Dear Rosin,

You wrote to Jim Daniell on 19 April about the suggestion from Sir David Price MP that the Prime Minister might 'sponsor' and name one of the second pair of refrigerated vessels being built by Harland and Wolff for the Blue Star Line. In addition Mark Addison had written to me on 29 March about an invitation to the Prime Minister from Larne Harbour Limited to open the new passenger terminal at that port.

Our advice would be that each of these engagements is inherently worth carrying out in its own right and would be of appropriate weight for the Prime Minister. The sensible thing would obviously be to include both of them in the schedule for a more comprehensive visit to Northern Ireland, as you discussed with Robert Andrew. It would be entirely practicable to contain both of these events on (say) the second day of a two-day programme.

Larne Harbour is the only commercial port in Northern Ireland in private ownership. The managing company, Larne Harbour Limited, is a wholly-owned subsidiary of the European Ferries Group.

Mr Parker, who is a director of the Group, is also Chairman of the Felixstowe Dock Company. His Larne company, which employs 140 people, has been energetic and enterprising in its development of the port from fairly modest dimensions to its present status as a vital link with the Great Britain mainland, handling 35% of all trade passing through Northern Ireland ports and over 80% of all sea-bound tourist traffic to the Province. The new multi-purpose passenger terminal building, costing £1.9 million, will add substantially to the comfort and convenience of passengers using the port.

Turning to the Blue Star proposition, as you know the order for four vessels was a very significant element in providing the Belfast shipyard with a reasonable flow of work until further orders could be achieved. The first pair of vessels have already been named (one by the Duchess of Kent). The standard naming ceremony at Harland and Wolff can be a somewhat protracted affair, allowing for a tour of the vessel as well as the naming ceremony itself and a formal luncheon with speeches, but this could no doubt be abbreviated to fit in with other events in a well-rounded programme.

I therefore attach draft letters which might go from you to Larne Harbour Limited and from Mr Alison to Sir David Price. You will see that each reply expresses interest in principle, but falls short of final commitment; we have very much in mind the inevitable uncertainties about the Prime Minister's forward programme, the development of political events here both internally and at the Anglo-Irish level, and the need to take careful security advice closer to the time. However, neither of these engagements necessarily has to take place on a set date.


