Weekend Interest

Digesting and assessing the impact of your visit to Washington, in particular on the economic front, will be a major subject of interest and the remarks on the strength of the Dollar by President Reagan as you departed will be seized on. Secondly, the story about the Channel 4 programme alleging MI5 phone-tapping will probably give rise to a lot of coverage and commentary. Thirdly, of course, the stalemate in the coal strike will continue to be centre stage. Mr Walker is issuing a statement tomorrow, and Mr Hunt will be on "This Week, Next Week" (Sunday, 13.00, BBC TV 2).

Key interviews/programmes on other matters include Mr Tam Dalyell on "The Week in Westminster" (Saturday, 13.10, Radio 4), Mr Timothy Raison on Sudan on BBC Radio "The World This Weekend", and Mr Denis Healey on "The Frost Interview" (Sunday, 9.00, TV AM).
