Subjects for Supply Days

If we are to have a planned programme thought should be given to maximising helpful publicity.

- Council House Waiting Lists and the rigidities built into the system.
- Waste and Centralised standards. Has the time come to look again at the costs and delays caused by outdated standards of building, parking spaces, street lamps and to ask whether the public's priorities would not be different if they had a chance to state them?

- The Inner City Partnership schemes. All the signs are that all decisions are being taken at Government/Borough level and there is no real partnership involving voluntary bodies at all.
- The place of voluntary organisations in the planning and provision of social and other services. (Sheila Moore's forthcoming booklet will provide an admirable basis for such a debate.)
- 5. The working of the Redundancy Payments Act. Much more research is needed but it meems as II for many tiny businesses this Act is creating large-scale anxiety since the proprietor cannot afford to go out of business if his employees are long-established. Also, where employees receive a substantial lump sum they have nothing like the opportunities to invest in a business which a previous generation had.
- Stamp Duty and the workings of the Stamp Duty Office.
- 7. <u>Derelict land in the ownership of mublic authorities</u>. It may be felt that the recent 10 Minute Rule Bill covered this but it is a subject which would allow great consultations with voluntary and community groups. It is also scandalous.
- The provision of adequate leisure time activities, particularly for the less educated. As a means of encouraging private enterprise to expand the economy this has few equals.
- Training and re-training. This would allow for detailed discussions with Trade Union leaders. It would also permit a thorough run over the various industrial training boards.

- 10. The restraints on the supply of teachers to schools. This is particularly pertinent to the supply of supply teachers when regular teachers are ill or involved in exame.
- 11. The care of the elderly in the 1980s. This allows for a debate running the whole gamut from the destruction of pensioners' savings from which they might make provision for themselves through to the closure of small hospitals suitable for long-term care. It brings in voluntary organisations etc.
- 12. Unemployment. "Back to work with Labour"
- Child Poverty. Who really looks after the poor? 9/10 rise in living standards has taken place under the Conservatives.
- 14. The EBC Social Fund and the Labour Party's dislike of Europe.
- Religious education in schools. This, properly prepared, could win us many friends in some of the immigrant communities.
- 16. Civil Liberties. a) At home, Secrecy, powers of bureaucracy, powerlessness of Commons against Government etc.
 - b) Abroad Czechoslovakia, Yuri Orlov, Berlin Wall.
- 17. Use of Government machine to sell Labour to the electorate.

On nearly all these use individual examples, carefully chosen.
