Italian Earthquake Relief In your letter of 13 January you conveyed the Prime Minister's agreement that a further £0.5 million should be spent on the purchase and transport of British manufactured prefabricated buildings for use in the disaster area in Southern Italy. The Prime Minister may wish to know that the operation we then set in hand was successfully completed on 9 May with the ceremonial handing over by HM Ambassador in Rome to the local Italian authorities of a number of prefabricated buildings at the villages of Serino and Solofra. The operation was supervised by the Crown Agents and was completed on time, against considerable odds, thanks to the untiring efforts of a small team of Royal Engineers who took over most of the construction work from the UK contractors. There is no doubt that this gift to the Italian authorities is greatly appreciated by the local communities: indeed, it is no exaggeration to say that it will enable normal life to resume in the two villages in question. The President of Italy, S. Pertini, is aware of what we have done. I attach a note describing the buildings provided.
