# The Weekend

Your speech at the Central Council in Felixstowe will command media attention, as will the French National Assembly Election. GCHQ may re-emerge as an issue. The first Aids advertisements are due to appear in the Sunday papers. Lord Whitelaw attends Mr Palme's funeral on Saturday.

On television, "This Week, Next Week" looks at "Caring Capitalism", including City salaries and issues affecting pensions, and "Weekend World" looks at "People's Capitalism", including wider share ownership. Mr Baker is interviewed about water privatisation on "The Money Programme".

#### Main Events

Monday is St Patrick's Day. You hold a reception for the Commonwealth Games.

Tuesday is Budget Day. OPEC meet in Geneva.

On Wednesday Messrs Fowler, Hayhoe and Whitney attend a conference on drug misuse; you look in at the reception in the evening. There is a lobby of Parliament on youth opportunities.

On <u>Thursday</u> you attend a memorial service for Mr Palme. The Queen opens the new head office of the Standard Chartered Group.

On <u>Friday</u> you visit the Board of Trade to commemorate their bicentinary. The Queen visits Wigan and Manchester. The RPI is published.

## Parliament

Besides the Budget and the ensuing debate on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>Wednesday and Thursday</u> the main business in the Commons is the Remaining Stages of the Gas Bill on Monday.

In the Lords, the Local Government Bill receives its Third Reading on <u>Tuesday</u>. On <u>Wednesday</u> there is a debate on the needs of voluntary organisations following the abolition of the GLC and Metropolitan Counties. Other Events
