The Honduran Ambassador called on Tristan Garel-Jones on 7 January with a request from President Callejas to visit the UK and call on the Prime Minister. The President expects to attend the San Jose VIII meeting of EC and Central American Foreign Ministers in Lisbon on 24/25 February and would like to come on to London afterwards.

Relations with Honduras are insubstantial but friendly. There are no obvious bilateral questions that the President is likely to wish to raise. A brief meeting with the Prime Minister would clearly be welcome to the Hondurans if it could be fitted in, but we would not make a strong case for it.



The Foreign Secretary saw the Honduran Foreign Minister on 3 October at the end of Dr Paz Barnica's month-long tour of European capitals. The burden of the Honduran message was that they would like to see more active European support for democracies in Central America and for a peaceful solution to the current problems. They needed above all economic assistance. You may recall that Dr Paz Barnica originally asked if he could see the Prime Minister, and was told that while her busy schedule made this impossible, the Foreign Secretary would nevertheless report his views to her. I enclose the record accordingly.

- 1. The <u>Secretary of State</u> welcomed the Foreign Minister and expressed his regret that the Prime Minister, because of her busy timetable, had been unable to meet him.
- Dr Paz Barnica said that relations between Honduras and Britain were excellent. His Government was democratic, committed to urgent social and economic reform, and seeking a negotiated and non-military solution to the problems of Central America. The Contadora process incorporated previous Honduran peace proposals. The Document of Objectives agreed by Contadora on 9 September had now been adopted by the five Central American governments and would provide a firm basis for further action. There was danger in the excessive radicalisation and militarisation taking place in Nicaragua. The US had a right to play a part in the region, and US aid was vital to Honduran security and economic progress. But Honduras would also like Europe to play a greater role in providing economic assistance and in supporting negotiations, with particular support for democracies under threat from totalitarianism.
- 3. The <u>Secretary of State</u> agreed that bilateral relations were excellent. He appreciated Honduran support and understanding for Belize and expressed good

wishes for President Suazo's health. He said that Britain supported the objectives of the Contadora Group, as indeed did the US. The US already giving considerable aid, most of it economic. Some military measures were required, but it was also important not to provoke Nicaragua. How could aid be deployed most effectively? What else could be done?

- 4. <u>Dr Paz Barnica</u> stressed the importance of European economic assistance which would allow internal economic and social reforms to take place. The Honduran share of the Caribbean Basin Initiative funds was not enough, and there was a large balance of payments problem. He pointed out that 60% of Nicaraguan income came from European aid. Honduras would like strings to be attached to such aid. The <u>Secretary of State</u> said that he appreciated the points about economic aid and its distribution. Britain was giving substantial aid to Honduras, but money for aid was always in short supply.
- 5. Dr Paz Barnica concluded by referring to the excellent relations between Honduras and Belize, and his own friendship with Mr Price. He sent greetings to the Prime Minister and commented that democracies such as those in Central America could be helped greatly by such international democratic bodies as the International Democratic Union.
- 6. He left a copy of the Contadora Document of Objectives, a copy of Honduran follow-up proposals, a copy of the Honduran presentation to the Brussels meeting of 19 September on the Economic Development of Central America, and, as a gift from his President, a book of his speeches.



Dr Paz Barnica wishes to provide a personal report on the work of the Contadora Group and its meeting with Central American Foreign Ministers earlier this month. The Honduran Ambassador said that his Minister had already seen the Presidents or Prime Ministers and Foreign Ministers of Spain, France, Italy, Greece and Belgium and had appointments to see in the next two weeks those of Germany, Sweden and Finland. The Foreign Secretary will be receiving Dr Paz Barnica at 0945 on Monday 3 October. Unless the Prime Minister has a particular wish to see him, our advice is that we should reply that the Prime Minister's programme is unfortunately already full but that she will of course be interested to hear from the Foreign Secretary about the Minister's report. Dr Paz Barnica will be able to give an interesting first-hand view of the current state of affairs in Central America. But if the Prime Minister receives him other Central American Foreign Ministers will naturally be encouraged to think that they also ought to be able to see her.
