1. MILITARY ISSUES

THE CHIEF OF THE DEFENCE STAFF briefed the Sub-Committee on the latest military situation.

The Sub-Committee - Took note.

2. DIPLOMATIC ISSUES

SIR ANTONY ACLAND said that the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary had seen the United States Secretary of State, Mr Haig, in Luxembourg. He seemed willing to try to persuade the Argentines not to press the South Georgia issue. But he had been less forthcoming about a possible American guarantee of a settlement. He also did not want the United States to act alone. A possible way forward might be to concentrate on the need for an American military presence in the Falklands in the context of verifying the military withdrawal.

THE PRIME MINISTER, summing up the discussion, said that American co-operation remained essential. Further consideration should be given to the possibility of bringing pressure to bear on Argentina through suitable Latin American intermediaries, eg Brazil and Mexico. The possibility of the Pope cancelling his proposed pastoral visit to Britain was unwelcome. Cancellation could look like a moral victory for Argentina. If it would be helpful to the Vatican, British Ministers could avoid involvement in the visit.

The Sub-Committee -

Invited the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary to give further consideration to the points raised by the Prime Minister in her summing up.
