## LONG TERM PUBLIC EXPENDITURE

In your minute of 4th February you asked all Ministers with responsibility for public expenditure to review their programmes critically with a view to contributing to a substantial reduction to public expenditure in the longer term.

- 2. Our policy on Defence expenditure is clear. We are committed to the NATO target of 3% real growth to 1985/6. We shall need to decide later in the year whether to carry forward this commitment for a further financial year in the light of our defence needs and the implications for the Alliance if we were to default on the 3%. Looking beyond this, I do not see how reductions in Defence expenditure could be reconciled with the policy of strengthening our defences which we have adopted since taking office and which I assume we shall be putting to the electorate at the General Election in stark contrast to the approach of the Opposition.
- 3. I shall, of course, be reviewing the programme, and the way in which we use our manpower and other resources, over the months ahead with the aim of securing maximum efficiency and value for money within the agreed defence budget. I shall be seeking to push into the front-line as many of the available resources as possible. I do not believe, however, that you will be looking to me to contribute reductions in expenditure.
