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Public Opinion Background Note 99 (produced 4th August 1985)

Introduction 1.

Gallup conducted the interviewing for our latest 'tracking' study from 24th to 29th July and confirmed the results of the previous unpublished study (conducted 17-22 July) that the so-called 'Alliance' is leading the other two parties. Gallup found 36.5% claiming they would vote for one of the 'Alliance' parties, 34% Labour and 28% Conservative. These findings can be compared with the results of a MORI study published in the Evening Standard on 30th July, conducted partly before and partly after the announcement on the top salary review. MORI found 34% claiming they would vote Labour, 33% Conservative, 31% 'Alliance' and 2% for 'other' parties.

Compared with the start of the year, 'Alliance' support is up from 28% to 35%, Conservative support down from 35% to 28% and Labour support almost stable - 35% in January and 34% in the latest study.

Full details of the trend of support for the main parties since January 1985 showing voting intentions when those respondents not giving details of voting intention are excluded and when they were included as a separate group are shown in the tables in section 2 below:

3. Government Record

Gallup found 26% claiming to approve of our record to date, 61% disapproved and 12% did not have a view. This compares with 32% claiming to approve of our record in Government at the start of the year. Details of the trend are shown in the table below:-

4. Popularity of Political Leaders

Gallup found the lowest level of satisfaction with Mrs. Thatcher as Prime Minister in any Gallup study conducted this year - only 31% claimed to be satisfied with Mrs. Thatcher as Prime Minister, 63% dissatisfied and 6% did not have a view. Mr. Kinnock's popularity remains at about the same level as at the start of the year - 34% regarded him as a good leader, 49% that he is not a good leader and 16% did not have a view. Mr. Steel's popularity remained unchanged and that of Dr. Owen improved sharply.

(b) NOP (Daily Mail 29th-31st July)

The Daily Mail from 29th to 31st July included details of an NOP poll conducted on 15th July. They interviewed almost 1,000 electors who voted Conservative in June 1983.

NOP found that out of the 982 Conservative voters, 166 are planning to vote for one of the so-called 'Alliance' parties; 21 for Labour and 3 for 'other' parties.

NOP asked the 982 last-time Tories if the Government should concentrate on keeping inflation down even if that meant continued high unemployment, or whether it should aim to reduce unemployment, even if that meant higher inflation.

The response was: Keep inflation down, 41%. Reduce unemployment, 51%.

NOP asked the Conservative supporters what their order of priorities would be. 30% said that they wanted spending cut significantly to make room for tax cuts. But they were outnumbered by the 44% who preferred the idea of minor cuts to keep taxes at their present level. And another 18% said they would like to keep spending at the presently proposed level even if that meant raising taxes a little.

NOP found that people are concerned with keeping up the standards of public services especially in health and education, even if that means saying goodbye to the prospect of tax cuts.

Interviewees who thought that voters could be attracted back to the Tory Party by lower inflation were outnumbered nearly 3-1 by those who believed that the vital factor would be a turn-around in the unemployment figures. And those who said that unemployment was the key issue outnumbered those looking for tax cuts by seven to one.
