## 1. Future Business for the Week-21st-28th February

On Monday, 21st February, there would be the Remaining Stages of the Covent Garden Market (Financial Provisions) Bill. This would be followed by a Motion on certain EEC Commission Documents on Textiles, listed in Hansard for 10th February (col. 1671).

On Tuesday, 22nd February, Mr. J. More would seek leave to introduce his Food and Drugs (Amendment) Bill under the 10 Minute Rule. This would be followed by further proceedings on the Scotland and Wales Bill (Mr. Pym and team).

On Wednesday, 23rd February, Mr. P. Viggers would seek leave to introduce his Service Widows (Equality of Pensions) Bill under the 10 Minute Rule. This would be followed by further proceedings on the Scotland and Wales Bill (Mr. Pym and team):

On Thursday, 24th February, there would be a Supply Day with subjects to be decided. This would be followed by the Remaining Stages of the Job Release Bill and debates on EEC Documents on Fisheries.

On Friday, 25th February, there would be the Second Readings of the following Private Members' Bills: Mr. W. Benyon's Abortion (Amendment) Bill, Mr. K. Lomas's House of Lords Reform Bill and those of Mr. S. Griffiths, Mr. R. Byre, Mr. R. Adley and Mr. T. Litterick.

On Monday, 26th February, there would be a Supply Day with subjects to be decided.

(There was, at the time of this discussion, no indication that the Government would seek to introduce a timetable motion for the Scotland and Uales Bill on Tuesday. 22nd February).

#### Hatters Axising on Business

There was a discussion and the following points were agreed:

- There would be a 3 line whip for the two days of proceedings on the Scotland and Wales Bill, which we could relax if necessary.
- (ii) We would offer the Supply Ley on the 24th February to the minor Parties and they would be told of this decision.
- (iii) We would seek to postpone discussion of the Remaining Stages of the Job Reloase Bill and the ERC Documents on Fisheries, which were tabled for later on Thursday, 24th February.
- (iv) It was likely that we would wish to debate personal taxation on the Supply Day on 28th February, but this decision would be confirmed at the ment meeting.
- (v) It was desirable to have a Supply Day on the cost of living in the coaing weeks, as an acceleration in the Retail Price lader was likely to be amnounced shortly. It was also desirable to debate unemployment in Wales.
- (vi.) While it was necessary to debate the Motion standing in the mames of Mr. Macasilian and others indicating that the ruling of the Deputy Speaker on the position of a referendum clause in a Bill should not be taken as a precedent, we would inquire within the Party whether it was felt we should wote if the Government refused to accept the Motion.

### 3. Devolution

Policy - A Proposal for an ell-Party Convention: Conservative Policy - A Proposal for an ell-Party Convention on Devolution' (LGC (77) 155) and hr. Taylor introduced his paper, "Devolution - the Way Absed" (LGC/77/156). There was a discussion and the following points were agread:

- (1) He could not be committed to setting up a convention if we were to ruture to power.
- (ii) If the proposal to set up a constitutional convention were accepted, we were not consisted, in those circumstances, to any particular constitutional solution for Scotland or Welsen.
- (iii) Subject to points (i) and (ii) above, hr. Pym would advocate a constitutional convention at such time and in such a memmer as be thought most exception. In view of the Bill's difficult passage and the refusel of the Covernment to concede any of the points sade by the Bill's critice in all Parties, and in view of the fact that if a guillotine were introduced the Bill would not be sufficiently discussed in the Commons, it was desirable to ensemts whether there was an alternative approach on which there might be more agreement between and within the various political Parties.

### 4. Other business

Lord Ferrers reported that the Braminers were likely to report the following day on the question whather the Aircraft and Shipbuilding Bill was hybrid.

Mr. Mossi introduced a short discussion on the Housing (Momeless Persons) Bill which was supported by certain Conservative members. It was agreed that while we would not vote against the Bill we would ensure that the case against certain of the Bill's prospects was adequately put in the delate.

The meeting closed at 6.15 p.m.
