Foreign & Commonwealth Office London SW1A 2AH 13 June 1991 Prime Minister of St Vincent Thank you for your letter of 7 June telling us that Prime Minister James Mitchell of St Vincent and the Grenadines will be watching the Trooping of the Colour on 15 June from the Prime Minister's stand. Mr Mitchell has been Prime Minister since 1984. was re-elected in 1989 when his New Democratic Party won all 15 seats in the House of Assembly. St Vincent, (population 115,000), became independent in 1979. It is a Realm and one of the poorest countries in the Eastern Caribbean (GDP per capita US\$1270). The economy depends on agriculture and tourism. Although it is the world's largest producer of arrowroot, bananas account for 60% of total exports and St Vincent is anxious about continued preferential access into EC markets after 1992. UK exports to St Vincent are very small and the balance of trade is heavily in St Vincent's favour. St Vincent is a member of the Eastern Caribbean's Regional Security System and of the Caribbean Common Market and Community (CARICOM). We share St Vincent's concern over drug trafficking in the region. The local coastquard has had some notable recent successes in interdiction but the Government is still dragging its heels over producing legislation for the tracing, freezing and confiscation of the assets of drug trafficking. Mr Mitchell is the leading proponent of political unification of the four Windward Islands, the others /being

His Party's landslide win in the 1984 General Elections owed much to public disaffection with the government of the day. His NDP government was quickly accepted in the region as a moderate sensible administration. Won the 1989 Election by a landslide (15–0). NDP's success due in large measure to his own personal qualities. Stands head and shoulders above is colleagues in abilities and political skill. Shrewd, intelligent, quick and forthright. An easy man to like and respect. Firm believer in kicking political opponents when they are down. Probably the only man in St Vincent to be able to successfully hold such power. Paid an official visit to the UK in 1989 (under Category I Sponsored Visitors Scheme).

Divorced from his Canadian wife but she still runs a small restaurant near Mitchell's hotel on Bequia. Three daughters.





MEETING WITH THE PRIME MINISTER OF ST VINCENT AND THE GRENADINES

You are to see Mr James Mitchell tomorrow. He is here on an official visit. You will remember him well from Commonwealth meetings: he is generally pro-Western and free market, and a member of the Caribbean group of political parties led by Mr Seaga and Miss Charles.

Mr Mitchell's main interest is in <u>bananas</u>, which account for 28 per cent of St Vincent's export earnings and virtually all come here. Like other Caribbean banana producers, St Vincent is worried about the arrangements for the EC market in the run-up to 1992. We have pledged to ensure continued preferential access and will stand by that commitment. But we need all the help we can get, and that means that the Caribbean must lobby hard with <u>other</u> EC governments (as Miss Charles did recently).

On the <u>aid</u> front he will be worried about the destruction by fire of his Police Headquarters. You can say that we will help in rebuilding. You will want to discuss <u>CHOGM</u>, and argue against allowing South Africa to dominate. We would like to see a particular place for environmental issues. He is a firm supporter of Malcolm Fraser for Secretary-General.

You should have a word about <u>drugs</u> which are a major and growing problem for him. We are providing some help, although quite modest (eg a sniffer dog).

You ought to thank him for St Vincent's consistent abstention on the <u>Falklands</u>' issue - and see if you can repeat your success with Miss Charles and get him to vote against in future.

He is keen on political unity among the smaller states, and the <u>Windwards</u> at least. This would be welcome from a security point of view, but overt support from us is likely to be counter-productive. You could ask about progress with regional security co-operation.

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Foreign and Commonwealth Office London SW1A 2AH 24 July 1989 Call by Prime Minister James Mitchell of St Vincent & The Grenadines, 26 July at 9.30 am Mr Mitchell periodically visits Britain in a private capacity but this is his first official visit since he became Prime Minister of St Vincent & the Grenadines in July 1984. He has a 5 day programme. The Foreign Secretary will host a dinner and he will also meet Mr Patten, Mr Eggar and Baroness Trumpington. Mr Mitchell dominates political life in St Vincent and at the general election in May 1989 his New Democratic Party (NDP) overwhelmed the opposition Labour Party, winning all fifteen seats in the House of Assembly. The NDP is an affiliate of the Caribbean Democratic Union (Chairman -Mr Seaga of Jamaica; Treasurer - Prime Minister Charles of Dominica). Mr Mitchell's Government pursues pro-Western policies and generally supports a free market economy. Our relations are traditionally very close and friendly. Our objectives for the meeting are to: demonstrate that Britain values its relations with a) St Vincent and, in general, the smaller Commonwealth States of the Eastern Caribbean; show that Britain is interested in Mr Mitchell's views on regional, Commonwealth and international affairs; and encourage Mr Mitchell in his efforts towards regional co-operation and in the fight against drugs. Economic Bananas form 28% of St Vincent's export earnings. Virtually all are exported to the UK. The UK has a longstanding commitment to provide preferential access for St Vincent and our other traditional suppliers (Jamaica, St Lucia, Dominica and Grenada). New EC-wide arrangements will be considered in the run up to 1992. The outcome is uncertain, and is likely to be so for some time. Mr Mitchell will no doubt raise his concerns at the potential implications for St Vincent. The Prime Minister could say that: /- We



- We are fighting to ensure continued preferential access (as the Prime Minister pledged during her visit to Jamaica in July 1987). We stand by our commitments.
- Maintenance of consistently high standard of <u>quality</u> by all our traditional suppliers is essential to strengthen our hand and meet UK consumers requirements.
- Caribbean governments must lobby in Brussels and with EC member states. Recent tour by Miss Charles beneficial.

Mr Mitchell may also raise the implications for our banana suppliers of the <u>Lomé negotiations</u>. The Prime Minister can assure him that we are working to safeguard the position of our traditional suppliers. Commonwealth banana producers should take action to ensure that their concerns are reflected in ACP positions.

Aid

Our <u>aid programme</u> to St Vincent is around f1 million a year. Mr Mitchell is likely to be concerned with the recent destruction of the Police Headquarters by fire, and ask for assistance in rebuilding the services affected (Immigration, Special Branch and Drug Control). The Prime Minister can assure Mr Mitchell that we will help.

Regional Security

St Vincent is a member of the <u>Eastern Caribbean Regional Security System</u> (RSS), which was established in 1982 due to events in Grenada. Britain (together with the US) provides training and Loan Service Personnel (LSP) to the RSS. Three Royal Naval LSP are presently attached to St Vincent's Coastguard unit. In November 1988 the RSS Council of (Prime) Ministers agreed that the emphasis of the RSS should shift from the primarily military or para-military to an increase in support for the civil power and narcotics interdiction. The Prime Minister may wish to express Britain's strong support for this new direction for the RSS as we view the threat to the region posed by drugs and drug traffickers is growing. The RSS is, at present, the only organisation capable of mounting an effective regional response to this threat.

Commonwealth Issues

Mr Mitchell may welcome a discussion of the CHOGM Agenda and the Prime Minister may wish to emphasise our hope that important non-political items get the full discussion they



deserve, and the need to avoid a further divisive debate on South African sanctions. As we know Mr Mitchell to be interested in environmental issues the Prime Minister might ask how he thinks this important agenda item should be handled.

On the <u>Secretary-Generalship</u>, St Vincent has committed itself to supporting Fraser's candidature and is against any extension of Ramphal's term. As no consensus emerged from the recent CARICOM Heads of Government meeting the Prime Minister may wish to ask Mr Mitchell for his assessment of overall Caribbean voting intentions.

Drugs

Marijuana is growing in St Vincent, which is also a transit country for cocaine. Mr Mitchell's government is doing its best with limited resources to meet this serious threat to the country's stability, and economic and social development. The UK has provided support in the form of Customs rummage equipment and a drug detector dog and a Customs official will shortly be visiting to assess how we might help with customs training. We are also encouraging St Vincent to strengthen its legislation to include provisions to trace, freeze and confiscate the assets of drug traffickers. A Caribbean Ministerial Conference on Drugs is due to be held in Jamaica on 2 - 4 October. We hope St Vincent will participate.

Falkland Islands

The Prime Minister might register our appreciation that St Vincent has shown its support for the principle of self determination by consistently abstaining on the Argentine resolutions at the UN. The Prime Minister may recall that following a call at No 10 last year Prime Minister Charles of Dominica has promised that Dominica will in future vote against such resolutions. It is possible that Mr Mitchell can be persuaded to join Miss Charles in opposing further resolutions.

Political Unity

Mr Mitchell may tell the Prime Minister of his vision of Eastern Caribbean political unity. Originally this encompassed both the Windward (Dominica, Grenada, St Lucia and St Vincent) and Leeward (Antigua and St Christopher/Nevis) Islands but inter-island jealousies have now reduced this to, at most, the four Windwards. Political union would be a welcome development as it would re-enforce regional security and improve the region's trade and aid opportunities. We have provided some discreet support.



Mr Mitchell will be accompanied by the High Commissioner for Eastern Caribbean States, Mr Dick Gunn (a St Vincentian). Our High Commissioner in Barbados, Mr Kevin Burns, who is also accredited to St Vincent has returned to Britain for this visit and could sit in on the meeting if the Prime Minister agrees.







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St Vincent and the Grenadines: Proposal to Invite
Prime Minister James Mitchell to visit the UK
as a Guest-of-Government

The Foreign Secretary would like Prime Minister James Mitchell of St Vincent and the Grenadines to visit the UK as a Guest-of-Government at mutually convenient dates between November 1988 and March 1989.

Mr Mitchell, a former Premier, was returned to power in July 1984. His New Democratic Party currently holds 10 of St Vincent's 13 parliamentary seats. His Government pursues generally pro-Western policies.

Mr Mitchell will be the Chairman of the Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) from 1 July. He is the leading campaigner for political union between member countries of the OECS and may be expected to promote the idea further during his OECS Chairmanship. We welcome the concept of OECS political union on which referenda may be held later this year in the countries concerned. It is uncertain whether this can be carried through: but, if achieved, political union would enhance regional security, improve trade and aid opportunities, and could in time involve some of our British Dependent Territories in the region.

Bilateral relations with St Vincent are generally good. They took a knock however last year when Mr Mitchell acted against the purchase by the Caribbean regional airline, LIAT, of British Aerospace's (BAe) Advanced Turbo-Prop (ATP) aircraft. The Prime Minister on that occasion sent personal messages to the Prime Ministers of LIAT shareholder countries supporting BAe but the majority vote was in favour of De Havilland of Canada. The UK firm is now preparing a formal offer to supply two ATPs on attractive leasing terms to replace some older LIAT aircraft. Mr Mitchell is reported to be sympathetic to the concept of a mixed fleet for LIAT. A Guest-of-Government visit would give BAe an opportunity to demonstrate the advantages of their aircraft.

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
This would be Mr Mitchell's first official visit to the UK since taking office. He is, however, due to visit London privately next month to be sworn in as a Privy Councillor. We hope to arrange a meeting with Mr Eggar at that time which would afford a useful opportunity to extend a formal invitation to Mr Mitchell.

The Foreign Secretary would be grateful for the Prime Minister's agreement that Mr Mitchell should be invited to pay a Guest-of-Government visit, and that his programme should include a call on the Prime Minister.

St Vincent General Election

The New Democratic Party led by Mr James Mitchell has defeated Mr Cato's St Vincent Labour Party in the general election held on 25 July. It is normal practice for the Prime Minister to send a message of congratulations to her opposite number in a Commonwealth country on appointment. I attach a draft message, to be sent by telegram to the British High Commission Representative in St Vincent for onward transmission to Mr Mitchell.

Mr Mitchell's victory ends 15 years in office for the outgoing Cato Government. Mr Mitchell's party is In the centre of the political spectrum and looks to the Western democracies for friendship and aid. It has traditionally been strong in the Grenadines and relatively weak in St Vincent. The election has helped to demonstrate the strength of democratic institutions in the Eastern Caribbean since it has been possible for an opposition party to defeat a party long established in government in a fair fight. Mr Mitchell intends to foster closer collaboration between the government, commerce and the unions and to privatise government investment in the hotel industry and shipping.

ST VINCENT: INDEPENDENCE (OD(79) 9)

The Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster was glad to have an opportunity to see the Foreign Secretary's memorandum OD(79) 9 and to note the proposal for a short debate on an affirmative resolution before the long recess.

The Parliamentary timetable in the House of Commons will be under great pressure during the time up to the long recess, and it will be difficult to find time for a debate if it has to take place before 10 o'clock. He hopes, however, that a debate lasting for 1½ hours after 10 o'clock will be considered acceptable, and on this basis there should be no serious problem about fitting it in. He assumes that Mr Ridley will make the detailed arrangements with the Chief Whip once the proposals in your paper have been agreed.

Memorandum by the Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs

- 1. The St Vincent Government have asked us to grant independence with effect from 27 October 1979. Under the West Indies Act 1967, an Associated State can itself terminate the status of Association after obtaining the approval of two-thirds of the votes in a popular referendum; or it can ask the British Government to terminate association by Order in Council. Grenada in 1974, Dominica in 1978 and St Lucia this year became independent by the second method. The policy of successive British Governments has been to move an Order in Council when satisfied that the majority of the people of the State want independence and that the new constitution is a democratic one.
- 2. We wish to bring Associated Statehood to an end as soon as possible. They already have full internal self-government. We are responsible only for external affairs and defence: this amounts to responsibility without power and on occasion has caused us international embarrassment.
- 3. The independent Commonwealth Caribbean Governments support independence for the remaining Associated States (St Vincent, St Kitts-Nevis, Anguilla and Antigua). In the light of the current instability in the region, the States wish to set up their own regional security arrangements, with help from us and to develop their political and economic cooperation. The Associated States can only play a full part in this process when independent. Also, after independence, they are able to look for aid elsewhere as well as from us.
- 4. The St Vincent Government, who won 10 of the 13 seats and over 69% of the popular vote at the 1974 election on a platform which included independence, have a clear mandate. The opposition parties also endorsed the principle of independence.
- 5. The St Vincent Government consulted the people on the constitutional CONFIDENTIAL /issues

CONFIDENTIAL

issues before last September's Constitutional Conference. The Conference Report and the draft constitution were then published in St Vincent. The House of Assembly approved the draft constitution in February. There has been little public interest in independence and no evidence of popular opposition to it.

- 6. The two opposition parties, however, are now opposing independence and trying to force an election (due anyway by March 1980). They boycotted the Constitutional Conference, made no constructive contribution to the House of Assembly debate in February, but subsequently suggested amendments to the draft constitution. These were at first rejected by the St Vincent Government. The Minister of State, Nicholas Ridley, who visited St Vincent last month asked the St Vincent Government to reconsider this since it would be preferable presentationally for the constitution to reflect the views of all the Parties. After further consideration the St Vincent Government agreed to the three Opposition amendments which Mr Ridley considered most important.
- 7. Although the recent volcanic eruption on St Vincent has delayed independence, the St Vincent Government are confident they will be ready for it in October. The alleged economic damage inflicted by the volcano has caused Mr Cato to seek to renegotiate the level of British aid after independence, but we have not conceded any increase: this problem should not be insurmountable.
- 8. I believe that we should agree to the St Vincent Government's request for independence. Although the opposition parties may continue to oppose it, they will probably confine themselves to peaceful action. The St Vincent Government anyway have an efficient police force which should be able to cope with any disorder. I think the Opposition will support us in Parliament although we may face criticism from individual MP's. I therefore seek my colleagues' approval that I should inform the St Vincent Government and Opposition that the British Government are willing to recommend to Parliament that St Vincent's status of Association be terminated by Order in Council. This will mean that parliamentary time for a short debate on an affirmative resolution in both Houses will have to be found before the recess. Unless I hear to the contrary by 26 June I will assume that my colleagues agree.
