With respect, I agree with its conclusions. I suggest that No 10 should tell Mr du Cann about the study and of the reasons for announcing it before his Committee have reported. As requested, I attach a draft Written PQ and Answer. Two points of which the Prime Minister should be aware. You will recall that, in her letter of 24 April to Mr du Cann, she said that she welcomed the intention of the Treasury and Civil Service Committee to enquire into the role and powers of the CSD and that she was sure it would be valuable to have the Committee's contribution. I think the Committee could well take offence if the Prime Minister announced her decision on the future of the central departments after considering the study team's report but without waiting for the Select Committee's conclusions. The draft Answer, therefore, says that the decision will be announced when the Prime Minister has "considered the Select Committee's report and the results of the study". But this deference to the Committee carries with it the risk that it would give the Committee effective control over the timetable for announcing the Prime Minister's decision if they did not report by, or very soon after, the end of the Recess. And second, there is the risk of further delay should the Committee ask to see the factual and analytical material from the study team before completing their report. THE FUTURE OF CSD : DRAFT ANNOUNCEMENT

Draft Written Question

To ask the Prime Minister if she will make a statement about the future of the Civil Service Department.

Draft Answer

I have been greatly impressed by the hard work and dedication of the officials of the Treasury and CSD since this Government took office. Under their Ministers, they have a vital role to play in reducing public expenditure, increasing the efficiency of the Civil Service and achieving our objectives for Civil Service manpower. Because of this, it is right that the organisation of their work should be reviewed from time to time, and I therefore welcomed the decision of the Select Committee on the Treasury and the Civil Service to study this subject. I understand that the Committee will not report (before) the Recess. / Meantime I have asked officials to help clarify the case for and against retaining the present arrangements and the implications of changing them. They will report to me in the autumn. The factual and analytical material that they produce will be published. I shall announce my decision on the future organisation of the departments when I have considered the Select Committee's report and the results of the study. Meanwhile, the Treasury and CSD will continue to press ahead with their present work.

THE ORGANISATION OF THE CENTRAL DEPARTMENTS

The Prime Minister has now been able to consider your minute of 28 July 1980 to me about the further study of the case for and against a merger of the Treasury and the CSD.

She has asked me to thank you for your proposals which she found most helpful.

The Prime Minister understands that it is now virtually certain that the Treasury and Civil Service Select Committee will not issue their report before the House rises. She does not think, however, that this is reason for delaying the announcement of the Government's feasibility study and she would like to publicise the establishment of the study in an Answer to an arranged Written Question on Thursday of this week. I should accordingly be grateful if you could let me have a draft Question and Answer by close of play tomorrow, Tuesday 5 August.

She agrees that the report of the feasibility study should be prepared as you propose in paragraph 4 of your minute, with the first part being published and the second remaining confidential.

She welcomes the proposal to complete the study by the end of October rather than by 30 November.

I am sending copies of this minute to Mr. Wiggins (Treasury), Mr. Buckley (CSD), Sir Douglas Wass, Sir Robert Armstrong and Sir Derek Rayner.
