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THE FALKLAND ISLANDS SERVICE

Note by Ministry of Defence officials

This memorandum invites the attention of Ministers to certain points arising in the implementation of the proposals set out in the Defence Secretary's minute of 5 July to the Prime Minister.

ORDER OF SERVICE

2. Attached is a copy of the order of service which the Dean of St. Paul's has proposed after discussion with other Church authorities and with Ministry of Defence officials. It has become clear that the Archbishop of Canterbury attaches great importance to a broadly based and willing ecumenical participation. It has not been easy to reconcile the approaches of the various ecclesiastical interests to what should be seen as a truly national occasion, but the more objectionable features reported in The Times of 1 July do not appear. The prayers are responsible in tone, though it is understood that the Moderator of the Free Church Federal Council (Dr. Kenneth Greet) has been asked to reduce the length of his contribution. The Ministry of Defence has, however, represented to the Dean its concern that there is no lay participation, for example in the reading of a lesson, to establish a linkage with the events which formed the occasion for the service. There are considerable difficulties here, and Ministers may wish to discuss the matter further.

ALLOCATION OF SEATS

3. In the time available the most practical, even if slightly arbitrary, way of implementing the wish of Ministers to be generous in the allocation of seats to next of kin is to send two tickets to each next of kin other than widows and three to each widow, with an indication that children may be included. This has been done, and we propose that the resulting increase over the 500 tickets assigned

to next of kin in the Defence Secretary's minute should, together with the accommodation of appropriate civic interests, be met mainly by reducing the allocation to the general public. It is planned that members of the task force and next of kin should be seated prominently within the Cathedral, receiving priority over VIPs not closely connected with the direction and conduct of operations, foreign and Commonwealth guests, and the general public.
