Dear Nonfort,

We will follow up the various requests you raised on Monday, including the unemployment issue.

Meanwhile, on strengthening the Lords: you could dramatise the support you have won away from Liberals and Labour by nominating converts at same time as Mr Foot tries to reinforce his faction in the Lords. My candidates would be chosen from: Former Labour, now anti-Soc Dem Sir Richard Marsh , Paul Johnson, Dr John Murray (who was one of Gaitskell's industrialist advisers); Former Liberals, now anti-Soc Dem Sir Max Beloff and Arthur Shenfield (Lib. candidate and former CBI economic adviser). From private words of Jo Grimond, I believe he might be persuaded to join the Lords where he could help dry out the Liberal benches.

All five are powerful speakers who would totally transform the rather weary cross-benches - and would I believe give undertakings to take an active part.
