In the last sentence of paragraph 3 of our telegram No 126 we said that a three-party Christian Democrat (DC)/Republican(PRI)/Social Democrat (PSDI) government might in theory obtain a majority in Parliament even with the Socialists (PSI) in opposition. To help explain the Parliamentary arithmetic, it might be useful to you to have the enclosed two tables from today's Corrière della Sera. These show how the majorities might theoretically be made up in the two Chambers. You will see that in both cases the majority depends on the National Democrats (D.Naz.), the group which broke away two years ago from the Neofascist MSI and has 9 seats in the Senate and 17 in the Chamber of Deputies. Since the National Democrats stand to be virtually eliminated in an election they are keen to do anything to keep the present Parliament in being.

It is as well to stress the word "theoretically" about these tables. Italian party discipline is notoriously bad, and there are always many more rebels against the party line than there would be in, say, a vote of confidence in the House of Commons. However, assuming that the PSI has at least its fair share of rebels (a safe assumption!), who would presumably abstain rather than vote in favour or against, this would if anything tend to increase the size of the majority.
