Weekend Interest

The weekend appears to be relatively quiet. Sunday papers are likely to further analyse censure debate speeches and speculate on the future course of sterling. Any moves on the coal dispute will also be watched with interest. LWT's 'Weekend World' will deal with Gibraltar and feature the Foreign Secretary, Morran and Hassan.

In Parliament

The press will be watching the <u>coal mining dispute</u> debate on <u>Monday</u> and also the <u>adjournment debate</u> on the <u>future</u> of the <u>BBC External Service</u> later that evening. Three controversial Orders will also receive media attention: the <u>Rate Capping</u> <u>Order on Wednesday</u>, and the <u>Water Authorities (Return of Assets)</u> <u>Orders and the</u> <u>Motion on the LRT (Lay)</u> <u>Order on Thursday</u>. On <u>Monday</u>, the <u>all-Party Rights Campaign</u> will be <u>launching a Bill with a public meeting</u> in the Commons to incorporate the <u>European Convention on Human Rights</u> into UK law. On <u>Wednesday</u>, the SDP Chief Whip, Lord Kilmarnock will open a <u>Lords debate</u> by demanding the introduction of <u>generic</u> prescribing by <u>GPs</u>.

Other Main Events

On <u>Monday and Tuesday</u>, the Foreign Secretary meets the <u>Spanish Foreign Minister</u> in Geneva for discussions on <u>Gibraltar</u> in preparation for the opening of the border on Tuesday. The <u>Building Societies meet on Monday</u> to discuss mortgage rates and on <u>Tuesday the money supply figures are published</u>. Monday's <u>BBC Panorama</u> programme looks at the problems of <u>unemployment and job creation</u>. Teachers in <u>England</u> and Wales have threatened <u>dissruptive action from Wednesday</u> when <u>Mr Ridley</u> appears before the <u>Transport Select Committee</u> on the financing of Public Transport Services. On the same day, the <u>Manpower Services Commission</u> will be giving evidence to the <u>Employment Select Committee</u> on the Youth Training Scheme. On Thursday and Friday <u>Mr Jenkin visits Liverpool</u> where he will dine with Liverpool editors. <u>Sir Geoffrey</u> Howe begins a 5-day visit to Turkey Rumania and <u>Bulgaria</u>. The Lord Chancellor announces the <u>civil justice review on Wednesday</u>.

PRESS DIGEST

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ECONOMY/DEBATE

- You rebuff Kinnock's attack he fails once again to ruffle you in spite of record unemployment figures which Tom King says are boosted by the coal strike.
- Sketchwriters say you trounced leader of the Opposition; <u>Sun</u> Maggie beats off Little Sir Echo - Kinnock floored. You claim standard of living is best ever; but emphasise need for wage moderation.
- Chancellor, winding up, puts attack on inflation before tax cuts.
- Meanwhile, £ strengthens to \$1.1315 and 71.6% oil prices rise on spot market, but expected cut in British base rates fails to materialise.
- <u>Telegrp</u> leader says central economic issue confronting Government is still unemployment. There is an urgent need for the Government to develop and apply policies which are cost effective and have a direct impact on jobs.
- D/Star also says unemployment is top priority and it is about time Tory MPs rebelled over this as well as Stansted.
- Trevor Kavanagh in <u>Sun</u> says you wiped the floor with Kinnock as he launched a suicidal attack; Labour MPs watched in dismay as he muffed a golden opportunity.
- <u>Mirror</u> concentrates on "fury" over unemployment rise and Chancellor's tax warning saying he backed off from his plan for a tax cutting budget. In a leader it says the nation has become numbed by unemployment. Criticises your description of the figures as "disappointing" and says unemployment is appalling, tragic, horrific and unnecessary. Government lacks the will, foresight and imagination.
- Express reports a clear triumph for you over"Little Sir Echo" Kinnock.
- <u>Mail</u> says you hit at wage rises in row over jobless record and says Chancellor's backtracking on tax reductions seemed to snatch defeat from what should have been a famous victory over the Opposition; in a leader <u>Mail</u> on the real cause of unemployment, says all too often British businessmen cannot be bothered to expand because of the hassle over employment protection laws, planning permission, regulations etc. Opposition seems hardly to realise that the problem exists.
- <u>Guardian</u> says Tories were accused of deliberately orchestrating a successful effort to wreck Kinnock's opening speech. He failed to make the impact he needed. It says Bank of England opposed a cut in lending rates yesterday, though market points to a 1-1.5% cut.
- Guardian leader finds scant comfort for unemployed in yesterday's debate.
- <u>Times</u> leads on Chancellor dampening hopes of a tax cutting Budget. Julian Haviland says the censure motion united the Tories and made you dangerous. MPs of all parties agree that after yesterday's speech it may be some years before another censure is attempted.
- <u>FT</u> says you brushed off Labour's challenge. Opposition ploy backfires. It adds that oil producers outside OPEC appear to be edging towards conformity with new pricing structure.

COAL STRIKE

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- Norman Willis, TUC General Secretary, trying to get talks going, but NUM still jib at uneconomic pit closures being on the agenda.
- You blame NUM for any humiliation of miners.
- Search for the NUM assets £2.7m moves to Dublin.
