Having now been in Central Office for three months it is time I made the organisational and personnel changes which I believe are needed.

The first priority is the appointment of my Chief of Staff. I have secured the agreement of Saatchis to the secondment of Michael Dobbs to this post. Michael will remain a Deputy Chairman of Saatchis. He will be running down his responsibilities over the next few months. As soon as I am satisfied over any possible conflicts of interest I would like to appoint him as a special adviser (unpaid) in order that he may have access to Government papers.

I would like Michael to start work as soon as possible. I suggest Monday 16th December, and a draft press release is attached describing his terms of reference.

The other new appointment will be that of Chief Information Officer who will be responsible for relations with the press and broadcasting media. For this appointment there are three candidates in play. I hope the matter will be settled shortly.

I am not convinced that I need somany Party Vice Chairmen. Tom Arnold is a tower of strength. Emma Nicholson's post is vital to our campaigns to capture the votes of women. Geoffrey Finsberg's London Vice Chairmanship is still essential. I could easily do without Hal Miller. However you may feel that there would be a downside to asking him to leave. I would be grateful for your advice.

I inherited Harvey Thomas as Director of Communications. He is not the easiest person to integrate into the organisation. However I intend to do so. I also intend to bring Chris Lawson into help on this front.

I should report to you before long on the state of the Party and its finances.

And it is to you that the Prime Minister looks for the administration of Conservtive Party affairs.
