Dear Gellen,

Thank you for your letter of 3 February.

Needless to say I very much welcome your decision to give effect to our Manifesto commitment and recognise that you will not be able to move at present on the other points mentioned in my letter.

I take the point that tax relief on health insurance premiums errodes the tax base and may affect the pattern of savings. On the other hand it may help relieve pressure to increase the volume of expenditure and hence taxation, and in the long run encourage some substitution of private for public expenditure on health care. I hope we shall be able to give further thought to the issues involved as part of a review of the longer-term financing of health care, on which I intend to produce a preliminary paper.
