Dear Joan ,

The Chief Whip has made some very informal soundings of those back bench colleagues who are most concerned with the Special Development Order. They still hope that by one means or another they can delay everything until the Autumn, and in that way shift the Government off its course and destroy the whole NIREX based approach. In the Chief Whip's view this would increase the chances of much more widespread opposition in the House and he cannot commend that course.

However we could try and meet their other point which is a debate on the policy of waste disposal before the laying and approval of the Order, and in the Chief Whip's view, this whole process should be completed before the House rises for Whitsun. This would involve two debates, not one as he hoped, but it could still be within the timescale worked out between him and the Secretary of State for the Environment on Sunday 20 April. Thus the timetable is tight but can be achieved as follows:

By 2 May: Government response to the appropriate part of

the Select Committee Report

8 May: Announce debate on principle

13 May: Hold debate on principle

13 May: Lay Order

13 May: Prayer tabled against Order

15 May: Announce debate on Prayer

By 22 May: Hold debate on Prayer.

This could be managed without disruption to other essential Government business.

The alternative is to have one debate before Whitsun. This could be done but it must increase the chances of guerrilla tactics by disgruntled government back benchers.

The Chief Whip's strong view is that we should do everything in our power to proceed resolutely but in as conciliatory a manner as possible, and without delay.
