Fight will go on if strike ends, Scargill says

If the miners decide at their delegate conference tomorrow to go back to work, the strike will end but "the fight and the dispute will go on", Mr Arthur Scargill, president of the National Union of Mineworkers, said last night.

He insisted that he would recommend the strike should continue, although he acknowledged a possibility that delegates could vote against

him.

Mr Michael Eaton, the National Coal Board spokesman, predicted during a faceto-face interview with Mr Scargill on a special ITV programme, The Miners Strike, that it was "highly likely miners will return to work next week".

The two men clashed over the question of granting an amnesty to miners dismissed because of convictions for criminal offences during the year-long dispute.

"There will be no resolution of the dispute in the industry,

whether the strike ends or not, until the coal board grant that question of an amnesty", Mr Scargill said.

But Mr Eaton said that the number and seriousness of many of the crimes committed were far too great to give such an amnesty, "and we shall not do it".

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
