## Scargill and Murray in clash on pay By David Felton

A public disagreement broke out at a conference yesterday between Mr Arthur Scargill, the miners' leader, and Mr Len Murray, general secretary of the

TUC, after Mr Murray suggested that workers could accept

lower pay increases in return for cuts in their hours. Mr Scarill, president of the National Union of Mineworkers, told the confderence in

London, that he hoped he had misheard what Mr Murray was

suggesting. "I seem to under-stand Len Murray to say the movement would have to face the problem of taking a lower

amount of wages in exchange for a shorter working week. "I reject that concept. I do

not believe in the argument that we should restrain from pressing for wage increases for a cut

in the working week," Mr Scargill said. He added that a national overtime ban could take two million people off the dole queue. Mr Murray had said earlier that union negotiators ought to realize that there could be a "trade-off between incomes and

jobs. Not cuts in pay for shorters hours because we rejected that. But workers choosing between pay increases alone or smaller pay increases with shorter hours. We have got to get the balance right."
