised at the last moment, leaving Nikonov high and dry.

Chebrikov is now to run the Legal Affairs Commission, a strange role for the ex-Head of the KGB. For the first time since 1973, the KGB itself has no representative on the Politburo. Since Chebrikov's former deputy, Kryuchkov (who was at Brize Norton last December) has been promoted to KGB Chairman, Chebrikov may continue in practice to exercise considerable control.

While the concentration of <u>reformists</u> in the field of foreign affairs (Shevardnadze and Yakovlev) represents a victory for Shevardnadze's approach, it is not clear where their division of responsibility will fall. The transfer of the ideology portfolio from Yakovlev to Mednedev may also mean a less forthright public commitment to glasnost in the future. Gorbachev has recently shown signs of concern that too much press openness is not always helpful to perestroika; some tightening of "discipline" may now be a possibility.

It is not clear who in the Party will be responsible for nationalities, industry or "delivering the goods". Nor is it clear how far the overall size of the Central Committee apparatus is to be reduced. Both may be affected by Gorbachev's announced intention of reducing the extent to which the Party second-guesses the Government.

More generally, it is striking that two of Gorbachev's keenest and most effective allies now deal with foreign affairs. This is of course a key area from our point of view; but it is neither particularly controversial in Soviet terms nor crucial to Gorbachev's reform objectives. Meanwhile two of those who are widely seen as hostile to reform, Ligachev and Chebrikov, have been given responsibilities which Gorbachev knows - and has stated - are vital if perestroika is to make headway. A flexible, non-ideological approach to agricultural reform will be essential if the government is to succeed in putting more food in the shops. And moving towards a state where the rule of law applies will mean rolling back the arbitrary power of the Party and the KGB. Neither Ligachev nor Chebrikov seem to fit these job descriptions. Gorbachev may intend to dominate these areas himself and use their inability to adapt to push both out at a later stage. If so, it is a risky tactic.

The changes Gorbachev has made will not in themselves help economic reform to produce tangible results. Nor will they bring other key issues such as the nationalities question any nearer a solution. By concentrating more power in his own hands Gorbachev has made effective opposition or a "conservative backlash" more difficult. But extending his authority into the lower reaches of the system is quite another matter. And he has made it clearer than before that the buck stops with him.

It will be well into 1989 before the new-style Supreme Soviet can begin, as Gorbachev hopes it will, to create a stronger platform for reform. Meanwhile the ruthless way in which Gorbachev bounced his leadership changes through the system exposes a basic paradox he faces. As Gorbachev has

constantly stressed, decentralised responsibility is essential for economic reform; but command methods are essential to get change moving. Gorbachev's handling of last week's changes, and the supine way in which his colleagues accepted them is a reminder that he is not a democrat in any true sense of the word.

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LEADERSHIP CHANGES IN MOSCOW

THE PERSONNEL CHANGES IN THE SOVIET PARTY AND GOVERNMENT ANNOUNCED YESTERDAY AND TODAY (MY TELEGRAMS 1617 AND 1619) ADD UP TO A REMARKABLE TWO DAYS IN SOVIET POLITICS. WE SHALL NEED TO LET THE DUST SETTLE BEFORE WE PRODUCE A CONSIDERED ASSESSMENT. BUT IT IS ALREADY CLEAR THAT GORBACHEV HAS CONSOLIDATED HIS POSITION THROUGH AN OPPORTUNIST, THOUGH DEFT POLITICAL OPERATION, IN WHICH HE APPEARS TO HAVE HELD THE INITIATIVE THROUGHOUT.

- 2. WE KNOW NO MORE THAN BEFORE ABOUT HIS MOTIVES. THE OBVIOUS EXPLANATION STILL SEEMS THE LIKELIEST: PERESTROIKA WAS FLAGGING, DISCONTENT WAS SPREADING AMONG THE PEOPLE AND PERHAPS THE LEADERSHIP. AND A DRAMATIC COUP DE MAIN - IN HIS USUAL STYLE - SEEMED THE BEST WAY TO REASSERT HIS DOMINANCE. HE IS NOW PRESIDENT - A POST HE HAD PLANNED TO RECEIVE ONLY NEXT SPRING. HE HAS REEMOVED MOST OF THE OLD BREZHNEV HANDS FROM THE LEADERSHIP (ONLY SHCHERBITSKY, THE UKRAINIAN PARTY LEADER REMAINS: BUT TO REMOVE HIM WOULD REQUIRE A PLENUM OF THE UKRAINIAN PARTY). LIGACHEV HAS BEEN HANDED THE POISONED CHALICE OF AGRICULTURE. THE MEN HE HAS PUT IN CHARGE OF IDEOLOGY AND SECURITY DO NOT HAVE THE PERSONAL AUTHORITY OF THEIR PREDECESSORS. (THE KGB IS NOT REPRESENTED IN THE POLITBURO, FOR THE FIRST TIME SINCE 1973). GORBACHEV NOW HAS THE FREER HAND HE WANTED TO PURSUE HIS OWN POLICIES.
- 3. THAT DOES NOT, OF COURSE, MEAN HE WILL HAVE THINGS ALL HIS OWN WAY. THE CLEAN-OUT WAS A CIVILISED ONE: THE TREATMENT OF GROMYKO WAS PARTICULARLY COUORTEOUS. BUT IT WILL HAVE AROUSED RESENTMENT AMONGST THE OLD HANDS WHO HAVE HAD THEIR WINGS CLIPPED. THEY WILL BE WAITING FOR GORBACHEV TO PUT A FOOT WRONG. AMONGST A WIDER PUBLIC, THE CONSPIRATORIAL NATURE OF THE COUP, THE SUPINE ROLES OF BOTH THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE AND THE SUPREME SOVIET, AND THE TOTAL LACK OF CONVINCING PUBLIC EXPLANATION, IT, WILL REINFORCE CYNICISM ABOUT GORBACHEV'S COMMITMENT TO GENUINE OPENNESS AND DEMOCRATISATION.
- 4. MORE FUNDAMENTALLY, THESE POLITICAL CHANGES AT THE CENTRE, AND

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FIDDLING WITH PARTY ORGANISATION'S IN THE PROVINCES, WILL HAVE NO DIRECT EFFECT ON THE APATHY AMONGST WORKING PEOPLE, OR ON THE DEEP ROOTED ILLS OF THE INDUSTRIAL AND AGRICULTURAL ECONOMY, WHICH ARE AT THE BASIS OF THIS COUNTRY'S PROBLEMS. GORBACHEV MAY NOW HAVE THE POWER. BUT BY THE SAME TOKEN, THE BUCK NOW STOPS WITH HIM. IF HE CANNOT DELIVER THE GOODS TO THE PEOPLE, HE WILL HAVE NO ONE ELSE TO BLAME IN FUTURE.

5. MY I.F.T. COMMENTS ON THE PESONNEL CHANGES IN MORE DETAIL. MY SECOND I.F.T. CONTAINS RECOMMENDATIONS ABOUT MESSAGES TO GORBACHEV AND GROMYKO.

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LIGACHEV AND PERESTROIKA

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SUMMARY

1. LIGACHEV SHARPLY CRITICISES THOSE WHO ARE SPREADING RUMOURS OF SPLITS IN THE POLITBURO, BUT NEVERTHELESS GIVES A REMARKABLY CONSERVATIVE INTERPRETATION OF PERESTROIKA.

DETAIL

- 2. ON 4 JUNE LIGACHEV ADDRESSED A MEETING OF WORKERS AT THE TOGLIATTI CAR PLANT. ACCORDING TO THE SUMMARY IN THE CENTRAL PRESS ON 5 JUNE MUCH OF HIS SPEECH CONSISTED OF A ROUTINE PEP TALK OF THE TYPE REGULARLY GIVEN BY MEMBERS OF THE LEADERSHIP TOURING THE COUNTRY. BUT HE ALSO GAVE A GENERAL ASSESSMENT OF THE STATE OF PERESTROIKA.
- 3. LIGACHEV SAID THAT THERE WAS NO ALTERNATIVE TO PERESTROIKA. IT WAS THE ONLY WAY OF OVERCOMING ECONOMIC STAGNATION AND SOCIAL APATHY SEMICOLON AND OF MORALLY CLEANING UP SOCIETY. RIGHTIST FORCES IN THE WEST SAW PERESTROIKA AS A THREAT. ALIEN VOICES WERE URGING THE USSR TO ADOPT A MULTI-PARTY SYSTEM AND AT TIMES CLAIMING THAT THIS WAS A PRE-CONDITION FOR COOPERATION BETWEEN THE USSR AND CAPITALIST COUNTRIES. THEY ALSO URGED THAT THE SOVIET UNION SHOULD ADOPT WESTERN MARKET ECONOMIC PRINCIPLES. ALL THIS WAS AIMED AT WEAKENING THE POLITICAL STABILITY OF THE USSR, DESTROYING SOCIAL JUSTICE AND INCREASING DIVISIONS IN SOCIETY. THE SOVIET UNION, HE SAID, WOULD NOT DEPART FROM SOCIALISM. THE HEALTHY DEMOCRATIC DEVELOPMENT OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY WAS THE GUARANTEE OF THEIR REVERSABILITY OF PERESTROIKA. IT WENT WITHOUT SAYING THAT THIS DEVELOPMENT DID NOT IMPLY THE WATERING DOWN OF THE PARTY'S ROLE IN SOCIETY. PROPOSALS OF THIS TYPE WERE UNACCEPTABLE. BUT THE PARTY DID HAVE TO PAY PERMANENT ATTENTION TO INCREASING ITS CONTACTS WITH THE WORKING CLASS.

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- 4. LIGACHEV THEN TURNED TO AGRICULTURE AND THE INTRODUCTION OF THE NEW ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURES BASED ON LEASING. HE STRESSED THAT THESE NEW STRUCTURES WERE FULLY COMPATIBLE WITH SOCIALISM. THEY BROUGHT ABOUT SUBSTANTIAL INCREASES IN PRODUCTIVITY, AND IF WAGES ALSO INCREASED THIS WAS MONEY WELL EARNED. LIGACHEV STATED THAT THE ECONOMY WAS MAKING REASONABLE PROGRESS AND REJECTED CLAIMS THAT THE REFORMS WERE HAVING NO EFFECT.
- 5. HE THEN TURNED TO THE QUESTION OF DIVISIONS WITHIN THE LEADERSHIP. THERE WERE SOME, HE SAID, WHO FOR THEIR OWN REASONS TRIED TO FOIST ONTO PERESTROIKA THE THEORY OF INCREASING CONTRADICTIONS. HE COULD NOT HELP RECALLING HOW THE CONSTRUCTION OF SOCIALISM IN THE 1930'S HAD BEEN ACCOMPANIED BY THE IDEA OF THE WORSENING CLASS STRUGGLE - AND THE DISASTROUS CONSEQUENCES OF THIS WERE WELL KNOWN. THERE WERE OF COURSE DISCUSSIONS AND ARGUMENTS WHICH WERE CONDUCTED ON A SOCIALIST PLATFORM. BUT ENEMIES IN THE WEST (AND SOME WITHIN THE COUNTRY) WERE SPREADING THE IDEA THAT THERE WERE DISAGREEMENTS IN THE SOVIET LEADERSHIP AND IN THE POLITBURO. SUCH ACCUSATIONS HAD BEEN MADE MORE THAN ONCE AND THEREFORE MUST BE CONSIDERED INTENTIONAL. WEDGE-DRIVING WAS A WELL-KNOWN TACTIC. IT HAD WORKED IN THE PAST WHEN FALSE RUMOURS ABOUT MEMBERS OF THE LEADERSHIP HAD LED TO THE DEATHS OF MANY PEOPLE. BUT THESE WERE DIFFERENT TIMES, A DIFFERENT POLICY AND DIFFERENT LEADERS. ALL MEMBERS OF THE SOVIET LEADERSHIP WITH GORBACHEV AT THEIR HEAD WERE COMMITTED TO THE POLICY OF PERESTROIKA. AT THE PRESENT STAGE OF PERESTROIKA UNITY AND CONSOLIDATION WERE ESSENTIAL. THERE WAS NO DOUBT THAT THE FORTHCOMING PARTY CONFERENCE WOULD CONTRIBUTE TO SUCH UNITY.

COMMENT

6. THIS IS A NOTICEABLY HARD LINE SPEECH, AND THE REFERENCES TO THE ENEMIES IN THE WEST TRYING TO DESTABILISE SOVIET SOCIETY HAVE A REMARKABLY OLD-FASHIONED RING. THE REFERENCE TO THOSE INSIDE THE SOVIET UNION SPREADING RUMOURS ABOUT SPLITS IN THE POLITBURO IS CLEARLY AIMED AT ELTSIN, AND THE HARSH TONE OF LIGACHEV'S COMMENTS (EQUATING ELTSIN, BY IMPLICATION, WITH THE RUMOUR-MONGERS WHO CONTRIBUTED TO THE PURGES UNDER STALIN) SUGGESTS THAT HE HAS BEEN REALLY NEEDLED BY THE NATIONWIDE PUBLICITY GIVEN TO ELTSIN'S CALL FOR HIS RESIGNATION IN GORBACHEV'S RECENT PRESS CONFERENCE (MY TELNO 941). THESE COMMENTS ALSO SUGGEST THAT HE IS BECOMING INCREASINGLY IRRITATED BY SPECULATION IN THE WESTERN PRESS ABOUT

PAGE 2 RESTRICTED HIS DIFFERENCES WITH GORBACHEV. AS GORBACHEV HAS DONE RECENTLY, LIGACHEV USED THIS OCCASION TO UNDERLINE THE IMPORTANCE HE ATTACHED TO LEADERSHIP UNITY IN THE RUN-UP TO THE CONFERENCE.

7. NEVERTHELESS, JUDGING BY HIS MORE GENERAL COMMENTS ON PERESTROIKA IN THIS SPEECH, HE IS NOT PREPARED TO MAKE ANY CONCESSIONS IN THE DIRECTION OF GORBACHEV'S MORE RADICAL CONCEPT OF PERESTROIKA IN SEARCH OF SUCH UNITY. THE MESSAGE THAT COMES OVER IS A MARKEDLY CONSERVATIVE ONE. THE IDEA OF PERESTROIKA AS A "REVOLUTION" IS NOT MENTIONED: NOR IS THERE ANY ACCEPTANCE OF THE NEED FOR RADICAL POLITICAL REFORM. PERESTROIKA IS MADE IRREVERSIBLE BY THE "HEALTHY" DEMOCRATISATION OF THE PARTY—BUT THERE IS TO BE NO REDUCTION OR WATERING DOWN OF ITS ROLE. GLASNOST SHOULD HAVE A "BUSINESS-LIKE" CHARACTER. MARKET ECONOMIC PRINCIPLES WERE A WEAPON OF WESTERN OPPONENTS AIMING TO DESTABILISE SOVIET SOCIETY.

8. COMING THREE WEEKS BEFORE THE OPENING OF THE PARTY CONFERENCE, LIGACHEV'S COMMENTS WILL BE WELCOMED BY THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY OFFICIALS WHO ARE LIKELY TO CONSIDER THEM AS THEIR MANIFESTO FOR THE CONFERENCE.

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AT PARTY MEETINGS BUT ALSO IN THE PRESS, ON TELEVISIÓN AND RADIO AND IN NUMEROUS LETTERS AND APPEALS TO PARTY COMMITTEES. PEOPLE HAD EVEN BEEN ON THE STREETS GATHERING SIGNATURES IN SUPPORT OF PARTICULAR CANDIATES. (CLIPS OF THE LAST-MENTIONED ACTIVITY WERE

OF THESE ADDING THAT IF THEY WERE NOT ALL ELECTED DELEGATES THIS
DID NOT IN ANY WAY DIMINISH THE CONTRIBUTION THEY HAD MADE TO

5. HE THEN DEALT WITH TWO PARTICULAR CASES WHICH HAD CAUSED CONCERN -

PERESTROIKA.

THAT OF YURI AFANASEV, THE RECTOR OF THE HISTORICAL ARCHIVES INSTITUTE AND A LEADING SUPPORTER OF HISTORICAL GLASNOST, AND GAVRIIL POPOV, A REFORMIST ECONOMIST BASED AT MOSCOW UNIVERSITY, BOTH OF WHOSE CANDIDACIES HAD BEEN REJECTED BY THE PARTY ORGANISATION. IN AFANASEV'S CASE, ZAIKOV SAID, IT HAD BEEN DECIDED TO MAKE AN EXCEPTION AND HE HAD BEEN REINSERTED ON THE LIST OF CANDIDATES TO BE PUT TO THE FINAL MEETING OF THE CITY PARTY COMMITTEE. IN THE CASE OF POPOV, THE LOCAL PARTY ORGANISATION HAD LOOKED AGAIN AT THE CASE BUT HAD DECIDED THAT THE TWO CANDIDACIES THAT HAD BEEN AGREED UPON (THE MOSCOW UNIVERSITY RECTOR AND PARTY SECRETARY) SHOULD STAND. HE ADDED THAT KOROTICH (EDITOR OF OGONYCK) WHO HAD BEEN REJECTED IN MOSCOW, HAD SUBSEQUENTLY BEEN ELECTED TO THE CONFERENCE AS A REPRESENTATIVE OF ONE OF THE UKRANIAN DELEGATIONS.

- 6. ZAIKOV THEN ANNOUNCED THAT ALL THE 319 CANDIDATES PUT TO THE FINAL MEETING OF THE MOSCOW PARTY COMMITTEE HAD RECEIVED THE NECESSARY NUMBER OF VOTES AND WOULD CONSTITUTE THE CITY'S DELEGATION TO THE PARTY CONFERENCE. HE NOTED THAT THOSE ELECTED BY MOSCOW INCLUDED GORBACHEV, LIGACHEV AND HIMSELF.
- 7. GORBACHEV THEN TOOK THE FLOOR, AND BEGAN BY BRIEFING THOSE PRESENT ON THE RECENTLY CONCLUDED SUMMIT. HE SAID THAT THE DIALOGUE HAD BEEN DIFFICULT AND AT TIMES TENSE, BUT THAT ON BALANCE IT HAD LED TO AN IMPROVEMENT IN RELATIONS WITH THE USA. ON THE ECONOMY HE NOTED THAT THERE WERE NOW REAL OPPORTUNITIES TO MOVE AHEAD RAPIDLY IN RESOLVING THE FOOD PROBLEM, BUT THAT ECONOMIC REFORM WAS A WHOLE WAS NOT YET PRODUCING THE RESULTS THAT HAD BEEN HOPED FOR. THERE WAS NO NEED FOR PANIC, HOWEVER, OR FOR UNNECESSARY SHOWS OF EMOTION. LEFTIST PHRASES WERE COUNTER-PRODUCTIVE. ONE COULD NOT BUY CHEAP AUTHORITY WITH THEM. ADVENTURISM WAS NOT THE POLICY.

COMMENT

8. THE SELECTION OF MOSCOW'S DELEGATION TO THE PARTY CONFERENCE HAS EVIDENTLY BEEN A FRAUGHT PROCESS. THE FINAL ELECTION MEETING WAS DUE TO HAVE BEEN HELD ON 29 MAY, BUT WAS POSTPONED FOR A WEEK. INTELLECTUALS HERE OVER THE PAST TWO OR THREE WEEKS HAVE BEEN EXPRESSING CONCERN AT THE WAY IN WHICH THE MOSCOW PARTY AUTHORITIES HAVE BEEN REJECTING THE CANDIDACIES OF MOST OF THE MAIN FIGUREHEADS OF GLASNOST AND PERESTROIKA. THE TWO CASES TO WHICH ZAIKOV REFERRED IN DETAIL (SEE PARAGRAPH 5 ABOVE) HAVE BEEN WRITTEN UP IN SEVERAL ARTICLES WHICH EXPRESSED CONCERN AT THE UNDEMOCRATIC WAY IN WHICH THEIR CANDIDACIES HAD BEEN REJECTED.

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BURLATSKY TOLD FOREIGN JOURNALISTS LAST WEEK THAT HE BELIEVED THAT THE WEEK'S POSTPONEMENT WAS INTENDED TO ALLOW FOR ''CORRECTION'' OF THE SELECTION PROCESS WHICH HAD DEVIATED FROM THE POLITBURO GUIDLINES.

9. THE ISSUE IS AN IMPORTANT ONE FOR GORBACHEV AS EVIDENCED BY THE FACT THAT HE HIMSELF ATTENDED THE FINAL MEETING. HE HAS PUBLICLY CALLED FOR THE DELEGATES TO THE CONFERENCE TO BE ARDENT SUPPORTERS OF PERESTROIKA. IF THE MOSCOW PARTY AUTHORITIES HAD BEEN SEEN TO BE ABLE TO REJECT THE CANDIDACIES OF A BROAD SWEEP OF THE NATIONALLY KNOWN PROPONENTS OF RADICAL REFORM THIS WOULD HAVE BEEN A DEMONSTRATION OF HIS INABILITY TO CONTROL THE ELECTION PROCESS. IN ADDITION, THE PRESENCE OF INDEPENDENT MINDED INTELLECTUALS AT THE PARTY CONFERENCE SHOULD ENSURE THAT THERE ARE SOME RADICAL REFORMIST SPEECHES IN ADDITION TO THE STAGE-MANAGED CONTRIBUTIONS OF PARTY AND GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS.

10. IN THE EVENT, A LARGE NUMBER OF REFORMIST INTELLECTUALS HAVE FAILED TO MAKE THE DELEGATION. BUT AFANASEV, WHO WAS REINSERTED INTO THE FINAL LIST WITH SCANT REGARD FOR DEMOCRATIC PROCEDURES, IS A MEMBER OF THE DELEGATION. AND THE FINAL DELEGATION LIST WHICH HAS NOW BEEN PUBLISHED IN THE LOCAL PRESS CONTAIN ANOTHER HALF DOZEN LEADING RADICALS - ENOUGH TO MAKE THIS A REASONABLE COMPROMISE FOR GORBACHEV, AND TO ENSURE THAT THERE WILL BE AT LEAST SOME RADICAL REFORM RHETORIC FROM THE CONFERENCE FLOOR.

SUMMARY

1. AN APPARENTLY FRANK ACCOUNT BY DOBRYNIN ON THE PROCEDURES ENVISAGED FOR ELECTIONS PRIOR TO THE PARTY CONFERENCE AND FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE CONFERENCE ITSELF. DOBRYNIN AT PAINS TO DISMISS SPECULATION THAT THE CONFERENCE COULD POSE ANY THREAT TO GORBACHEV'S POSITION.

DETAIL

- 2. DOBRYNIN RECEIVED ME FOR ONE HOUR ON 18 MAY (TETE A TETE, AT HIS INSISTENCE). MY MAIN PURPOSE IN CALLING ON HIM WAS TO ELICIT AN AUTHORITATIVE PREVIEW OF THE ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE 19TH PARTY CONFERENCE AT THE END OF JUNE, GIVEN THE ABSENCE OF ANY COHERENT INFORMATION IN THE SOVIET MEDIA ON THE SUBJECT.
- 3. ON THE ELECTION OF DELEGATES TO THE CONFERENCE, DUE TO BE COMPLETED BY THE END OF MAY, DOBRYNIN SAID THAT EACH REGIONAL PARTY COMMITTEE (OBKOM) HAD BEEN ALLOCATED A QUOTA OF DELEGATES RELATED TO THE NUMBER OF PARTY MEMBERS IN THE REGION CONCERNED. THE OBKOMS WOULD PREPARE LISTS OF CANDIDATES, USUALLY IN EXCESS OF THE QUOTA, WHICH WOULD THEN BE DISCUSSED AT MEETINGS UNDER OBKOM AUSPICES, TO WHICH NON-PARTY INDIVIDUALS WOULD BE ADMITTED BUT WITHOUT VOTING RIGHTS. EACH NAME ON THE OBKOM LIST WOULD BE SUBMITTED INDIVIDUALLY TO THE MEETING FOR APPROVAL, COMMENT OR REJECTION. IT WOULD BE OPEN TO RANK AND FILE PARTY MEMBERS TO PROPOSE ADDITIONS TO THE LIST AS WELL AS DELETIONS FROM IT. NON-PARTY ATTENDERS WOULD BE FREE TO COMMENT ON THE CANDIDATES. WHEN EVERY MEMBER ON THE LIST, AND NAMES ADDED TO IT, HAD BEEN DISCUSSED, A VOTE WOULD BE TAKEN, BY SECRET BALLOT, ON EACH CANDIDATE. THE OBKOM'S DELEGATION TO THE CONFERENCE WOULD CONSIST OF THE NUMBER OF CANDIDATES EQUIVALENT TO ITS QUOTA WHO HAD OBTAINED THE MOST VOTES FROM THE MEETING.

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- 4. DOBRYNIN ACKNOWLEDGED THAT THIS PROCEDURE REPRESENTED SOME ADVANCE, IN TERMS OF ''DEMOCRATISATION'', ON THE PROCEDURES WHICH WERE IN FORCE AT THE TIME OF THE ELECTIONS TO THE 27TH PARTY CONGRESS IN 1987. OBKOMS WOULD HAVE LESS DIRECT CONTROL OVER THE FINAL COMPOSITION OF THE LISTS OF CANDIDATES. THIS, AND THE OPPORTUNITY FOR NON-PARTY INDIVIDUALS TO COMMENT, SHOULD HELP TO GIVE THE CONFERENCE AS A WHOLE A FIRMLY PRO-PERESTROIKA COMPLEXION.
- 5. DOBRYNIN SAID THAT THE AGENDA FOR THE CONFERENCE WOULD BE DETERMINED BY THE ''THESES'' AGREED IN ADVANCE BY THE POLITBURO, WHICH WOULD PROBABLY (BUT NOT YET CERTAINLY) BE PUBLISHED BEFORE THE CONFERENCE TOOK PLACE. IT WOULD NOT, THEREFORE, BE NECESSARY TO HOLD A PLENUM OF THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE PRIOR TO THE CONFERENCE. THE CONFERENCE WOULD LAST FOR FOUR, OR POSSIBLY FIVE, DAYS. ITS WORK WOULD BE DIVIDED BETWEEN TWO BROAD THEMES: PROGRESS OF PERESTROIKA, AND OF THE 12TH FIVE YEAR PLAN IN PARTICULAR, AND THE DEMOCRATISATION OF SOVIET SOCIETY AND OF THE PARTY. THE THRUST OF THE DRIVE FOR GREATER ''DEMOCRATISATION'' WOULD BE THE TRANSFER OF A WIDE RANGE OF ADMINISTRATIVE RESPONSIBILITIES FROM THE LOCAL PARTY APPARATS TO THE LOCAL SOVIETS, IN ORDER TO REDUCE THE EXTENT TO WHICH PARTY ORGANS WERE INVOLVED IN THE DAY TO DAY RUNNING OF THEIR LOCALITIES. THERE WAS UNLIKELY TO BE MUCH, IF ANY, OPPOSITION TO THIS TREND: MOST PARTY OFFICIALS WOULD BE ONLY TOO GLAD TO HIVE OFF SOME OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE CHORES WHICH HAD BEEN LAID AT THEIR DOOR OVER THE YEARS.
- THE CONFERENCE WOULD ADOPT RESOLUTIONS BUT COULD NOT USURP THE FUNCTIONS EITHER OF THE SUPREME SOVIET OR OF A PARTY CONGRESS. RESOLUTIONS CONCERNING THE ECONOMY OR THE SOVIETS WOULD BE REMITTED TO THE SUPREME SOVIET FOR CONSIDERATION AND EVENTUAL TRANSLATION INTO LAW. RESOLUTIONS CONCERNING THE PARTY, EG ON THE INTRODUCTION OF A MAXIMUM AGE UP TO WHICH, AND THE LENGTH OF TIME FOR WHICH, PARTY OFFICES COULD BE HELD, WOULD BE REMITTED TO THE NEXT PARTY CONGRESS (IN TWO AND HALF YEARS TIME). ONLY THE PARTY CONGRESS COULD REVISE THE PARTY STATUTES: THE BUILT-IN TIME LAG WHICH THIS IMPLIED WOULD SERVE TO REDUCE ANY POTENTIAL OPPOSITION TO RESOLUTIONS BY THOSE PARTY MEMBERS WHO MIGHT BE ADVERSELY AFFECTED BY THEM.
- 7. IN THEORY, THE PARTY CONFERENCE WOULD HAVE THE POWER TO EFFECT PERSONNEL CHANGES, EG IN THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE. BUT DOBRYNIN STRESSED THAT AT THE FORTHCOMING CONFERENCE SUCH CHANGES WOULD

PAGE 2 CONFIDENTIAL BE MINIMAL AND INSIGNIFICANT: ''A FEW'' MEMBERS OF THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE MIGHT RETIRE AND BE REPLACED BY EXISTING CANDIDATE MEMBERS. NEW ELECTIONS, THEREFORE, WERE LIKELY TO BE CONFINED TO A FEW NEW CANDIDATE MEMBERS OF THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE. SPECULATION CONCERNING MORE DRAMATIC CHANGES WAS VERY WIDE OF THE MARK.

- 8. THE CONTROVERSIAL ISSUE OF PRICE REFORM WAS UNLIKELY TO BE ADDRESSED BY THE CONFERENCE. A SPECIAL PARTY COMMITTEE WAS ALREADY WORKING ON THE PROBLEM AND ITS RECOMMENDATIONS WOULD, IN DUE COURSE, BE PUBLISHED FOR 'PUBLIC DISCUSSION'. THE MATTER WOULD THEN BE REFERRED TO A SPECIALLY CONVENED CENTRAL COMMITTEE PLENUM.
- 9. THE NATIONALITIES PROBLEM, ON THE OTHER HAND, WAS LIKELY
 TO BE DISCUSSED AT THE CONFERENCE AND THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE PLENUM
 ALREADY DESIGNATED TO CONSIDER THE ISSUE WOULD TAKE ACCOUNT OF
 VIEWS EXPRESSED AT THE CONFERENCE (WE HAVE HEARD SEPARATELY THAT
 THIS PLENUM IS LIKELY TO TAKE PLACE NEXT AUTUMN).

COMMENT

- 10. THE RECURRENT THEME IN THE REPLIES WHICH DOBRYNIN GAVE TO THE QUESTIONS I PUT TO HIM WAS THAT BY NO STRETCH OF THE IMAGINATION COULD THE FORTHCOMING PARTY CONFERENCE POSE ANY KIND OF THREAT TO GORBACHEV. THE ISSUES ADDRESSED BY THE CONFERENCE WOULD BE ONES ON WHICH THERE WAS ALREADY AN OVERWHELMING CONSENSUS WITHIN THE PARTY (THE IMPLICATION WAS THAT THE MOST CONTROVERSIAL ISSUES, SUCH AS PRICE REFORM, WOULD BE KEPT OF THE CONFERENCE AGENDA ON ONE PRETEXT OR ANOTHER). DOBRYNIN SEEMED ENTIRELY CONFIDENT THAT THE ELECTION PROCEDURES WOULD MORE OR LESS AUTOMATICALLY PRODUCE THE KIND OF DELEGATES ON WHOSE SUPPORT GORBACHEV COULD RELY (ALTHOUGH THIS IS NOT, I THINK, SELF-EVIDENT FROM THE ACCOUNT WHICH HE GAVE ME). WHEN I ASKED DOBRYNIN WHETHER, IN HIS VIEW, WESTERN COMMENTATORS HAD BEEN TAKING AN OVER-DRAMATIC VIEW OF THE CONFERENCE, DOBRYNIN SAID THAT IT WOULD BE A DRAMATIC OCCASION IN TERMS OF ITS IMPORTANCE TO THE CONTINUATION OF PERESTROIKA, BY RE-AFFIRMING AND FILLING OUT THE AGENDA OF REFORM: BUT THAT IT WOULD NOT BE DRAMATIC IN TERMS OF CLASHES OF OPINION OR COMPETITION FOR INFLUENCE WITHIN THE PARTY.
- 11. ALTHOUGH IT WOULD HAVE BEEN SURPRISING IF DOBRYNIN HAD TAKEN A DIFFERENT LINE, I AM INCLINED TO BELIEVE THAT HIS CONFIDENCE IN GORBACHEV'S ABILITY TO MANAGE THE CONFERENCE IS JUSTIFIED.

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HOWEVER, IF DOBRYNIN IS CORRECT, AS HE PROBABLY IS, IN FORECASTING ONLY VERY MINIMAL PERSONNEL CHANGES, THIS MAY MEAN THAT GORBACHEV HAS DECIDED AGAINST ATTEMPTING TO BRING ABOUT THE MORE AMBITIOUS CHANGES WHICH I AM SURE HE WOULD IDEALLY LIKE TO MAKE, PARTICULARLY IN THE COMPOSITION OF THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE. THIS MORE CAUTIOUS POLICY WOULD BE IN LINE WITH THE TONE OF HIS RECENT SPEECHES (MY TELS NOS 807 AND 840).

- 12. DOBRYNIN EVIDENTLY ATTRIBUTED MY CALL TO THE PRIME MINISTER'S SUPPOSED PERSONAL INTEREST IN THE IMPLICATIONS OF THE PARTY CONFERENCE FOR GORBACHEV'S FUTURE. HE CONCLUDED BY ASKING ME TO ASSURE MRS THATCHER THAT GORBECHEV WOULD STILL BE IN PLACE WHEN THE CONFERENCE WAS OVER: AND TO CONVEY HIS BEST WISHES TO HER.
- 13. WHEN WE HAD FINISHED DISCUSSING THE PARTY CONFERENCE, DOBRYNIN MADE SOME POINTS ON ARMS CONTROL, FOR WHICH SEE MY TELNO 859.

Gorbachev Speech at Central Committee of CPSU

Moscow May 10 TASS -As already reported, a meeting with media executives and the heads of ideological institutions and professionals' unions took place at the Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union on May 7.

Mikhail Gorbachyov said in his opening remarks there:

"We want to devote this meeting to the forthcoming 19th Party Conference. We see that society and the Party have become involved in the process of preparing it. This is why guideposts are needed.

"The press has already introduced relevant rubrics and the debates have, effectively, already got under way - and not only within the Party, but on a nationwide scale as well. I think the mass media have already gained some experience in this respect and some questions have arisen, too."

Many of those attending then expressed their opinions on matters under discussion. In conclusion the meeting was addressed by Gorbachev. He said: "Such meetings are very important to us, to the Central Committee, and it is good that we now have such a tradition. There are at least two points that could be taken up.

"First, the Party's leadership needs to consult you. A policy devoid of a scientific basis is doomed to vacillation and errors. We know this from our own experience. A policy not resting on morality can cause, I think, no less harm. And we are aware as well of what this has led to. This is why this meeting is important to us.

-5panicked. And the panic - and this is very serious - has taken the form of asking: 'Isn't perestroika coming to mean the wrecking and rejection of the values of socialism, isn't it giving rise to alien phenomena, isn't it destabilizing society?'. I'll tell you that all these questions are very serious. And I wouldn't reckon those who have panicked to be irresponsible people or people opposed to perestroika out of hand. "No, comrades, we should treat this seriously, without falling into another extremity, without branding everybody who has voiced some doubts as an opponent of perestroika. And I am especially against the position of those who have put the 'enemy of perestroika' phrase into circulation in the press. "What does it mean, comrades? this sounds somehow ominous. This is the same as the allegation which has been floated through Sovetskaya Rossiya that we are being threatened by the descendants of Nepmen and kulaks. Just think of it: 70 years on, they're trying to scare us with the descendants of Nepmen, Trotskyites and Dans. Let's rise to the occasion, comrades. "Through perestroika, we want to restore Lenin's image of socialism and lead Soviet society to a drastically new level. We should really bring out the humanist potential of socialism - that is the task for perestroika. But this means that at the second stage of perestroika we should see the overriding goal - an updated society and updated relations among people in line with Lenin's ideas. "We should work towards this end by using methods marked by humanity, trust and respect. This does not mean lack of principle, any eclecticism or reconciling the irreconcilable. No, it doesn't. We should restore the genuine, wonderful meaning of the great word + comrade+, restore the spirit of comradeship in the Party and in society. "We cannot pursue perestroika, which aims to upgrade socialism to meet the parameters of Lenin's thinking in the interest of the people, by practicing a free-forall. We aren't after all destroying the social system or changing the forms of

earnest. This would be useful for us and, most important, simply indispensable, vital for us. I have already said this in a remark here and I want to stress it once more: both the Party is at the service of the people and all the media are at the service of the people.

"It is impossible to write of the people's destiny in a formal, bureaucratic, soulless way. Sometimes a true-to-life picture is presented, but the author writes as if the pain of the people is not sensed. And if there is no awareness of this pain, then epithets and metaphors are used, labels are stuck on, anything. This, I repeat, happens, if the author does not sense the people's pain. And if this sense is present, if you remember your people always, if you write with an anguished heart of the grimmest things, then there will surely emerge something which in the long run will contain a lesson and optimism. For there will be a sense of involvement in the destiny of the people and the care that their life should be better. I am not going to teach you, I simply address your hearts and minds.

"All in all, you, too, should reform. The media are an instrument of perestroika. And in order to be an effective instrument they should undergo restructuring, just like the entire society. We say that there is no monopoly of

-7criticism, that no zones are denied to criticism. But, hence, the press itself cannot be exempt from criticism. You should pose questions in a serious way, truthfully, in the interests of the people, socialism, restructuring. And in this the press can count on the support of the Party. ."Why is conservatism so tenacious? this is another theme which I would like to discuss with you. What is it that feeds conservatism? "I believe that conservatism is the main factor impeding perestroika." Establishing what is it that feeds conservatism should not be avoided as the answer to this question will help the Party and the media to determine correctly the methods of overcoming this phenomenon. "We must defeat conservatism on the roads of perestroika. Conservatism in part of society is nourished not only by dogmatic mentality, the habit of thinking in stereotypes, the fear of everything new, but also by egoistic interests. As to egoistic interests, this theme is raised by the press. It is shown that perestroika pinches someone and they start resisting, hampering the process of renewal of society. But this is just part of the problem. The main thing for all society is still the need to overcome dogmatic mentality as it is something that a politician, a writer, a scientific worker have. It exists in all who are connected with intellectual activity and this largely determines theoretical analysis, the shaping of politics, etc. "There are stereotypes of thinking and action and they have a grip on a worker, an intellectual, a politician. This is a serious and profound phenomenon. We are all products of our time. We have conceived perestroika and we also manifest many of the things that inhibit it. To reveal this, comrades, is a very important task of the media and, certainly, of the Party and ideological work. Such a treatment of this subject helps man make a revolution in his own thoughts and determine his stand. "Indeed, conservatism quite often stems from egoistic interests. But will anyone mount the rostrum now and say he will write in a letter to a newspaper, that

-8he raises some problem or other in order to save his present positions and preserve what suits him very much? Not at all. His stand will be presented as if he were acting for the benefit of the people, for the sake of socialism. This is something to be seen and understood. "And, comrades, there is another very important aspect. We often label as a conservative a person who holds his own special point of view. But take a more attentive look and you will realise that he gets into this position for the reason that so far he has not learnt how to work in the new conditions. He just does not know how to work, comrades. This is quite commonplace now. And we see how difficult it is to learn to work in a new way when we have been acting for decades in the framework of methods of the command-and-administer system. Then should these people who have not yet learnt how to work be regarded as adversaries of perestroika, as inveterate conservatives? "A real process of perestroika is being conducted in society through concrete experience, through debates, comprehension and realisation of this process and changing positions, and taking into consideration the renewal of our society. And these are important things. We give everyone a chance to adjust. We talk about this in conversations, in the press. But sometimes it is reasoned in the following way: everyone has been given three years for perestroika and that is enough. If you have failed to reform, get out. But we, all of us, have not yet reformed. I shall say this outright that we have not yet reformed and are only in course of doing this. "What is to be done now? What emphasis is to be placed on the Party work, on the work of the media? A correct idea has been expressed here - that though during perestroika much is being done in all directions, the main thing -- the life of the people, their wellbeing, their mood, the way they feel -- should not be overlooked, comrades. It is not only material wellbeing, social environment, but also the way people feel, their dignity, that should be taken into consideration.

address ourselves to the past, this has the aim of understanding better what we need now so as not to repeat the mistakes of the past.

All this should be done without undue sensationalism. I would like to say that a good sensation for us is the one that our people are waiting for and our adversaries fear. It is the success of perestroika.

"The further development of criticism, the widening of glasnost is a matter of extreme importance. This matter has been resolved. It is sometimes asked what are the limits of criticism and glasnost. We have resolved this matter within the framework of socialist pluralism of opinions. We are for broad development of criticism and glasnost but in the interests of society, of socialism, in the interests of the people. Waging consistently and resolutely the struggle against conservatism,

"The growth is evident, but the shortages are evident too. This means, comrades, that we must have by far more of everything, of everything including the services, but the quantities are insufficient. There are enormous potentialities for cooperatives in that field. "Every year the country's population increases by two and a half million. These dynamics should determine the growth of the rates of production of foods and commodities. "We are at a difficult stage in the economy, a very difficult one. We are introducing the reform, enhancing state-quality control, mastering cost-accounting. Half the country is run on a cost-accounting basis and the other half not. This is,

"In general, comrades, we should raise all these questions both at the stage of preparations and at the Conference itself from positions of principle. 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SUMMARY

1. REPORTS CIRCULATING IN MOSCOW HAVE IT THAT WHEN THE POLITBURO DISCUSSED PRAVDA'S RESPONSE TO THE SOVIETSKAYA ROSSIYA ARTICLE OF 13 MARCH GORBACHEV DEMANDED AND RECEIVED A VOTE OF CONFIDENCE IN HIMSELF, AND THAT THE MEETING APPROVED A WRITTEN CENSURE OF LIGACHEV (IN HIS ABSENCE). THIS INFORMATION IS OF UNPROVEN AUTHENTICITY BUT NOT INCONSISTENT WITH WHAT IS ALREADY KNOWN. IF TRUE, WE COULD EXPECT EVIDENCE TO EMERGE IN PUBLIC OF THIS SHARP TRANSFORMATION OF THE EXISTING DEBATE INTO A QUESTION OF PERSONAL AUTHORITY. A MOVE AGAINST LIGACHEV COULD BE ON THE CARDS.

DETAIL

2. SEVERAL WESTERN MISSIONS AND JOURNALISTS HAVE HEARD MORE DRAMATIC AND DETAILED VERSIONS OF THE POLITBURO'S REACTION TO THE SOVIETSKAYA ROSSIYA ARTICLE THAN THAT OFFERED IN MY TUR. ACCORDING TO THESE ACCOUNTS, FOR WHICH THERE APPEAR TO BE THREE SEPARATE IMMEDIATE SOURCES, A SPECIAL SESSION OF THE POLITBURO WAS SUMMONED ON 30 MARCH IN THE ABSENCE OF LIGACHEV (IN VOLOGDA, 28-30 MARCH). GORBACHEV REPORTEDLY SAID THAT HE WOULD ONLY CONTINUE TO SERVE IF HE HAD THE FULL SUPPORT OF THE POLITBURO AND ASKED ALL THOSE PRESENT TO STATE THEIR POSITION. ALL DECLARED THEIR SUPPORT, ALTHOUGH ONE SOURCE HAS IT THAT CHEBRIKOV DISSENTED. IN ADDITION TO AUTHORIZING THE PRAVDA ARTICLE THE POLITBURO THEN APPROVED A REBUKE TO LIGACHEV, WHICH ALL SIGNED, CALLING ON HIM TO DESIST FROM SUPPORTING THE CONSERVATIVE CAUSE AND INSTRUCTING HIM TO READ THE PARTY STATUTES IN CONNECTION WITH HIS RESPONSIBILITY AS A SECRETARY OF THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

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- IT SHOULD BE BORNE IN MIND HOWEVER THAT ON MORE THAN ONE OCCASION, LIGACHEV HAS TAKEN ADVANTAGE OF GORBACHEV'S ABSENCE TO ADVANCE HIS OWN IDEAS SEMICOLON AND THAT THE SOVIETSKAYA ROSSIYA PIECE WAS TIMED TO APPEAR JUST AS GORBACHEV WAS DEPARTING FOR YUGOSLAVIA SEMICOLON

IT SEEMS UNLIKELY THAT WHAT IS TANTAMOUNT TO AN OFFER OF RESIGNATION BY THE GENERAL SECRETARY AND THE HUMILIATION OF THE SECOND MAN IN THE PARTY HIERARCHY COULD END HERE.

IF THE STORY IS TRUE LIGACHEV'S AUTHORITY WILL HAVE SUFFERED A SEVERE DENT, AND HIS DAYS IN HIS PRESENT NUMBER TWO POST MIGHT BE NUMBERED. THERE HAVE IN THE PAST BEEN RUMOURS THAT HE WOULD SUCCEED GROMYKO AS HEAD OF STATE.

DID SUCH A CLASH TAKE PLACE?

5. MUCH OF THE STORY HAS STRONG CIRCUMSTANTIAL CREDIBILITY. LIGACHEV IS THE LEADING CONSERVATIVE PROTAGONIST IN A VISIBLE DIVISION OF OPINION IN THE LEADERSHIP WHICH IS DAMAGING THE CAUSE OF REFORM. THE EVIDENCE FOR HIS INVOLVEMENT IN SOME WAY

PAGE 2 CONFIDENTIAL IN THE SOVIETSKAYA ROSSIYA PIECE IS GENERALLY TAKEN HERE AS CONVINCING.

- 6., THE TIMING OF THE SOVIETSKAYA ROSSIYA PIECE WAS ALMOST CERTAINLY CALCULATED TO HAVE THE MAXIMUM INFLUENCE ON THE PREPARATIONS FOR THE PARTY CONFERENCE IN JUNE. ONE MAY QUESTION WHETHER THIS ATTEMPT TO MARSHAL SUPPORT FOR THE REACTIONARY TENDENCY WILL ACTUALLY INFLUENCE THE CONFERENCE AGENDA AND ARRANGEMENTS FOE THE CHOICE OF DELEGATES WHOSE ELECTION IS PENDING: BUT IT SEEMS LIKELY TO HAVE OFFERED REASSURANCE TO THOSE OF CONSERVATIVE VIEWS IN THE RANK AND FILE BUREAUCRACY THAT THEY HAVE SUPPORT AT THE CENTRE. AT THE SAME TIME, THE VIGOROUS RESPONSE FROM PRAVDA AND OTHER NEWSPAPERS WILL WARN THAN THAT THE DRIVE FOR REAL REFORM RETAINS ITS MOMENTUM.
- 7. FOR THE REFORMERS, THEREFORE, THERE WAS GOOD REASON FOR FIRM ACTION TO ATTEMPT TO STOP THE SPREAD OF THE THINKING REPRESENTED BY THE SOVIETSKAYA ROSSIYA ARTICLE.
 THERE WOULD AT THE SAME TIME BE A STRONG INTEREST IN AVOIDING ANOTHER PUBLIC ROW SUCH AS THAT WHICH SURROUNDED THE REMOVAL OF ELTSIN. IN THIS CONTEXT A SHORT SHARP INTERNAL RAP OVER THE KNUCLES FOR LIGACHEV MAKES SENSE.
- 8. THE REFORMIST PRESS, PLUS PRAVDA, CONTINUED TO SUPPORT PRAVDA'S REBUTTAL OF SOVIETSKAYA ROSSIYA AND TO USE THE OPPORTUNITY TO PUSH FORWARD THEIR CAMPAGIN FOR GLASNOST AND POLITICAL REFORM. BUT, AS RECORDED IN MY TELNO 663 (NOT TO ALL) CHEBRIKOV IN A RECENT SPEECH DID NOT SHRINK FROM GIVING FULL WEIGHT TO THE CAUTIOUS APPROACH TO REFORM.

WHOSE INTERESTS DOES THE PUBLICATION (OR FABRICATION) OF THIS EPISODE SERVE?

9. ALTHOUGH, AS NOTED ABOVE, IT WAS PREFERABLE TO AVOID A PUBLIC CLASH, THE SALUTARY LESSON OF THE REBUKE TO LIGACHEV WOULD HAVE ONLY PARTIAL EFFECT IF ITS EXISTENCE WERE KNOWN ONLY TO THOSE DIRECTLY INVOLVED. DISCREET PUBLICITY WOULD SERVE AS A WARNING TO ALL THAT SERIOUS DISSENT WOULD NOT BE TOLERATED. THE SAME ARGUMENT CAN OF COURSE BE USED TO EXPLAIN THE CIRCULATION OF A FABRICATED STORY TO THE SAME EFFECT. THE FACT THAT THERE WAS GOOD REASON FOR GORBACHEV'S SUPPORTERS TO GIVE CURRENCY TO THE STORY OFFERS NO COMMENT ON ITS AUTHENTICITY.

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CONCLUSION

10. WESTERN REACTION HERE IS CAUTIOUS.

IT IS NEVERTHELESS VERY LIKELY THAT THERE WAS SOME DIRECT TALKING IN THE POLITBURO AT THE TIME OF THE APPROVAL OF THE PRAVDA REPLY. BUT, PENDING ADDITIONAL INFORMATION, WE WOULD BE WISE TO TREAT THE DETAILS WITH CIRCUMSPECTION. IF THERE WAS INDEED A SHOWDOWN ON THE SCALE OUTLINED ABOVE, I BELIEVE THAT WE ARE LIKELY TO SEE PUBLIC EVIDENCE OF THIS BEFORE TOO LONG.

11. WHAT IS MORE IMPORTANT PERHAPS IN THE MEANTIME IS THAT, FOR THE PRESENT, THE VIEWS OF THE REFORMERS SEEM TO HAVE THE UPPER HAND AMONG THE LEADERSHIP. BUT AMONG THE RANK AND FILE, AND ESPECIALLY THOSE REMOTE FROM MOSCOW, THE STRENGTH OF THE REFORMIST CAUSE IS MUCH LESS IN EVIDENCE.

GORBACHEV WITH THE APPARENT SUPPORT OF THE LEADERSHIP, IS LOOKING TO RECEIVE AT THE PARTY CONFERENCE, IF NOT A DECISIVE MANDATE TO PRESS AHEAD WITH REFORMS AT LEAST A SUFFICIENT SUPPORT TO PURSUE THE PARTY'S PRESENT COURSE. FOR THIS REASON ALSO THE CONSERVATIVE TENDENCY KNOW THAT THE TIME REMAINING IN WHICH TO MOBILISE FORCES WHICH WOULD ACT AS A BRAKE AT THE PARTY CONFERENCE IS VERY SHORT.

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Soviet Union: Leadership Divisions

There are now clear signs of a split in the Party over 'perestroika', which reaches up to the highest level in the Soviet leadership.

- On 13 March, one day before Gorbachev left Moscow on a visit to Yugoslavia, the Soviet newspaper "Sovietskaya Rossiya" published a "letter to the editorial office", supposedly from a university teacher in Leningrad. While including a couple of brief quotes from Gorbachev, the author, Andreeva, devoted the great bulk of her "letter" to criticising the effects of 'glasnost' and democratisation in particular, the (to her) excessively negative treatment of the past and the freedom of debate which, she claimed, had allowed "left liberals" and "peasant socialists" to come out with their programmes. These were confusing for young people. She concluded that the whole process of discussion raised the fundamental question of whether or not the leading role of the Party and the working class was to be recognised in socialist construction and in 'perestroika'. The article as a whole was a visceral reaction against 'perestroika'. It contained no specific recommendation about political or economic reform. It was also strongly anti-Semitic.
- 3. "Pravda" replied authoritatively on 5 April. In a full-page unsigned editorial (a clear indication of high-level backing), the newspaper took issue with Andreeva's "letter", saying that it could only be described as "providing an ideological platform and manifesto for anti-restructuring forces". "Pravda" claimed that the "letter" virtually advocated a return to "the system whereby bureaucratism, lack of control, corruption bribery and petty bourgeois degeneration flourished lavishly".

- 4. It is virtually inconceivable that "Sovietskaya Rossiya" would have published the "letter" without high-level approval. It filled a full page, and, despite flying in the face of major elements in Gorbachev's reform policy, was not accompanied, or even followed, by any comment or "alternative view". It may not even have been a letter at all (or may, at the least, have been heavily reworked). "Pravda" described it as "an article, written in the style of 'a letter to the editorial office'".
- 5. Having been published, however, it was clearly given a fair wind. "Izvestia" on 10 April noted that no sooner had it appeared than it was hastily reprinted in other newspapers, and local Party organisations began to organise large-scale meetings to express support for the ideas contained in it.
- 6. We do not know who, in the higher levels of the Party, was behind the publication of the "letter". The only obvious candidate, however, is Ligachev, the senior Party Secretary, and the number two to Gorbachev in the Party hierarchy.

 Supervising the press is part of his job as Secretary in charge of ideology: one unconfirmed report suggests that he may even have called editors together to commend the "letter" to them. While he outwardly (and probably genuinely) supports many aspects of Gorbachev's reforms, he is notably more conservative in some areas (especially culture) and may have doubts about the pace of change. Bearing in mind the timing of the "letter", it may also be indicative that Ligachev has something of a track record for making his moves in Gorbachev's absence. He made a strikingly hard-line speech while Gorbachev was on holiday last summer.
- 7. The "Pravda" response, on the other hand, was in part drafted, we believe, by Party Secretary Yakovlev, a close associate of Gorbachev, and was formally endorsed by Gorbachev in a speech a few days later.

- 8. It does not seem likely that the "letter" was printed for the express purpose of being demolished, as some sort of effort to re-emphasise the importance of reform. "Pravda" criticised not only the "letter" but "Sovietskaya Rossiya" for showing a lack of responsibility in publishing it.
- 9. The Soviet press machine has now swung into line. Even "Sovietskaya Rossiya" is now publishing letters from its readers attacking the "letter" and supporting the "Pravda" line.
- 10. We do not know what further steps Gorbachev will now take. If Ligachev was responsible (and if it was not he, then there is clearly some other centre of high-level opposition within the Party), he has clearly lost this particular battle. It remains to be seen whether Gorbachev will try to paper over the cracks, or look for a chance to remove Ligachev from his influential position. But the hardline approach clearly has many supporters in the Party. "Izvestia", having noted how quickly people initially rushed to support the "letter", asked "What is the state of public awareness if the slightest test could have produced such confusion of mind and fecklessness of action?". An article by a prominent reform economist in "Sovietskaya Kultura" on 7 April, supporting the "Pravda" editorial, warns that, unless people can see some benefits from restructuring, and can become actively involved in it, then they could become a breeding ground for the resurrection of the "command system", enabling the opponents of restructuring to defeat its supporters and grasp the levers of power.
- 11. Gorbachev clearly has major problems to solve before the Soviet Party Conference in June.

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SOVIET CENTRAL COMMITTEE PLENUM: LEADERSHIP CHANGES

Changes in the leadership as a result of the CPSU Central Committee Plenum on 17-18 February are as follows:

- Full Members of Politburo: no change.
- Candidate Members of Politburo:
 - Eltsin dropped.
- Yu D Maslyukov (50), who recently took over from Talyzin as Chairman of Gosplan, promoted to Candidate Member. (Talyzin, now Chairman of the Bureau of the Council of Ministers for Social Development, retains his candidate membership.)
- <u>G P Razumovsky</u> (52), currently Head of the Central Committee Department for Organisational Party Work and junior Party Secretary for personnel questions, is promoted to Candidate Member, while remaining a CC Secretary.
 - Central Committee Secretaries:
- O D Baklanov (55), hitherto Minister of General Machine Building (ie ballistic missiles), is transferred to become a Central Committee Secretary.
- 2. <u>Comment</u>. The dropping of Eltsin was a foregone conclusion. <u>Maslyukov's promotion was expected</u>, but Talyzin's retention of his Politburo status in his new job (social

affairs, including employment) is no surprise, given the importance the leadership now ascribe to this area. Baklanov comes out of the blue. While his precise role as a Central Committee Secretary will not become clear until he has been in the job for some months, we can be fairly certain that he will take over Party supervision of the defence industries from Zaikov, who has recently been combining this with his new Moscow job. (Zaikov, however, has apparently retained his post as Party Secretary. It is not clear whether he will retain some residual supervision of industry or whether his dual function is designed to tie Moscow more closely to the Party Secretariat - Eltsin had complained of lack of support from the Secretariat.)

- 3. It is likewise not yet clear whether Razumovsky will broaden or change his responsibilities on promotion. He may be being groomed to replace Ligachev (to whom he currently reports on personnel questions) in due course, or possibly Chebrikov, Chairman of the KGB. While not a Gorbachev protégé in the narrow sense, Razumovsky, from what we know of him, can be expected to support Gorbachev fairly consistently.
- 4. Shcherbitsky soldiers on. His award of an Order of
 Lenin on the opening day of the Plenum means nothing more
 than that it was his 70th Birthday. Under Brezhnev he would
 have got a higher award, but the currency is being generally
 revalued. He remains the only Party leader of a Republic in
 the leadership. It is slightly surprising that he has not
 been joined by the Belorussian Party leader, who
 traditionally has a place as Candidate Member (and the
 Belorussians are in good odour). This may have something to
 do with the Central Asians, who also traditionally have one
 or two places in the leadership, but are currently in the dog
 house. The leadership may want to avoid looking unduly Slav.

5. <u>Conclusions</u>. Overall, a tidying up Plenum. But the advancement of Razumovsky is a good chess move. He is now well placed to take over a senior leadership job. Maslyukov could be an eventual replacement for Prime Minister Ryzhkov. People in their early fifties are moving up; although Gorbachev remains the youngest Full Member of the Politburo, there are now three members of the leadership younger than he is.

SUMMARY

1. A MAJOR AND WIDERANGING SPEECH BY GORBACHEV, BUT ONE LACKING IN SPARKLE AND NOVELTY, AND COUCHED AT TIMES IN UNUSUALLY DEFENSIVE LANGUAGE. SOME SHARPER COMMENTS BY LIGACHEV ON THE OPENING DAY OF THE PLENUM ON ISSUES RELATED TO GLASNOST. A MINOR LEADERSHIP RESHUFFLE WITH A SMALL PLUS FOR GORBACHEV. BUT NO MAJOR CHANGES. THE GLASNOST PROCESS MAY NOW BE LOSING SOME IMPETUS AS ENERGIES ARE CONCENTRATED ON THE ECONOMY AND PREPARATIONS FOR THE PARTY CONFERENCE.

DETAIL

- 2. GORBACHEV'S SPEECH COVERED THE WHOLE FIELD OF PERESTROIKA GLASNOST', DEMOCRATISATION AND ECONOMIC REFORM AS WELL AS FOREIGN AFFAIRS ON WHICH I HAVE TELEGRAPHED SEPARATELY. IT WAS A MODERATE AND CAUTIOUS SPEECH. ITS MAIN MESSAGE IS THAT GLASNOST' MAY HAVE BEEN PROCEEDING TOO FAST WHILE DEMOCRATISATION AND THE ECONOMIC REFORM HAVE NOT BEEN PROCEEDING FAST ENOUGH.
- 3. SOME OF GORBACHEV'S LANGUAGE WAS NOTABLY DEFENSIVE. HE HAS TALKED ON MANY OCCASIONS IN THE PAST OF BUREAUCRATIC FOOT-DRAGGING OVER THE ECONOMIC REFORM PROCESS. BUT ON THIS OCCASION HE USED EVEN STRONGER LANGUAGE, REFERRING AT ONE POINT TO THOSE WHO ARE DELIBERATELY TRYING TO SABOTAGE AND DESCREDIT THE REFORMS. HE ALSO STRESSED TO A GREATER EXTEND THAN I HAVE SEEN BEFORE THE IDEOLOGICAL BASIS OF SOME OF THE OPPOSITION TO PERESTROIKA. HE MADE A SPECIFIC POINT OF TAKING UP THE ARGUMENTS OF THOSE WHO CLAIMED THAT PERESTROIKA REPRESENTED A DEPARTURE FROM THE BASIC PRINCIPLES OF SOCIALISM AND MARXISM-LENINISM. IN TALKING OF DEMOCRATISATION HE MENTIONED

PAGE 1 CONFIDENTIAL THOSE WHO HAD WARNED THAT THIS WOULD LEAD TO CHAOS.

4. HE STRESSED, AS HE HAS ON PREVIOUS OCCASIONS, THE NEED FOR THE PARTY ITSELF TO SET AN EXAMPLE IN THE MATTER OF DEMOCRATISATION, BUT THE LANGUAGE HE USED SUGGESTS THAT MANY PARTY MEMBERS REMAIN UNENTHUSIASTIC. HIS COMMENTS ON THE DIRECTION SUCH REFORMS MIGHT TAKE WERE NOTICEABLY VAGUE. THIS SUGGESTS THAT, WITH THE PARTY CONFERENCE NOW ONLY SOME FOUR MONTHS AWAY, THERE IS STILL LITTLE IN THE WAY OF LEADERSHIP AGREEMENT ON CONCRETE PROPOSALS FOR THIS KEY ITEM OF THE CONFERENCE AGENDA.

ECONOMY

5. ON THE ECONOMIC FRONT, GORBACHEV'S CRITICISMS OF THE MINISTERIAL BUREAUCRACY HAD A WEARY AND FAMILIAR RING. IT IS ALSO CLEAR FROM THIS SECTION OF HIS SPEECH THAT THE NEW LAW ON THE STATE ENTERPRISE IS NOT HAVING AN EASY PASSAGE. HIS CLAIM THAT THERE HAD BEEN NO REAL GROWTH IN NATIONAL INCOME BETWEEN 1960-80 IF ONE DISCOUNTED OIL PRICE FLUCTUATIONS AND THE GROWTH IN ALCOHOL PRODUCTION IS LIKELY TO HAVE SHOCKED MANY OF HIS AUDIENCE. THERE HAVE BEEN A NUMBER OF SUGGESTIONS RECENTLY THAT SOME OF THE GROWTH RATES CLAIMED IN THE LATE 1970S WERE ILLUSORY. BUT I HAVE NOT YET SEEN SUCH A GRAPHIC CONDEMNATION OF ECONOMIC PERFORMANCE UNDER BREZHNEV. PRESUMABLY GORBACHEV HOPES THAT SUCH REVELATIONS WILL FINALLY PERSUADE HIS AUDIENCE THAT THERE IS INDEED NO ALTERNATIVE TO HIS REFORMS.

GLASNOST'

6. THE LANGUAGE ON GLASNOST' AND HISTORY WAS MEASURED AND CAUTIOUS. THERE WAS NO SUGGESTION OF BACKTRACKING, BUT THE EMPHASIS THROUGHOUT THIS PASSAGE WAS ON THE NEED FOR A PERIOD OF CONSOLIDATION. THE ANALYSIS OF HISTORY NEEDED TIME. PEOPLE MUST RESTRAIN THEIR IMPATIENCE. HE ALSO EMPHASISED THE IMPORTANCE OF AVOIDING ONE-SIDED (IE UNDULY NEGATIVE) INTERPRETATIONS OF HISTORY, AND SAID THAT IS WAS IMPORTANT TO DISTINGUISH BETWEEN DEVELOPMENTS WHICH WERE AN INHERENT PART OF THE SOCIALIST SYSTEM AND THOSE WHICH WERE DISTORTIONS. PRESUMABLY THIS IS A WARNING TO SOME ACADEMICS WHO HAVE BEGUN TO SUGGEST THAT STALINISM WAS A NATURAL PRODUCT OF THE SOVIET SYSTEM AND NOT AN INDIVIDUAL ABERRATION. THE MEDIA AND THE CULTURAL INTELLIGENTSIA WERE PRAISED FOR THEIR CONTRIBUTIONS TO GLASNOST BUT ALSO WARNED AGAINST GOING TOO FAR TO FAST.

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LIGACHEV

- 7. LIGACHEV'S SPEECH ON THE FIRST DAY OF THE PLENUM WAS VERY LARGELY DEVOTED TO EDUCATIONAL REFORM, ON WHICH WE SHALL BE REPORTING IN MORE DETAIL BY BAG. BUT HE ALSO MADE A NUMBER OF COMMENTS ON GLASNOST'-RELATED ISSUES WHICH PROVIDE AN INTERESTING OPPORTUNITY FOR COMPARISON WITH GORBACHEV'S TREATMENT OF THE SAME SUBJECT. LIGACHEV'S COMMENTS WERE BOTH MORE INCISIVE AND MORE CONSERVATIVE. HIS HEAVY EMPHASIS ON THE NEED FOR A CORRECT CLASS/IDEOLOGICAL APPROACH TO HISTORY AND THE SOCIAL SCIENCES HAD A MARKEDLY OLD-FASHIONED RING, AS DID HIS ILL-TEMPERED COMMENTS ON WHAT HE TERMED THE CURRENT FAD FOR ''PRIMITIVE'' MUSIC. HIS DISLIKE OF THOSE WHO OVEREMPHASISED THE NEGATIVE ASPECTS OF SOVIET HISTORY CAME THROUGH MORE STRONGLY THAN IN GORBACHEV'S SPEECH, AND HIS PRAISE FOR PRAVDA'S (NOTABLY CONSERVATIVE) HANDLING OF THIS SUBJECT WOULD SEEM TO BACK UP THE REPORTS WE HAVE HAD THAT HE HAS BEEN ENCOURAGING PRAVDA IN TAKING THIS LINE.
- 8. LIGACHEV'S COMMENT THAT THE RESULTS OF DISTORTED NATIONAL ATTITUDES HAD BEEN SEEN IN YAKUTIA AS WELL AS IN ALMA ATA IS THE FIRST PUBLIC CONFIRMATION I HAVE SEEN OF THE FACT (WHICH WE HAVE HEARD MENTIONED IN PRIVATE CONVERSATIONS) THAT THERE WERE NATIONAL DISTURBANCES IN YAKUTIA LAST YEAR.

LEADERSHIP CHANGES

- 9. THE PROMOTION OF MASLYUKON THE NEW CHAIRMAN OF GOSPLAN, AND THE DEMOTION OF ELTSIN CAME AS NO SURPRISE. THE PROMOTION OF RAZUMOVSKY, WHO WAS BROUGHT IN BY GORBACHEV TO RUN THE SENSITIVE CENTRAL COMMITTEE DEPARTMENT RESPONSIBLE FOR PARTY PERSONNEL MATTERS IN 1985, IS A MINOR PLUS FOR GORBACHEV. AGED 51, HE IS THE YOUNGEST OF THE CANDIDATE AND FULL MEMBERS OF THE POLITBURO AND MAY BE A MAN TO WATCH.
- 10. THE BRINGING INTO THE SECRETARIAT OF BAKLANOV, WHO WILL, WE ASSUME, UNDERSTUDY ZAIKOV IN SUPERVISING THE DEFENCE INDUSTRIES GETS ROUND THE PROBLEM OF WHAT TO DO ABOUT ZAIKOV'S DOUBLE PORTFOLIO (HE IS ALSO FIRST SECRETARY OF THE MOSCOW PARTY COMMITTEE). BUT IT ALSO SUGGESTS THAT THERE ARE STILL PROBLEMS IN REACHING AGREEMENT ON CANDIDATES FOR FULL POLITBURO STATUS. DESPITE A NUMBER OF FAIRLY SHARP PRESS CRITICISMS, SHCHERBITSKY RETAINS HIS POSITION IN THE POLITBURO, AND IS LIKELY TO CONTINUE TO HOLD ON UNTIL HE CAN BE PRISED OUT OF

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HIS ENTRENCHED POSITION AT THE HEAD OF THE UKRAINIAN PARTY.

CONCLUSIONS

11. YEGOR YAKOVLEV, EDITOR OF MOSCOW NEWS AND ONE OF THE LEADING CAMPAIGNERS FOR GLASNOST', TOLD ME WHEN HE CAME TO MY RESIDENCE TO MEET YOU FOR LUNCH ON 16 FEBRUARY THAT HE THOUGHT THE BALANCE WAS NOW TIPPING AGAINST GLASNOST'. KOROTICH, THE EDITOR OF OGONEK AND ANOTHER OF GLASNOST'S LEADING PROPONENTS, HAS BEEN SAYING MUCH THE SAME RECENTLY. THE EVIDENCE OF THIS PLENUM IS THAT THEY ARE PROBABLY RIGHT. IT HAS BEEN EVIDENT FOR SOME TIME THAT GLASNOST' IS PROCEEDING CONSIDERABLY MORE QUICKLY THAN ECONOMIC REFORM OR DEMOCRATISATION AND THAT THIS HAS BEEN CAUSING CONCERN. IT NOW SEEMS THAT GORBACHEV HAS ACCEPTED THIS POINT, AND THAT THERE WILL NOW, AT BEST, BE A PERIOD OF TREADING WATER WHILE EFFORTS ARE CONCENTRATED ON OVERCOMING BUREAUCRATIC OPPOSITION TO THE ECONOMIC REFORMS. BUT THE PARTY CONFERENCE WILL ALSO REQUIRE GORBACHEV TO CONCENTRATE ON THE ISSUE OF DEMOCRATISATION AND PARTY REFORM AND THIS, IT SEEMS, IS LIKELY TO PROVE JUST AS CONTROVERSIAL AS GLASNOST' WITH SOME OF HIS COLLEAGUES IN THE LEADERSHIP AND IN THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

SUMMARY

1. A DEFENSIVE, LACK-LUSTRE JUSTIFICATION OF ARMS CONTROL POLICY, MAXIMISING THE SUCCESS OF THE INF TREATY. UK AND FRANCE CRITICISED. NEW THINKING IS GIVEN GOOD LENINIST CREDENTIALS, AND SAID TO BE ESSENTIAL.

DETAIL

ARMS CONTROL

- 2. GORBACHEV SAID ARMS CONTROL HAD BEEN AN EARLY PRIORITY FOR THE PARTY. THE INITIATIVES PUT FORWARD BY THE SOVIET UNION HAD NOT BEEN AD-HOC, BUT HAD BEEN GIVEN A 'SOUND, LONG-TERM SCIENTIFIC BASIS'.
- 3. THE INF TREATY WAS DESCRIBED IN FAMILIAR TERMS AS THE 'BEGINNING OF REAL DISARMAMENT'. GORBACHEV ADDED 'BUT IT IS ALSO A RESULT. A RESULT OF THE STRUGGLE OF SOCIALIST COUNTRIES, OTHER PEACE-LOVING AND PROGRESSIVE STATES, MASS POPULAR MOVEMENTS, THE UN, THE NON-ALIGNED....OF THE ACTIVITY OF LEADERS OF SCIENCE, CULTURE, THE CHURCH....OF THE COMMON-SENSE OF POLITICIANS BUSINESSMEN AND THE MILITARY. THE TREATY IS SOME KIND OF INIDCATOR OF THE POTENTIAL FOR PEACE'.
- 4. HE THEN CAUTIONED THAT THERE WAS NO CAUSE FOR COMPLACENCY.
 WITHIN DAYS OF THE SUMMIT EUPHORIA, 'OPPONENTS OF NORMALISING
 RELATIONS WITH THE SOVIET UNION' WERE TRYING TO RALLY SUPPORT.
 GORBACHEV PAID A MIXED TRIBUTE TO THE REAGAN ADMINISTRATION. 'THE
 ADMINISTRATION IS KEEPING ITS WORD AND SUPPORTING THE TREATY. BUT
 AT THE SAME TIME IT ECHOES THE EXTREME RIGHT IN ANTI-SOVIET,
 ANTI-COMMUNIST RHETORIC,...AND ALSO IN DEEDS. WE HAVE AGAIN
 WITNESSED PROVOCATIONS ON OUR BORDERS. SOMEONE CLEARLY DOES NOT

- THERE WAS SHARP CRITICISM OF THE EUROPEAN MEMBERS OF NATO.

 'THEY ARE HURRYING TO ARRANGE COMPENSATION FOR THE MISSILES

 COVERED BY THE TREATY. THEY PLAN TO MODERNISE OTHER TYPES OF

 WEAPONS,....CYNICALLY ARGUING THAT THEY ARE NOT ENCOMPASSED BY

 IT. WE HAVE ONCE AGAIN HEARD FROM LONDON, FROM PARIS, AND FROM

 NATO HQ A CATEGORICAL 'NO' TO GIVING UP NUCLEAR WEAPONS EVEN IN

 THE DISTANT FUTURE. APPROVAL OF A START TREATY IS ACCOMPANIED BY

 STATEMENTS THAT FRANCE AND BRITAIN ARE NOT AT ALL PREPARED TO STOP

- 6. GORBACHEV THEN COMMENTED ON THOSE URGING CAUTION IN THE WEST, WHO WERE SUSPICIOUS OF THE "DIPLOMACY OF SMILES". THEY WERE TRYING TO PREVENT PROGRESS ON DISARMAMENT AND ALSO WERE STEPPING UP THE IDEOLOGICAL ATTACK, "TO BRING THE IDEOLOGICAL STRUGGLE OVER THE QUESTION OF PERESTROIKA AND DISARMAMENT INTO OUR TERRITORY, INTO OUR MIDST." HOWEVER, NEW THINKING AND OTHER STEPS WHICH UNDERMINDED THE "ENEMY IMAGE" WOULD OVERCOME THIS.

NEW THINKING

- 7. GORBACHEV SPOKE AT LENGTH IN DEFENCE OF NEW THINKING, WHICH, LIKE PERESTROIKA (LAST WORD UNDERLINED) HAD BEEN THE NECESSARY RESULT OF THE DELIBERATIONS OF THE LEADERSHIP IN 1985. 'THERE IS CONFUSION IN THE MINDS OF SOME PEOPLE ABOUT THE ESSENCE OF NEW THINKING. IT IS NOT SURPRISING. THE PROBLEMS ARE CONSIDERABLE'. AGAINST THIS DOCTRINE OF MILITARISM, THE SOVIET UNION WAS ADVANCING THE IDEAS OF 'A BALANCE OF INTERESTS AND EQUAL MUTUAL SECURITY'. HE ASSERTED THAT IT WAS THE APPROPRIATE RESPONSE TO THE CONTEMPORARY WORLD, AND WAS A MORAL ASSET TO THE SOVIET UNION.
- 8. HE TOLD THE PLENUM THAT NEW THINKING WAS THE CORRECT UNDERSTANDING OF THE REALITIES SUBJECT TO ANALYSIS BY DIALECTICAL MATERIALISM. IT RELIED ON THE LENINIST THEORY OF IMPERIALISM. NEW THINKING WAS WELL SUITED TO SOCIALISM'S 'HISTORIC MISSION' OF CREATING NEW REALITIES WHICH WOULD BE AN INSUPERABLE BARRIER AGAINST AGRESSION AND INTERVENTION. GORBACHEV CONCLUDED BY STRESSING THAT THE SUCCESS OF PERESTROIKA (LAST WORD UNDERLINED) WOULD NOT BE POSSIBLE WITHOUT A FOREIGN POLICY BASED ON NEW THINKING.

1. THE FULL TEXT OF GORBACHEV'S SPEECH IS PUBLISHED IN TODAY'S PRESS. IT RANGES WIDELY OVER INTERNAL AND FOREIGN POLICY ISSUES. THE FOLLOWING 1S A SUMMARY OF THE MAIN POINTS OF INTERNAL POLICY. WE ARE TELEGRAPHING SEPARATELY ON POINTS FROM THE FOREIGN POLICY SECTION OF THE SPEECH.

DIFFERENT VIEWS OF PERESTROIKA

- 2. GORBACHEV BEGAN BY LOOKING AT SOME KEY IDEOLOGICAL ASPECTS OF PERESTROIKA. AT FIRST, HE SAID, MANY PEOPLE HAD FAILED TO UNDERSTAND THE NATURE OF THESE CHANGES PERESTROIKA INVOLVED. THIS MEANT THAT THE PARTY HAD LITERALLY TO FIGHT FOR PERESTROIKA IN BOTH ITS ECONOMIC AND SPIRITUAL ASPECTS.
- 3. GORBACHEV SAID THAT THERE WERE DIFFERING VIEWS OF PERESTROIKA. SOME SAW IT AS SIMPLY A PROCESS OF COSMETIC ADJUSTMENT - AS SOMETHING SUPERFICIAL. OTHERS DEMANDED THE DISMANTLING OF THE WHOLE SYSTEM OF SOCIALISM AND ASKED THAT POLICIES FOLLOWED FOR DECADES SHOULD BE DÉCLARED TO HAVE BEEN MISTAKEN. OTHERS USED RADICAL PHRASEOLOGY BUT WANTED TO MISS OUT NECESSARY LOGICAL STAGES OF THE PROCESS.
- 4. GORBACHEV THEN SAID THAT THERE WERE SOME PEOPLE WHO EXPRESSED DOUBTS ABOUT PERESTROIKA, AND INTERPRETED IT AS A RETREAT FROM SOCIALISM. NOT SURPRISINGLY, SUCH TALK HAD LED TO THE APPEARANCE OF QUOTE ''DEFENDERS'' OF MARXIST LENINISM. THEY WERE MISTAKEN. PERESTROIKA DID NOT INVOLVE ANY RETREAT FROM SOCIALISM. BUT IT DID INVOLVE THE FIRM REJECTION OF THE SOVIET UNION'S DOGMATIC, BUREAUCRATIC AND VOLUNTARIST LEGACY FROM THE PAST.

HISTORY

5. GORBACHEV STRESSED THE NEED FOR A TRUTHFUL AND COMPLETE HISTORY OF THE LIFE AND STRUGGLES OF THE SOVIET PEOPLE. THIS MUST SHOW HOW PEOPLE REALLY LIVED AND WORKED, THEIR VICTORIES AND THEIR FAILURES, THE GLORIOUS AND THE TRAGIC, THE REVOLUTIONARY ENTHUSIASM OF THE PEOPLE, THE VIOLATION OF SOCIALIST LEGALITY AND AT TIMES THE CRIMINAL ACTS. BUT A MARXIST/LENINIST AND DIALECTICAL APPROACH WAS NEEDED IN WHICH THERE WOULD BE NO ONE-SIDEDNESS. THE ANALYSIS OF HISTORY NEEDED TIME. SOME PEOPLE WANTED TO LOOK TOO QUICKLY AT THE CLOSED PAGES OF THE PAST. THIS ONLY RESULTED IN SUPERFICIAL WORK. THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE AND THE PRESS RECEIVED MANY LETTERS FROM PEOPLE CONCERNED ABOUT ONE SIDED APPROACHES TO HISTORY. THE AIM, GORBACHEV STRESSED, MUST BE TO CREATE CONDITIONS FOR CALM AND OBJECTIVE WORK WHICH WOULD INVOLVE THE PEOPLE AS A WHOLE IN DISCUSSING HISTORICAL ISSUES.

DEMOCRATISATION

6. GORBACHEV STRESSED THAT THE PARTY MUST UNDERSTAND THAT IT IS ONLY THROUGH DEMOCRATISATION THAT THE HUMAN FACTOR CAN BE BROUGHT INTO PLAY AND THAT APATHY CAN BE OVERCOME. BUT THERE WERE PEOPLE WHO BECAME NERVOUS AND ISSUED WARNINGS THAT DEMOCRACY COULD TURN INTO CHAOS. IN GENERAL THESE WARNINGS WERE THE RESULT OF THEIR OWN SELFISH CONCERNS, NOT OF THEIR CONCERN FOR A SOCIETY AS A WHOLE. PARTY OFFICIALS STILL TRIED TO PUT ARTIFICIAL LIMITS ON GLASNOST AND DEMOCRACY. PARTY OFFICIALS MUST UNDERSTAND THAT THE PARTY CAN ONLY ENSURE ITS LEADING ROLE IF IT ADOPTS DEMOCRATIC METHODS OF WORK.

PRESS CRITICISM

7. PRESS AND TELEVISION HAVE BEEN TURNING THE SPOTLIGHT OF GLASNOST ON THOSE WHO ARE RESISTING AND HINDERING PERESTROIKA. THIS WAS HEALTHY. BUT FROM TIME TO TIME JOURNALS AND NEWSPAPERS MADE MISTAKES AND COULD NOT RESIST SENSATIONALISING. THERE WERE STILL TOO FEW POSITIVE ACCOUNTS OF THE PROGRESS OF PERESTROIKA.

CULTURE

8. GORBACHEV STRESSED THE IMPORTANCE OF DEVELOPING A RICH AND VARIED CULTURE AS PART OF THE PROCESS OF PERESTROIKA. BUT HE SAID THAT HE AGREED WITH THOSE AT THE PLENUM WHO HAD SPOKEN ABOUT THE IMPERMISSIBILITY OF A LIGHT-HEARTED APPROACH TO ISSUES OF CULTURE AND IDEOLOGY. IN THIS AREA, PERHAPS PARTICULARLY IN THIS AREA, ACTIONS HAD TO BE GUIDED BY MARXIST/LENINIST PRINCIPLES.

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NATIONALITIES

9. GORBACHEV DID NOT DWELL ON THIS ISSUE, BUT RECOMMENDED THAT A FUTURE PLENUM SHOULD DEVOTE ITSELF TO THE SUBJECT.

ECONOMIC REFORM

10. GORBACHEV THEN TURNED TO THE ECONOMY AND THE ECONOMIC REFORM PROGRAMME. HE NOTED THAT THE MOVE OVER TO KHOZRASCHET (SELF-ACCOUNTING) HAD ONLY JUST BEGUN, AND THAT OTHER KEY ELEMENTS IN THE REFORM PROGRAMME SUCH AS THE INTRODUCTION OF WHOLESALE TRADING DIRECTLY BETWEEN ENTERPRISES, AND PRICE REFORM STILL LAY AHEAD. EVEN SO, HE SAID, THE REFORM PROGRAMME WAS ALREADY MEETING PROBLEMS. THE BRAKING MECHANISM HAD STILL TO BE FULLY OVERCOME. THERE WAS STILL TOO MUCH ATTENTION TO INDICATORS OF GROSS OUTPUT, AND THERE WERE CASES WHEN INSTRUCTIONS WERE ISSUED TO FIRMS WHICH WENT CONTRARY TO THE NEW LAW ON STATE ENTERPRISES. THE ATTACHMENT TO THE OLD SYSTEM WAS SO STRONG THAT EVEN IN CASES WHERE FIRMS WERE PROFITABLY PRODUCING ITEMS IN GREAT DEMAND THEY DID NOT PURSUE THIS BUT OPTED FOR THE QUIET LIFE INSTEAD. GORBACHEV WARNED THAT IF THESE OLD FASHIONED ATTITUDES WERE NOT OVERCOME THEN THE REFORMS WOULD NOT HAVE THE NECESSARY EFFECT. THE DEVELOPMENT OF COOPERATIVE AND INDIVIDUAL LABOUR ACTIVITY, THE INTRODUCTION OF NEW FAMILY AND OTHER UNITS IN AGRICULTURE WAS MEETING PROBLEMS AND BEING SUBJECTED TO ARTIFICIAL DELAY. RADICAL IMPROVEMENTS WERE STILL NEEDED IN THE ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE OF THE ECONOMY. THERE WERE STILL PEOPLE WHO PLAYED AT INTRODUCING REFORMS, AND OTHERS WHO WERE OPPOSED TO THE VERY CONCEPT AND THE REFORM AND AIMED TO SABOTAGE AND DISCREDIT THE NEW METHODS. GORBACHEV WARNED THAT THERE WAS NO ALTERNATIVE TO THESE REFORMS. IT WOULD BE IMPERMISSIBLE. TO LET THEM BE STOPPED HALF WAY OR ROLLED BACK.

11. GORBACHEV ALSO STRONGLY ATTACKED THE CONTINUED ATTACHMENT TO THE IDEA OF 'LEVELLING OUT' OF WAGES. IT WAS HARDLY A SECRET HE SAID THAT MANY RECEIVED WAGES SIMPLY FOR TURNING UP AT WORK WITHOUT CONTRIBUTING ANYTHING. BUT AS SOON AS PEOPLE IN NEW SELF-ACCOUNTING COLLECTIVES BEGAN INCREASING OUTPUT AND THEREBY INCREASING THEIR INCOME THERE WERE ANGRY CRIES. PEOPLE MUST LEARN THAT LEVELLING OUT WAS A REFLECTION OF PETTY BOURGEOISE VIEWS AND HAD NOTHING IN COMMON WITH MARXIST LENINISM. THE BASIC PRINCIPLE OF SOCIALISM 'FROM EACH ACCORDING TO HIS ABILITIES, TO EACH ACCORDING TO HIS LABOUR' MUST BE APPLIED.

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12. GORBACHEV THEN REMINDED HIS AUDIENCE OF THE PARLOUS STATE
OF THE ECONOMY AT THE BEGINNING OF THE 1980S - SOMETHING HE
SAID WHICH HE HAD NEEDED TO DO ON PREVIOUS OCCASIONS. AT THE
BEGINNING OF THE 1980S GROWTH RATES HAD FALLEN AND HAD REACHED
A CRITICAL POINT. BUT, AS HAD SUBSEQUENTLY BECOME CLEAR, EVEN
WHAT GROWTH THERE WAS HAD BEEN BASED ON UNHEALTHY AND TEMPORARY
FACTORS. HE CITED IN PARTICULAR THE HIGH WORLD OIL PRICE AT THE
TIME AND THE UNJUSTIFIED EXPANSION OF THE PRODUCTION OF ALCOHOL.
IF ONE ELIMINATED THESE FACTORS, THEN THERE HAD BEEN NO REAL GROWTH
IN NATIONAL INCOME DURING THE WHOLE FOUR FIVE YEAR PLANS LEADING
UP TO THE BEGINNING OF THE 1980S. FROM THIS POINT NATIONAL INCOME
HAD EVEN BEGUN TO DECLINE. ONLY NOW HE SAID WAS ECONOMIC GROWTH
BEGINNING ON A HEALTHY BASIS.

13. BUT THERE WERE STILL SERIOUS PROBLEMS. THE CUT BACK IN THE SALE OF ALCOHOLIC PRODUCTS HAD COST THE STATE MORE THAN 37 BILLION ROUBLES OVER THE PAST THREE YEARS, WHILE RECEIPTS FROM REVENUES FROM THE SALE OF IMPORTED GOODS HAD DECLINED BY 9 BILLION ROUBLES FROM 1985-7 BECAUSE OF SHORTAGES OF HARD CURRENCY.

14. GORBACHEV THEN DEALT WITH 3 PARTICULAR AREAS OF THE ECONOMY THE FOOD PROGRAMME, HOUSING AND THE PRODUCTION OF CONSUMER GOODS.
SHORTCOMINGS IN THE LAST OF THESE WAS A MATTER FOR PARTICULAR
CONCERN. THERE HAD BEEN NO TANGIBLE IMPROVEMENT IN THE QUALITY
OF CONSUMER GOODS AND CONSUMER DEMAND WAS FAR FROM BEING
SATISFIED. THIS HAD TO BE CHANGED QUICKLY. THE WAY THIS PROBLEM
WAS HANDLED WOULD, GORBACHEV STRESSED, LARGELY DETERMINE
PEOPLE'S ATTITUDES TOWARDS PERESTROIKA.

POLITICAL REFORM

15. GORBACHEV STRESSED THE INTER RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN ECONOMIC REFORM, POLITICAL REFORM, DEMOCRATISATION AND GLASNOST. THEY WERE ALL LINKS IN THE SAME CHAIN. THE POLITICAL SYSTEM NEEDED OVERHAULING. THIS DID NOT MEAN REPLACING THE EXISTING SYSTEM, BUT SUPPLEMENTING IT WITH NEW STRUCTURES. THIS ISSUE HAD TO BE THOROUGHLY DISCUSSED WELL IN ADVANCE OF THE PARTY CONFERENCE. THE MAIN PROBLEM WAS TO CREATE A MECHANISM IN WHICH DEMOCRATIC CONTROL WOULD BE CLEARLY EXERCISED, AND TO WORK OUT APPROPRIATE LEGAL PROCEDURES WHICH WOULD AT LEAST SERIOUSLY RESTRICT THE ELEMENT OF SUBJECTIVITY AND CHANCE (SLUCHAINOST) IN THE DECISION MAKING SYSTEM. AS AN EXAMPLE OF THE TYPE OF REFORM THAT WAS NEEDED GORBACHEV CITED THE FURTHER DEMOCRATISATION OF THE SYSTEM OF LOCAL SOVIETS. HE ADDED THAT IT WAS ALSO NECESSARY TO THINK ABOUT THE

PAGE 4 UNCLASSIFIED ROLE OF THE USSR SUPREME SOVIET AND INCREASING THE EFFICIENCY OF ITS WORK. THERE ALSO HAD TO BE CLEARER DELIMITATION OF THE FUNCTIONS OF PARTY AND STATE BODIES. THE LEADING ROLE OF THE PARTY WAS AN ESSENTIAL CONDITION FOR THE FUNCTIONING AND FURTHER DEVELOPMENT OF A SOCIALIST SOCIETY. IN CONDITIONS OF PERESTROIKA AND DEMOCRATISATION THE LENINIST TEACHING ABOUT THE PARTY AND ITS ACTIVITIES MUST BE REVIVED. CAREFULLY THOUGHT OUT PROPOSALS ON THESE ISSUES HAD TO BE WORKED OUT IN TIME FOR THE PARTY CONFERENCE.

16. IN CONCLUSION GORBACHEV NOTED THAT PERESTROIKA HAD MADE CONSIDERABLE PROGRESS OVER THE PAST 3 YEARS BUT THAT THERE WAS STILL A LONG WAY TO GO. MANY DIFFICULT PROBLEMS STILL REMAINED TO BE RESOLVED. AS THE COUNTRY APPROACHED THE 19TH PARTY CONFERENCE THERE HAD TO BE A THOROUGH ANALYSIS OF THE RESULTS OF THE PAST THREE YEARS, AND IN PARTICULAR OF THE FIRST MONTHS OF THE OPERATION OF THE NEW LAW ON THE ENTERPRISE. FUTURE TASKS FOR THE PROCESS OF DEMOCRATISATION AND ECONOMIC REFORM HAD TO BE CAREFULLY DEFINED, AND CONCRETE DECISIONS WERE NEEDED ON HOW TO IMPROVE BOTH THE POLITICAL SYSTEM AND THE PARTY IN ITS ROLE AS THE POLITICAL AVANTGARD.

CENTRAL COMMITTEE PLENUM

- 1. THE PLENUM OPENED ON 17 FEBRUARY WITH A LENGTHY SPEECH BY LIGACHEV ON THE RESTRUCTURING OF EDUCATION. THE FULL TEXT OF THE SPEECH APPEARS IN TODAY'S PRESS. LIGACHEV'S SPEECH WAS FOLLOWED BY CONTRIBUTIONS FROM THE FLOOR WHICH HAVE NOT YET BEEN PUBLISHED. THE PLENUM CONTINUES TODAY. IT IS CUSTOMARY FOR ANY LEADERSHIP CHANGES TO BE ANNOUNCED AT THE END OF A PLENUM.
- 2. THE FOLLOWING IS THE SUMMARY OF THE MAIN POINTS FROM LIGACHEV'S SPEECH.
- 3. LIGACHEV SAID THAT WIDERANGING REFORM OF THE WHOLE EDUCATION SYSTEM WAS NEEDED AS AN ESSENTIAL PART OF THE PROCESS OF PERESTROIKA. HE IDENTIFIED THREE MAJOR FAILINGS IN THE REFORM PROGRAMME INTRODUCED IN 1984. ITS APPROACH WAS TOO EVOLUTIONARY: THIS CONFLICTED WITH THE REVOLUTIONARY NATURE OF PERESTROIKA. SECONDLY, THE REFORMS WERE BASED ON AN 'EXTENSIVE' APPROACH. THERE WAS NEED FOR GREATER SPECIALISATION. AND FINALLY, THE SYSTEM FOR RUNNING EDUCATION NEEDED DEMOCRATISATION.
- 4. LIGACHEV'S MAIN MESSAGE WAS THE NEED TO GIVE SCHOOLS MORE FLEXIBILITY IN ORDER TO ENABLE THEM TO CONCENTRATE ON DEVELOPING INDIVIDUAL ABILITIES. THERE SHOULD BE NO LEVELLING DOWN. THE PROGRAMME FOR INTRODUCING VOCATIONAL TRAINING INTO BASIC SECONDARY SCHOOL EDUCATION HAD NOT BEEN A SUCCESS, AND SHOULD BE DISCONTINUED. THE NETWORK OF SEPARATE VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS SHOULD BE IMPROVED, IN ORDER TO OVERCOME THE SHORTAGE OF SKILLED WORKERS IN THE ECONOMY. THERE SHOULD BE MUCH CLOSER LINKS WITH INDUSTRY. HIGHER EDUCATION WAS NOT MEETING THE NEEDS OF THE ECONOMY. THERE WERE TOO MANY ENGINEERS TRAINED IN SOME AREAS AND A SHORTAGE IN OTHERS. THERE WAS AN ACUTE SHORTAGE OF ECONOMISTS. A NETWORK OF TRAINING CENTRES SHOULD BE ESTABLISHED FOR RETRAINING WORKERS AND UPGRADING THEIR SKILLS.
- 5. INVESTMENT IN EDUCATION HAD DECLINED FROM 11% OF THE BUDGET IN 1970 TO 8% IN 1986. 21% OF SCHOOLS HAD NO CENTRAL HEATING, 30%

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HAD NO RUNNING WATER AND 40% NO DRAINAGE. THE NUMBER OF PLACES AT PRE-SCHOOL INSTITUTIONS WAS 1 MILLION SHORT OF DEMAND. IN MANY AREAS THE SWITCH FROM SCHOOL ENTRY AT 6 YEARS RATHER THAN 7 WAS ONLY BEING MANAGED BY 2, AND IN SOME CASES 3 SHIFT, SYSTEMS. THE RATE OF BUILDING OF NEW SCHOOLS WOULD DOUBLE IN THE NEXT TWO 5 YEAR PLANS IN ORDER TO PROVIDE 28 MILLION NEW PLACES BETWEEN 1990 AND THE YEAR 2000. THE PROGRAMME FOR EQUIPPING SCHOOLS WITH COMPUTERS WOULD HAVE TO BE SPEEDED UP. IN ORDER TO IMPROVE THE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM FOR EDUCATION, EDUCATIONAL COUNCILS WILL BE ESTABLISHED INCLUDING REPRESENTATIVES OF PUPILS, PARENTS AND LOCAL FIRMS AS WELL AS TEACHERS. HIGHER EDUCATIONAL ESTABLISHMENTS WILL BE EXPECTED TO OBTAIN SOME FUNDS FOR FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS FROM INDUSTRY.

6. LIGACHEV ALSO DEALT WITH THE NEED TO IMPROVE POLITICAL AND IDEOLOGICAL TEACHINGS IN SCHOOLS. APOLITICISM, AND THE INFLUENCE OF BOURGEOIS MORALITY WAS INCREASING, AS WERE DISTORTED NATIONALIST SENTIMENTS, THE RESULTS OF WHICH HAD BEEN SEEN IN RECENT EVENTS IN ALMA ATA, THE BALTIC REPUBLICS AND YAKUTIA. FURTHER IMPROVEMENT WAS NEEDED IN THE TEACHING OF SOCIAL SCIENCES IN ORDER TO COPE WITH THE GROWING INTEREST OF THE YOUNG IN THE PROBLEMS OF PERESTROIKA AND DEMOCRATISATION AND TO ENABLE THEM TO UNDERSTAND THEIR HISTORY. LIGACHEV CONDEMNED THE GROWING TENDENCY, IN THE NAME OF GLASNOST, TO REPRESENT SOVIET HISTORY AS A SERIES OF MISTAKES AND CRIMES, AND THE LACK OF EMPHASIS GIVEN TO THE SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE SOVIET SYSTEM. THIS WAS SHAMEFUL HE SAID. SOCIAL SCIENCE TEACHERS MUST ENSURE THAT THE YOUNG WERE TAUGHT THE SUBJECT FROM A CLASS POSITION AND THAT THEY UNDERSTOOD CLASS NATURE OF THE CHANGES TAKING PLACE IN THE COUNTRY. IT MUST BE MADE CLEAR THAT THERE WAS NO INTENTION OF 'LIBERALISING' SOVIET SOCIETY IN THE WESTERN SENSE, OR OF COPYING BOURGEOIS LIBERALISM IN ANY WAY.

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^{7.} LIGACHEV ALSO STRESSED THE NEED TO GIVE GREATER ATTENTION TO AESTHETIC EDUCATION, AND CONDEMNED THE CURRENT FAD FOR ''PRIMITIVE'' MUSIC AMONG THE YOUNG. I promised to provide further views on Gorbachev's major anniversary speech on 2 November. You will now have seen Moscow telno 1590 containing Sir Bryan Cartledge's further comments, in addition to the account in his initial series of telegrams 3 (1575-8). I am indebted also to Mr Murrell's analysis in what C follows, though he may not agree with it wi of it. 2. I agree with Sir Bryan Cartledge's adjusted view that expectations of the speech had been unduly raised (partly through the fault of the Russians themselves), and that on this occasion-a celebration of 70 years - Gorbachev had to take a positive overall view of Soviet history and achievements. Viewed in this light (and compared with what we might have expected only a year . or two ago), the speech was pretty forthright; though it did not go as far in the den unciation of Stalin as Krushchev's secret speech at the 20th Party Congress. 3. On the other hand, it has not broken much new ground probably not as much as Gorbachev would have liked. There is reason to suppose that he may have watered down his original text following the Central Committee plenum debate about it. 4. Sir Bryan gives the speech 6 out of 10 for glasnost, and a much higher mark for political judgement. Mr Murrell gives it less than 6 out of 10 for glasnost. The marking matters because, as Mr Murrell points out, the opening up of the Soviet past, and the questioning of features of the Soviet system, serves to widen Gorbachev's options for future reform. Thus the debate about history is also a debate about policy. My judgement is that Gorbachev wanted to go further in his speech than he felt able to; and that he will return to the charge. In the meantime his formulations have not, so far as I can see, closed off options for reform. 5. Two major related questions arise from the speech and surrounding events: the strength of Gorbachev's own position and the prospects for the changes he is trying to bring about in Soviet society. The JIC will look at the first of these

questions next week.

(i) Gorbachev's position The differences in the Politburo and Central Committee about glasnost and the pace of change came into the open at the Central Committee plenum with the row between Eltsin and Ligachev. The twists and turns over the Washington summit also probably owed something to Gorbachev's desire to secure his flanks against the charge of seeming soft on the Americans. It is clear that Gorbachev has to take the views of Ligachev and others seriously. Though temperamentally he stands in the tradition of the autocratic one-man Russian leader, he is still shackled by the restraints of collectivity, and of course by the inertia and resistance of the human material he has to deal with. The whole tenor of his speech, including the striking lack of references to glasnost (only one) and the implied rebute to Eltsin, show the restraints he is under. Gorbachev's personal commitment to change is so strong that I find it implausible to suppose that he will allow himself to be reined in for long. Events since 2 November, including the references in his 4 November speech to past mistakes in dealings with other communist parties, and statements reported in the press here about the need to review the 1968 invasion of Czechoslovakia, show that the agenda of possible change has not been narrowed.

It is very difficult to be sure from the outside how much support Gorbachev has inside the Politburo, the Central Committee and the Party more widely. It is common ground amongst observers that he has moved skilfully to achieve a majority of "his" men in key positions. But that begs the question whether all of these fully support his views and the pace of change he is trying to push through. It is clear that resistance in the Party and government bureacracy is considerable and may even be increasing. There is no evidence that it has yet crystallised around one of the so-called conservatives, eg Ligachev.

(ii) The Future of Gorbachev's Reforms Gorbachev's Murmansk and Leningrad speeches, and indeed parts of the 70th anniversary speech, testify to his impatience to see implemented the economic and other changes he seeks. He believes, rightly in my view, that once the momentum of change is allowed to slacken, it will be difficult or impossible to restore if. There is at times a note of near desperation in his calls for attitudes to change and old thinkers to get out of the way. But fact is that real change is

proving slow to achieve, particularly in the economy; and,

resistance seems if anything to be growing.

It has always seemed to me probable that, as the difficulty of his reforming mission becomes apparent, Gorbachev would be driven to further and more radical attempts to impose perestroika. He has to face the possibility that his reforms may be incompatible with the "system" as in its present stage of evolution (ie centralised one-party rule); that the system is now striking back, and that he has no mandate from his colleagues to change this system in the fundamental ways he sees as necessary. Some outside observers (an increasing number) are concluding that he is doomed to failure, since economic and social reform on the

scale he is proposing contradict the grip of the party and cannot therefore be allowed. This may be right. But we should not underestimate the force of Gorbachev's personality, the power of his position as General Secretary, and the weight of the evidence of current failures to which he can point. shessful 6. All in all, there may be a/period ahead inside the Kremlin. Further tensions within the leadership are likely. An eventual showdown between Gorbachev and others cannot be ruled out. 7. Are there conclusions to be drawn for our own policy? We have based ourselves hitherto on the premise that whatever we do or say can only have a marginal influence on the main political and economic developments inside the Soviet Union, and that we therefore do best to safeguard our own interests carefully while watching with interest and welcoming developments which go in the direction of a more open and cohabitable Soviet society. I see no reason to change that view. 8. One final thought. I wonder whether we should go on refering to Gorbachev as a "convinced Communist" and "believer in the system". It may be more accurate to say "a convinced believer in Leninist opportunism" who will shape the system and the ideology) to his own practical priorities. Machenery Smith M J Llewellyn Smith U92AAJ

At the October 1964 plenum of the CPSU Central Committee there was a change in the MAMMIMM leadership of the Party and country, and decisions were adopted to overcome the MAMMIMM libertarian tendencies and distortions in domestic and foreign policy. The Party strove to achieve some stabilization of policy and to provide it with realistic features and a solid foundation.

The March and September 1965 plenums of the CPSU Central Committee put forward a fresh approach in the guidance of the economy. An economic reform and large-scale programmes for opening up new areas and developing the country's productive forces were drawn up and a start was made to their implementation. In the first few years this altered the situation in the country for the better. There was an increase in the economic and scientific potential. The defence capability was strengthened. There was a rise in the level of the people's wellbeing. Many foreign-policy actions were carried out which consolidated the international prestige of our State. A military and strategic parity with the USA was ensured.

At the April 1985 Plenum of the Party Central Committee and the 27th Congress the Party frankly specified the reasons for the situation that had come about, who revealed the mechanism that was slowing down our development, and gave a principled assessment of it. It was emphasized that during the latter years of the life and activities of Leonid Ilyich Brezhnev the search for the way to achieve further progress was to a great extent Minimum held back by an adherence to customary formulas and schemes that did not reflect the new realities. There was an increasing gap between word and deed. There was a build-up of negative processes in the economy, which had in effect created a pre-crisis situation. Many anomalous features had arisen in the social, spiritual and moral spheres, which were distorting and deforming the principles of socialist justice, MANAGEMENT the people's faith in it and giving rise to social alienation and amorality in various forms. The mounting divergence between the lofty principles of socialism and the everyday reality of life became intolerable. The healthy forces in the Party and society as a whole felt more and more acutely the insistent requirement and need to overcome the negative features , interrupt the course of events, ensure an acceleration

of the country's socio-economic development and achieve a moral cleansing and renewal of socialism. A response to this most acute social requirement was the concept and strategy **MYMMANAM*** for accelerating the socio-economic development of the country, which **were put forward by the April 1985 Plenum of the Central Committee, and were the course for **MANAMM** revitalizing socialism, which **/WAM** developed theoretically and **MANAMM** politically in the decisions of the 27th Congress and subsequent plenums of the Central Committee and were formulated into the general line for the revolutionary restructuring of all aspects of life in socialist society.

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Continuing the cause of the October, restructuring has put forward as a task of the highest priority the further deepening and development of socialist democracy. The democratization of society is the soul of restructuring; and on the future progress of democratization will depend also the success of restructuring itself and, it can be said without exaggeration, the future of socialism as a whole. This is the firmest guarantee of the transformation of policy and of the economy, and it excludes any backward movement. The reforms that are now taking place in this country are possibly the biggest step since the October on the path of the development of socialist democratism. In restructuring our economic and political system, we are obliged to create, first, a reliable and flexible mechanism by which to ensure that all the working people do, in reality, become involved in deciding the affairs of the State and of societ Secondly, we must in practice teach people to live in the conditions created by

a deepening democracy; widen - widen and strengthen - human rights;

and fuse the modern political culture of the masses. In other words, we must teach and learn democracy. As we mark the 70th anniversary of our Revolution, as we take thought for the future, we must look more closely at how the process of the democratization of society is going and what is hindering it.

Here there are considerable difficulties and contradictions, at times unexpected. There is no avoiding the struggle of what is new and progressive with what is old and obsolete. There is a degree of uncertainty and indecision.

In the first days after the October, Vladimir Ilyich Lenin noted that the workers and peasants were still timid; that they were not yet determined enough; that they had not yet come to terms with the fact that they themselves must take into their hands all the levers of government. But the power, vitality and invincibility of the October Revolution of 1917, wrote Lenin, lay precisely in the fact that it was awakening these qualities, breaking down all the old

impediments; that it was tearing away the delapidated trammels and leading the working people out onto the road of the independent creative endeavour of the new life. Now, too, we see how difficult it is for people to get the feel of a new situation - to accustom themselves to the possibility and necessity of living and deciding all questions by democratic methods. Many are still afraid, act circumspectly, are chary of responsibility and remain in thrall to outdated rules and instructions. The task is to instil in people a taste for independence and responsibility in their approach to industrial and public affairs on whatever scale; to develop self-government as the power of the people, exercised by the people itself and in the interests of the people. The development of self-governmen will proceed above all through the Soviets, which must, in accordance with the Party's designs, fully justify their role as plenipotentiary organs of decision. Recently, the rights and opportunities of the Soviets at all levels have been considerably expanded. That process will continue, and therefore the Soviets will

gather strength and Soviet democracy will deepen. We have begun to improve the electoral system. The elections held in June of this year have convinced us of the rightness and fruitfulness of the new approaches. They demonstrated the increased political activeness of the people, and the interest that people have in seeing that it really is the best representatives of the workers who get elected to the Soviets - though once again, formalism and over-organization were not avoided. Restructuring and the development of democracy make it possible to turn on at full capacity the energy, possibilities and rights of the trade unions, the Komsomol and other public organizations, including those that have come into being in recent years, such as the All-Union Organization of War and Labour Veterans, the Women's Councils, the Soviet Culture Fund and the Vladimir Ilyich Lenin Children's Fund. It is important that their day-to-day activities should be concerned with solving vitally important tasks and should reflect the interests of the broad masses of the working people. Much that is new and promising has appeared in the labour kollektivs and in work linked to place of

residence. A wide scope is opening up for useful initiative, so that all vital questions may be settled efficiently and without red tape. The new processes that have got underway in our country also pose in a new way the question of general political and legal standards, which I would call the culture of socialist democratism. It is to a large extent the lack of that culture that gives rise to such defects as bureaucracy and abuse of power; undue reverence for rank; bad management and irresponsibility.

The true culture of Socialist democracy will never accept either a commandpressure style nor organisational_y wooliness, the substitution for business
of empty conversations - the one and the other are alien to Socialism. There
is no doubt either about something else - the broader and deeper democracy, the
more attention is required by socialist legality and law and order, the more
we need organisation and conscious discipline.

The culture of democracy cannot be limited to the political sphere.

It must penetrate all spheres of human relations. Comrades, the world would not have been as we now see it if it were not for the great revolution in Russia. Up until this turning point in the world history, the right of the strong and the rich, as well as wars of aggression were the customary norm of international relations. By its first legislative act - the famous decree on peace - the Soviet power began to lead the struggle against this state of affairs. The country of the soviets brought into international practice what previously was outside the framework MATOR FOLITICS of big policy: people's common sense and the interests of the working masses. During the brief years when Lenin was in charge of Soviet foreign policy, he not only worked out its starting principles, but also showed how to implement them in a most unusual, drastically changing situation.

Indeed, contrary to the initial expectations, the breaking of the weakest link of the capitalist system was not the final, decisive battle, but a beginning of a protracted and complex process. One of the greatest services rendered by the founder of the Soviet state was that he saw in good time the real prospects opening up for the new Russia as a result of the victorious end of the Civil War. As he conceived, the country not only succeeded in getting a breathing space, but also something much bigger - a new period of time when our main international existence within the network of capitalist states was won.

And Lenin decisively suggested the course of learning and getting to know how to co-exist with them for a long time.

Counterbalancing left wing extremism, he found a basis for the possibility of states with different social systems AFTER THE CIVIL WAR, to co-exist peacefully. Only a year and a half to two years were needed to bring the workers' and peasants' state out of the foreign political isolation. Treaties with the neighbouring countries and then with Germany of in Rapallo were concluded. England, France, Italy, Sweden and other capitalist states extended diplomatic recognition to the Soviet Republic. First steps were taken to establish equal relations with the states in the East: China, Turkey, Iran and Afghanistan.

All this does not simply represent the victories of Leninist foreign policy and diplomacy - it was embarking on a fundamentally new international development. The most important direction of our foreign policy was laid and we call it by rights the Leninist course for peace, mutually advantageous co-operation among states and friendship among peoples.

Naturally, not all our subsequent foreign policy work consisted of successes and achievements alone. There were errors. It was not always and not everywhere, before and after the second world war alike, that we succeeded in making use of the opportunities that were opening up.

We were unable to make use of the enormous moral prestige with which the USSR emerged from the war to consolidate peaceloving, democratic forces and to stop the organisers of the cold war.

Our reaction to the provocative actions of imperialism was not always adequate. Yes, some things could have been done better and more effective action could have been taken.

Nonetheless, we are able, at this festive time, to state:
the fundamental line of our policy invariably adhered to the
general direction worked out and laid by Lenin - that is to say
in accordance with the nature of socialism, its fundamental orientation
towards peace. (applause).

Together with our allies we inflicted a defeat on the imperialist strategy of rolling back socialism. Imperialism had to moderate its claims to world supremacy. At the present stage, it is on the results of our own peace-loving policies that we have been able to rely, elaborating new approaches in the spirit of the new thinking. Lenin's conception of peaceful co-existence has, naturally, undergone changes. In the beginning it was justified primarily by the need to create the minimum external conditions for the construction of a new society in the country of the socialist revolution. But while being a continuation of the class policy of the victorious proletariat, peaceful co-existence has gone on, especially in the nuclear age, to become transformed into a condition for the survival of the whole of mankind. The April (1985) Plenum of the CPSU Central Committee also became a milestone in the development of Leninist thought along this same avenue. The 27th congress provided a new external economic conception in detailed form. Its point of departure, you will recall, is the following idea: in spite of the profoundly contradictory nature of the modern world, and the fundamental differences of the states which comprise it, it is mutually connected, mutually dependent, and forms a definite integral whole. This is brought about by the internationalisation



of world economic links, the all-encompassing nature of the scientific and technical revolution, the fundamentally new role of the media and communications, the condition of the planet's resources, the overall ecological danger, and the glaring social problems of the developing world which affect everyone; but mainly it is brought about by the rise of the problem of the survival of humankind, for the appearance and the threat of the use of nuclear weapons has placed a question mark over its very existence. Lenin's idea of the priority of interests of social development has thus acquired new sense and meaning. Starting from the April Plenum, we have told everyone sufficiently clearly how we picture the movement towards a secure and solid peace. Our intentions and our will are recorded in the decisions of the supreme poliitcal forum of the party, the 27th congress, in the new edition of the CPSU Programme, in the programme for nuclear disarmament as set out in the statement of 15th January 1986, in the Delhi Declaration, and in other documents, and in the official speeches of the leading figures of the Soviet Union. The states of the Warsaw Treaty

We have put forward specific plans, and are actively striving for the banning and elimination of chemical weapons. We have resolutely advocated strengthening the authority of the UN, making full and effective use of the rights which have been invested in it and its organs by the international community. We do everything in our power in order that the UN, this universal mechanism, can with full authority discuss and work to guarantee a collective quest, a balance of the interests of all states, and effectively carry out its peace-making functions.

The Western world is full of theories that the working class is disappearing. They write that it has already dissolved in the middle class, has been socially reborn, and so on and so forth. Sure, there are large and considerable changes in the working class, but the class opponent is in vain lulling himself and trying to disorganise, to disorientate and to confuse the workers' movement istelf. The working class now, in its new social frontiers, represents a numerically predominatn force and possesses the potential to play a decisive role, all the more so at the sharp turning-points of history. The transition to a new phase of the technological revolution on a militarist basis is a strong catalyst, especially as is the path to war; and that means that it affects all strata of the population and expands the extent of mass protest beyond the limits of economic demands. exploitation of the third world, the question of the unacceptability and intolerability of a system which is incapable of existing without it could reach the political plane, and very sharply. In general, and from this point of view, capitalism faces hard choices: to take matters as far as an explosion, or to take account of the laws of an interrelated, integral world, which demands a balance of interests on the basis of equal rights; and according to the situation as we see it, this is not only necessary, but possible, especially as forces in the third world itself are operating in that very direction.

It is customary to talk of the decline of the national liberation movement, but what is going on nere, obviously, is a substitution of concepts and a non-recognition of the new nature of the situation. If the liberating impulse which operated at the stage of the struggle for political independence is meant, then it is weakening, of course, and that is natural. But the impulse necessary for the new, present stage of development of the third world is only just taking shape; and it is necessary to be clearly aware of this and not to fall into pessinism. The factors from which this impulse is formed are varied and heterogeneous. Here there is a powerful economic process which sometimes takes on paradoxical forms: for example, some countries retain features uf underdevelopment

and emerge at the level of great powers in world economics and politics. 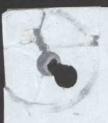

WE LOOK FOR AND to the October Days that shook the world and / still find Today, we turn in them both a firm spiritual support and instructive lessons. Again and again We are/convinced of the rightness of the Socialist choice made by October. The objective logic itself of the historical progress of mankind led to this frontier. The October Revolution, with all the contradictoriness and the many variations of the path of civilisation's forward movement, was the logical result of the development of the ideas and practice of the centuries-old struggle of the working people for freedom and peace and for social justice against class, national and spiritual oppression. The year 1917 showed that the choice between Socialism and capitalism is the main social alternative of our age and that there is no way to advance in the 20th century without moving towards a higher form of social organisation, and to Socialism. This fundamental Leninist conclusion is no less topical today than when it was reached. Such is the logical pattern of forward social development. became The Revolution in Russia / as it were the pinnacle of aspirations of liberation, the living embodiment of the dreams of the mankind's best minds from the great humanists of the past to the proletarian revolutionaries of the 19th and 20th centuries. The year 1917 absorbed the energy of the people's struggle INDEPENDENCE THEIR OWN for independent development and autonomy, of the progressive national it movements and the peasant risings and wars against serfdom which are typical of our history. It

embodied the spiritual quests of the enlighteners of the 18th century, the heroes and martyrs of the Decembrist movement, the ardent tribunes of revolutionary HEROIC ENDEAVOUR democracy and the moral ascetism of the great figures of our culture. For our country's destiny, there was/determining significance in the time when, at the dawn of the 20th century, Vladimir Ilyich Lenin, took with him a closely serried group of like-thinkers on the road towards creating a proletarian party of a new kind in Russia. And it was precisely this great Leninist party that raised the people and its best and honourable forces to storm the old world. The foundation of October's success was the corner-stone laid by the first Russian Revolutions of Here were the bitter lessons of 9th January and the desperate 1905 and 1907. heriosm of Moscow's December barricades, the feat of thousands of freedomfighters, known and unknown and the birth of the first workers soviets, the prototype of Soviet power. The victory of Great October grew out of the gains of the February Revolution of 1917 that was the first triumphant popular revolution of the age of imperialism. After the February victory the development of the Revolution proceeded with incredible speed. In it the main characters were the workers and peasants, clad in soldiers' overcoats. The spring of 1917 showed the might of the nation-wide popular (MN Russian obshchenarodnogo) movement. At the THERE WERE DISPLAYED same time its limitations appeared. the contradictions of revolutionary consciousness at that stage, the forces of historical inertia as a result of which

the exploiting classes that were departing from the stage were able for a time to make use of the fruits of the people's victory. The February Revolution put the major weapon into the hands of October; the organisation of authority in the form of the re-born soviets. February was the first experience of real democracy and the political education of the masses in practice which was acquired in the very complex conditions of diarchy. February is unique in its opportunity for the peaceful transfer of power to the hands of the working people, an opportunity BECOME A REALITY that did not, sadly, materialise because of the historical circumstances of reality. February was a most important historical stage on the road to October. In the complex inter-twining and confrontation of the class forces that took part in THE VICTORY OF the February Revolution, Lenin brilliantly perceived the opening opportunity for REVOLUTION a Socialist Nictory. The April Theses were the scientific foresight of and a model for the revolutionary programme of action in those historical conditions. Lenin did not only demonstrate the logic of development of the bourgeois democratic revolution into Socialist revolution but the form of that process as well, via the soviets, via their becoming Bolshevik, the essence of which lay in assisting the people, the masses to comprehend the meaning of their own struggle and to bring about revolution consciously, in their own interests. To MAKE A for collective creative seearch, to renounce stereotypes and slogans which only yesterday in a different situation had seemed indisputable and the only possible ones.

It can be said that the very flow of Lenin's thought, the whole activity of the Bolsheviks, which was distinguished for its quick change of forms and methods of work, flexibility and unconventionality of tactical solutions, political boldness - is a most brilliant model of anti-dogmatic, genuinely dialectic and therefore new thinking. foundation for the further development of the Revolution and essentially the foundation of social salvation and prevention of national disaster.

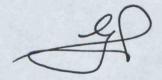

The socialist revolution was accomplished in a country with an average level of development of capitalism, a high concentration of industry, a predominantly peasant population and deep remnants of feudalism and even of preceding social formations. Russia had given the world the highest achievements in the sphere of science and culture, but three quarters of her population was illiterate. country had been ravaged to the extremes by the imperialist war and undistinguished leadership. Construction of the new life had no models; it required a tireless search for creative solutions. The goal was clear for the party of communists: revolution and the path of socialism, Soviet power. Lenin led the party along this path. The MEXICA principles and norms of the future socialist system and forms of which were without precedent in history organising society crystallised in the lively creativity of the masses and the most complex material of Russia with her many structures. What were at first purely theoretical ideas about forms of people's power, means and limits of the socialisation of property, organisation of socialist production, setting up new, comradely discipline and about the place and role of the person in the new society were put into more precise form and filled with real living content. The MRAN main meaning of October was the creation of a new life. It did not break off for a single day, and even a short respite was used to build and seek ways towards the The beginning of the twenties was marked with a great take-off

by the people's initiative and creativity. They became a genuine revolutionary laboratory of social innovation, the search for the optimal forms for the alliance between the working class and the labouring peasantry and the snaping of a mechanism for implementing the whole spectrum of the interests of labouring WAR-COMMUNISM people. The party went over from the /war communist methods of organising APPLIED OF NECESSITY production and consumption, which were forced in the conditions of war and destruction, to more flexible, economically-based and regular instruments of influencing social reality. The measures of the New Economic Policy were directed at weeks constructing the material foundatinos of socialism. We are now turning more and more often to Lienin's last works and to the Leninist ideas of the New Economic Policy and striving to take from that experience everything which is valuable and necessary for us today. Of course, it would be erroneous to/put up a sign of equality between NEP and what we are doing at the present time, at a fundamentally different stage of development. We do not have in the country today the individual peasant farmers, the arrangement of an alliance with whom determined the most pressing goals of economic policy in the twenties. But NEP had a more far-reaching aim, too. The task was set of constructing a new society, not directly on the enthusiasm, as Lenin wrote, but, with the help of the enthusians brought forth by the great revolution, on personal interest, personal

A system of views/and the actual concept of, construction of socialism in our country took shape in Lenin's last works, which were endowed with an unusual degree of intellectual and emotional concentration. This comprises the Party's great theoretical wealth.

Vladimir Ilyich Lenin's premature death was a profound shock for the
entire Party and the Soviet people. Grief exceeded all bounds; the loss was
irreparable - everyone understood this. Tasks of colossal historical significance
lay ahead:

'without Lenin, but relying on his teachings and
behests, the Party leadership was to seek the optimum solutions capable of

consolidating the achivements of the revolution and bringing the country to socialism, in the specific conditions of the Soviet Russia of that time.

History delivered a harsh ultimatum to the new order: either to survive, by creating in the shortest possible time its own socio-economic and technical base, and to give mankind its first experience of just organization of society; or to burn out, and remain in the memory of the ages as, at best, only a heroic but unsuccessful social experiment. The question of bringing about socialist transformations at an accelerated speed, first and foremost, assumed a vitally important and, in the full sense of the word, erueial/significance.

The period after Lenin, the 1920s and 1930s, occupied a special place in the history of the Soviet state. In just about 15 years or so, radical social changes were brought about.

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The period after Lenin, the 20's and 30's, took up a special place in the history of the Soviet state. Over a period of something like 15 years radical social changes were put into effect. So much was accommodated in these years, both from the point of view of searching for the optimal variants of socialist construction, and from the point of view of actual achievements and the creation of the foundations of a new society. These were years of persistent labour at the limits of human possibilities, of keen struggle at a multitude of levels. Industrialisation, collectivisation, cultural revolution, strengthening the multi-national state, establishing the USSR's international positions, new forms of running the economy and the whole of social life - all of this fell precisely on this period, and all of this had far-reaching consequences. Over the decades we return again and again to this time. This is natural, for it was then that the construction began (APP correcting himself) that the first socialist society in the world was built. This was a feat of historic dimensions and historic significance. Admiration for the feats of our fathers and grandfathers, assessments of our real achievements, will live for ever, like these same feats and achievements. (Applause)

And if today, we look into our history with an occasionally critical gaze, then

only because we want to get a better, a fuller idea of jits path into the future. It is essential to evaluate the past with a sense of historical responsibility and on the basis of historical truth. This has to be done, firstly, by virtue of the enormous importance of those years for the destiny of our state and for the destiny of socialism; secondly, because these years lie at the centre of discussions of many years' standing, both in our country and abroad, in which along with a questing for the truth, attempts are often made to discredit socialism as a new social system, and as a real alternative to capitalism; finally, we need trughful evaluations of this and of all the other periods of our history, especially at the present time, when restructuring has got under way; they are are needed not to settle political scores, or as they say, to unburden our souls, but to render due tribute to everything that was heroic in the past, and to learn lessons from mistakes and miscalculations. And so, about the 20's and 30's after Lenin. Regardless of the fact that the party and society were equipped with Lenin's conception of building socialism and with the work of Vladimir Ilyich Lenin after the October period, the quest for a path was very difficult, in a keen ideological struggle and an atmosphere of political discussions. The central place in these discussions came to be occupied by the fundamental problems of the development of society,

primarily, the question of the possibility of building socialism in our country. Theoretical thought and practice were searching - along which avenues, and in what forms are social and economic transformations to be effected? How is their solution to be guaranteed on a socialist basis, in the specific historical conditions in which the Soviet Union found itself? There was placed on the agenda practical, constructive work which required the highest sense of responsibility. First and foremost the question arose in acute form of the industrialisation of the country and the reconstruction of the economy, without which socialist construction and the strengthening of defence capacity were unthinkable. This followed from Lenin's direct instructions, and from his theoretical legacy. In this same context, and also in accordance with Lenin's behests, the question arose of socialist transformations in rural areas. It was thus a question of the most major, crucial matters, problems and tasks. And although the party, I repeat, had at its disposal Lenin's directions on these questions, keen discussions unfolded around them.

The concrete conditions of those times, both the internal and the international ones, put forward a substantial raising of the rate of socialist construction as a vital task. Bukharin and his supporters, in their calculations and theoretical attitudes effectively underestimated the significance of the factor of the times in the construction of

To a large extent their position was determined by dogmatic thinking, by a lack of dialectic approach in their appraisal of the specific situation. Both Bu kharin himself and his supporters soon recognized their mistakes.

In this connection it is worth recalling the description of Bukharin given by Lenin: Bukharin is not just a most valuable and major theoretician in the party. He is also legitimately considered to be the pet of the whole party. But his theoretical outlook can only be regarded with very great doubt as being fully Marxist, for in him there is something of the scholasticist. He has never learned dialectics, and I don't think he has ever fully understood it.

Life once again confirmed that Lenin was right. Thus the political debates of those times reflected the complex process in the Party's development, typified by bitter struggle over the most important problems of socialist construction. END PART ELEVEN (mtf)

single burst, industrialisation brought the country to a qualitatively new

level. By the end of the 30s, the Soviet Union had occupied first place in Europe for idustrial output production and the second in the world and had the second in the world and had indeed become algreat industrial power. warned about in his time. A corresponding management structure and planning WITH THE SIZE THAT IT WAS methods also began to take shape. In industry, / for its volume at the time, when all the main/facilities of the industrial edifice were literally in the public eye, these methods and this system of management generally yielded their results. However, such a rigid system of centralization and command was inadmissible in resolving the tasks of transforming the countryside. It has to be said frankly: at that new stage not enough/attention was paid, in the Leninist way, to the interests of the working peasantry. And most importantly, they underestimated the fact that as a class, the peasantry had changed fundamentally over the years since the Revolution. The middle-level peasant became the chief figure; he became established as his own master, this peasant toiler, who had received his land from the Revolution and who over whole decade had become convinced of the fact that Soviet rule was also his rule. He became a true and reliable ally of the working class, an ally on a new basis, and he satisfied himself in practice that his life was increasingly turning for the better And if a little more consideration had been given to objective economic laws, if more attention had been paid to the social processes taking place in the countrysic if generally attitudes towards that huge mass of working peasantry - most of whom took part in the Revolution and defended it from the White Guards and the

Interventionists — had been better regulated politically, and if a policy of alliance with the middle-level peasants against the kulaks had been consistently conducted, then there would not have been any of the excesses which took place when collectivization was carried out. Today it is clear that in the great cause which affected the fates of the majority of the country's population a deviation policy from Leminist/was committed in relation to the peasantry. The management of this most important and very complex social process, where a great deal depended on local conditions, was carried out primarily by administrative methods.

Such, comrades, is the historical reality.

But, comrades, if we are to assess the importance of collectivisation, overall, in the strengthening of the positions of socialism in the countryside, then in the final analysis it was a turning-point of fundamental importance. Collectivisation decented a radical change in the whole structure of the life of the basic mass of the population of the country on socialist foundations. It created the social

of cultivatory management, made possible a significant increase in labour

productivity and released a important number of working hands which were necessary

for other spheres of socialist construction. All this had historic consequences.

For an understanding of the situation in those years, one must bear in mind that the administrative command system, which began to take shape in the course of the industrialisation and received a new impetus during the collectivisation, had effects on all the whole public and political life of the country. Having consolidated its position in the economy, it began also spread to the suprestructure, limiting the unfolding of the democratic potential of socialism and restraining the progress of socialist democracy. But what I have said does not indee the all the complexities of that period.

What happened here? The phase of the most serious ideological and was political tests from the party were virtually behind it. Millions of people set about working on implementing socialist transformations with enthusiasm, and the first successes began to appear. And, at this very time, the methods dictated by the period of struggle against the hostile resistance of the exploiting classes were mechanically transferred into the period of peaceful socialist contruction, when conditions had changed fundamentally. An atmosphere of intolerance, emmity

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and suspicion was being created in the country. This political practice went on
to broaden and was substantiated with the erroneous theory of stepping up the class
- struggle in the process of building socialism. All this had a ruinous effect upon
the socio-political development of the country and had grave consequences. It is
perfectly obvious that the lack of the proper level of democratisation of Soviet
society was precisely what made possible both the personality cult and the violations
of the law, arbitrariness and prepressions of the 1930s -- to be blunt, real
crimes based on the abuse of power.

Many thousands of members of the Party and non-Party members were subjected to mass repressions. That, comrades, is the bitter truth. Serious damage was done to the cause of socialism and the authority of the Party, and we must speak bluntly about this. 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There is a lot of discussion now about Stalin's role in our history. His personality was extremely contradictory. Holding positions both Stalin's contribution of historical truth, we must see how indisputable was Stalin's contribution to the struggle for socialism and the defence of its gains, as well as a rhitrarmus the gross political errors and truency permitted of occur by him and his those around him, for which our people paid a great price and which had serious consequences for the life of our society.

Some_times it is said that Stalin did not know about the instances of lawlessness. Documents in our possession that this is not so. The guilt of Stalin and those closest to him before the Party and the people for the mass repressions and lawlessness that were permitted are immense and impardonable. This is a lesson for all generations.

Of course, despite the assertions of our ideological enemies, the cult of personality was not unavoidable. It is alien to the nature of socialism and represents a deviation from its fundamental principles and thus cases has no justification.

At the 20th and the list 22nd Party Congresses both the cult of Stalin and its consequences were harshly condemned. We now know that the political accusations and repressions against a number of figures in Party and state, against many Communists and non-Party members, economic and military cadres, academics and cultural figures were the result of deliberate falsification. We must do this, especially since even now we still encounter attempts to turn one's back on sore questions of our history, to hush them up, to pretend that nothing special happened. Being/rejected owing to our socialist origins, under no circumstances could we be right in the eyes of imperialism. As I have already said, Western right wing circles, trying to whitewash their sins, are trying striving to persuade people that the Soviet-German non-aggression pact of the 23d of August 1939 triggered the Nazist invasion of Poland and, through ascement this, the Second World War. It is known from the documents that the date for Germany's invasion of Poland, no later than 1st September, had been set as early as 3rd April 1939, that is long before the Soviet-German pact. In London, Paris and Washington they knew all the ins and outs down to the smallest details of the preparations for the Polish campaign, just as they knew that the only obstacle capable of stopping the Hitlerites could be the conclusion, no later than August 1939, of an Anglo-Franco-Soviet military alliance. These plans were also known to the leadership of our country, and for this reason it tried to convince Britain and France of the need for collective measures. It also appealed to the Polish government of the time for co-operation with a view to ending aggression. But the western powers had other calculations: to lure the USSR with a promise of an alliance, and thereby to hamper the conclusion of the non-aggression pact which had been offered to us, to deprive us of the possibility of better preparing ourselves for the inevitable attack by Hitlerite Germany on the USSR. Nor can we forget the fact that in August 1939 the Soviet Union was faced with the real threat of war on two fronts, in the west with Germany, and in the east with Japan which had unleashed a bloody conflict on the Halhyn gol river. But life and death, scorning



the myths, came into their own, a new chapter, the hardest and most difficult was opening. in modern history, // t that stage, however, we managed to put off the clash with the enemy, such an enemy that left both himself and his adversary one choice to vanquish or to perish. The aggression thrust upon us was a merciless test of the vitality of the socialist system, of the strength of the multi-national Soviet state, of the strength of the patriotic spirit of Soviet people, and this test by fire and sword we passed, comrades! (Applause) Passed because that war became for our people the Great Fatherland War, for in a struggle with such an enemy as German fascism it was a question of life or death, of whether we were to be free or fall into slavery; passed because the war became nation-wide, everyone came to the defence of the native land, old and young, men and women, all nationalities and ethnic groups of the great country. Also entering their first battle was the generation born of October and brought up by the socialist system. Unprecedented fortitude and heroism on the battlefields, the courageous struggle of the partisans and underground fighters behind the front line, virtually round-the-clock tireless labour in the rear - this is what this war was for us. Soviet people fought and laboured defending the homeland, the socialist



common home, the Soviet people did not flinch, did not bend, neither under the blows of the first failures and defeats, nor under the burden of millions of deaths, torments and sufferings. From the first day they firmly believed in the future victory. In soldiers's greatcoats, in workers' overalls, they did everything at the limits and beyond the limits of human strength to bring closer that long-awaited day. And when, on the 1,418th day of war, victory came, the entire world that had been saved breathed freely, paying due tribute to the Soviet people, the victor, the hero, the toiler, their valiant army which had covered thousands of embattled kilometres, each of which cost many lives, and no small amount of blood and sweat. (Applause)

and that communists were demonstrating in deed what it meant to be the vanguard of the people when the flames of war were raging and when it is a question of life and death. One can say with confidence that the years of the Great Fatherland War were one of the most glorious and heroic pages in the life of the Party itself, written with the heroism and bravery and supreme self-sacrifice and commitment of millions of communists. (Applause)

October are indivisible. And there are no forces in the world which could did not simply shatter this unity. Socialism did not only hold out and gain victory: it emerged from the most terrible and destructive of wars, having grown morally stronger, and consolidated its authority and influence throughout the world.

At the end of the war, our foes prophesied that we would suffer economic collapse, that our country would for a long time lose its place in world politics, and considered that it would take us 50 years or more to cope with the consequences of the war. But in a very rapid space of time the Soviet people rehabilitated from the ruins the destroyed towns and villages, raised/plants and factories, collective and state farms, schools and institutions of the consequences as were manifested, the will of the Party motivated by the understanding of the higher interests of the motherland of October; the steadfastness and proletarian wisdom

of the workers, who shouldered the main burden of the peaceful transformation of the country's industrial might and restoring what had been destroyed; the fixe, The self-sacription lendurance and patriotism of the peasantry, who gave their utmost in order to feed the devastated country; and the friendship of the peoples, and mutual assistance, the readiness together to help those who suffered especially, back on their feet and to help/those areas of our common motherland upon which the merciless hand of war had lain particularly heavily.

The source of our achievements, economic and scientific and technical progress, mastery of atomic energy and the first space craft launches, the growth of the cultural and material prosperity of the people, lie in the heroism of the daily round of labour in the difficult post-war years.

But at this same time, a time of new popular upsurge in the name of socialism, the contradictions between what our society had become and the previous methods of leadership made themselves felt increasingly perceptibly.

ABuses of power and violations of socialist legality continued; the Leningrad case, and the doctors' affair were concocted, and not just these. People worked selflessly, studied and streetly sough new knowledge, became reconciled to the difficulties and the shortages, but felt that both anxiety and hope were accumulating in society. And all this gripped public awareness shortly after Stalin's death.

In the mid 1950s, especially after the 20th CPSU COngress, the wind of change swept across the country. The people took heart, livened up, became bolder and more confident. It required no little courage on the part of the Party and its leadership, headed by Krushchev, to criticise the cult of personality and its consequences and to re-establish socialist legality. The previous stereotypes in domestic and foreign policy began to break down. Attempts were made to overcome the bureaucratic methods of management based on command which had become established in the 1930s and 1940s, and to endow socialism with greater dynamism, to underline . humanistic ideals and values and revive the creative spirit of Leninism in theory and practice. The decisions of the September 1953 and July 1955 plenums of the CPSU Central Committee were shot through with the aspiration to change the priorities of economic deevelopment and to set in incentives linked with personal interest in the results of labour. Greater attention began to be paid to the development of agriculture, housing construction, light industry, the consumer sphere and everything connected with satisfying a person's needs. In a word, changes for the better, both in Soviet society and in international relations, were taking place.

However, no few subjectivist errors were committed, which hampered socialism's emergence at a new stage, and which in many respects compromised

GORBACHEV'S 70TH ANNIVERSARY ADDRESS

- 1. We do not yet have a full text of Gorbachev's threespeech earlier today (this will be available from Caversham
 tomorrow morning) but I attach some extracts from the earlier.
 parts of the speech.
- 2. As soon as we have had a chance to look carefully at the full text, I will put up some considered analysis. Meanwhile you may be interested to see two minutes by Mr Murrell of Research Department, one on the speech itself, to which he listened, and one on the dissension within the Politburo which emerged over the weekend. I agree with both of them, in particular his conclusion that if Eltsin goes, Gorbachev's position will be weakened.
- 3. The scene-setting letter to Number Ten which I submitted on 30 October said the degree of openness in Gorbachev's speech, notably about the past, could be an important indication both of the strength of his own position and of the speed and extent of further change within the Soviet Union. First impressions suggest that, on this criterion, Gorbachev may be under greater pressure from his internal opponents (in the Politburo/Central Committee and within the government and party bureaucracy) than we had hitherto thought. This would fit with his uncertain performance over the Washington Summit. It is too soon to say whether this pressure will result in a more cautious Gorbachev than before, and less glasnost. If so, it is likely to be a case of "reculer pour mieux sauter". It is worth noting that the extracts we have seen so far from his book on Perestroika,

/published

published at the weekend, are outspoken across the whole spectrum of Soviet history and economic, political and social life. Moreover the public acknowledgement of the argument at the Central Committee plenum is itself a virtually unprecedented display of glasnost at work.

4. Sir Bryan Cartledge's telegrams reporting the speech are beginning to come in. I am seeing that these go to Number Ten Downing Street.

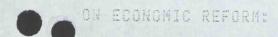

GORBACHEV'S 70TH ANNIVERSARY ADDRESS: FIRST IMPRESSIONS

1. General

There was no radical reappraisal of Soviet history or striking new ideas on perestroika. In general rather duller than anticipated.

2. 1920s

Strong criticism of Trotsky for his anti-Leninist policies are in without abuse. No rehabilitation of Bukharin. His political mistakes were criticised relatively mildly and Lenin's characterisation of his good and bad points quoted.

3. 1930s

Forced industralisation justified - there was no other path possible in the circumstances. Collectivisation also necessary but stronger criticism than hitherto of the methods of collectivisation, especially the treatment of the middle peasants.

4. Stalin

Stalin praised for his contribution to the building of socialism and to victory in the Second World War but condemned for his "unforgivable" role in the mass repressions. Also references to the post-war abuses, eg the Leningrad affair and the "doctors plot". Many victims had been rehabilitated after the 20th and 22nd Party Congresses but the process had not been carried through. The recent October Plenum took a decision to set up a commission to examine these questions.

5. Gorbachev defended the Soviet role on the eve of the Second World War in conventional terms.

6. Khrushchev

Khrushchev was praised for his courage in condeming the cult of personality. A positive assessment of the 20th Party Congress and the subsequent attempts at reform which were visciated by subjectivism and voluntarism.

7. Brezhnev

Brezhnev was criticised by name for the stagnation of the later part of his rule.

8. Perestroika

The two key problems were democratisation and radical economic reform. Democratisation was given considerable emphasis but Gorbachev said that it had to be accompanied by order, legality and discipline.

- 9. Gorbachev referred to a forthcoming Plenum on education.
- 10. There was rather little emphasis on glasnost which was only mentioned once.

11. Opposition to perestroika

Gorbachev referred to resistance to perestroika and to those who liked to emphasise the costs of the process and to count the problems and who took malicious pleasure in setbacks. He also

/criticised...

criticised those who were too impatient and expected everything to happen all at once. He referred to oblast and even republics where the process of perestroika had hardly begun.

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70th ANNIVERSARY OF THE RUSSIAN REVOLUTION - GORBACHEV'S SPEECH

- 1. Gorbachev introduced a week of 70th Anniversary celebrations with a 3-hour speech in the Kremlin this morning. Although shorn of some of the hollow triumphalism of analogous speeches on past anniversaries and critical of some past and present practices, the speech was appropriately celebratory in tone: these had been 70 heroic years.
- 2. The past. Gorbachev broke new ground by referring to the hitherto unmentionable Trotsky and Bukharin, but did not reassess the Party's generally negative view of their role. He ele re-confirmed that Stalin's policies of industrialisation and collectiveisation were correct, if badly executed. He also re-confirmed the Party's view that Stalin was personally responsible for the purges, but did not rehabilitate any of his victims. Instead he revealed that the recent Central Committee Plenum had set-up Commissions to re-examine the questions and to produce a new version of the history of the Party. Gorbachev did not mention Stalin's responsibility for the Soviet Union's lack of preparedness at the beginning of the second world war, but indulged in a long defence of the Molotov/Ribbentrop pact. He made one positive, but rather grudging reference to "Khruschev" (no first name or patronymic), and one slightly warmer reference to "Leonid Il'ich Brezhnev", without altering the current generally negative view of both leaders.
- 3. Perestroika. Gorbachev reaffirmed the two pillars of perestroika political democratisation and economic reform, drawing liberally on the ideological authority of Lenin. He was, as usual, frank about the

opposition it has engendered, berating on the one hand conservatives who gloated over its problems, and on the other hand the "excessively zealous", who wanted to skip the necessary stages and failed to display "revolutionary patience". (Comment: The cap seems to fit Eltsin, the most outspoken advocate of reform in the leadership, who was allegedly at the centre of a row at the Central Committee Plenum on 21 October. Over the weekend a Central Committee Secretary, Lukyanov, revealed that Eltsin's speech had touched on "the style of work of leading Party bodies and the progress of restructuring", that it had been critised and that Eltsin had offered his resignation, which was being considered. This explanation is consistent with Western press reports that Eltsin had criticised both Gorbachev's and Ligachev's style; it provides no evidence that the US/Soviet summit was at issue.)

4. External. Gorbachev hailed the INF agreement as a success for "new thinking", but asserted that the issue had basically been solved at his second meeting with President Reagon in Reykjavik. More was expected of the third and fourth meetings, where the Soviet Union would work unremittingly for "a palpable breakthrough, for concrete results in reducing strategic offensive arms and barring weapons from outer space—the key to removing the nuclear threat." The rest of the foreign policy section of the speech was devoted to an analysis, similar to the one given at the 27" Party Congress, of the problems of the capitalist world, which concluded that while the capitalists themselves were incorrigible, they could be brought to heel by a combination of their own working class and "peace" movements; the third world and international organisations; and Soviet plans for international security. Gorbachev did not broach the question of the ultimate victory of communism.

ELTSIN

- 1. At a press conference in Moscow on 31 October the Central Committee Secretary Lukyanov confirmed reports that the Moscow Party leader Eltsin had offered his resignation at the CC Plenum on 21 October and said that matters arising from this would be considered by the Politburo and the Moscow Party Committee. .
- 2. The fact that Lukyanov implicitly criticised Eltsin, referring to the view that there were "practical mistakes" in his statement at the Plenum and saying that it contained assessments with which Central Committee members did not agree, indicates that, whether or not Eltsin later withdrew his offer or threat to resign, his situation is now precarious.
- 3. The substance of Eltsin's statement is still unclear, especially whether or not he referred to an alleged cult of Gorbachev's personality. But the thrust was evidently an attack on conservatives in the leadership (principally aimed at Ligachev) for obstructing the progress of perestroika, which backfired and brought down criticism on his own head. Whatever the rights or wrongs of Eltsin's speech at the Plenum, or of his performance as Moscow Party leader, his demise would be a severe set-back for perestroika and for Gorbachev personally. He is one of the few members of the leadership who appear to be wholeheartedly behind radical reform and glasnost', and the success or failure of his attempt to tackle the entrenched Moscow bureaucracy has been widely seen as a crucial test case for the prospects of perestroika as a whole.
- 4. Eltsin has played a key role in the reform process going well beyond the administration of Moscow itself. He has exercised

considerable influence over the development of glasnost' and cultural liberalisation through his jurisdiction over the Party committees of the creative unions and by permitting and encouraging exhibitions, public meetings and discussion clubs in the capital. Since the Party committees of all Ministries, organisations and institutes located in Moscow are formally subordinate to the Moscow Party Committee he has been in a position to apply reformist pressure to the whole central state bureaucracy and intellectual establishment.

- 5. At the Party Congress Eltsin is thought to have played the role of trail-blazer or lightning conductor for Gorbachev by making a more radical and outspoken speech attacking the Party bureaucracy than the General Secretary felt able to deliver in his official report. On that occasion too his speech drew a sharp retort from Ligachev. (It is significant that at the recent Plenum Eltsin was the first speaker, immediately followed by Ligachev).
- 6. It is a matter for speculation whether at the Plenum Eltsin spoke as he did with the knowledge and approval of Gorbachev or entirely on his own initiative. If it was a calculated challenge to the conservatives it appears to have badly misfired. Gorbachev is now faced with the dilemma of whether to defend or sacrifice a man who is a key ally, albeit possibly something of a maverick, whom he personally installed as Moscow Party leader against considerable opposition from the Moscow Party organisation itself less than two years ago. If Eltsin does go Gorbachev's position will be significantly weakened.

ECONOMIC REFORM

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MY THREE IPTS: GORBACHEV'S 70TH ANNIVERSARY SPEECH, 2 NOVEMBER: FOREIGN POLICY

SUMMARY

1. GORBACHEV DEVOTED 30% OF HIS SPEECH TO EXTERNAL RELATIONS, IN A SECTION ENTITLED 'THE OCTOBER REVOLUTION AND TODAY'S WORLD'. HE SPOKE IN GENERALITIES AND IN CONCEPTUAL LANGUAGE, THE MAIN THRUST BEING A COMPLEX JUSTIFICATION OF THE NEW POLITICAL THINKING AND OF A POLICY OF COOPERATING WITH CAPITALIST COUNTRIES IN ATTEMPTS TO RESOLVE THE WORLD'S PROBLEMS. HE BROKE LITTLE NEW GROUND, BUT ASSERTED THAT PERESTROIKA WOULD ENABLE THE USSR 'TO BECOME INVOLVED IN THE WORLD DIVISION OF LABOUR AND RESOURCES IN A WAY NEVER KNOWN BEFORE'. AFTER A SURPRISING EULOGY OF THE COMMUNIST INTERNATIONAL, GORBACHEV TOOK A TOLERANT LINE ON RELATIONS BETWEEN SOCIALIST COUNTRIES.

DETAIL

FROM PEACEFUL COEXISTENCE TO INTERDEPENDENCE

- 2. GORBACHEV RECAPITULATED THE FORMULATION BY LENIN OF THE POLICY OF PEACEFUL CO-EXISTENCE, UNDER WHICH THE FIRST STEPS WERE RECOGNITION BY NEIGHBOURING AND CAPITALIST COUNTRIES AND THE BUILDING OF EQUITABLE RELATIONS WITH CHINA, TURKEY, IRAN AND AFGHANISTAN. THIS HAD CONSTITUTED 'A BREAKTHROUGH INTO A FUNDAMENTALLY NEW QUALITY OF INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS'.
- 3. HE PRESENTED SOVIET FOREIGN POLICY SINCE LENIN AS A BROAD CONTINUUM. HOWEVER THE SOVIET UNION HAD NOT MADE FULL USE OF ALL THE OPPORTUNITIES BEFORE AND AFTER WORLD WAR II, HAD FAILED TO TRANSLATE ITS ENORMOUS MORAL PRESTIGE AFTER THE WAR INTO EFFECTIVE EFFORTS TO CONSOLIDATE PEACELOVING DEMOCRATIC FORCES,

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AND 'DID NOT ALWAYS RESPOND ADEQUATELY TO IMPERIALIST PROVOCATIONS'. NEVERTHELESS, THE LENINIST POLICY HAD AVERTED NUCLEAR WAR AND PREVENTED IMPERIALISM FROM WINNING THE COLD WAR AND FROM ROLLING BACK SOCIALISM. IT HAD PROVIDED THE BASIS FOR 'FRESH APPROACHES IN THE SPIRIT OF THE NEW POLITICAL THINKING'.

4. GORBACHEV TRACED THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE NEW THINKING FROM THE APRIL 1985 PLENUM THROUGH THE 27TH CONGRESS TO THE PRESENT DAY. HE PLAYED ON WELL-WORN THEMES: AN INTERDEPENDENT AND INTEGRAL WORLD, THE COMMON ENVIRONMENTAL DANGER, THE THREAT TO HUMAN SURVIVAL, AND THE NEED FOR A COMPREHENSIVE SYSTEM OF INTERNATIONAL PEACE AND SECURITY. HE RECAPITULATED PROPOSALS MADE BY THE WARSAW PACT AND THE USSR FOR THE REDUCTION OF ARMED FORCES TO A LEVEL OF REASONABLE SUFFICIENCY, FOR COMPARISON BETWEEN THE ALLIANCES OF MILITARY DOCTRINES, FOR THE ELIMINATION OF CW, FOR EFFECTIVE VERIFICATION, AND FOR STRENGTHENING THE UNITED NATIONS. THESE REFLECTED THE 'COMMITMENT TO DIALOGUE' WHICH PERMEATED THE NEW POLITICAL THINKING.

SUPERPOWER RELATIONS

5. IN A BRIEF PASSAGE, GORBACHEV REFERRED BACK TO REYKJAVIK AS A MEETING WGICH WOULD GO DOWN IN HISTORY, AND WHICH HAD GIVEN A PRACTICAL BOOST TO THE NEW THINKING. GUAGED AGAINST THE TASKS MANKIND WOULD HAVE TO TACKLE TO ENSURE ITS SURVIVAL, VERY LITTLE HAS SO FAR BEEN ACCOMPLISHED BUT A BEGINNING HAS BEEN MADE'. EVIDENCE OF THIS WAS THE UNDERSTANDING WITH THE US TO CONCLUDE AN INF AGREEMENT IN THE NEAR FUTURE. THIS AGREEMENT WAS VERY IMPORTANT IN ITSELF. BY ELIMINATING A WHOLE CLASS OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS IT WOULD BE THE FIRST TANGIBLE STEP ALONG THE PATH OF SCRAPPING NUCLEAR ARSENALS, AND "WAS OBVIOUSLY A MAJOR SUCCESS OF THE NEW WAY OF THINKING . THIS AGREEMENT HAD BEEN " LARGELY SETTLED BACK IN REYKJAVIK". THE WORLD EXPECTED 'THE THIRD AND SOURTH SOVIET/US SUMMITS TO PRODUCE MORE THAN MERELY AN OFFICIAL ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF THE DECISIONS AGREED UPON A YEAR AGO, AND MORE THAN MERELY A CONTINUATION OF THE DISCUSSION'. THE SOVIET UNION WOULD WORK UNREMITTINGLY AT THESE MEETINGS FOR " A PALPABLE BREAKTHROUGH, FOR CONCRETE RESULTS IN REDUCING STRATEGIC OFFENSIVE ARMAMENTS AND BARRING WEAPONS FROM OUTER SPACE - THE KEY TO REMOVING THE NUCLEAR THREAT' ..

THEORETICAL BASIS FOR COOPERATION WITH CAPITALISM

6. AT SOME LENGTH, GORBACHEV JUSTIFIED IN ANALYTICAL MARXIST

PAGE 2 RESTRICTED TERMS THE BASIS FOR MOOKING FOR RESULTS FROM COOPERATION WITH CAPITALIST POWERS AT THE PRESENT JUNCTURE. FIRST, HE ARGUED THAT THE CONTRADICTIONS THAT USED INVARIABLY TO LEAD TO WARS HAD BEEN MODIFIED SINCE THE SECOND WORLD WAR. THE LESSONS OF THE WAR AND THE FEAR OF SAPPING ITS OWN STRENGTH IN THE FACE OF SOCIALISM HAD PREVENTED CAPITALISM FROM ALLOWING ITS INTERNAL CONTRADICTIONS TO GO TO EXTREMES. 'SINCE AN ALLIANCE BETWEEN A SOCIALIST COUNTRY AND CAPITALIST STATES PROVED POSSIBLE IN THE PAST, WHEN THE THREAT OF FASCISM AROSE, DOES THIS NOT SUGGEST A LESSON FOR.....TODAY'S WORLD WHICH FACES THE THREAT OF NUCLEAR CATASTROPHE'.

- 7. SECOND, GORBACHEV SAID THAT IT WAS POSSIBLE FOR CAPITALIST COUNTRIES TO DEVELOP WITHOUT MILITARISATION. CITING THE JAPANESE, WEST GERMAN AND ITALIAN ECONOMIC MIRACLES, HE NOTED THAT THERE HAD BEEN A PERIOD WHEN THE MODERN CAPITALIST ECONOMY DEVELOPED RAPIDLY IN SEVERAL COUNTRIES WHOSE ARMS SPENDING WAS MINIMAL. SINCE THE WAR, THE AMERICAN ECONOMY HAD BEEN DEPENDENT ON MILITARISM, BUT 'SUPER-MILITARISATION' HAD LED TO AN ASTRONOMICAL NATIONAL DEBT AND ECONOMIC UPSETS OF WHICH THE WALL STREET PANIC WAS A GRAVE SYMPTOM.
- 8. THIRD, EXPLOITATION OF DEVELOPING COUNTRIES HAD LED TO ACUTE PROBLEMS WITHIN CAPITALIST COUNTRIES THEMSELVES. ATTEMPTS TO INTRODUCE LATTER DAY CAPITALIST MODERNISATION DID NOT SOLVE THE PROBLEM, AND WESTERN LEADERS WERE BEGINNING TO APPRECIATE THE POSSIBILITY THAT INEQUITABLE TRADE WOULD 'EVENTUALLY CULMINATE IN AN EXPLOSION'. IN THE FACE OF THE CHOICE BETWEEN A DISASTER OR A JOINT QUEST FOR A NEW ECONOMIC ORDER, THERE WAS DISCERNIBLE MOVEMENT TOWARDS THE LATTER THROUGH IMPLEMENTATION OF THE CONCEPT OF DISARMAMENT FOR DEVELOPMENT. THEREFORE, IN THIS AREA TOO, THE SITUATION DID NOT DEFY RESOLUTION AND CONTRADICTIONS' COULD BE ''MODIFIED''.
- 9. FOURTH, GORBACHEV MENTIONED THAT SOCIALISM HAD MADE ITSELF A COMPONENT OF THIS INTER-CONNECTED WORLD AND HAD IN FACT DETERMINED THE CHARACTER OF THE 20TH CENTURY. THERE WERE 'VAST POTENTIALITIES FOR PEACEFUL COEXISTENCE INHERENT IN JUST THE SOVIET UNION'S PERESTROIKA. BY MAKING IT POSSIBLE FOR US TO ATTAIN THE WORLD LEVEL IN ALL MAJOR ECONOMIC INDICATORS, PERESTROIKA WILL ENABLE OUR VAST AND WEALTHY COUNTRY TO BECOME INVOLVED IN THE WORLD DIVISION OF LABOUR AND RESOURCES IN A WAY NEVER KNOWN BEFORE'. HE WENT ON TO REFUTE WESTERN THEORIES THAT THE WORKING CLASS HAD BECOME DISSOLVED IN THE MIDDLE CLASS,' AND CLAIMED THAT THE

WORKING CLASS ('A NUMERICALLY PREDOMINANT FORCE TODAY WITHIN ITS -- NEW SOCIAL BOUNDARIES') COULD PLAY A DECISIVE ROLE, FOR EXAMPLE THROUGH THE CONVERSION AND DEMILITARISATION OF THE ECONOMY.

THE NATIONAL LIBERATION MOVEMENT AND THE THIRD WORLD

10. IT WAS NATURAL THAT THE IMPULSE FOR LIBERATION SEEN IN THE STRUGGLE FOR POLITICAL INDEPENDENCE WAS WANING: BUT THE IMPULSE WAS TAKING DIFFERENT AND PARADOXICAL FORMS. SOME COUNTRIES, WHILE RETAINING FEATURES OF BACKWARDNESS, WERE ATTAINING A GREAT POWER LEVEL. THERE WAS THE WRATH BRED BY THE POLARISATION OF POVERTY AND WEALTH, AND THE URGE FOR NATIONAL IDENTITY FELT THROUGH THE REGIONAL AND COLLECTIVE ORGANISATIONS OF DEVELOPING COUNTRIES. THESE ORGANISATIONS (THE NON ALIGNED MOVEMENT AND OTHERS WHICH HE LISTED) HAD COLOSSAL POTENTIAL, AND IT WOULD NOT BE THE TRANSNATIONALS WHICH DETERMINED THE THIRD WORLD'S DEVELOPMENT.

PEACE MOVEMENTS ETC

11. MOVEMENTS CONCERNED WITH PEACE, THE ENVIRONMENT, RACIAL DISCRIMINATION ETC INVOLVING MILLIONS OF PEOPLE AND LED BY PROMINENT FIGURES OF SCIENCE AND CULTURE, AND SOCIAL DEMOCRATIC PARTIES AND MASS ORGANISATIONS, WERE PLAYING AN IMPORTANT ROLE. THE ASPIRATIONS OF HUNDREDS OF MILLIONS OF PEOPLE HAD TO BE HEEDED. THIS PLACED RESPONSIBILITY ON POLITICIANS: THE HUMAN FACTOR AFFAIRS'. GORBACHEV GAVE THIS AS A REASON FOR THE USSR'S OPTIMISTIC VIEW OF THE FUTURE AND AS THE LOGIC BEHIND ITS STANCE ON DEFENCE ISSUES: 'AS LONG AS THERE IS THE DANGER OF WAR AND AS LONG AS THE DRIVE FOR SOCIAL REVANCHE FORMS THE CORE OF WESTERN STRATEGIES AND MILITARIST PROGRAMMES, WE SHALL CONTINUE TO DO EVERYTHING NECESSARY TO MAINTAIN OUR DEFENCE CAPABILITY AT A LEVEL RULING OUT IMPERIALISM'S MILITARY SUPERIORITY OVER SOCIALISM'.

WORLD COMMUNIST MOVEMENT

12. THE ANNIVERSARY WAS THE 'RIGHT OCCASION TO MENTION THE THIRD, COMMUNIST INTERNATIONAL', THE AUTHENTIC HISTORY OF WHICH HAD YET TO BE WRITTEN. FOR ALL THE ERRORS IN ITS ACTIVITIES AND FOR ALL THE BITTERNESS EVOKED BY CERTAIN CHAPTERS IN ITS HISTORY, 'THE COMMUNIST INTERNATIONAL IS PART OF OUR MOVEMENT'S GREAT PAST'. IT HAD MADE INTERNATIONALISM AN EFFECTIVE INSTRUMENT AND HAD PRODUCED TRUE KNIGHTS OF THE 20TH CENTURY'. HAVING PAID TRIBUTE IN GLOWING TERMS TO THE ROLE OF THE INTERNATIONAL IN THE RESISTANCE TO

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FASCISM, GORBACHEV DECLARED THAT 'THE TIME OF THE COMMUNIST INTERNATIONAL, THE INFORMATION BUREAU, EVEN THE TIME OF BINDING INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCES IS OVER. BUT THE WORLD COMMUNIST MOVEMENT LIVES ON. ALL PARTIES ARE COMPLETELY AND IRREVOCABLY INDEPENDENT. WE DECLARED THAT AS EARLY AS THE 20TH CONGRESS. TRUE, THE OLD HABITS WERE NOT DISCARDED AT ONCE. BUT TODAY THIS HAS BECOME AN UNALTERABLE REALITY...THE 27 TH CONGRESS OF THE CPSU WAS A FINAL AND IRREVOCABLE TURNING POINT. I THINK THIS HAS BEEN ACTUALLY PROVED BY OUR RELATIONS WITH FRATERNAL PARTIES IN THE COURSE OF PERESTROIKA'.

13. GORBACHEV WENT ON TO SAY THAT COMMUNIST PARTIES WERE LOOKING FOR THEIR NEW PLACE IN THE CHANGING WORLD. THEIR INTERNATIONAL MOVEMENT WAS UNDERGOING A RENEWAL. HE LISTED THE PRINCIPLES GOVERNING RELATIONS BETWEEN SOCIALIST COUNTRIES, INCLUDING UNCONDITIONAL AND FULL EQUALITY AND CONCERN FOR THE COMMON CAUSE OF SOCIALISM. VARIETY WAS GOOD AND USEFUL. UNITY DID NOT MEAN IDENTITY AND UNIFORMITY. "WE HAVE BECOME CONVINCED THAT THERE IS NO 'MODEL' OF SOCIALISM TO BE EMULATED BY EVERYONE'.

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MIPT: GORBACHEV'S 70TH ANNIVERSARY SPEECH: SOVIET HISTORY

1. THE FOLLOWING ARE THE MAIN POINTS OF GORBACHEV'S REVIEW OF SOVIET HISTORY SINCE THE REVOLUTION:

NEW ECONOMIC POLICY (NEP)

2. GORBACHEV NOTED THAT THE PARTY NOW TURNED MORE OFTEN TO LENIN'S LAST WORKS AND TO LENIN'S NEP, BUT THAT ''IT WOULD BE A MISTAKE TO EQUATE THE NEP WITH WHAT WE ARE DOING NOW AT A FUNDAMENTALLY NEW LEVEL OF DEVELOPMENT''. LENIN HAD NOT ''MEANT TO DRAW THE PICTURE OF THE FUTURE SOCIETY IN EVERY DETAIL''. HISTORY, IN GORBACHEV'S OPINION, DELIVERED THE NEW SYSTEM WITH A ''RIGID ULTIMATUM'': SOCIALISM WOULD HAVE TO DEVELOP IN THE SHORTEST POSSIBLE TIME IF IT WERE TO SURVIVE.

THE 1920'S AND 30'S

- 3. GORBACHEV NOTED THE NEED TO ASSESS THE PAST WITH A 'SENSE OF HISTORICAL RESPONSIBILITY AND ON THE BASIS OF HISTORICAL TRUTH'. THE 1920'S AND 30'S, WERE THE FOCUS OF 'EVERLASTING DISCUSSIONS BOTH IN OUR COUNTRY AND ABROAD, WHERE, ALONG WITH A SEARCH FOR TRUTH, ATTEMPTS ARE OFTEN MADE TO DISCREDIT SOCIALISM'. IN CONDITIONS OF PERESTROIKA IT WAS IMPORTANT TO PAY CREDIT TO THE PAST AND TO DRAW LESSONS FROM MISTAKES AND MISCALCULATIONS.
- 4. GORBACHEV NOTED THE LACK OF CONSENSUS AMONGST PARTY LEADERS IN THE EARLY YEARS OF SOVIET POWER. "THE CHARACTER OF THE IDEOLOGICAL STRUGGLE WAS COMPLICATED BY PERSONAL RIVALRIES IN THE PARTY LEADERSHIP". THESE DIVISIONS LED TO FACTIONALISM AND THE LEADERS IN QUESTION CONTINUED TO PROVOKE A SPLIT "EVEN AFTER THE VAST MAJORITY IN THE PARTY SAW THAT THEIR VIEWS WERE

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CONTRARY TO LENIN'S IDEAS AND PLANS AND THAT THEIR PROPOSALS WERE ERRONEOUS AND COULD PUSH THE COUNTRY OFF THE CORRECT COURSE =-.... THIS APPLIES FIRST AND FOREMOST TO TROTSKY' WHO, IN LENIN'S OPINION, WAS 'AN EXCESSIVELY SELF-ASSURED POLITICIAN WHO ALWAYS VACILLATED AND CHEATED '. GORBACHEV CONTINUED THAT TROTSKYISM WAS ''A POLITICAL CURRENT WHOSE IDEOLOGISTS TOOK COVER BEHIND LEFTIST PSEUDO-REVOLUTIONARY RHETORIC', AND WAS " 'AN ATTACK ON LENINISM IN ALL OF ITS ASPECTS". IT WAS THEREFORE ESSENTIAL, 'TO DISAPPROVE TROTSKYISM ... AND TO LAY BARE ITS ANTI-SOCIALIST ESSENCE' . THE TROTSKYISTS ACTED WITH ''NEW OPPOSITION HEADED BY ZINOVIEV AND KAMENEV'', BUT THE 'PARTY'S LEADING NUCLEUS HEADED BY STALIN SAFEGUARDED LENINISM IN THE IDEOLOGICAL STRUGGLE' . THE POLITICAL COURSE WHICH WAS SUBSEQUENTLY WORKED OUT WAS APPROVED BY " MOST MEMBERS OF THE PARTY AND MOST WORKING PEOPLE". GORBACHEV NAMED BUKHARIN (AMONGST OTHERS) WHO PLAYED AN IMPORTANT PART IN DEFEATING TROTSKYISM.

BUKHARIN

5. BUKHARIN AND HIS FOLLOWERS RESTED ON 'DOGMATIC THINKING
AND NON-DIALECTICAL ASSESSMENT OF THE CONCRETE SITUATION.
BUKHARIN HIMSELF, AND HIS FOLLOWERS, SOON ADMITTED THEIR MISTAKES'.
GORBACHEV QUOTED LENIN'S OPINION OF BUKHARIN: THAT HE WAS A MOST
VALUABLE AND MAJOR THEORIST OF THE PARTY, THAT HE WAS CONSIDERED
A FAVOURITE OF THE PARTY, AND THAT HIS THEORETICAL VIEWS COULD
BE CLASSIFIED ONLY RESERVEDLY AS COMPLETELY MARXIST. 'THE
FACTS AGAIN CONFIRMED THAT LENIN HAD BEEN RIGHT'.

INDUSTRIALISATION

6. GORBACHEV SAID THAT THE CRASH INDUSTRIALISATION PROGRAMME
OF THE LATE 20'S AND 30'S WAS 'THE ONLY POSSIBLE WAY FORWARD
IN THOSE CONDITIONS, THOUGH IT WAS INCREDIBLY DIFFICULT FOR THE
COUNTRY AND THE PEOPLE'. HE SHOWERED PRAISE ON THE SELFLESS
HEROISM SHOWN BY SOVIET CITIZENS DURING INDUSTRIALISATION AND
NOTED THAT, PARTLY BECAUSE OF THE GROWING THREAT OF IMPERIALIST
AGGRESSION, 'THERE COULD HAVE BEEN NO OTHER PATH FOR
DEVELOPMENT IN THE SOVIET UNION'. GORBACHEV SAID THAT, IN
ANSWERING THE QUESTION ABOUT WHETHER THE SOVIET UNION COULD HAVE
DEVELOPED DIFFERENTLY, 'IF WE WISH TO BE FAITHFUL TO HISTORY
AND THE TRUTH OF LIFE THERE CAN ONLY BE ONE ANSWER: NO,
ABSOLUTELY NOT.

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COLLECTIVISATION -

7. THIS PERIOD "'ALSO SAW SOME LOSSES". THERE WAS A GROWING RELIANCE ON RIGID CENTRALISATION AND AN ADMINISTRATIVE COMMAND SYSTEM OF LEADERSHIP, WHICH EXTENDED TO COLLECTIVISATION. THERE WAS AN UNDERESTIMATION OF CHANGES IN RURAL SOCIETY SINCE THE REVOLUTION AND A FAILURE TO UNDERSTAND THAT THE PEASANTRY HAD FOUGHT FOR THE REVOLUTION. DURING COLLECTIVISATION THERE WAS "'A DEPARTURE FROM LENIN'S POLICY TOWARDS THE PEASANTRY". IN THE RUSH TO COLLECTIVISE, "FLAGRANT VIOLATIONS OF THE PRINCIPLES OF COLLECTIVISATION OCCURED EVERYWHERE". THERE WERE ALSO EXCESSES IN THE STRUGGLE AGAINST THE KULAKS. BUT COLLECTIVISATION WAS "IN THE FINAL ANALYSIS A TRANSFORMATION OF FUNDAMENTAL IMPORTANCE ... AND CREATED THE SOCIAL BASE FOR MODERNISING THE AGRARIAN SECTOR".

STALINISM

- 8. GORBACHEV SAID THAT ''AN ATMOSPHERE OF INTOLERANCE,
 HOSTILITY AND SUSPICION WAS CREATED IN THE COUNTRY. MANY
 THOUSANDS OF PEOPLE ... WERE SUBJECTED TO WHOLESALE
 REPRESSIVE MEASURES. SUCH, COMRADES, IS THE BITTER TRUTH''.
 GORBACHEV NOTED STALIN'S ''EXTREMELY CONTRADICTORY PERSONALITY''.
 FAITHFULNESS TO HISTORICAL TRUTH REQUIRED APPRECIATION OF BOTH
 STALIN'S CONTRIBUTIONS AND HIS ERRORS, FOR WHICH SOCIETY PAID
 A HEAVY PRICE.'' GORBACHEV SAID THAT THE PERSONALITY
 CULT WAS NOT INEVITABLE AND NOTED THE IMPORTANCE OF THE 2UTH
 AND 22ND CONGRESSES IN CONDEMNING STALINISM. THERE FOLLOWED
 A REHABILITATION OF THOSE REPRESSED AS ''A RESULT OF DELIBERATE
 FALSIFICATION'', BUT THE PROCESS OF RESTORING JUSTICE WAS NOT
 SEEN THROUGH AND ''WAS ACTUALLY SUSPENDED IN THE MID-60'S.
- 9. GORBACHEV ANNOUNCED THAT THE POLITBURO HAD ESTABLISHED A COMMISSION TO EXAMINE NEW FACTS ON 'THESE MATTERS' AND THAT DECISIONS WOULD BE TAKEN ON THE BASIS OF THE COMMISSION'S FINDING. ITS FINDINGS WILL ALSO BE REFLECTED IN A NEW HISTORY OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION. A TRUTHFUL APPRAISAL OF BOTH ACHIEVEMENTS AND MISFORTUNES 'WILL PROVIDE REAL MORAL GUIDELINES FOR THE FUTURE.'' SOVIET HISTORY WAS 'REPLETE WITH CONTRADICTIONS AND COMPLEXITIES, BUT A BIG AND HERIOC ROAD.''

10. GORBACHEV DWELT AT LENGTH ON THE EVENTS LEADING UP TO THE

PAGE 3 UNCLASSIFIED NON-AGGRESSION PACT OF AUGUST 1939. THROUGH THE LATE 1930'S
THE 'HATRED OF SOCIALISM ... PREVENTED A SOBER ASSESSMENT OF THE
REAL DANGERS', AND THAT 'FASCISM ... WAS OFFERED THE MISSION OF
A STRIKE FORCE IN AN ANTI-COMMUNIST CRUSADE.' WITH HINDSIGHT THE
CONCLUSION OF A NOM-AGGRESSION PACT WITH GERMANY WAS NOT THE BEST"
DECISION BUT THAT THIS 'MAY BE SO, IF ONE IS NOT GUIDED BY
HARSH REALITY, BUT BY ABSTRACT CONJECTURES TORN OUT OF THEIR TIME
FRAME.' THE ONLY WAY TO STOP FASCISM WOULD HAVE BEEN THE
CONCLUSION OF AN ANGLO/FRANCO/SOVIET MILITARY ALLIANCE 'NOT LATER
THAN AUGUST 1939.' THE SOVIET UNION WAS FACED BY A 'VERY REAL
THREAT OF WAR ON TWO FRONTS'.

POST-WAR

11. GORBACHEV MENTIONED THE CONTINUATION OF ABUSES OF POWER IN THE EARLY 195US, INCLUDING THE LENINGRAD AFFAIR AND THE DOCTORS' PLOT. HE NOTED THAT THERE WAS 'IN SHORT A LACK OF GENUINE RESPECT FOR THE PEOPLE.''

KHRUSHCHEV

12. THE 20TH CONGRESS IN 1956 SAW A CHANGE IN THE PEOPLE'S SPIRIT.

IT TOOK NO SMALL COURAGE ON THE PART OF THE PARTY AND ITS

LEADERSHIP BY KHRUSHCHEV TO CRITICISE THE PERSONALITY CULT AND

ITSCONSEQUENCES.'' HOWEVER, THE CHANGES BEGUN IN THE 1950'S WERE

HINDERED BY ''SUBJECTIVIST ERRORS''. ''NEW PROBLEMS OF DOMESTIC

AND FOREIGN POLICY AND OF PARTY DEVELOPMENT WERE TOO OFTEN SOLVED

BY VOLUNTARISTIC METHODS'', AND WERE NOT BACKED BY A ''BROAD

DEVELOPMENT OF THE DEMOCRATISATION PROCESS''.

BREZHNEV

13. MANY NEW ECONOMIC CHANGES BEGUN UNDER BREZHNEV IN 1965

'REMAINED ON PAPER AND WERE LEFT SUSPENDED IN MID-AIR. THE PACE
OF OUR DEVELOPMENT WAS SUBSTANTIALLY RETARDED'. THE LATTER YEARS
OF THE BREZHNEV PERIOD 'CREATED A PRE-CRISIS SITUATION AND THE
GULF BETWEEN PRINCIPLES AND SOVIET REALITIES 'WAS BECOMING
INTOLERABLE.' THE RESPONSE TO THESE PROBLEMS CAME WITH THE
APRIL 1985 PLENUM AND 'ASSUMED FINAL SHAPE IN THE GENERAL POLICY
OF REVOLUTIONARY PERESTROIKA.' THE ROAD WHICH THE SOVIET UNION IS
FOLLOWING, GORBACHEV SAID, 'IS NOT FOR THE WEAK AND FAINTHEARTED: IT IS A ROAD FOR THE STRONG AND THE BRAVE.'

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GORBACHEV'S 70TH ANNIVERSARY SPEECH, 2 NOVEMBER

1. OPENING THIS WEEK'S CELEBRATIONS TO MARK THE 70TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE OCTOBER REVOLUTION, GORBACHEV DELIVERED A THREE HOUR 'REPORT' ENTITLED 'OCTOBER AND PERESTROIKA: THE REVOLUTION CONTINUES' TO A JOINT MEETING OF THE CPSU CENTRAL COMMITTEE, THE USSR AND RSFSR SUPREME SOVIETS AND FOREIGN GUESTS. AS REPORTED PREVIOUSLY (MY TELS 1421 AND 1425) THE CONTENT OF THE SPEECH WAS DISCUSSED AT A SPECIAL PLENARY OF THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE ON 21 OCTOBER, AND THE SPEECH WAS PRECEDED BY WIDE ADVANCE BILLING AS A MAJOR RE-EVALUATION OF SOVIET HISTORY. THE DIPLOMATIC CORPS ATTENDED EN MASSE, AS DID A LARGE NUMBER OF VISITING FRATERNAL DELEGATIONS.

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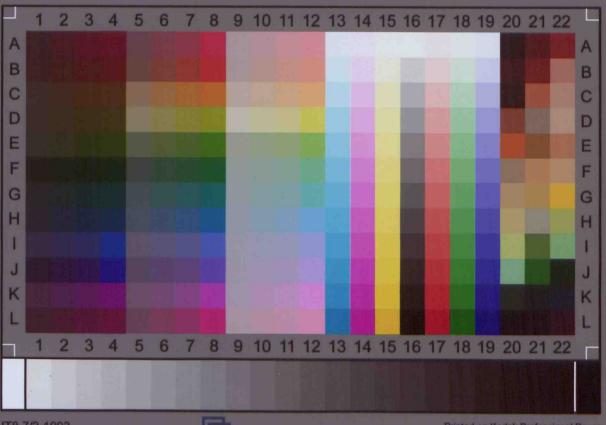
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
