Steel

Steel unions meet today. Sirs predicts BSC offer will be turned down and strike will go on to Easter. FT says most buyers are overcoming the strike.

Economy/Budget

Star says Treasury officials and Chancellor are at loggerheads over indirect tax increases because of effect on IRP. Petroleum Revenue Tax to be raised; also end of earnings related supplement, de-indexing of short term benefits and 75p on child benefit - Budget speculation. National Consumer Council wants higher maternity grant and higher stamp duty threshold. R. Hayward calls for import controls.

Ireland

Sun backs Edward Gardner's idea of ending Irish voting privilege. Cardinal O'Fee condemns violence in London sermon but says a united Ireland is a natural desire.

EEC

Reports that Community nears Eurobudget crisis. Euroloan to provide 18 new fast inter-city trains. Cossiga may lose vote of confidence this week.

Law and Order

Sunday Times says Blair Peach was killed by one of a six-man SPG team.

Charles of ficers want 12,000 more men at cost of £60 million. Petrol bomb thrown and explodes at Newcastle football match. Attorney General says some criminals have been framed by Police so that they will not give evidence against officers - and offers protection.
