MIJ

- <u>Mirror</u>: 'Maggie 'misled' MFs on spies'. Peter Wright says you gave false information about Blunt and Hollis. Britain has been completely penetrated by Russian agents. He admits he was paid £13,000 in advance for his book. Lord Pothschild, he says, was never a spy.
- Chapman Fincher may be prosecuted for receiving secrets from Wright. The Attorney Ceneral has the matter under consideration.
- Leader says the court action in Australia has shown your Covernment teetering between incompetence and farc. But Peter Shore's demand for a judicial inquiry into allegations that MI5 tried to bring down Harold Wilson is aiming at the wrong target.
- <u>Mail</u>: Teddy Taylor says there is an "unexploded time bomb" in the MI5 case. Other MPs, along with Farold Wilson, may have been victims of a dirty tricks squad.
- Chapman Pincer says when he wrote "Inside Story" in 1978 there were demands by Labour MPs for his prosecution. The then Attorney Ceneral found no grounds for action and he (Pincher) anticipates the same outcome this time.
- Wright says people in power past and present have shut their eyes to massive Eussian penetration.

- Express: Chapman Pincher says that a few weeks ago Mr'Turnbull "telephoned me with some glee to say that the Labour Party would be calling for my prosecution and the prosecution of Lord Rothschild".
- Wright says Lord Rothschild told him that you didn't understand intelligence work. He believed Lord Rothschild, in setting up the meeting with Pincher, must have had at least tacit approval from on high.
- Lord Chalfont says Government and the courts should deal far more rigourously with people who undertake to work in a secret service and then betray that trust for any reason.
- Sun: 'Mrs T was conned by MI5 liars'.

Star: You have ordered a major shake-up of the Security Services (seems to refer to random checks at GCHQ).

- 'Thatcher misled House, claims Wright.
- Times: Kinnock to face MPs on spy book allegations.
- <u>Independent</u>: Pincher may now face charges over spy book. Thatcher accused as the spycatcher puts his case. Government has promised to say today whether it will accept Turnbull's offer.
