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FACT SHEET: MIDDLE EAST PEACE PROCESS

RELEASED IN FULL

I. SITUATION IN THE REGION IS PARTICULARLY UNSETTLED

- o Ultimate results of Jordan's administrative and legal disengagement from the West Bank are still uncertain.
- o Israel will be preoccupied for some time with formation of a government and policy formulation.
- o Syria is focussed on Lebanon and the Iraq-Iran wind-down and is not ready to move on peace.
- o Palestinian National Council meeting in mid-November will set PLO agenda.

II. U.S. POLICY REMAINS CONSTANT

- o We continue to urge moderation, accommodation, and dialogue, on the regional parties.
- We cannot support any attempt, by either Israel or Arabs, to determine unilaterally the ultimate status of the West Bank and Gaza; this is an issue for negotiation. A PNC declaration of independence would be a unilateral move.
- U.S. policy towards the PLO remains constant. The U.S. will not recognize or negotiate with the PLO until it accepts UNSCR 242, 338, and Israel's right to exist. The PLO also must renounce terrorism and violence.
- o The U.S. peace initiative remains on the table and its principles remain valid: comprehensive peace, UN Security Council Resolutions 242 and 338, legitimate political rights of the Palestinian people, and security for all states in the region.
- o The U.S. will remain active and engaged.

III. UK VIEWS PARALLEL OUR OWN

- o We have consulted closely with the UK on regional issues and hold similar views on the peace process; UK has emphasized support for Jordan and for an international conference.
- o Important that we adopt similar positions in light of latest developments affecting the peace process.
