## PRIME MINISTER'S ENGAGEMENTS

At 1000 the Prime Minister met representatives of the British Council of Churches. (The meeting was at their request: they wished to discuss unemployment, Southern Africa, aid for refugees and Scotland).

There would be a meeting of Ministers this afternoon. This evening the Prime Minister would have an audience of the Queen. Later Mrs. Thatcher would dine and speak at Lincoln's Inn. It was unlikely that we would have an advance text.

Re-appointment of David Mackenzie Wilson as a Governor of the Museum of London.

### COMMON AGRICULTURAL POLICY

Our position was clear. Based on the Commission's own findings following the Strasbourg Council, we now looked to the Dublin Council for a decision on Britain's budget contribution. It was wrong to interpret our position on a possible refund as an invitation to be turned down by France and Germany.

### ELECTRICITY DISCOUNT SCHEME

This had been considered by Cabinet - decisions had been taken. There would be a statement soon after the House re-assembles. Lobby would hear then that the scheme had been changed.

## COMPETITION BILL

This would be near the top of the queue when the House returned (the 2nd reading debate on this Bill had been in progress when the House broke for the Summer recess).
