Thank you for your letter of 4 June about the British Council.

Peter Blaker spoke to Tony Kershaw on 5 June. He does indeed have an Early Day Motion in his pocket which supports the British Council and calls on the Government to provide the necessary funds for its activities. It has been approved by Geoffrey Rippon and Tony has sought the support for it of other officers of the Foreign Affairs Committee. Tony agreed with Peter when he suggested that it would be quite improper to launch this Motion just after the Prime Minister had met Sir Charles Troughton. Peter thinks he has taken the point that pressure now from our own back benchers criticising the Government could very well rebound to the disadvantage of the British Council. So we are fairly confident that we will not come under pressure for the time being. Tony also told Peter that he would speak to John Burgh, the new Director General of the British Council, to caution him against the Council inspiring any campaign against cuts at present.

In my view all this underlines the importance of following up the Prime Minister's view expressed at our meeting on 3 June that we should agree, and quickly inform the Council, that we will ensure that their core budget does not fall below £38 million in the financial year 1983/84. Since Sir Charles himself suggested that figure to the Prime Minister he can hardly do other than call off his campaign if it is accepted. I am therefore sending copies of this letter and yours to the Prime Minister and our other colleagues who were at last Tuesday's meeting.
