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NOTE FOR THE RECORD

1. When the Prime Minister emerged from the luncheon on the first day of the Summit meeting at Copenhagen on 14 December, he gave a brief account of the proceedings to date.

2. After the first one-and-a-half hours of discussion, the Prime Minister said that these had been spent entirely on how to deal with the five Arab Foreign Ministers. President Pompidou said that this was nothing to do with the Heads of Government. An interminable procedural discussion then followed. The Prime Minister of Denmark suggested that he should receive the Foreign Ministers alone, on behalf of the Conference, and was supported by Mr den Uyl. After further discussion (the objections to the Danish proposals were not clear in the Prime Minister's account) the Prime Minister himself proposed that the Foreign Ministers of the Nine should receive the Arabs, and this proposal was accepted. It was agreed that the Foreign Ministers would take delivery of the Arab message, and report to the Heads of State and Government.

3. Mr Jørgensen next proposed that the meeting should break up into separate gatherings of Prime Ministers and Foreign Ministers. This was accepted also. He then put to his colleagues the suggestion that the President of the Commission should be present with the Heads of Government. President Pompidou did not know that this suggestion had been made, and did not object to it, although M Jobert subsequently informed him of it. The Prime Minister thought it possible that M Pompidou would object to the President of the Commission

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when the meeting reconvened.

4. Herr Brandt apparently said that if these facilities were granted to the Arab Foreign Ministers to state their view, similar arrangements should be granted to the representatives of Israel. When it was pointed out to the Federal Chancellor that the Israelis had not turned up at Copenhagen, Herr Brandt said that if necessary ^{would} he ~~could go~~ to Tel Aviv himself. *Speak to the Israeli Ambassador tomorrow*
