SUBJECT:

Mrs. Thatcher's Visit

Our views on Ambassador Wright's proposal to invite the President and Mrs. Reagan to a dinner marking the bicentennial of the establishment of the US-UK diplomatic relations remain essentially the same as conveyed in our earlier memo. To reiterate, in view of the President's close personal relationship with Mrs. Thatcher this sounds like the sort of event that the President and Mrs. Reagan would like to attend. Their attendance would also send a highly positive signal about U.S.-British relations.

Like you, we are concerned about the precedential implications of an acceptance. However, in light of the President's relationship with Mrs. Thatcher and the special character of the dinner, we recommend that the President and Mrs. Reagan accept Ambassador Wright's invitation. We can use the special character of the bicentennial event to fend off other requests to make exceptions to our standard policy on dinner and breakfast. If the President and Mrs. Reagan accept the invitation, I strongly recommend that we not let it become known publicly until after King Fahd's visit. This may pose a slight problem for Wright since he hopes to include the President's attendance in his invitation. I am confident that he will agree to cooperate. Please let me know if I can help in any way.

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SUBJECT:

Mrs. Thatcher's Visit

Mrs. Thatcher's schedule for her February 20 visit to Washington is nearly in place. She will be addressing a Joint Session of Congress; therefore, her meeting with the President will not start until 12 noon, and we will reverse the normal order and have lunch first followed by the meeting, or seminar. There will also be a brief tete-a-tete in the Oval Office just prior to lunch.

From the British perspective the major outstanding question is whether the President and Mrs. Reagan will attend the Ambassador's dinner commemorating the 200th anniversary of US-UK diplomatic relations. The Reagans and Thatchers would be the guests of honor. Wright wrote you about this and other aspects of the visit in early January; in our reply (which went out under Bob's signature because you were in Europe), we promised to help sort out the schedule. We also told Wright to feel free to contact Mike Deaver directly, especially about the dinner.

Wright discussed the dinner with Deaver and he has now written making a formal proposal (Tab A). Bob has been in close touch with Deaver's office all along; and they have asked for our views on the invitation.

In a memo that John signed in your absence we informed Deaver that this sounded like the sort of event the President would like to attend (Tab II).

For your information, Mrs. Thatcher is now staying a second day in Washington and she has asked for a roundtable discussion of economic issues with Cabinet members. State is sorting out who would chair: Shultz or Regan/Baker.

RECOMMENDATION

That you sign the Tab I memo to Deaver reiterating the above view, while also underlining the precedential nature of the President's acceptance.

SUBJECT:

Mrs. Thatcher's February Visit

We need to sort out the details of Mrs. Thatcher's February 20 visit to Washington.

She wants to address a joint session of Congress before coming to the White House to meet with the President. Steps are underwayto arrange for her to address Congress. Speaker O'Neill's office has indicated that Congress will likely agree and that Mrs. Thatcher could probably address Congress at 11:00 a.m. on February 20.

This will require some modifications in our normal meeting times. Furthermore, Mrs. Thatcher always asks for at least a brief private meeting with the President (see Wright's letter). George Shultz had previously spoken to Mrs. Thatcher about a "seminar" type discussion. This is more or less what we did at Camp David.

Against this background, we propose the following White House schedule for Pebruary 20:

1985 marks the 200th anniversary of the establishment of US-UK diplomatic relations. We plan to include a reference to this in the President's departure remarks. Ambassador Wright also wishes to host a dinner in the President's and Mrs. Thatcher's honor marking the bicentennial anniversary. In view of the President's close personal relationship with Mrs. Thatcher, this sounds like the sort of event that the President would like to attend.

Please let me know your reaction to our schedule suggestion including the possibility of the President attending Ambassador Wright's dinner.

Mrs. Thatcher's February Visit

Now that the Thatcher visit is officially on the President's schedule for February 20, we need to nail down some of the loose ends outlined in my earlier memo (Tab III). Ambassador Wright's letter to Bud (Tab A) amplifies the three outstanding questions:

- -- Address to Joint Session of Congress
- -- Timing and format for "seminar" meeting with President
- -- Possible Presidential participation at dinner on the evening of February 20, hosted by Wright, commemorating the 200th anniversary of the establishment of US-UK diplomatic relations.

Joint Session:

We are underway on getting Speaker O'Neill's agreement for Mrs. Thatcher to address a joint session. Wright has sent the requesting letter. Once I receive a copy of it, I will be sending over a package with the Presidential endorsement letter. Both State Protocol and the British tell me that she should be able to address Congress at 11:00 a.m. (B also thinks it could be arranged to start at 11.)

Timing and Format:

If she addresses Congress at 11, we can start at the White House at 12 noon (based on Protocol's analysis of how past joint sessions have gone, a 12 noon starting time at the White House 15 nighly feasible). The British are pushing for both additional time with the President because of the seminar and a private session. There follows my compromise suggestion:

With Bud in Europe, he asked me to reply to your letter concerning the administrative arrangements for Prime Minister Thatcher's upcoming visit.

We are currently addressing the three questions you have raised. We understand you have written to Speaker O'Neill formally requesting that Mrs. Thatcher address a joint session of Congress. The President will also be writing the Speaker endorsing your request.

We are working with Mike Deaver on the timing and format for the White House session and on the possibility of the President attending your dinner on February 20th. You will be hearing back from us, shortly, with information on the details we have worked out. Please, however, feel free to mention your desires directly to Mike, especially your interest in hosting a dinner in the President's and Prime Minister Thatcher's honor to mark the bicentennial of US-UK diplomatic relations.

Mrs. Thatcher's February Visit

I) am working separately with Bob Kimmitt on nailing down formally Pebruary 20th as the date for Mrs. Thatcher's next visit.

There are a number of related questions that must be resolved soon. The first is format. Secretary Shultz had earlier spoken to Mrs. Thatcher about a seminar. I believe he had in mind the university type seminar that Mrs. Thatcher occasionally holds at Chequers. Given that we have already been to Camp David and other demands on the President's schedule. It suspect that you will want to hold the seminar here at the White House. It generally has been referred to as a "arms control seminar" but I believe we should broaden it to call it "A Seminar on East/West Relations and Arms Control."

As to timing, we normally have, as you know, from 11:00 a.m. to 1:40 p.m. for working visits. I need guidance on whether we intend to seek additional time on the President's calendar. Given that he has just met with Mrs. Thatcher, I see no pressing need to seek more time.

Furthermore, we may have to seek modifications in the times normally allocated for such visits. As you know, Mrs. Thatcher has expressed an interest in addressing a Joint Session of Congress. I have received conflicting information on when such a session normally begins, but it may be that we will have to begin the White House meeting with a working lunch to be followed by the normal discussion meeting.

Concerning the Joint Session, I have spoken to both B. Oglesby and State. B. has spoken to the Speaker's office, who would first like an official request from the British Embassy. After the British have made their request, we will follow it up with a Presidential endorsement. Since the British first raised this with the Vice President, Don Gregg has asked, and I have agreed that he could inform the Embassy of the need for a letter from Wright to the Speaker.

Ambassador Wright has also exprassed interest in the President attending a dinner on the evening of February 20th that he will host commemorating the 200th anniversary of the establishment of U.S.-U.K. diplomatic relations. Mrs. Thatcher plans to attend the commemorative dinner. The British Embassy told me Wright planned to write Deaver about the dinner invitation. I told the Embassy, Wright should write you.

RECOMMENDATION:

At this time, I need your guidance on the format and timing for the seminar.

Hold meeting to normal length of approximately two hours and forty minutes (including prebrief)

Seek additional time
