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The Weekend

Hippies, the US extradition issue and the World Cup will be prominent in the weekend media. Mr Dalyell's speech attacking you may also arouse some interest. Weekend events include the arrival in London of the Chinese Communist Party Secretary, the Austrian Presidential election, and SOGAT's biennial delegate conference. Mr David Steel appears on 'Weekend World' (ITV, Sunday 12.00 Noon), Mr Pattie on 'The World This Weekend' (BBC Radio 4, Sunday 1.00 pm), and Mr Lange on 'This Week Next Week' (BBC TV 1, Sunday 1.00 pm).

Main Events

On <u>Monday</u> you meet the Chinese Party Secretary for talks and later host a dinner for him. The producer price index for May is published. Sir Geoffrey Howe attends the Eureka Conference in Scotland. Mr Lawson addresses the Bow Group. DoE officials give evidence on local authority capital spending to the PAC. 'Panorama' (BBC TV 1, 9.25 pm) looks at public expenditure.

On <u>Tuesday</u> the <u>money supply figures for mid-May</u> are published. Mr Baker meets local authority associations. The Education Bill gets its Second Reading.

On Wednesday the pensioners' £10 Christmas bonus and other social security benefits are debated in the Commons. Mr Newton gives evidence to the Social Services Select Committee. You meet Roger Gale and twelve children from the Royal School for Deaf Children; and then visit Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital; later you attend dinner given by the Chinese Party Secretary. Sir Geoffrey Howe addresses the Anglo Hong Kong Society. 'Flashback' (Channel 4 TV 7.20 pm) looks at the reporting of the Falklands conflict.

On Thursday the unemployment, earnings, employment and unit wage cost figures are published. The Association of University Teachers lobbies Parliament on "the crisis in the universities". The Remaining Stages of the Financial Services Bill are debated in the Commons. You entertain a group of American tourists to tea. Sir Geoffrey Howe addresses the annual diplomatic banquet. Lady Young departs for Berlin. Mr Jeffrey Archer appears on 'Question Time' (BBC TV 1, 10.00 pm).

On <u>Friday</u> The RPI for May is published. There is an adjournment debate on enterprise and deregulation in the Commons. You officially open the British Travel Centre, and later record an interview for Channel 4 News. The Prince of Wales presents the Times/RIBA Community Enterprise Scheme Awards. The EC Eureka Ministerial conference begins in The Hague. 'Any Questions' (BBC Radio 4, 8.45 pm) includes Sir David Nickson and Sir Edward du Cann.
