Plans A

I note from the record of our meeting on 29 April that your summing up concluded that the union demand for arbitration for 1982 was not negotiable. During our talk I had taken it that you were referring to arbitration in 1981. If your view is that we should rule out arbitration, in advance, for 1982 this is a change from what we agreed at Cabinet on 14 April when we left open the possibility of allowing arbitration in 1982 if:

- a. it was necessary to secure a settlement of the dispute; and
- b. I had the agreement of the Chancellor.

That was of course when you were away.

It is now evident that our next talks with the unions will be after their conference season, towards the end of this month. I will then give an account and my views to Cabinet. But, though I would be delighted to be proved wrong on this, I must again repeat my view that we are unlikely to get the unions to settle without arbitration for 1982. By arbitration I mean arbitration qualified as we discussed at Cabinet on 14 April.

I am copying this to the Chancellor, Secretary of State for Employment and Sir Robert Armstrong.
