



RADIOACTIVE WASTE MANAGEMENT: WHITE PAPER

Thank you for sending me a copy of your letter of 25 June to Nigel Lawson about the proposed White Paper on radioactive waste management.

Our officials have been keeping closely in touch during the preparation of successive drafts, and most of the points Allan Stewart and I had on earlier versions have now been taken into account. However, we are still unhappy with figure 1 which, even in its revised form, is still very complex and, I fear, virtually unintelligible to anyone who is not completely familiar with the subject matter. What I would like to suggest as an alternative to figure 1 is that the narrative in paragraph 5 of the draft be expanded to include the essential points which figure 1 is trying to convey. Some figures on the levels of activity of each type of waste might also be included if quantification is thought to be desirable.

Subject to this reservation (which my officials have already taken up with yours) you may take it that I am content for publication of the White Paper to proceed.

RADIOACTIVE WASTE MANAGEMENT: WHITE PAPER

Thank you for sending me a copy of your letter and enclosure of 28 June to Nigel Lawson. I agree with you that this will be an important document and, in general, I am content with it. I should, however, like to propose three fairly minor amendments.

Paragraph 1 clearly refers back to the Government's Response to the Sixth Report of the Royal Commission on Environmental Pollution (Cmnd 6820), but the wording has been slightly changed. My own feeling is that the introductory sentence would be stronger and more arresting if it used the actual words of paragraph 14 of Cmnd 6820 and opened:

"The Secretary of State for the Environment is responsible, together with the Secretaries of State for Scotland and Wales, for nuclear waste management policy."

This spells out clearly the responsibilities of Environment Ministers for broad management strategy without cutting across my various policy responsibilities for radioactive matters. If it would help, I would be equally content if you were to amend the first line to "The responsibilities for civil radioactive waste management policy".

The first sentence of paragraph 46 concludes that atmospheric discharges are of minor importance. This is true under normal operating conditions but any significant accidental release could give rise to very serious consequences, possibly including the need to ban sales of milk and other local produce. This is a very sensitive issue, particularly to the general public, and the White Paper must not seem to be dismissive of it. I would suggest the sentence be slightly extended to make it quite clear that it refers only to normal planned releases.

Finally, I suspect that there has been an unintentional oversight in the third sentence of paragraph 61. The Executive will, of course, need to be in close touch with my Department when preparing

The Executive will, of course, need to be in close touch with my Department when preparing detailed waste disposal plans for English sites and the reference to "the Environment Departments" should I suggest be to "the Authorising Departments".


