Pit strike 'has cost **CEGB** £1.8 bn'

The pit strike has cost the Central Electricity Generating Board as much as £1.8billion, according to leaked documents.

They show the board could incur a loss of up to £2billion this year, compared with pre-strike estimates of a deficit of

£200million.

The most important factor in The most important factor in the cost of the stoppage has been oil substituted for coal, according to *Channel Four News*, which obtained the papers. They were said to have the board's highest security rating. rating. The

The sum s higher than previous estir ates and will be used by the National Union of Mineworkers as an argument against the National Coal Board's policies.

In normal times 80 per cent of electricity comes from coalfired power stations. By August last year electricity from coal was meeting only 40 per cent of demand.

The Electricity Council, which runs the electricity industry's finances, said last November that if the financial November that it the financial burden of the strike were to be borne solely by the consumer, prices would have to rise by 10 per cent. According to Channel 4 researchers the leaked documents suggest the rise would be twice that.
