#### HIPPIES

- Express: 'Maggie launches convoy task force'.
- A flock of sheep was savaged yesterday by dogs from the convoy.
- Hippies "swarmed like locusts" over a small Social Security office in the New Forest. They even climbed drainpipes to try to get inside.
- Star: P1 picture headlined 'Give us our bread' shows mob clamouring outside Social Security Office waving dole forms.

  After collecting Giro cheques they loaded a supermarket trolley with cans of beer.
- The Cabinet Committee you have formed will look at a 'workfare' scheme for the hippies.
- Mail: 'Tories work plan for hippies'.
  - Today: Article asks whether the hippies really are wastrels and scroungers or if they are just taking the blame for our real problems. We are turning them into "folk devils".
- Telegraph: P1 lead 'Workfare plan for hippies'.
- Guardian: 'Hippy delight as convoy gets week's grace to leave site'.

#### GENERAL ELECTION

- Express: P1 lead. You are winning growing Cabinet support for a "last minute" election in 1988. The reason is the Chancellor wants two budgets to get the basic rate of tax down to 25p in the £. Also, you have been advised that unemployment will start to fall significantly next winter.
- Mail: Senior Ministers now believe that an election will not be held until 1988. Nigel Lawson wants two more budgets.
- Today: Ministers are preparing tax cuts and higher public spending to tempt the electorate in 1938.
- About 120 Conservatives last night backed a motion designed to lower the temperature in the public spending v tax cuts debate.

# HEALTH AND WELFARE

- Express: An article in the Health Service Journal, written before the resignation of Victor Paige, gives him a 'D' grade. He has failed to live up to expectations.
- <u>Mail</u>: Doctors are using babies and older children for research without their parents' consent.
- <u>Mail</u>: Volunteer hospital drivers have had their mileage allowances cut while health chiefs are getting three times as much.
- Guardian: Doctors appealing for funds to save a dying child claim that they were silenced on the orders of Barney Hayhoe.
- The Commons Social Services Committee is on the verge of setting up a special inquiry into Victor Paige's resignation.
- Government plans to save cash by cutting back last year's child benefit rise have misfired. The number of children involved was miscalculated and the DHSS is £26m worse off.
- Ian Aitken looks at why civil servants (the second permanent secretary and the Director of Information) are leaving DHSS.
- Telegraph: Managers rally to defend Tory shake-up of the Health Service.

# EDUCATION

- Express: Kenneth Baker says a "modest" amount of extra money will be found for the GCSE.
- Leader praises Mr Baker for his intention to ban political indoctrination in schools.
- Mail: Leader says Mr Baker's first radio interview since becoming education supremo was a masterly performance. He was firm but kind. "It may well be that he is now the Minister who holds the future of this currently unpopular government in the hollow of his hand.
- Today: 'Baker offers give and take schools deal'.
- Guardian: The Government plans to place a new duty on head teachers and governors to take notice of approaches made by police who want access to schools.
- University administrators and lecturers have agreed a salary structure that would add £128m to the pay bill - a rise of about 18%.

### LAW AND ORDER

- Express: In a country-wide drugs swoop, armed police, some with sub-machine guns, arrested 43 people yesterday.
- <u>Sun</u>: Kevin Taylor, former Chairman of Manchester Conservative Association says the police are investigating him. He says he is a friend of John Stalker, the suspended Manchester deputy police chief.
- Mirror: Leader says it is time Mr Stalker was told why he had been suspended.

# NORTHERN IRELAND

- Express: A showdown vote on the US extradition treaty is due today. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee is virtually certain to give approval.
- <u>Sun</u>: Leader says the Anglo-Irish Accord is up the creek. A growing number of Tories believe that Ulster should be integrated with the UK like Wales and Scotland. Since everything else has failed it might be worth a try.
- <u>Today</u>: The Dukes of Norfolk and Marlborough were among backers of a Lloyd's syndicate which had helped finance the IRA, according to Campbell-Savours.
- Telegraph: Peter Barry criticises the slow pace of reforms in Ulster following the Agreement. There is growing pressure in the south to see more tangible results.

# FUEL PRICES

- Express: 'New deal on power cuts 3½ per cent off bills".
- Electricity chiefs are to offer £100 rewards to people who "shop" neighbours who are fiddling meters.

# TOURISM

- <u>Star</u>: Reporter dressed as Shakespeare walks round New York trying to persuade Americans to come to Britain.
- <u>Mail</u>: MPs on all sides yesterday attacked Americans for not coming to Britain, for the way they have treated Mark Thatcher and for delaying the extradition treaty.

# DEFENCE

- Express: The SDP/Liberal split on defence is widening.
- President Reagan is facing a humiliating reversal in Congress over his decision to scrap SALT II.

# COMPETITION POLICY

- Telegraph: Leader headed 'Channon's mouse' says that unless the review is prepared to challenge the complacency of its departmental sponsor it will not have been worth waiting all this time for.

# TRANSPORT

- <u>Telegraph</u>: The Commons last night gave overwhelming approval for the construction of the Channel Tunnel - a government majority of 265.

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### NUCLEAR

- Mail: The WI has called for a worldwide halt to nuclear development until the risks are assessed.
- Telegraph: The number of people who may have been resettled as a result of Chernobyl is put at 500,000.
- Guardian: William Waldegrave yesterday circulated a briefing document to MPs on the Panorama programme which argued that Britain's radiation limits were too high.
- Liverpool Airport has been ordered to stop handling flights of plutonium for Dounreay.

- Mirror: Joe Haines says you are indulging in gimics, eg litter; freedom of speech in universities; and the plan to instruct school pupils in morality and sex.
- <u>Mail</u>: Men will be banned from contesting for Labour Bristol City Council's elections next year in order to boost the number of women Labour councillors.
