

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO PARIS, 5 JUNE 1978

As I told you on the telephone this morning, the Prime Minister would be very happy to accept the invitation which President Giscard d'Estaing conveyed to her through HM Ambassador in Paris on 10 May to pay a short one-day visit to Paris on an agreed date early in June. Of the dates mentioned by the French, Tuesday, 5 June, would suit the Prime Minister very well. It has proved possible for her to rearrange her other commitments on that day so that the whole day is now clear. The most suitable outline programme might include a session of talks before lunch, and another, perhaps shorter, concluding session in the afternoon. It would be convenient if the Prime Minister were able to return to London in time for dinner.

I should be grateful if you would arrange for the Elysee to be informed of the Prime Minister's acceptance of President Giscard's invitation, and of her preference for 5 June. Prime Minister will wish to keep the party travelling with her to an absolute minimum on this occasion: I should be grateful for early advice on the composition of its FCO element.

It would be helpful if briefing for the Prime Minister's talks with President Giscard could reach me not later than 1700 hours on Thursday, 31 May. I should also be grateful if our Embassy in Paris could confirm that there would be no question of speeches at the lunch which President Giscard is to give in the Prime Minister's honour: if there is any likelihood that the Prime Minister may be expected to respond to a toast, I should be grateful if draft speaking notes could accompany the briefs.

I should also be grateful for early advice on travel arrangements for the visit.
