Invitation to the Prime Minister to Deliver the Decline? with Commencement Address at Stanford University on spel. Sunday, 14 June 1981 ( hud 16/Ku

Stanford University in California have told our Embassy at Washington that they would like to invite the Prime Minister to deliver their commencement address on Sunday, 14 June 1981.

The possibility of a major speech on the West Coast is an attractive one. Given Presidentelect Reagan's connections with California, a visit to Stanford would now be more appropriate than hitherto. Stanford University is a prestigious institution and would provide a suitable platform for a speech by the Prime Minister.

On the other hand, an invitation for 14 June seems unfortunately to be a non-starter. The Prime Minister has indicated that she would wish to pay an early visit to the United States after President Reagan's inauguration, probably in February/March. The Economic Summit at Ottawa will take place on 20 and 21 July, which argues against the Prime Minister crossing the Atlantic to the United States six weeks previously. If you agree, therefore, we will instruct the Embassy to decline the invitation with regret on the grounds that the Prime Minister cannot be in the United States at
