1. FOLLOWING IS THE TEXT OF THE SPEAKER'S STATEMENT ON WHICH HE DREW IN HIS REMARKS AT THE WHITE HOUSE PRESS CONFERENCE:
BEGINS: THANK YOU MR PRESIDENT FOR INVITING ME TO JOIN YOU IN EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR THE HISTORIC ANGLO-IRISH AGREEMENT REACHED TODAY. I AM DELIGHTED TO BE HERE.

I CONGRATULATE THE LEADERS OF THE GOVERNMENTS OF IRELAND AND GREAT BRITAIN FOR TAKING THIS IMPORTANT AND COURAGEOUS STEP OF CONSTRUCTING A FRAMEWORK FOR PEACE AND RECONCILIATION IN NORTHERN IRELAND.

THE ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE AGREEMENT TODAY DEMONSTRATES IN UNMISTAKABLE FASHION THAT THE WAY FORWARD IN NORTHERN IRELAND IS NOT THROUGH THE BULLET AND THE BOMB BUT RATHER THROUGH DIRECT NEGOTIATIONS BETWEEN THE FREELY ELECTED LEADERS OF TWO GREAT WESTERN DEMOCRACIES.

I AM HOPEFUL THAT THIS AGREEMENT WILL PROVIDE THE BASIS FOR BUILDING A BRIDGE OF HOPE AND RECONCILIATION BETWEEN THE TWO GREAT TRADITIONS IN NORTHERN IRELAND. WE KNOW FROM OUR EXPERIENCE IN AMERICA THAT DIVERSITY CAN BE A SOURCE OF STRENGTH IN A SOCIETY RATHER THAN A SOURCE OF DIVISION.

BEGINNING TODAY MUCH MUST BE DONE TO BUILD A LASTING PEACE IN NORTHERN IRELAND. BECAUSE OF THIS, I AM PLEASED TO HEAR THE PRESIDENT REAFFIRM THE COMMITMENT OF THE UNITED STATES TO HELP PROMOTE PEACE AND RECONCILIATION IN NORTHERN IRELAND IN A CONCRETE WAY.

I CAN ASSURE THE PRESIDENT THAT AS SPEAKER I WILL DO EVERY—THING IN MY POWER TO SEE THAT SUCH A COMMITMENT, INCLUDING APPROPRIATE FINANCIAL AND ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE, IS HONORED BY THE CONGRESS AS SWIFTLY AND AS FULLY AS POSSIBLE. I AM SURE THAT MY COLLEAGUES SENATORS KENNEDY AND MOYNIHAN AND CONGRESSMEN BOB MICHEL, TOM FOLEY AND JOE MCDADE WILL JOIN WITH ME AND THE MANY FRIENDS OF IRELAND ON CAPITOL HILL TO HELP MAKE THIS IMPORTANT AMERICAN CONTRIBUTION TO PEACE, JUSTICE AND RECONCILIATION IN NORTHERN IRELAND. ENDS

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Draft message from the Prime Minister to the President of the United States

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I want to thank you most warmly for the generous statement you made on 15 November about the new Anglo-Irish Agreement. I was very grateful that you spoke in such warm terms, and within minutes of the ceremony when Garret FitzGerald and I had signed the Agreement. Your joint press conference with Speaker O'Neill was widely featured in the media here, including the first televised reports on the Agreement.

It is a great source of strength for me
to have your public support for our efforts to
promote stability in Northern Ireland through
democracy, dialogue and reconciliation and
for our determination to defeat those who
cause suffering through violence.

I believe that the Anglo-Irish Agreement has the support of a very large majority in Parliament and in the public in the United Kingdom. My major purpose now will be to bring home to unionists that the Agreement can do good for all the people of Northern Ireland.
